BIRCHANGER BOYS IN TWICKENHAM FINALS

Two of Birchanger's finest represented the village last month when they were in the Bishop's Stortford U11s squad that played in the Gulliver's National Finals at Twickenham, world home of Rugby Union.

Matthew Crossley and Lewis Edgeworth were both part of a side that have become recognised as one of the very best in the country at this age group. Both selected for their hard tackling and no-nonsense approach to the game the pair, who both play in the backs (although this is Matthew's first season after 2 in the forwards), have both enjoyed being part of a team that has not been beaten in 2 years.

The finals, held on Sunday 28th May, were played as curtain raisers to the England Barbarians match played that afternoon and were the culmination of a tournament started in Nottingham over the Easter weekend.

In this tournament the Stortford boys played sides from all over the country (and Hertford) to win their group and then the quarter finals which qualified them to play Worcester in the semis at Twickenham. It was to be an early kick-off (09:30 to be precise) so the squad was taken up by coach the evening before and billeted in a nearby hotel where they were fed, watered and sent to bed early to be fresh for the big day.

The Sunday dawned and the boys transferred to Twickenham by team coach to be greeted by friends and family as they paraded into the ground ready to play.

The semi final was a disappointment insofar as Bishop's Stortford had 90% possession but were unable to score. Worcester knew that all they had to do was draw to qualify for the final (due to a try scored countback from the qualifying tournament), they tackled very well, and when the game finished 0-0 they knew they had gone through.

That having been said, the real achievement was to reach Twickenham, the home of rugby, where most rugby union players would give their eye teeth to play. These boys have done it at age 11 - What a fantastic effort!!

The day was rounded off by an award presentation by Garth Chilcott (ex England prop forward), and then watching England beat the Bar-Bars convincingly from grand-stand seats – A magic day out!

On the back of their success this season the U11s were named as the BSRFC Mini's Team of the Year at a presentation at the rugby club on Friday 9th June.

Well done all the boys, especially the Birchanger duo – Watch out for them in future years wearing the red rose!!!

A national report has slammed Uttlesford for having the highest carbon dioxide emissions in the country. Dental Services In Uttlesford

The Parish Plan Demographic Survey has shown that a very large portion of Birchanger residents obtain their dental treatment outside the district. It is perhaps not at all surprising when Uttlesford has only 7 NHS practices, of which 5 treat children only. Currently only one practice in Dunmow is accepting NHS patients. NHS emergency treatment is also only available for Dunmow, and the responsibility for providing this lies with the Primary Care Trust, not with the individual dentists.

The Primary Care Trust is well aware of the shortage of proper NHS dental care in Uttlesford, and despite a successful bid for funds to enlarge dental services, progress is very slow. Resources have been devolved to the NHS practices, but recruitment of dentists to the NHS nationwide is slow. Suitable treatment locations in Uttlesford are also hard to find. There are dental facilities with time available in the Community Hospital in Saffron Walden and at the Community Centre in Dunmow, but at the moment there is no available dentist.

The Primary Care Trust is holding talks with all the dental practices in the district, and trying to recruit new dentists. There is the real possibility of a new dental practice in Saffron Walden, and there will be a new Dental Suite in the new Stansted Medical Centre, but all that is some way off. New dental charges which are based on a three band payment system are supposed to make understanding NHS charges a great deal simpler. That is, of course if you can find a NHS dentist in the first place. I don't think that getting toothache is a very good idea at present.

Kingfishers visit Birchanger

Walkers along Britain's rivers are, if they are lucky, rewarded by a bright flash like a turquoise lightning bolt before their eyes. One book puts it as 'a swift arrow of colour speeding along the river bank'. This spectacular bird, scientific name *Alcedo Atthis*, is as famous for its shyness as for its vivid and unmistakable plumage.

Normally a bird of clear running waters, this bird has recently been seen several times in Birchanger. Lucky householders in Birchanger Lane and in Duck End have spotted them visiting their garden ponds and birdbaths, as well as local ditches.

Kingfishers are resident in Britain all year round and, as their name suggests, have a partiality for fish. They're quite small - only about 16cm (6¹/₂in.) long - so owners of expensive koi carp need not be unduly worried. Birchanger residents with small goldfish do have their fish at risk, but many would think a glimpse of this spectacular creature was worth the occasional loss.

Kingfishers nest in burrows in banks, which are built by both parents. The eggs hatch after about three weeks, and the young emerge after another another four weeks.

Apparently the flesh of kingfishers tastes unpleasant. That's good news for the kingfisher but bad news for the other spectacular recent Birchanger avian arrival - the Sparrowhawk. Let's hope they're both here to stay.

Recycling Confusion

The confusion arose because the leaflet from the Council made no mention of a recycling collection during bank holiday week of 29th May. In fact, green bins were collected on Friday 31st and dustbins the day after. The following week **should** have been a black bin day - but most residents put out the green ones. So, from now on the

leaflet is, quite simply, wrong. Do the opposite of what it says.

More confusion seems likely next month when the 'three bin' system is introduced. Some parts of the village may have collections on a different day from the rest of the village. Watch this space.
