# PARISH COUNCIL NEWS Elizabeth Godwin

### A New Year, a new challenge?

This time of the year with the long dark evenings and a strong disinclination to go outside, and indifferent television, often makes people review just what is going on in their lives. Perhaps it is time for a new challenge, or possibly a new job and a different lifestyle.

There is one available on your own doorstep, if you are interested. Both the Parish Council and District Council Elections will take place on May 3<sup>rd</sup>. Council work brings its own challenges and new horizons at both levels. It is possible that you might be interested in planning, in improving life for youngsters in the village, or services for the elderly. Whatever your interests, it is very possible that they could be useful in the role of a District or parish Councillor.

Experience is no bar, as induction training is available and encouraged, with a wide variety of optional speciality courses also available which could lead to a NVQ ultimately. It is also an opportunity to meet new people and a chance to contribute to the well being of the local community.

Birchanger Parish Council for more years than anyone can remember, has not had a sufficient number of candidates to hold an election. Fortunately this has not affected the quality of the Parish Councillors, but there is no limit on the numbers of people standing for the Parish Council. They must be local, on the electoral roll, and over 18, that is all. Meetings of the Parish Council are on the first Tuesday of every month. If you would like to know more, please call me on 812793.

### Runway location revealed

A little piece of tweaking from the original options, and BAA's long awaited preferred location for the second runway is revealed. Less cost and less land take, but a clear heralding of the demolition of all the communities around the airport for an additional runway which is no longer viewed by many as appropriate in these days of global warming and climate change. Whichever way the proposal is viewed, communities will be irrevocably changed. One only has to imagine Heathrow transported into Stansted to have some idea of what could be in store. Land take may be down, but segregated mode will mean unremitting noise for those under the flight path by day and night. Communities will be split and roads around the airport regularly used by residents will be closed. Hatfield Forest, whose vegetation is already under threat will be overflown and ultimately may not survive.

Heathrow has an infrastructure, but there are as yet no plans for any government investment in the infrastructure here. BAA is saving money in this latest plan, but no money will go for the fundamental massive infrastructure overhaul which will be needed for a second runway.

Noise is a major issue, a fact which the District Council came to appreciate in full during the application to increase the use of the original runway. Communities near Ware and Dedham are seriously affected. The affects will double with two runways and more areas will feel the strain.

The plain fact is that life in our area will change irrevocably. Those of us who like our life the way it is may find we will no longer be able to stay here, but the niggardly HOSS scheme will only compensate a few properties in a very narrow additional band, so it may not be easy to move for everyone else. With determination on everyone's part it might be avoided. That is up to you.

### A new way to connect to the District Council 24 hours a day

From February 8<sup>th</sup> one phone call to Uttlesford District Council on 01799 510510 at any time of the day will mean that residents can report problems or pay their bills even when the office is closed, thanks to a newly installed computer system called UConnect. The system means that all the council departments are now linked and a single operator can deal with multiple enquiries in one call. The improvements also mean that dozens of services can also be accessed on line at anytime at the new email address-<u>unconnect@uttlesford.gov.uk</u>. These will include bill paying, licensing, environmental matters and the reporting of most of the problems which are normally dealt with by the council. Council Service Staff have been extensively trained to handle the wide range of expected enquiries. The new system should allow feedback from residents it can be monitored more quickly and it is expected that this will lead to improvements in the service overall.

The reception areas at the District Council's offices in both Saffron Walden and Dunmow have been redesigned and will be officially opened as Customer Service Centres at noon on February 8<sup>th</sup>.

### New health centre

For more years than we like to remember, we have been promised a new Health Centre in Stansted. The centre is expected to offer a range of treatment normally only available in hospital. It is now understood that negotiations with the owner of the site are progressing and it is hoped to sign an agreement soon. Building would not be expected to commence until 2008. With houses in Rochfords supposed to be occupied later this year, the new health centre cannot come soon enough.

### Could you be a Special Constable?

It seems that the only way we are going to see more policemen on the beat will be if more of us become special constables. We have seen initiative after initiative where more actual policing is promised, only to fail abysmally after a matter of weeks. The plain fact is that there are simply not enough policemen to go around.

