## Parish Plan update

A very big thank you to all those who took the time to contribute to the Parish Plan, by completing the two long surveys, and to the youngsters who also completed their surveys, and who gave us their views for what will be their village in the future. Details of their responses feature elsewhere in the magazine.

The plan was well supported, with some 64% of the village responding to the Demographic Survey, 51% to the more difficult issues questionnaire, and 46 10 to 17 year olds responding to the young person's questionnaire. The survey was anonymous, and members of the team analysing the questionnaires do not know who responded, or from whom each response came.

There were many differing ways of life emerging from the survey which reflected the diversity of Birchanger. The most common facts have emerged from the Demographic Survey from those who responded were as follows:

Most people read the Village magazine.  
Not many used the village surgery, although for those who did use it, it was a vital service.  
Most people visit dentists outside the area.  
Although the Club and the Pub are used frequently, other village activities do not find the same support.  
The footpaths and woodlands are popular.  
There are few problems with crime.  
Most homes are privately owned, and there are relatively few on the housing list.

At present the Parish Plan team are working on the issues questionnaire, which will help to inform the plan in its final state. More details of the plan, and the findings will be given at the Annual Parish Meeting on April 12<sup>th</sup>.

## Telephone masts in Birchanger

Telephone masts are seemingly everywhere these days, and we have far too many in Birchanger. The Parish Council has opposed every single application, and those which have been allowed have mainly been allowed on appeal.

The latest appeal which unfortunately had been successful is for a new mast close to the roundabout at the junction with the A120 with the B 1383. It is inconceivable as to how the inspector at the appeal allowed this latest mast. Not only is it far too near existing homes, it will also be a traffic hazard. It can only be a matter of time before some driver demolishes it, but the cost to the driver could be very dear. The ways of the planning inspectorate continue to be a mystery, but it really is time that they got their collective acts together over these masts.

## Birchanger Parish Council's response to Runway 2 consultation

Birchanger Parish Council thought long and hard about the response to the second runway consultation. The primary response of an unequivocal "no" was the easy bit. Our response was important as everything we raise would become part of any subsequent inquiry, even though this consultation was more remarkable for what it left out in the way of necessary information. The effects we experience now at 22 million passengers per annum would be much worse at 76 mppa.

The Parish Council raised all the issues BAA have not yet addressed. These include real noise contours, atmospheric pollution, ground engine running and taxiing, numbers of the population affected, community safety, soil pollution, kerosene and de icing pollution, vibrations from heavy aircraft, infrastructure, and blighted homes in Birchanger.

## Missing roundabout

Vandalism in the recreation ground has made the roundabout dangerous with the exposure of the ball bearings, which could seriously injure a child's hand. The roundabout has now been removed while funds are raised for its eventual repair. The repair is expected to cost over £3000, but to replace it with a lesser model would be in excess of £6000. Unfortunately there is a pole left, which is crucial to the installation. There was a protective cover over this, but, guess what, the vandals have been at this as well. Please take great care when using the play area. If the cover is replaced, those who do not give a fig for the children who use the recreation ground will have destroyed it at the first opportunity.

## Free bus travel for everyone over 60

The Government's scheme for free bus travel for all who are over 60 comes into effect from April 1<sup>st</sup>. The responsibility for administering the scheme in this area lies with the District Council, who will issue the concessionary passes. Essex County Council also co-ordinates a county wide travel scheme which allows all pass holders to travel free after 9am on all journeys that start in Essex.

## Crisis support team Essex

Could you become a trained crisis support worker to help those affected by disasters such as the recent Tsunami, 7<sup>th</sup> July Bombings, and the Paddington Rail Crash? Basic skills required are the ability to be a good listener, be interested in helping others, willing to drop everything at a moments notice, and have previous experience in helping people.

Volunteers are required from all walks of life with very diverse backgrounds and beliefs. Once trained, volunteers would be working alongside Family Liaison Officers, operating a telephone hotline, explaining procedures and legal rights, and giving practical and emotional support to anyone affected by a disaster.

