PARISH COUNCIL NEWS FROM Elizabeth Godwin

Awards for Birchanger youth

Congratulations to Jessica Wright and Rudy Roberts who received awards from the County and District Councils for their fundraising work for the youth shelter in Birchanger. They were the only two who actually stayed the course over the two years, and richly deserved their award. Well done and thank you to you both.

Another load of rubbish.

The way in which our rubbish is collected is about to undergo a radical change in the next few months. The unpalatable truth is that we have run out of landfill sites, and there are now very heavy financial penalties for councils who exceed the bare minimum targets for landfill. Ultimately all landfill will cease, and the councils have to find alternatives, possibly anaerobic digestion, to take their place. In the meantime, higher recycling rates have to be put into place as soon as possible. Uttlesford District Council has no other option but to comply, or raise council tax by major amounts to pay the heavy financial penalty imposed by the government.

Where possible wheelie bins will be introduced, but this will not be practicable for everyone. They will not be imposed on those who can show that they have a genuine difficulty using them, or that their premises are unsuitable to store the bins. It is possible that there will be two wheelie bins, one for residual waste and the other for dry recyclables. There will be a weekly kitchen waste collection which may possibly involve a smaller bin. Dry recyclables, paper cardboard, plastics and metals will all be collected together in one of the wheelie bins, while all the residual waste will be collected in the other on alternate weeks. Where wheelie bins are unsuitable, appropriate sacks will be issued to householders. The recycling banks will remain as at present.

The District Council will be consulting further on the options in the New Year.

The Christmas present nobody wanted

We have just learned that the regular Friday morning surgery in Birchanger Church Hall is to cease from December 31st. This will affect a great number of those who rely on the Friday morning slot for routine visits, and who have difficulty accessing the surgery. This is apparently due to economic reasons, but it is very much to be regretted by all those who are patients of the Stansted surgery.

Patients are having a raw deal. It is very hard to access an appointment at the surgery at the best of times. It would seem that the patient is not the prime consideration these days.

Do you want to help someone?

When the Christmas and New Year celebrations have finally come to an end, many people feel somewhat flat, and perhaps a little lonely in the long January nights. It is often a time for introspection and a time when life changing decisions are made.

If you do fancy an added dimension to your life, you might consider becoming a volunteer and working with one of the many and varied groups who operate in the District. Most people do not know what is actually out there for them to do, and do not know how to go about finding out.

The Volunteer Bureau has changed its name to the Volunteer Centre. It provides a free and confidential service both to volunteers, and to the organisations who need their services. There is no pressure to volunteer for any organisation, but the staff at the bureau are happy to talk through the various options available.

The main office is a cosy portakabin at Saffron Walden Hospital, telephone number 01799 513626, or they can be reached at Uttlesford Voluntary and Community Centre at the Council Offices in Dunmow on Thursdays from 10 am until 1pm, where you would be welcome to drop in for a chat.

Parish Plan.

If you were among the 56% of Birchanger residents who completed the Demographic survey of The Parish Plan, a very big thank you. Your time was much appreciated, and the results are in the process of being collated to form the basic picture of Birchanger as it is today. The second part of the survey, which is the Issues Questionnaire, will be delivered in the week beginning January 16th. Again we are asking for just a few minutes of your time to let us have your views on life in Birchanger, your concerns, what you would like to see preserved, and what could be improved.

The Youth Questionnaire will be distributed at the same time. This is a special questionnaire aimed at the 10 to 17 year olds in which we are looking for their views, their needs and what they want to see in the Birchanger of the future.

Second runway threat looms closer

BAA have finally unveiled their options for a second runway, or more realistically a second airport. There are three main options each taking up slightly less land with three of them available in mixed or segregated mode. A fourth option D which is only available in segregated mode would have the runway to the North West of the existing runway and would have the one of the greatest impacts on Birchanger.

The published options could have the affect of splitting the community into factions, as for each

option it is easy to assume that there will be winners and losers. The hard fact is that in this consultation there are no winners. The impact of an airport which will carry 75 million passengers per annum is going to impact badly upon us all in terms of air pollution, noise, traffic jams; in fact a Heathrow scenario as is seen now. Make no mistake, no matter what BAA say, our area, as we know it will be gone for ever.

There are no proposals for rail and road improvements. BAA are said to be working on these. The truth is that they cannot afford to pay for what is necessary, and neither the Government, nor the East of England Development Agency will fund them. BAA will try to get permission without anything concrete in place other than a convincing yarn.

The consultation runs until March 24th. There will be an exhibition in the Village Hall on Friday March 20th from 11am until 9pm. You will be able to see the proposals for yourself.

