THE SHELTER HAS LANDED

The Youth Shelter saga has run and run. Starting nearly three years ago following complaints by the teenagers who were using the Church Lych Gate as a place to hang out, as they had nowhere else to go in Birchanger.

Last year a group of youngsters decided to do something about it. The Parish Council were approached, who explained that while they did not have sufficient funds to provide a shelter, they were not against the idea, and would do all they could do facilitate the enterprise. Paul and Paula ran the first fete at the Three Willows, than there was a litter pick, a second fete at the pub and other fundraising efforts provided some £3500 towards the overall projected cost of £7500 for the shelter. At that point the shelter seemed a long way off.

At this point Jif who brings the youth bus into the village, suggested that he might be able to find a grant. The Parish Council applied to the Lottery Fund. To everyone's amazement both grants succeeded, and there was enough money to fund the shelter which had been the preferred option.

However, things do not always go to plan. The team went to a trade fair and found a better shelter at less cost. A few phone calls later, and the shelter had been purchased, along with two large litter bins to match. The lottery money was there, but the other provider withdrew, as did the Princes Trust. The District Council came forward with another grant, but the problem of installation remained. The shelter was delivered to the pub car park. Again another friend, Charles the Streeter's Farm Manager, managed to find the equipment to move it to the pub garden. We had a shelter, but nobody to install it.

Another phone call, and the District Council came to the rescue again. This time through their environmental services manager Mel Ribbans, who was able to provide the specialist team and the equipment to do the right installation. The shelter was to be lit on a timer with low level lighting and a trench had to be dug to the Church Hall where a coin meter provides the electricity supply. The lighting system was connected by the Parish Council's new lighting contractor.

There has been a great deal of help and support from many people in the whole enterprise. It has been carried out with goodwill. It is hoped that those who use it, which will include everyone who visits the recreation ground, will respect the hard work which has gone into the project. There are large purpose built litter bins for the bottles, sweet wrappers, take away containers, and these must be used.

Enjoy the shelter, use it responsibly. It is for everyone, and properly treated will outlast most of us, although at the time of writing the shelter had already received some additional redecorating!

After all it's the one time in the year that the church fills up with a congregation who want to be there. There will however be a Sunday morning carol service on December the 18th. So I hope you all come out and support it.

Club AGM

Birchanger Social Club made a break with tradition at its AGM on 15th October when Marilyn Hutchins was appointed Club Secretary when she became the first female officer in the Club's 114-year history. Marilyn's appointment, however, was not a complete break with the past. Her father, George Banks, served the Club faithfully for many years as a committeeman; as secretary; and as treasurer and is much missed by the membership.

Marilyn's duties will include routine tasks such as handling post and preparing the minutes of meetings as well as trickier activities such as ensuring that the Club complies with the vast and growing raft of legislation that applies to it.

Club Chairman Ken Wheatley welcomed Marilyn onto the team and also thanked her predecessor, Keith Robins, who had steered the Club through the difficult task of acquiring its club premises certificate under the new licensing act.

Other decisions made at the AGM included an increase of the annual subscription to £10 and a ban on smoking at the bar.

More affordable housing In Birchwood? Not this time

Affordable homes in Uttlesford are in very short supply. There are also many young families in Birchanger who have been forced to leave the village to find housing which they can afford. The District Council in attempt to address the situation looked at garage sites, which are often eyesores and underused throughout the district, including Birchanger.

The proposals are not proving to be popular with residents throughout the district, and that definitely includes Birchanger. A near 100% petition against the proposal, organised by Pearl Rogers, with strong and valid reasons was handed in to the Chairman of The Health and Housing Committee last month. The scheme would be unlikely to provide more than 6 homes, a drop in the ocean of overall need. The loss of parking facilities overall would not be acceptable.

The Parish Council also opposed the proposals. We do need affordable houses in Birchanger within development limits. The question is where? Any ideas?

More Parish councillors needed

Two members of the Parish Council have found themselves forced to give up their roles due to pressures of work or health. There are therefore two vacancies arising on the Parish Council.

Birchanger Parish Council has Quality Parish Council Status. It is very proactive, and is at present at a very interesting stage with the development of the Parish Plan which will lead to the village design statement. In case of emergency.

Nobody knows when an emergency will happen to them, and they will end up in hospital. Hospital staff will try to contact next of kin, but the victim may be unconscious, and nobody can give information as to medical history or allergies. A new simple idea, supported by Falklands war hero, Simon Weston, uses the fact that an increasingly large number of people carry a mobile phone. The idea is that people store the word ICE on your phone, with the number of the person required to be contacted in this situation entered against it.

The message in a bottle scheme for those who are vulnerable or live alone continues to be successful in the district. For those who are unfamiliar with the scheme, the council will supply a simple plastic bottle, in which all the details of personal, medical, medication and next of kin are kept in the fridge. Emergency services are trained to look for the bottle when they respond to a call, and it is accepted as good practice. It can save lives.

