I can understand that this will put off most under 18s but the club remains the property of its members and is not a public asset.

Bad parking hinders rescue services

The most important thing when you discover a serious house fire is to obtain help from the emergency services as soon as possible. The emergency services are doing their utmost to reach those who need their help as fast as they can. It is frustrating for them and potentially devastating for those who need their services, when access to the site of the emergency is blocked by inconsiderately parked cars.

This is just what happened last month when firemen were impeded by badly parked cars in Highview. They have quite rightly complained about this. The fire victims must feel even more upset when they realise that had the fire brigade been able to make their way unimpeded, some of the damage could have been less, and they might not have been made homeless.

Please, wherever you are in Birchanger, think about the access for the emergency services when you park your car. If you can use a garage or off street parking please do so. Many of the car parks in Birchanger are underused but the roads are clogged with parked cars. In Birchwood there is so little use of the off street parking that the District Council is giving very serious consideration to the use of two of the car parks for affordable housing, and will revisit the use of the other two. It could be a case of use it or lose it.

Another familiar face retires

Bryan Reed is a very well known figure in Birchanger. Not only is he well known for his sporting activities in his younger days, but he was Clerk to Birchanger Parish Council, and a club committee member for over 20 years. He was the club treasurer for the past 12 years.

At last month's Birchanger Social Club's AGM Bryan decided that it was time to hang up the calculator. He hopes now to spend more time in Norfolk and to do all the myriad of other things for which there has never really been any spare time. It means that Gloria will start seeing far more of Bryan now as for large parts of the week he has been working up at the club.

The club's debt to both Bryan and Gloria was acknowledged by the club at the AGM, where everyone said a big "thank you" and wished him a happy retirement.

Night time flights to resume

Runway resurfacing at Stansted Airport is to resume this month. This will be a blow to many who, despite the resurfacing noise, have benefited from a better night's rest. If you have noticed the difference since night flying ceased, and are now being woken regularly, I would like to hear from you on 812793. The council is committed to ban night flights, but the government has left the limits as they currently exist. This is not acceptable, but we do need evidence that there is sleep disturbance in the community to start to make our case.

Switch off for Birchanger Lane?

Essex County Council has offered to install free switches on streetlights which are in the control of Parish Councils. In Birchanger's case this means all the lights in Birchanger Lane as these are the only lights in the village which are in the Parish Council's control. This could make the bends dangerous and the Parish Council would keep the lights in these locations on.

The Parish Council would like to hear from Birchanger residents as to whether they would want the lights switched off in the lane or not. Please call me on 812793.

Volunteer speed guns unlikely

There were insufficient volunteers in Birchanger to make the use of speed guns by village volunteers a viable project. A big thank you to those who did volunteer, but it will not be happening in the foreseeable future. Speeders need not think they will be getting away with it scot free. All the police who are not usually involved with speed guns have recently been trained to use them, and can give tickets just as easily as a traffic policeman. I am told that they cannot wait to get out there and try out their new toys!

Energy saving very expensive

New ways of heating homes by environmentally friendly means for existing homes continues to be prohibitively expensive for many people, despite the provision of grants to householders. Small wind generators, sustainable fuel burners, solar powered electricity and underground heat pumps will all be costly for the average home owner to install, despite the available grants. These could still be useful to houses which do not have a gas supply, or to those who wish to invest in a new heating system. Many of these schemes are also better suited to new build, or for those planning extensions. However the renewable energy research opens up new possibilities all the time.

There are still many ways of insulating your home to cut your fuel bills and grants are available. The most effective way is to insulate your roof and to make sure that all draughts are eliminated. 
Vandalism at the Church Hall

Let's Move For Youth.

It has been very hard in recent years to find anyone who is prepared to help youngsters in Birchanger. There has been too much vandalism in the village, and many feel intimidated when they are approached by crowds of youths sometimes with very good reason. This does not help the problem, even though it has been proved that drunken adults have been responsible for much of the damage. The stark fact is that many of young people feel that they have nowhere to go. Their parents are not keen on having a houseful of teenagers after a hard day's work so that teenagers feel forced to meet their friends on the street.

Last year the Youth Shelter project provided a place to hang out in summer. There can be no supervision, and there has been dangerous damage to the box housing the electricity supply. The youth bus, run by Essex County Council comes fortnightly, but there is a need for more provision than this and the equipment to go with it. There is also a greater need for the people to run the facility as well as the premises to house the club.

There are perhaps two possible existing sites, but these are already committed. The Scout Movement in Birchanger has been one of the biggest successes in the village in recent times. There are spare evenings on Mondays and Fridays at the Scout Hut, but are there any spare people to run a Youth Club?

Running a Youth Club is a challenge but it is certainly not insurmountable. There will be back up from the experts at Essex County Council. There are a variety of grants available for a project such as this which the County Council can provide the information and there is the enthusiasm for the project from many youngsters in Birchanger.

Think about it. It is not the intention that anyone should necessarily take on a project such as this on their own. There will be back up from other organisations in the village including the Parish Council. Funds will be needed, but this will be something which everyone including the young people and their parents will have to tackle. It is a village project, not one which will be allowed to go on alone.

Youth Facilities in Birchanger

When we are asked to "Hug A Hoodie" many people recoil with a mixture of fear, and loathing. However, the following letter from the young people in Birchanger is an indication of the fact that the response youngsters get from many older people makes them feel just as bad and more importantly alienated.

In Newport, all be it a larger village and one which was suffering from more difficult problems than Birchanger, we have recently reopened the Youth Facilities and amalgamated the centre with the Scouts. It has so far been a real success, on the opening night 28 young people arrived and generally had a good time and more importantly new youngsters have joined the club over the period since it opened. They have arranged their own events and are engaging in a series of fund raising exercises to support their own activities.

No one would pretend that this is the answer to all of the problems, perceived and actual, with young people, but it is certainly a start in raising an understanding of the difficulties which afflict both young and old and getting them to work together. The hope is that we can do a similar thing in Birchanger and it is here that we are looking for assistance. We hope that we may have secured a venue for the proposed youth group to meet, but they do need adults to join in and we are appealing for people who may be interested in running the Youth Facility. Essex County Council would be pleased to give assistance, training and carry out the legal requirements (CRB Checks etc.) in order to get this off the ground.

Would those interested in helping please form a queue!
