### LOCAL MP VISITS BIRCHANGER SCHOOL

Sir Alan Haselhurst spent a morning at Birchanger school. During the visit, which was relaxed and informal, Sir Alan met head teacher, Mrs Howell, who along with Liz Godwin, Chair of Governors, showed him round the school while the children were inclass. He had the opportunity to see the computer suite, complete with new computers, in use by Class 1, to meet the newest pupils and to see the children at work.

School assembly followed and it was the chance of the School Council to ask questions. Each member had their turn and carefully noted the answers. The School council face reelection shortly and one member wanted to know how Sir Alan felt when the result of the election was about to be announced. They could identify with his pleasure at winning, particularly as many of the school councillors enjoy their role and wish to stand for reelection. They discovered how it felt to be an MP, what Sir Alan did in his spare time, what it was like to talk to the Prime Minister and the Queen and the difficulties attached to the role of Deputy Speaker. They learnt that it is a job where every day is different and that

he never knew what surprises the post might bring each morning. Those who did not understand the role of a Member of Parliament learnt a lot and it seems that more than one child was inspired to follow in his footsteps.

Sir Alan then had time to meet some of the staff, to discover the benefits of being in, and the difficulties of running a small school. He was able to see all the improvements that the school had made since it was built in 1982, the special provision for the disabled and the plans for the future.

Everyone learnt from the visit and Sir Alan knows he would be most welcome back at the school any time his busy schedule allows.

# Additional affordable homes for Birchwood?

There are many families in the village desperately seeking houses in Birchanger but finding they are priced out of the market. The school is seeing numbers fall as young families have to move away to find affordable larger homes elsewhere. The village needs a school but it will face financial constraints as numbers drop. This is somewhat ironic as Birchanger is a good school, with smaller than average classes even when full and has undergone a period of development and improvements which has meant it is a stable school, where every child is valued.

Parking is also an issue, especially in the evenings and weekends in many areas in Birchanger. Any development site must take into account parking issues, and the fact that there is an inadequate bus service.

The District Council has identified three sites in Birchwood which might be used by a registered social landlord for affordable housing, and one which is very small but which might be of interest to a developer for a single house. These are all in areas where there are garages or parking places. All of the sites are used for parking at some time of the day.

The council is proposing to introduce a rolling program to redevelop these sites for housing. No further leases would be offered, and tenants will be notified if this scheme was to ever go ahead. Officers will investigate the possibility of offering and creating alternative parking arrangements for tenants affected, but the owners of houses now in private ownership would have to make their own parking arrangements.

The Parish Council will be attempting to negotiate proper parking for everyone, and it would certainly be impracticable to develop any more than two of these sites at the most. Public transport is such that it is very difficult to live in Birchanger without a car.We do need affordable homes, but we are not

in a big city, and Mr Prescott's guidelines are very difficult to apply here.

#### **Honours Lists**

Twice a year the District Council is asked to nominate someone for an individual honour in the New Year, or the Queen's Birthday List Honours. The honours can apply just as well to someone in the middle of their working life, as well as at the end of it for services which are outstanding in any different field.

There have been very few community honours for this district lately, perhaps because of our own individual community awards.

#### Shelter Update

Many of you will have been aware of the upheaval in the recreation ground and allotments over the past two weeks. The youth shelter arrived at last, and spent most of the last month in the pub garden waiting for installation. A large saving in the price of the youth shelter has mean that there was enough money to install low level lighting on a time switch, and the connection that this would require, has been the cause of the chaos in the allotments.

By the time you read this, it is hoped that the installation will be complete. Rain has not made the muddy situation in the recreation ground any easier, and highways will eventually repair the access to the area. It is hoped to arrange a grand opening, once the work has been completed, and the lighting connected. More next month.

#### Children in danger

It can only be a matter of time before a child is seriously hurt in Birchanger. Concerned residents have approached the police, school and council regarding the children who dice with death on the roads in Birchanger. They run out in front of cars, ride bikes or skateboards in the middle of the road, and sit on kerbs with their skateboards projecting into the middle of the road, causing motorists to swerve around them. Parents who have been approached, have in the main denied that their children are involved, and ignore appeals to monitor their children's behaviour.

The local schools are trying to address this, but at the end of the day, the children are their parent's responsibility, something which it seems a minority of parents would prefer to forget.

# THE BIRCHANGER PARISH PLAN IS ON ITS WAY YOUR VILLAGE NEEDS YOU

As you may be aware from previous issues of this magazine, a Parish Plan for Birchanger is to be produced. The Parish Plan is a document that is being compiled by volunteers in the Village from information collected from all the residents of Birchanger.

"What is a Parish Plan?" we hear you say, "why should it affect me and why should I spend time completing these questionnaires?"

Due to changes in Local Government planning and the regionalisation of decision making a Parish must now set out its own strategic framework defining the needs and wants of their community.

The Parish Plan is a comprehensive document that has two fundamental parts. Firstly, it will define a vision of what the community would like the Parish to be. It will allow the residents to identify and define planning rules for what needs to be done now and what is important in the view of the parish members for the future development of Birchanger. Social, environmental, economic issues, employment, playgrounds, design and location of new buildings, protection of hedges and ponds, in fact, anything that the community values. In effect, it is our "Wish List".

Secondly, it will contain an Action Plan to address the needs for change and improvement, defining those things that should be done and who should be doing them to achieve the vision over 5 to 10 years. It will address actions which the Parish itself - Council, individuals, Organisations – will undertake and actions that will affect the policies, decisions and actions of bodies outside the Parish.