It is Christmas time and I wish you all a happy and peaceful Christmas. Please remember those who have lost someone this year, and those who live on their own. They need some special consideration and care at this time


"Be quiet, Roland, and stop asking silly questions," she reprimanded him sharply, "You'll see Him when he comes."

Birchanger residents to get more leisure

It gives me great pleasure to announce that the Mountfitchet Romeera Leisure Centre is to join up with your Village Magazine in two developments that will prove of benefit to us all.

Firstly they are joining our illustrious list of advertisers, thus helping to keep the magazine going with much appreciated funds, and secondly they will be sponsoring the new Sports Page with a view to keeping us all up to date with sporting news, views and achievements pertaining to the village and village residents. This partnership will be kicked off by a fantastic competition and prize this month (see bottom of article).

There can't be many villagers who don't know that the centre opened a little over two years ago (19th August 2003 to be precise), with the Duchess of Gloucester doing the official ribbon cutting in October of that year, but I wonder how many are aware of the full range of activities available.

Gymnasium 5 a-side football Basketball Netball Tennis, Badminton, Karate Pilates Yoga Dance, Volleyball Body Balance Body Combat Body Pump Creche facilities Childrens clubs, Parties Trampolining, Arts & crafts (coming soon)

There are others but quite frankly I have forgotten them! The parties alone can be as varied as you like, with options including football, parachutes (yes parachutes) and go-carts to name but three, so there should be something for everyone. There is also a 'Junior Harpers' club that is for children between 11-16 that allows access to gym facilities between 4 and 5.30 seven days a week and for the really little ones the crèche is manned by fully qualified staff and takes children up to 5 years old

The Leisure Centre, which is aligned to Stansted School as part of a PFI contract, has range of memberships including the full membership, Junior Harpers, student membership (designed for the holiday periods), GP referrals and special needs. There is even a three site membership which allows access to Stansted's two sister clubs, the Lord Butler in Saffron Walden and the Great Dunmow site, and as both of these sites have pools this option could make a lot of sense for those who want to swim.

The facility is already used by many clubs but as the Centre's Business Manager, Lynn Fisher told me. "We are a completely inclusive centre and are always looking to be of service to the local community, the more the merrier!"

Lynn also told me how proud she is of her youthful but enthusiastic staff, "They are always up for helping out and doing extra duties, for example they have visited Birchanger School, something that will be repeated and we have hosted the school here". Indeed the school has been adopted by the Leisure Centre as part of the Government's Health and Fitness for Children campaign which looks at all aspects of healthy living for growing children.

Lynn's message to the village is "We are here, come and use us"

Having just received the November 2005 issue of the village magazine, I feel compelled to respond to your comments on why there will not be an evening carol service in the village church this year. I should first, however, make it clear that even though I am a member of the PCC, what I say hereafter does not necessarily represent the view of other members, although I do feel that many will agree with my views.

In the final paragraph of your editorial you have said that you are "bothered" about the fact that there will not be an evening service – due to the retirement of the benefice musical director. I do not know your source of information but the statement, is in fact, incorrect.

Within the PCC, there was much discussion about whether or not there should be an evening service this year because last year the congregation (apart from regular attendees) was pitiful. It was also noted that in the preceding year, attendance had been lower than usual.

Account was, of course, taken of other matters including the expressed wishes of parishioners who regular attend church who had indicated that they would like to have a carol service but would prefer not to have to face inclement weather on a dark night. In the end, it was decided to have a morning carol service rather than none at all.

There are many people within the village who seem to be quick to criticise the operation of the church but, they rarely

attend church services or any of the functions that are organised on a regular basis. Most of these people do not usually attend services but turn up on "high" days and "holidays" expecting nothing to have changed. There are others who say that they want the church to remain open for worship but then, allow personality differences to intervene. For me, this is particularly sad because St. Mary's is our church. At any service, it should not matter who the officiate is or if there is an organist present. What is important is that if people want an active church in the village, they must recognise the fact that there is no point in having a service if no one attends!

At the present time, there are a few people working hard to maintain and promote worship within the village. They do not deserve to be criticised for their efforts. I believe that at some future date, most of us will turn to God for support and comfort. I would like to think that St. Mary's will still be open and will be able to provide a place of sanctuary but that can only happen if there is regular support both on a spiritual and a financial level.

If there are any villagers out there who feel as I do, I urge them to think very carefully about what they can do to ensure that St. Mary's remains open and remains our parish church.

Refuse collections will be as normal on Friday December 30th. The next collection will be on Saturday January 7th. The green box will be collected as usual on Thursday December 29th, with the black box collection taking place one day later than usual on Friday January 6th.