The Primary Care Trust in Uttlesford

The Primary Care Trust is under threat in Uttlesford. It has to save £200,000 somehow, as Primary Care Trust spending across the country has to save over £250,000,000. An impossible task for any trust in its current form. Accordingly there are two options under consideration for Essex, either a single PCT for Essex, or a division into two PCTs, one in the north, and one in the south of the county. Neither solution is acceptable to Uttlesford.

The District Council would like to preserve Uttlesford Primary Care Trust in its current form, with perhaps more joint working taken on by the council, with a sharing of resources. This option may not be acceptable to the powers that be. What is not acceptable to the District is the loss of valuable resources to Harlow, which notoriously eats money, and is known to have debts.

Uttlesford PCT has 77,299 patients registered to its GPs. It has shown a decrease in accidents, deaths from respiratory disease are down, services are improving, and there is a big uptake in vaccinations. The PCT is a young trust, and only recently beginning to find its feet. It promises better things, and it seems that it may not now have the opportunity to show what it can do.

At the same time there are consultations around which will mean that Uttlesford patients will have to travel to Southend, Colchester, or Ipswich for certain specialised cancer services, while all but the simplest throat and neck surgery will move to Broomfield. This gives Uttlesford residents huge transport problems, at a time when they are at their most vulnerable, and is simply not acceptable. The government is against cross county boundary splits in the main, but it does make sense for Uttlesford residents to make use of Addenbrookes Hospital where we can, except that as a Foundation Hospital, they can set their own boundaries, and Birchanger is not included. What chance will the village have when their own PCT is under threat as well?

Vanishing roundabout

The roundabout in the recreation ground has remained a very popular piece if equipment for several generations of Birchanger children. It has been vandalised several times, and has lost the cover to the ball bearings. this winter it will be removed for general refurbishment. It will be back, but it is a big job, and it could take some time.

Elsenham water is the best

Did you know that the best water is actually produced from an artesian well in Elsenham, near the jam factory site. It comes from a source some 300ft into the chalk substrata, and is produced and bottled at the source, by a small team.

The building which houses the enterprise is brand new, and constructed using a great deal of specially treated glass. The glass keeps the building warm in winter, and cool in summer, and for those who work there, the experience is almost like working outdoors.

The factory is equipped with a tea shop, and you can buy the water there. You can also watch the water as it is pumped from the source, and is then immediately bottled. The bottles themselves are unique, and recently won an international glass bottle award in Dubai. They would grace any table, long after the original contents have been consumed.

The water is not aimed for the mass market. It sells for £4 per bottle, and is exported to a few selected clients world wide. It is retailed by Harvey Nicholls, and if you are fortunate enough to visit exclusive restaurants, you may find it there. The factory welcomes visitors, and it will be a visit with a difference.

Another Cautionary Tale

It had been a trying day, and the baby who had been running a high fever all day was finally asleep. The parents did not anticipate a good night. In the morning they were surprised to find that they had all slept soundly.

The mother took the baby to find a drink in the kitchen in the basement. While he was playing, she slipped upstairs to find her work diary in her handbag in the front room. She was surprised that she could not find it at all. She returned to the kitchen, and her husband came down. She searched the house for her bag. She discovered she could not find her camera case although the video camera was lying on the desk. A bag containing brand new binoculars for the family holiday the following week was also missing, nothing else appeared to be touched, although the thieves had also made off with the car keys. There was no sign of forced access, although the door had been locked, but not bolted, or the snib put on. Nothing had been disturbed.

The police were called. They demonstrated how easy it was to gain access with the flattened top of a coca cola bottle. Now they are also using the mobile phone, and have started to apply for store cards on the wife's identity.

It could happen to anyone anywhere. It would not have happened if a bolt or chain had been used. For the couple the misery goes on.

County Council news from Ray Gooding

Those of us who live, work and travel to and fro in the Stansted area will be all to aware of the impact which the Airport is having on our lives, not just because of the noise and air pollution which is ever present, but also because of the increased traffic on our roads which generally hampers our journeys.


It is well known that Stansted has a greater number of parking spaces per passenger than any other airport in the world and in their displays and the interim forecasts which BAA have recently presented they appear to have paid little heed to the Surface Access requirements which their current and proposed growth in passenger throughput will require. Indeed, recent surveys have shown that the percentage of passengers and employees who use public transport to travel to the airport is woefully small and it is hardly surprising. The low cost airlines have attracted people from all over the country and unless you travel via central London it is almost impossible to reach the airport by train. Couple this with the fact that the Stansted Express shares the general, unreliable commuter services to the City and it leaves the car as the only feasible means of reaching the Airport for the majority of passengers.

We in Essex are all aware that the Airport is here to stay but when added to the impact of the housing development in the area, the 2012 Olympics, not to mention the Thames Gateway Development and the growth in road transport which passes through the County on the Motorway network, we have a daunting prospect.

In order to address this, Essex County Council are exploring new measures to manage the airport's transport impact and this includes such things as demand management for airport trips through some form of toll on users together with new freight management systems and innovative ways of financing and delivering the necessary infrastructure programme which is essential if the nature of this area is to be maintained.

I can report that the Highways Department are aware of this and are checking the criteria and a full investigation leading to any necessary remedial works to the junction will follow.