A Steering Committee of ten was formed from those who had attended an initial meeting in June and who had voiced an interest in the project. Work began in earnest to produce the first two consultation documents, along with a third questionnaire for young residents. The first of these documents the "Parish Survey" has been finalised and awaits printing, with a view to delivering this questionnaire sometime in November.

The second document, the "Issues Questionnaire" along with the young residents questionnaire will follow, hopefully, after Christmas.

All the questionnaires are confidential to the Parish Plan Steering Committee only and are completed anonymously. A member of the Parish Plan team will deliver each questionnaire personally, introducing themselves to you and explaining the document if required. You will have up to 2 weeks to fill in each questionnaire and an envelope will be supplied in which to put your completed questionnaire for collection by your team member or for you to return to the team member's home if preferred.

The sealed envelopes will be opened at random, ensuring none of the team has any idea from where each envelope originated. The responses will be collated and it is from your replies that the plan will be formed.

Nobody need feel that they are under any obligation to complete these forms, but they are extremely important documents for Birchanger, as they will form the basis of planning for residents needs in the future. All views are vital if there is to be a proper portrayal of the life, needs and aspirations of Birchanger.

There is a lot of hard work still to come, but once completed the Parish Plan will be a printed booklet, delivered to every household. It will then pass from the Parish Plan Committee to the Parish Council who will maintain and review it every three years. The final Parish Plan will be lodged with both the District Council and the Regional Assembly and will have the status of providing a set of additional planning guidelines for Birchanger that will be applied to any development proposals that they have to consider.

So, when the Parish Survey is handed to you by your team member, or when it drops on your doormat, please take a little of your time to fill it in and return it.

# Stained glass, it's a pane!

In my quest to try new things, I booked a two day course on making a stained glass panel. The tutor was local and I arrived complete with old clothing, good footwear, rubber gloves and plenty of enthusiasm. We began by going into the studio. Carol the tutor gave my colleague and I a brief rundown on what we would be doing, the tools required and also made us aware of the health and safety issues.

We began by taking a plain sheet of glass and an oil glass cutter, scoring the glass and breaking it into lots of pieces. There was a knack to this as the glass would sheer off at an angle if the cutter was not held at the correct angle or the glass was scored unevenly. We followed this process by drawing lines using a cutting square and felt pen on a new sheet of glass and cutting to the lines.

We also used grozing pliers to chip off small pieces. It was not easy and I managed to obtain a "Snow White" Disney plaster on my finger. We stopped for coffee and then resumed by designing our pane.

This involved drawing a 30 x 30 cm square and dividing it up into ten to fifteen panels, oblong, square, triangular, all varied in size. We then chose our preferred layout, then we had a salad lunch.

After lunch we spent time choosing various cuts of coloured glass from a cabinet and trays and put them as an overlay on our panel design that we had drawn to scale. This was where our expertise in cutting glass was to come in. We then had to painstakingly cut each piece of glass to size using a grinder to smooth out any rough edges.

My colleague had chosen blues, pinks and lilacs, whereas I chose red, yellow, orange and green, so there was no fighting. Both of us were very pleased at the way our panels were taking shape. We ended our day and looked forward to the next.

We arrived the next morning eagerly anticipating the day's events. We were told to choose three to four pieces of glass to sandblast a pattern on and after masking we took those pieces to the sandblasting machine and made decorative lines, squares, oblongs or triangles on our chosen pieces.

Back to our studio and now it was time to tackle the lead. The outer lead was of course thicker than the inner and each pliable strip was put into a lead vice and stretched taught ready to cut to length. My colleague obviously didn't know her own strength and pulled so hard she and the lead went flying backwards where she had not secured the lead tightly into the vice.

We repeated this with the inner leads and cut all to sizes required to make our panel. Working on a board we pegged out the glass using horseshoe nails to hold the glass in position, whilst leading up our panel.

It was now time for a much needed break and a chance to view some of Carol's work. Carol showed us some mirrors that she had made, which were so beautiful and her folder of commissions, which apart from the leaded windows included screens, door panels, mobiles, etc.

It was only now that I was having a go at making a panel that I appreciated the amount of work that went into making these items and I think that the cost is justified. Besides you gain a satisfaction knowing that this item is unique to you and personal. It provoked many ideas and we chatted about the endless possibilities for Christmas decorations, Wedding or Christening memorabilia and Valentine gifts.

Enough chat, we needed to get on, so we then proceeded to wire brush our lead and solder the joints on both sides of our panel. We had lunch and then puttied up between the lead and glass. Next came the

cementing, blackening our lead, cleaning up our glass and polishing. Carol attached two hanging hoops at the top and lo and behold, we had a very presentable glass decor panel.

It was half past five and we had been so preoccupied that the time just flew by. Carol took a photo of us both holding our panels for her folder and she joked that one of her students had remarked that she intended to make all her friends a Christmas present.

It is not impossible as you can buy a starter kit, but as they say "you cannot run before you can walk". It would need a lot more than a two day course. However there are night classes and day courses and I would thoroughly recommend it, even if it is only to say "been there, done that". It is all about trying new things.

I have a little card I carry with me which says "God gave me this day to use as I will. I can waste it or grow in its light and be of service to others, but what I do with this day is important because I have exchanged a day of my life for it". So every day must count.
