Annual parish meeting

The Annual Parish Meeting will take place on Wednesday April 18th at 8pm in the Church Hall. As usual everyone is welcome. Speakers at this year's meeting will include our own Brian Ross who will talk about the airport and the forthcoming inquiry and it is hoped that there will also be representatives from the police and county highways. See you there!

A footbridge across the A120?

There are plans for a bridge across the A120 which might achieve cycle or bridleway status. Essex County Council already has a plan for a foot bridge which should have been put in place when the by pass was built, but the route for any new cycleway is not clear at present. A great deal more of the wood would be lost if a cycle path was to be built. There is also the question of the effect which a metalled path would have on the wood, and whether the land owners would agree to a cycleway through the fields in the first place.

The project would certainly open up the link between Birchanger and Bishop's Stortford, but it may not be what the majority of the village would like. The Parish Council would appreciate your views which would be passed on to the Birchanger Wood Management Committee and Essex County Council. There may be an opportunity to discuss this at the Annual Parish Meeting.

New surface for the recreation ground

For many years now play equipment in the recreation ground has had an under surface of bark. This has not been the best or the safest way of surfacing the area, and for a long time the Parish Council has been saving funds to provide a much safer surface for the children to use. Anne Kent has spent a great deal of time researching the best affordable safe surface and one has at last been found which will provide a safer landing under the equipment, but this is far from cheap. Nothing is vandal proof, but yet again the hope is that those who do use the recreation ground will have the common decency to accept that their actions selfishly put others, including their own friends, at risk of serious harm.

David Holder regularly checks and repairs the equipment, and the area is subject to ROSPA safety inspections. If people cannot respect what others are trying to do for them, the only course would be to close the whole area down.

It is hoped that the new surface will be installed in May.


Airport surface access consultation

Last month BAA launched a consultation on the access arrangements for the second runway. There are big implications for Birchanger as many of the old familiar links to Broxted and Thaxted will disappear, and a new access road from the M11 to Runway 2 will eat up more countryside.

The biggest bombshell for Birchanger is a proposed new motorway junction 8b which will be sited between the present junction and Burton End, and will give access on to a new road which will link up with the lower end of the new A120. This will have a very major affect on Birchanger, particularly those who live in the lane and parts of Birchwood.

There are a series of exhibitions of the proposed new access arrangements, which surprisingly do not include any in Birchanger Village. Venues near to us include Takeley on Wednesday April 11th at the Silver Jubilee Hall and Stansted at the United Free Church on Wednesday May 9th both from 11am to 9pm. I have requested an exhibition for the village, but this might not happen.

Whatever your feelings, it is very important that you make your views known. If you have not received the consultation document please ask for a copy from the response address, Freepost CL4055, Chelmsford, CM1 3BR. I have asked for every household in Birchanger to receive a copy, but I cannot ensure that the request will be granted to everyone, Alternatively copies can be obtained at the exhibitions, or by phoning 0800 783 1764, or on line at <u>www.stanstedairport.com/future</u>.



Election Update

It is sometimes very difficult to get to the polling station on the right day, this year May 3rd, and it is possible that many people will be on holiday.

You can apply for a postal vote, and the last date for your application to be in is April 18th. You can obtian the relevant forms by calling Uttlesford District Council on 01799 510510 and a form will be sent to you.

Alternatively you might like to have somebody vote on your behalf. this is called a proxy vote and the closing date for these is April 25th.

Votes are important in our democracy, please use them in whatever manner is easiest for you.

Those wishing to stand for the Parish Council or District must have their nomination papers in by April 4th.

Airport inquiry update

The public inquiry on the appeal by Stansted Airport Limited against Uttlesford's refusal to remove or alleviate the planning conditions currently in place limiting the use of the existing runway is set to startat 1000 on 30th May. The inquiry will (probably) be held at BAA's Endeavour House, and the hearing is tentatively expected to last some six weeks or so, with sittings on Tuesdays to Fridays. It is not too late to request to speak at the inquiry, and if you feel strongly about the expansion then you should certainly do so. The SSE website has the following advice (at http// www.stopstanstedexpansion.comr1_public_inquiry 2.html)

"Your letter should include the Appeal Reference APP/C1570/A/06/2032278/NWF

and should say that you want to speak as an objector. If you are able to indicate the particular areas you wish to cover in summary form this would be helpful. You might also refer to your previous correspondence with the Council and/or Planning Inspectorate. You should send your request to speak to the Planning Inspectorate, Room 4/04 Kite, Temple Quay House, 2 The Square, Temple Quay, Bristol BS1 6PN. Telephone 0117 372 8559. You will be notified if your request to speak has been successful."

The SSE site goes on to explain that it is usually possible to ask to speak by attending in person on the opening day of the inquiry.

The Parish Council are going to speak against the appeal. If you would like them to consider incorporating your views into their response then please send them to Ken Wheatley (ken.wheatley@birchanger.com, 814678) as soon as possible.

The inspector intends to hold some evening sessions around the region, and the Parish Council wil try to persuade him that he should hold a session in Birchanger. However, with so many communities affected by the airport there will be many more such requests than can be accommodated.

