VILLAGER GETS UTTLESFORD TOP JOB

Congratulations are in order for long time village resident Elizabeth Godwin who has been honoured with the Chairmanship of Uttlesford District Council

Elizabeth, who was first elected to the council in 2000 and now stands as an Independent, was recently elected by her fellow councillors and installed at a ceremony in the council's Saffron Walden offices

Most people will know Elizabeth as a school governor, parish councillor, open gardens committee member, village magazine contributor or one of the hundred or so other jobs she tirelessly takes on for the good of the village, and so this honour is richly deserved, although the office does come with its challenges

"I've never been so busy, said an enthused but tired Elizabeth when I met her recently at one of the many village fetes she is attending in an official capacity, "to think that my predecessor said things would start slowly and build up through the year. Goodness knows what I have in store!". Indeed Elizabeth is so busy on the village fete 'circuit' that on some days she is doing multiple visits "Everybody wants to see you there" she says

The Chairmanship of UDC is, in itself, strange. Uttlesford is the largest single area within Essex, and Uttlesford Hundred dates back to Doomsday times, but nobody seems ever to have heard of it (until Stansted is mentioned of course), even the Queen has asked where her subjects would be if they resided in Uttlesford, even though the district was named, in a Sunday Times survey, as the area that "offered the best quality of life in England and Wales"

Fire in Birchanger Lane

In the early evening of June 16th a fire broke out in a caravan parked at a house in Birchanger Lane. The emergency services were called arriving at about 5.30.

The fire destroyed a garage, the caravan and caused substantial damage to the house. A number of neighbours rallied to the emergency and happily, there was no one harmed in the fire although a number of the residents pets needed to be rescued.

Some of the pets are being cared for at The Three Willows, the remainder of the family will be staying with relatives while their home is cleared up.

Four appliances attended the fire, one of which had been sent by the Tower at the airport, as a result there was some disruption to traffic which was quickly redirected. The cause of the fire is as yet unknown.

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS FROM Elizabeth Godwin

A New Role

Last month I was elected Chairman of The District Council, a role I never expected to have. It is also very important for Birchanger as well. I am very proud to remember that Dolly Haggerwood was the last person from Birchanger to hold this office. There have only been three ladies in the role in the last thirty years.

The District Council in its present form was inaugurated on April 1st 1974. There are ten members of staff, and one councillor who have remained in post for over 30 years. They were all presented with a hamper of locally grown produce to mark the occasion.

It is usual for Chairmen of the Council to sponsor a charity that will benefit the entire district. I have chosen Crossroads, an organisation that allows carers some respite from a job which would otherwise be 24/7, and one that also benefits people in Birchanger. Crossroads is at risk, due to severe cut backs in funding, and has ceased operating in some parts of Essex. I do not want this to happen here. There are several fundraising events planned, but I am going to start in Birchanger, with a buffet lunch, on Friday June 25th at my house. I know the date is far from ideal, but my diary is not my own these days. I would like as many Birchanger residents to join me if they can. Tickets, to include a lunch and a soft drink are £10 each, and the lunch will run from 12 noon. I hope you can come.

Meeting with Terry Morgan

Members of the Parish Council met with Terry Morgan, and Alasdair McDermid to discuss airport issues relating to Birchanger.

The good news is that there are no plans to increase night flights in the foreseeable future.

There are no plans for compensation schemes to address blight for Birchanger, although if householders were able to prove loss of value of their homes which is directly related to the airport alone, they would be able to seek compensation in the usual way. The airport executives are very good at claiming that most of the noise, pollution and blight in Birchanger, are related to the motorway, and the A120. Noise compensation will be available to those residing in the appropriate noise contours, which have yet to be confirmed.

The airport claims to have funding for the second runway in place, but gave no details as to how this could come about. They certainly could not afford to fund the infrastructure which will be needed, and seem to have a totally unrealistic view of the actual cost required. It cannot be funded through section 106. Agreements with developers, and the governmen will not contribute the necessary amount either.

There are plans to shift the responsibility of Air Transport Movements to the District Council. Currently this lies with the Government. Stansted is the only airport whose ATMs are controlled by the government.

The first draught of the new airport layout, is a close mirror image of the existing one, with the two terminals facing each other across the short stay car park.

Architects have been appointed, and an application for the second runway is expected in about ten months time. In the meantime, plans will still be submitted to increase the airport to 35 million passengers per annum are expected at the end of the year.

Anti Social Behaviour Officer appointed

It is a sad reflection of our time that the Uttlesford District Council has found it necessary to point an Anti Social Behaviour Officer. Sadly, even in this village, we all know that this appointment is necessary The Home Office has provided funding for the post.

Fiona Gardiner has been appointed to this post. She will provide training on best practice for Council officers, and will be available to attend public meetings. She will assist the Community Safety Officer, and the Community Safety Action Team.

Another warning

We are all used to flashing lights at a car we see being driven without headlights. This may make you think again.

An initiation practice has started in South East London, and is moving into Essex. It involves the initiation of young men into drugs related gangs. The initiate has to drive his car without lights. The first motorist to flash their lights at him will be treated to a shower of bullets aimed at his tyres and windscreen. Serious injuries have been caused, and the practice is spreading. New voluntary sector centre in Dunmow

A new Voluntary Sector Centre for the district is to open in the Council Offices in Dunmow, with the support of the District council. This will provide a one stop shop which will support the wide range of voluntary work in the district. It will enable groups to share resources, and will be an important access point for those who need to use their services.

At present seven groups are due to move into the centre when it opens. These are the Council For Voluntary Service, Uttlesford Community Travel, Uttlesford Altzheimer's Society, Uttlesford Mind, Uttlesford Carers, Stroke Association and ResCu, an organisation which organises respite care for children with learning disabilities. Other groups can be accommodated for shorter periods if required, and there will be provision for any voluntary group to hold meetings, use photocopiers, and computers. There will be access for the disabled to all the meeting rooms on the ground floor. 
Rochfords update

You may have been wondering why there has been no news from Rochfords for a long time. This is because one of the developers, Taylor Woodrow, has found crested newts on the site. There may have been sustained objections to the development in the past, but the power of the crested newt puts everyone else in the shade.

As a result of this discovery, a special two acre site bordering Forest Hall Road, will become the newt's private property, and will be left in as natural a state as the newts require, with appropriate planting and maintenance. The developers have to apply for a licence from DEFRA to move them, and can then only do so at specified times of the year. Unless they obtain the licence by the end of November, work will be on hold for yet another year.
