


TONY PULLS A PERFECT PINT

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS FROM Elizabeth Godwin

What does the Church mean to Birchanger?

Our village society is changing and the Church of England is changing too. Without the active involvement of the parishioners in Church affairs there is a real danger that the two could drift apart. So how could the church fit into our village life now, and in the future?

The Friends of St Mary's are leading an initiative to define what the Mission of the Church in Birchanger should be, that is to say to draft a general statement of the Mission, supported by details of the way it is to be put into effect.

The Church is an essential feature of our life in Birchanger. A Mission Statement and its supporting details must, therefore, reflect the concerns and opinions of the Parish as a whole. The Friends, therefore are seeking your help in a questionnaire, which appears later in this magazine, in order to prepare a draft of a Mission Statement which will be considered at a public meeting at a later stage.

Sponsored shelter team cleans up the lane.

Thirteen sacks of rubbish were collected from Birchanger Lane by a small group of volunteers and youngsters from the village who wanted to do something for Birchanger, and to increase the funds raised for the youth shelter. The team spent two and a half hours cleaning up the lane on a Sunday afternoon last month. Some of the items were large, heavy and bulky. The team was joined by the new Chairman of the District Council, Peter Wilcock, and the project was supported by the youth team, and the Parish Council. A total of over £200 is expected to have been raised. It is a great pity that many of those who will benefit from the shelter failed to get out of bed for the occasion, but big congratulations to Rudi Roberts and Jessica Wright who did, and whose efforts more than made up for their absent colleagues. Both Rudi and Jess were presented with their mobile phone vouchers earlier in the month.

A new Police team for Birchanger.

Tom Munro and Neil Russell are the two police officers who are expecting to spend more time in the village in the next five years. We hope it will last that long, as the cynics among us can remember many past promises which have crumbled in the last few years.

The officers intend to maintain a regular beat in Birchanger at varying times of the week. They are also working with youngsters, and have for the time being stopped cars parking in the lych gate, while keeping good relations going with the young people. Contact numbers remain the same, either 812211, or 647680. It seems they can do nothing about the answer phone system, or the fact that when the call is answered, it could be taken at Chelmsford, Braintree or Dunmow. The Parish Council were very explicit about their feelings on this one at the Parish Council Meeting last month, but this is a matter out of the control of the community police team, although our representations will be made known to their superiors.

The Parish Council outlined all their concerns to the police. They have been taken on board, but as always the proof of the pudding is in the eating of it.

This is the last straw.

The Parish Council has come under fire in recent months for the lighting in Birchanger. The Parish Council only maintains the lights in Birchanger Lane, and a spate of vandalism and escalating costs of call out, contract and repair, had meant that call outs had to be limited. Then our contractor began to let us down. We changed contractors to someone who responded quickly, and for a few days all the lights worked well.

Unfortunately, the same crew who wrecked the telephone box took an air rifle to a selection of lights in the lane. Four were wrecked, the evidence in the form of air pellets left for the repair crew to retrieve.

The damage done is considerable, as the electrical systems have been damaged, and these

will be hard to access and repair, when the parts eventually arrive. The lights may be on at the airport, but it could be a long time before they function here. Is it really worth repairing them, when they might not last the night and the cost will eventually mean a rise in the precept if this continues?

Highway issues.

The Parish Council has been very concerned about the state of Birchanger Lane, and other highway matters for some time. It did not appear that Highways were listening to us at all, or dealing with our complaints. The last straw came in March when there were proposals to resurface the only part of the lane which did not appear to need it. Since then, we have managed to see some action, but it is clear that this is only palliative. There is a schedule of further work, but it is clear that it will not be effective for long.

The damage is caused mainly by the extra large buses, always under occupied which go through the village, and the increasing number of Heavy Goods Vehicles which use the village in either mistakenly taking Birchanger Lane as a slip road for the M11, wrecking the Duck End island when they realise their mistake, and attempt to turn, or by lorries looking for the Parsonage Farm Trading Estate. Despite the concerns of the Parish Council and myself regarding highway and access issues, the permission has been granted for the new trading estate on the footprint of the old, but effectively much larger.

While this will tidy up an existing eyesore, there will be both a visual, and a traffic impact on Birchanger. The only palliative solution to the problem in the lane would be to restrict HGV's to Birchanger village access only. The Parish Council, and myself will continually request this, until something happens. Let's hope that highways see it our way quickly, it could save them some money in the end.

Over but not out.

My year as Chairman of the District Council came to an end last month. It was a land mark year, when I managed to meet many interesting people who I might never have met, and to visit place I had not even dreamt about. It was a year when I discovered how much good and hard work is being done in our district, quietly and efficiently so that other people can benefit, by people of all ages. I also had the opportunity to travel outside the district and county, and to forge friendships which will last.

