Housing options decisions

Uttlesford has to face the fact that refusing to take the share of new housing decreed by Whitehall is not an option, and there are some very unpalatable decisions that have to be made. Somewhere there has to be room for 4200 additional homes in this new development framework and there may well be more in years to come.

Every household by now should have received a list of the options in Housing Options leaflet which was issued to every household last month. Please let me know if you have not yet received one on 812793. There are four options to chose from and please make additional comments where necessary. All submissions on this round of the consultation process must be in by January 11th. You are also free to propose further options yourself.

Whatever is decided Birchanger will see some in filling with affordable housing, but there are no plans to release any of the Green Belt land which surrounds the village so far!

Ellis is a 8 year old Collie, Ted is a Labrador who is 2, while Bob is an eight month old Bedlington/Whippet Cross who has made really impressive progress helping a four year old blind autistic child. The latest member of the team is Clay who is only 5 months old and is a terrier.

School News

Changes in the School governing body

Susan Haggerwood Bullen became Chairman of the Governors last month. She has worked tirelessly for the school since she became a school governor a decade ago. It is probably quite unusual to have a Chairman of the Governors who was actually a pupil at the school herself. There are few people who will know and care the school as well or as much as she does. The role will be very familiar to her as she has acted as Vice Chair for the past four years, and has served on all the Committees of the Governing Body. She is very deservedly continuing the family tradition at Birchanger School.

Two new parent governors are also due to take up their new roles as school governors following their successful election earlier in the year. Birchanger School has four places on the governing body open to parents although in practise the number of parents past or present is greater than this. Although they were elected several weeks ago, like every governor at the school they have to go through routine police checking, which always seems to take a great deal of time. There is also initial training but we do welcome Mrs Jo-Ann Chaplin and Mrs Lianne Sowter to the Governing body of Birchanger School.

There had been a vacancy for a Parent Governor for some time, but this time there were four candidates and a high poll. The other vacancy occurred when Mrs Molly Bishop moved earlier in the year. Although Mrs Bishop was a Foundation Governor, one of the existing Parent Governors whose children are no longer at Birchanger School is to be appointed to this category, thus leaving the second parent vacancy.

Settling in for Winter

The school football season came to an end temporarily when the clocks went back, but will resume again with the longer evenings in March. School finances do not run to floodlighting, and the school might not be too popular in some areas if they were to be installed.

There are other things on offer for the second half

of the term as work on the Infant's School Play gets under way and the children learned to design their own shopping bag following a visit by Chairman of the District Council, Catherine Dean. She spent time with every class and at the end of the day every child had a heavy cotton bag which they had decorated themselves using stencils, leaves, apple stamps and a great deal of their own ingenuity. Some of the bags were displayed at one of the regular Friday Assemblies, which over thirty parents regularly attend. Then there were all the items to make for the Christmas Fair.

Invitation to Learn to Knit.

Both girls and boys have enjoyed the Knitting Club run by Mrs Lee and Mrs Kadwill. They have now extended the invitation to parents to join them on Fridays to knit, or find out how to knit with the children over a cup of tea. It is open to anyone else who would like to join in, and every age is very welcome. To find out more call the school on 812362.

Parents involved with reading programmes

The emphasis is very much on teaching every child to read at present, and there are a great many government ideas and initiatives floating around. At a recent Parents' Forum they came up with their own ideas about greater involvement in reading at the school. They are now working on a Rota for the Parent's Golden Hour where they will share with the youngest children books they have particularly enjoyed, and invite the children to share their own favourites and explain why they like them so much. For the older children there will be book clubs, where everyone will have a book to read, chosen by one of the children and will then discuss the book and say whether or not they enjoyed it and why.

Learning to read is a complicated process. It works best when the children are really interested and enjoying their books. This initiative hopes to promote reading enjoyment for everyone.

New email address for parents

The days of sending a note home will soon be over for most parents at Birchanger School. Every parent is about to be issued with their own individual email address by the school. This means that the school will be able to contact them where necessary and the parents will be able to access the school directly in return. The days of lost notes and missing reports will soon be gone for good.

Children in need

The Children in Need Appeal day is one which is always keenly anticipated by everyone. This year the day really was different, as all children and staff had to think out of the box and do something different they spent the day thinking up new ideas, and sometimes whole new approaches to daily life. It turned out to be a different kind of a day for everyone.

Beating bullying before it starts

Bullying can make anyones time at school a true nightmare. Most of us have experienced it at some time or another at any stage in our lives. It is certainly not confined to children or the work place either. In any walk of it can be a major concern, and we need to learn to deal with it at a very early age.

Bullying is always regularly discussed, and as an issue it is never hidden away although in any walk of life it can be very hard to detect. At Birchanger it is regularly discussed with the children, and strategies and support measures discussed. At this Autumn's anti Bullying week all the issues were raised again, and every class brought their own new and very individual ideas to the debate. The main message is that wherever the bullying is, it must always be addressed in some way by everyone involved. They thought long and hard as to the ways in which they could help others and consider their needs and feelings as well as their own.

Help wanted

These days children in Class 1 are very young. The school takes children from as young as four years following the introduction of the Early Years Policy which includes children in school as pupils in the year in which they have their fifth birthday. This has meant that the Class has been adapted for younger

children.

Equipping any classroom is an expensive business, but one of the most successful areas has always been the Play House, and Class 1 needs a new one. It is also a piece of equipment which children do grow out of fairly quickly, and somebody somewhere may well have one which they would like to dispose of.

If you do have a Play House you need to part with, or indeed any other suitable item please ring the school on 812362. Other items can be disposed of through the services of an organisation known as freecycle which has a branch in Bishops Stortford at www.freecycle.org/bishopstortford.

Christmas waste collections in Birchanger.

There will be NO separate collection of kitchen waste and dry recyclables in the week beginning December 24th. Non recyclables (black bin) only will be collected sometime either on Thursday December 27th or Friday December 28th.

In the week beginning December 31st there will be collections for both dry recycling (green bin) and kitchen waste (brown bin) on Thursday January 3rd. It is advisable to place bins at the usual collection point on the evening before the collection date. Normal collections will resume in the week beginning January 7th.

On Saturday December 22nd the green waste, wood and dry recyclable skips will be at the Stansted Lower Street Car Park between 9am and 3pm.

On Saturday January 5th between 9am and 3pm there will be a skip to collect Christmas Trees in the car park at Lower Street Stansted.