Volunteers will be fully trained for whatever role they might be called upon to deliver, and are supported throughout their involvement with the scheme. If you want to know more, call the Emergency Plans Unit on 01245 430378.

## New mental health foundation trust for North Essex

One in four people living in Birchanger may experience mental health problems at some time in their lives, and many others will be involved in the care of someone who is suffering from a mental illness, or who has problems with drugs or alcohol. The proposed Foundation Trust will mean that mental health services will be more accountable to the people whom it actually serves. The trust will have a board of governors which it will elect, and a membership open to anyone over the age of 14 which will influence the trust's future direction.

The Mental Health partnership is to hold a series of public consultation meetings to which everyone is invited. The one for our area is to be held on Wednesday March 22<sup>nd</sup> between 7pm and 9pm at the Uttlesford District Council offices, where you will be able to find out more about the trust, and how you could become a member or a governor. ## The latest Barclaycard Scam

Fraudsters are calling credit card holders claiming to be from the Security and Fraud Department of their credit card company. They suggest that the card may have been the subject of a fraud, and are carrying out an investigation. They are plausible in that they will not ask for the card number, it seems they already know that somehow, but they will ask you to confirm that you have possession of your card, and ask for the security number on the back. Do not give it to them under any circumstances.

# Proposed development at Churton 300 Birchanger lane

The proposed demolition of this fine old house became an issue in the public domain after our editorial meeting on March 6<sup>th</sup>. At the time the members of my committee had varying views on the benefits or problems that this development might pose.

In essence the current resident Mr John Gibb has proposed to knock down the existing house and replace it with an estate of seven houses on the most dangerous double bend in the village.

Mr Gibb is the only likely beneficiary of such a scheme and his reasons for doing it are probably just a way of leaving the best legacy to his family that he can. This at least is understandable.

The legacy that is left to Birchanger is less attractive. Seven new houses mean up to twenty more cars as well as any vehicles requiring access to the new estate, all emerging onto the lane on a blind bend, at a place where there is no proper footpath.

There is a suggestion that some of the properties would have to be "affordable housing" to meet the needs of local residents. However houses in the open market in this area do not remain "affordable" for long.

Whether this application is successful or not the property will eventually change hands either to Mr Gibb's family or to another buyer, all of whom will see the development potential of the site. A subsequent application may prove to be even less attractive than this one.

If I have one question for Mr Gibb it is this. If he were still Chairman of the parish council and lived hypothetically in a different property. What would his response to this application have been?

# The Future Of Birchanger Church

Last month the PCC had to face some unpalatable truths about the finances of St Mary's. The treasurer of the PCC had to tell members that, **due to the continuing shortfall of income from collections and donations against the day-to-day running costs**, the Church would be insolvent within eighteen months. Doing nothing was not an option. It would appear that the only way forward need not be to close St Mary's altogether, as was the situation some years ago, but to begin a consultation as to how the Church could remain open for special services, rites of passage, high days and holidays. Advice will be taken to review the various options with the Archdeacon, but ultimately the decision must rest with the PCC.

One option that could be suggested is that the PCCs of St Mary's and St John's Stansted could be merged. This would provide the much needed support for the PCC, who do feel somewhat that they are fighting a battle without support from the community at large. Stansted has larger resources and expertise to help members of Birchanger PCC.

This option could open the door to other shared community projects. There are five schools, all of whom feature in the work of the Church. Shared resources and the utilisation of Church trusts by the combined PCC, could mean that more work with the youth in the Benefice, involving after school and holiday clubs among other projects, and the possible use of the Church for these activities.

Other ideas may come forward, and although it is the PCC's decision ultimately, it is also one on which the community will be consulted. Nobody wants the Church to close, but it cannot carry on as it is. **If it is to remain open then doing nothing is no longer an option.**