I was backed by a cross party fundraising team. Who helped put on some seven differing functions throughout the year, and it will be a long time before the chilli quiz evening is forgotten. Birchanger residents supported me by coming to the functions, sponsoring my abseil, and making donations to Crossroads, the charity which provides respite time to those who care for a friend or relative for 24 hours a day, seven days a week. Crossroads was facing a crisis, following the withdrawal of some of its funding. We raised over £10,000 for Crossroads, which will ensure the organisation's immediate future. Thank you all for your support. I shall continue to work for Crossroads as a member of the management committee.

My year did end badly, when the perceived chairman was not elected after the main political party changed its mind following the results of the County Council election. In the aftermath many people were hurt. This should never have happened, and new procedures must be put into place to ensure it never happens again. Nothing I said made any difference. The position of chairman is not supposed to be political. There is a case that there should be no politics in local government at all. It would be great if everyone really could work together for the good of the district, as most Parish Councils do.

SUMMER ARRIVES FOR OPEN GARDENS

Brilliant summer sunshine greeted the 2005 Open Gardens event. With nine gardens open as well as the Church and the School gardens along with the art studios of Heather Brown and Brian Gough.

The gardens reported around 30 to 50 visitors on the Saturday with that number set to be beaten easily on the Sunday. The sunshine brought high temperatures with 35C (90 F) indicated in the shade at Moorswood this may have deterred some visitors others waited until the Club and Pub closed before venturing forth. TRAVELLER'S TALES

It gives me great pleasure to introduce a new contributor to our readers. Sally Tilstone married Nick a village lad in Birchanger Church in 1974. They have always lived in the village and have two children Sarah and Neil who have now grown up and live nearby. Sadly Nick died in 2001.

Since then Sally has begun to explore both the world and her own potential discovering that she likes to write about her experiences, venturing first to China and more recently to Peru. She says that she "Has made a new circle of friends" as a result and is making plans for more forays in the future. So here is the first part of Sally's account of her trip to Peru.

Following a very sociable evening with my friends Andy and Rosemary Cameron I have been persuaded to write an article on my recent travels to Peru.

Peru was supposed to be the birthplace of Paddington bear, but the courier told us right at the start of the holiday that Paddington was in fact a product of someone's imagination and the Peruvians have never heard of him, besides they do not have any bears in Peru.

I began my journey by meeting up with a group of single travellers at Heathrow airport. We chatted and boarded our plane to Miami. The flight was going to take ten and a half hours and I was seated between Steven who was in my party and a Jamaican gentleman who was a retired police officer. Steven was a young man aged around thirty and had a similar sense of humour to my own. The Jamaican gentleman had been staying in London for his niece's wedding and took great pleasure in showing me his souvenir programme of Charles' and Camilla's wedding which had also been on the same day. Steven was a well travelled young man and while we chatted, there was a point when the whole aircraft seemed very quiet and I suspect they were all tucked up trying to sleep.

Everyone had their red issue blanket draped around them and I remarked that it reminded me of the London homeless wrapped in their blankets waiting for the handouts of soup. We laughed, the aircraft was packed and Steven and I joked of how the airline could fit more people in if they really tried.

We arrived at Miami and went through to connecting flights lounge, but not before we filled in forms,

were finger-printed, photographed and removed shoes, bells, jewellery etc all bar removal of false teeth! It was in my opinion, way over the top. We then flew on to Lima the capital City of Peru and arrived after a very tiring twenty six hours.

On this flight I found myself sandwiched between Steven and a gentleman from Haiti.

Steven was probably thinking. "Oh no not that woman again?" I felt really claustrophobic and noticed a spare aisle seat, so I moved, apologising to Steven that it was not anything he said or had done.

We landed in Lima and I was pulled to one side for a baggage check! Unlucky or what? The hotel was basic, hot and the air conditioning was noisy, so you either had to sweat or put up with the noise.

The next morning we had a morning tour of the Cathedral, the Archbishop's Palace and the Presidential Palace. There was a demonstration going on in the square and a line of police with riot shields stood ready at the roadside waiting to go in if there was any trouble.

The following morning we were up early to take another flight to Cuzco the former Inca capital. We visited the ruined village of Ollantaytambo with steps and niches carved right out of the cliff face as well as the lively Pisac market, but the highlight was Machu Picchu the ruined city perched precariously above a steep valley surrounded by jungle.

Machu Picchu was discovered by H. Bingham in 1911 and is referred to as the Lost City. We travelled most of the way to it on a narrow gauge railway which took us through some breathtaking scenery, then on by bus.

Machu Picchu was worth the journey as it was so peaceful, so spiritual. Llamas and alpaca wandered around the site and the tourists were well organised. We had some free time to wander and take in the beauty of it all. The railway track and trains were just a pin dot below us and the mountain scenery was so captivating.

We had a guide who gave us running commentaries on the history of Peru, the Inca's and their culture. It was a wonderful experience.