Special constables are an important part of Essex Police. They are volunteers who assist the regular police, they are trained and give up a few hours a week of their time. To be a special constable you need to be between 18 and 50 years, fit and in good health, to be able to think fast and to be part of a team.

# New environmental crime enforcement policy for Uttlesford

The District Council is about to adopt a new policy which will mean that it will become an offence to drop litter anywhere. There will also be powers to force businesses to clear litter from their land, and to curb the handouts and pamphlets which frequently end up as litter. It also confirms that cigarette butts and discarded chewing gum are also officially classified as litter. There are also powers to deal with dog fowling and noise nuisance which will include burglar alarms and light pollution. It should be easier to get abandoned cars removed as well. The District Council will be the authority to approach to report any of these soon to be recognised environment crimes on 01799 510510.

Our noisiest neighbour and those who persistently refuse to clean up after their dogs could be in for a wake up call!

### Open gardens in hibernation.

In the past twelve years the open gardeners in Birchanger have raised over £7000 for village projects. These have included new equipment and benches for the recreation ground, support for the school garden projects by the provision of suitable tools, the village sign and numerous smaller projects. Sadly support from the village in latter years has been poor, despite the work which the gardeners have put into the project. It is probably a case of "been there, done that".

This means that Open Gardens will not happen again this year in Birchanger. The group will stay together and review the situation on an annual basis. They are always open to new ideas, and any new gardeners who would like to join them.

There was money remaining from the Open Gardens in 2005. Although this did not raise very much the Scouts will benefit from £250, the magazine will receive £200, and £50 will be spent on bulb planting around the village this Autumn.

# **New Exercise Class for All**

The Uttlesford Healthy Eating & Lifestyle Programme is providing opportunity for local residents to improve their health and fitness by introducing an exercise class at Birchanger Village Hall from this Spring.

The class will last approximately one hour and will be suitable for all levels of fitness.

The Healthy Eating & Lifestyle Programme is a Leisure Connection initiative, supported by and developed with local partners Uttlesford District Council, West Essex Primary Care Trust and Uttlesford MIND. The project is funded by Sport England and has an objective of encouraging and supporting people who want to increase the amount of health beneficial physical activity they participate in.

Programme Co-ordinator Steven Prosser says... "The government recommends people be moderately active for 30 minutes a day, 5 days a week in order to reduce risk of developing sedentary related illnesses such as obesity and heart disease. This new class is a great way for people to go about achieving that target.



The classes, commencing weekly from Friday  $9^{th}$  March, will start at 12.30pm and cost £3 per person, going towards the cost of hiring the hall and instructor. Any person interested should attend in suitable, comfortable clothing and footwear.

#### Holiday Creativity

If you thought that children did very little over the Christmas Holidays other than play with their new toys, visit relatives and enjoy Christmas entertainment you would be wrong in the case of Birchanger School. Throughout the Autumn Term Class 4 Reading Groups had been reading and discussing with the rest of the group some of the modern classic literature for children. Their task for the Christmas Holidays was either to make a comic strip, or a Diorama.

You might be forgiven for not knowing just what a Diorama is. The dictionary describes it as an exhibition of pictures seen through an opening with lighting affects. The children mainly used shoeboxes to create their scene and placed the characters from the book inside.

Class 1 have also been nominated as the class who settled best on the return to school after the Christmas Holidays.

The end of the week assembly is open to everyone, even if they do not have a child at the school.

#### Birchanger School plays host

The long anticipated visit by sixty children from the Essex School in Manor Park took place last month. The children come from a densely populated area of east London, and the space and the freedom around Birchanger was a surprise to most of them. The day was bitterly cold, wet and windy but despite this they managed to visit the Church, Digby Wood, and to fit in a short village walk divided into five smaller groups. They also saw around the school which much have seemed tiny to them and spent some time with binoculars studying the bird life in the children's own garden.

The children were able to recreate the friendships which they had begun in their visit in December. They enjoyed a longer lunch and play time so when they regrouped for the afternoon activities they were noticeably relaxed and at ease with each other. There will be another visit by the other sixty children in the year group in the summer.

This is an important link for the school, as it introduces Birchanger School children to a world they could only imagine. It is also a chance to meet again the School's previous Head teacher, Mrs Cowan, who amused some of the children with her memories of them when she was at the school.