More Information on The Airport Surface accessconsultation

A few lucky residents have recently received a copy of Stansted Airport Limited's surface access consultation, in which they describe changes to local transport infrastructure to support a tworunway airport. The main conclusions reached by the consultation so far as Birchanger is concerned are as follows.

* The M11 should be widened to four lanes each way between junction 6 (M25) and Junction 8 (that's us)

* A new junction, 8b, should be built north of and as close as possible to the current junction 8a. This will primarily carry traffic to the existing terminal via a new link road mostly on the alignment of the current Long Border Road.

* The existing junctions 8 and 8a will mostly serve the new facilities.

* Junctions 8, 8a and 8b will be linked to form one large intersection.

* Several local roads, footpaths and bridleways will be stopped up or diverted.

* The bridleway currently on the far side of the M11 between Duck End bridge and Church Road will be moved to the Birchanger side of the motorway. * The railway will be able to support the growth of the airport upto 2020 with the strengthening of trains to 12 carriages. Beyond that date

some infrastructure work will be needed.

The Parish Council is trying to obtain more copies of the consultation document. These can be obtained online from <u>www.stanstedairport.com/</u><u>future</u>,

but if anyone has difficulty obtaining one then they should contact Ken Wheatley (814678).

The motorway plans (minus the revised junction 8/a/b plans) are currently the subject of a Highways Agency consultation and roadshow. Sadly, by the time this magazine is published some of the exhibitions will have already taken place, but the exhibition will visit Takeley Silver Jubilee Hall on Wednesday 11th April and the United Free Church, Chapel Hill, Stansted on Wednesday 9th May. In both cases the opening hours are 1100 - 2100. The plans can also be seen in Bishop's Stortford and Stansted libraries andonline at www.highways.gov.uk/m11junctions6to8.

It became the day when children returned to Birchanger. It was the day when nearly all the children played outside enjoying the fresh snow. Children playing in the village in such numbers had not been seen in the village for a long time. What are we actually doing with our children's childhoods that they have to spend so much of their time indoors?

Help us again please

The vouchers schemes run by the major supermarkets really do benefit schools, and Birchanger always tries to utilise these schemes to the full. Tesco has a spring promotion for IT equipment which the school is always using and updating. Any vouchers you can save for the school will be very much appreciated.

New kit in the kitchen

Healthier eating is meaning changes in equipment in the school kitchen. Although the chip fryer is not being thrown out, there will be a new steamer for healthier vegetables and a new salad bar arriving shortly. The menus will also be run on a three week cycle instead of the two week cycle which was in use. The children see the menus so they know which days they would prefer to order a baguette instead of the full lunch. A cluster group adviser helps to procure the best fresh food locally for several small schools and shows how to make the most of the food budget to ensure healthier eating.

To support the healthy menus two new fitness clubs have started. There will be a morning Fitness Club and an after school Gym Club each week for the second half of the term.

Small Schools Mini League

Birchanger have been playing in the Small Schools Mini-League again this year. Not quite the unbeaten record of last year, but we are improving with every match.

In the Autumn we played Chrishall first, away and the score was 7 - 4 to Chrishall. A hard fought game. Next we played Newport away. This match really could have gone either way with lots of goals scored by unfortunately we were on the losing side again with the final score being 6 - 4. Our last game before Christmas was again away to Manuden and this resulted in a 0 - 0 draw.

This week we finally had a home match against Clavering. The boys really worked hard as a team, always talking and encouraging each other. As a result of this much improved team spirit we won convincingly with a score line of 6 - 1. The first goal was unfortunately an own goal by Clavering, but we followed this up with two quick goals from Tom Culpin, followed by another from Elliot Field and a fifth from Michal Earnshaw, all before half time. Elliot scored another after half time to complete the set. We had to defend more in the second half, but Callum Bates, Alex Roke, Matthew Reed and Jordan St Hilaire were more than up to the job.



BIRCHANGER VILLAGE FETE

Birchanger Village Fete will once again be held at the Three Willows this year as Paul and Paula host the event for the third straight year on Sunday 8th July.

The fete, which has been a fixture in the village's life for many years, is used to raise money for several causes within the community, has been successfully staged at the pub since the event ran into difficulties in 2005. At that time it seemed we would lose a much loved institution but the Willows' garden came to the rescue, and although a snugger venue than the club field, it has continued to draw the crowds.

In fact it could be argued that the close proximity of the stalls in relation to each other has fostered a great atmosphere and encouraged more people to visit, the number of stall holders has also stayed constant (apart from the fairground rides) and the amount of money raised has actually increased.

So the pub is running the fete in a caretakers capacity? "If someone wants to take over running the fete, and if they want to hold it at the Club, then I am happy, but until then I will make sure the tradition of an annual fete in Birchanger is continued. I am a village boy and I will always remember the fetes I attended over the years."

Fine sentiments, but the fete still needs the support of us all, the villagers, to ensure that this celebration of our village, something unique to Birchanger, continues.


