Junction 8b remains the preferred option!

Despite our objections to the siting of Junction 8b so close to Junction 8a it seems this still remains the preferred option! The Highways Agency have acknowledged the needs of the residents at Burton End, but have ignored the larger community of Birchanger which already suffers from the affects of Junction 8a. It seems traffic madness to site these two junctions so close together. There is already a great deal of confusion seen daily amongst those who are trying to access the airport with last minute lane changes. A further junction within a half mile will bring complete chaos.

Once again Birchanger has seemed to be invisible, despite all the efforts of the Parish Council and myself to avoid this, with some very good but sparse support from the community. The Highways Agency and BAA did not even bother to have an exhibition in Birchanger, despite our requests that they do so. We are the village which will be most affected. They did not draw our houses on the map, although Burton End is shown to be well populated and it seems that we did not exist. They claim that exhibitions in the past have not been that well attended. There are times when more voices are needed and this is largely up to you. We will keep protesting, but it seems the more people who do so, the better the likelihood of success.

The next stage in the scheme's development will be the publication of detailed proposals as draught orders. There will be a further opportunity to comment then. Meanwhile please do not wait. NATS Consultation

Birchanger is unlikely to perceive too much change in the new flight path proposals which feature in the latest NATS Consultation on flight paths. News that the South East of England is already seriously over flown will be of little surprise to most people. Sadly instead of simply moving air traffic elsewhere NATS have created new stacking areas, the nearest being over Saffron Walden, with the use of continuous descent where possible over Noise Preferential Routes. As always there are winners and losers, but overall in our area some 220 people will experience higher aircraft noise levels, mainly around Saffron Walden, and south west Bishops Stortford when planes take off to the south west. This could result in planes flying closer to Duck End and is the change that could affect Birchanger.

Birchanger is currently overflown by 17 aircraft routes, mainly coming from the different runways at Luton, Heathrow, Gatwick and City airports. These routes should be 6000ft and above by the time they reach Stansted and these routes will have little impact on Birchanger.

What is apparent that is Stansted has the noisiest fleet of aircraft. The noises from the average planes using Stansted are shown in the NATS consultation to be mainly noisier than those using the other London airports at 1000ft. It is this noise which affects Birchanger the most, and is exacerbated by the very noisy cargo planes we hear so frequently both by day and night. None of this will change with the proposed new routes.

The consultation is an interesting document. It is not clear how Runway 2 proposals will affect this, as only routes for Runway 1 are shown. It can be viewed on <u>www.nats.co.uk/TCNconsultation</u> Comments are invited, but changing any of the stacking areas will have a knock on affect, and may not be possible. What is very clear is that NATS is trying to cope because the government has given it no alternative. There are clearly too many airports in the south east.

Runway 2 is very bad news for Birchanger

We may think that Birchanger has got off lightly in comparison to villages to the east of the airport. Perhaps we have as regards to take off when the wind blows from the south west, but the reduced size of the land take means that a great deal of development will take place on sites to the south west which are currently used for car parking. You can expect another big hotel next to the Hilton, and the car parks to be moved towards Burton End with a great deal of additional building on their sites. This combined with the effects of junction 8b will impact badly on Birchanger. Again your representations are badly needed. BAA have not distributed the project documents widely, there are too many. The summaries paint a glossy picture without giving the full facts. To find out more, log on to www.stanstedairport.com/future. The planning application has started to arrive at the council offices, the Compulsory Purchase Notices are up, this application is for real.

Airport noise raises blood pressure Official

New residents to Birchanger

It may seem strange, and it will certainly be very confusing to the new residents of the Rochford Nursery Site, but most of the homes, (over 80%) will actually be in Birchanger. It may well be that most of the residents will feel that their ties are much more closely bound to Stansted, by geography as well as by amenities. However they will be able to use the facilities in Birchanger as well as they will actually be residents of Birchanger parish. This may all change by the time there are around 200 houses occupied and there will be new boundaries drawn by the Electoral Commission. Both the Parish Councils of both Stansted and Birchanger as well as the residents of the new estate will be consulted about this. Meanwhile the first houses are expected to be occupied very soon. Welcome to Birchanger!

Uttlesford's New Website

Uttlesford District Council has completely redesigned its website. The new website is planned to be easier to use for everyone. You can now download various forms on line, including Planning Application Forms. It is easier to access the council's timetable of meetings and to email relevant departments. It is hoped that users will find it easier to access wide ranging information. Check it out for yourself. Just putting in the word Uttlesford will get you there through the various search engines.

The planning forms are easily accessed through the system, and they vary according to the type of application you wish to submit. They are designed by the government for national use which means that the forms are the same for everyone. There are also notes which will explain what you need to submit with your application. Applications can be refused if some documents supporting the plans are missing and not submitted on time. This will mean a new fee and the applicant will have to start the process all over again. The system is part of the government's new planning process and if anybody would like to see the forms I do have a few samples.

You can also look at plans for anywhere in the Uttlesford using this system. It helps if you do have the application number, but they can be accessed through keying the town followed by the address.

There are a great many forms which the council requires you to fill in over the years. Most of these forms will also be available through the website.

Empty Homes in Uttlesford.

There are 319 empty homes in Uttlesford at present. Sadly most of them are around the airport where houses of all sizes have been bought by BAA and simply left to rot. This upsets their previous owners, and does absolutely nothing for the community. A new scheme known in the short form as PLACE but which means Private Lease Agreements Covering Empties is to be trialed by Uttlesford District Council. There are many families on the Housing List who could benefit from the scheme. It is proposed to renovate the houses to the Decent Homes Standard and to rehouse somebody from the Council's waiting list. At the end of the three years the house will be returned in its refurbished condition to the owner while the tenants will have been established in other permanent accommodation. The project is being financed by Regional Government. Hopefully life will eventually return to some of the abandoned communities, even if only for a little while.

Birchanger in UK first

Three Birchanger families are helping to change the lives of disadvantaged children from Botswana and India in an initiative being run by Bishop's Stortford Rugby Club.

As some of you will know, the U13s age group at BSRFC have had a fantastic few years of success, and it was whilst they in the process of winning an international tournament in Belfast last year, an idea was hatched. The coaches realised that the boys were making friendships that would hopefully go on to last their lifetimes, as we had made friendships when we were starting out in the sport, rugby is like that, it is one big family.

One thing led to another and eventually this germ of an idea took root when the club hitched up with a charity called "**Tour**aid." This charity specifically looks to use rugby to help and develop children in need from around the world

So, the club, which is based at Silver Leys, will be hosting an invitation international rugby tournament at their grounds over the weekend of 3rd &4th of May this year and sides are coming from afar a field as West of Scotland RFC, Calcutta and Gaborone in Botswana

Yes you did read that right

The focal point of the weekend will be to welcome children from the Vultures rugby club based in the Botswanan capital and the Tiger Cubs rugby club from India. Most of the children from these clubs are orphans and rugby is used by their mentors and teachers at home to give them identity, hope and focus for achievement in their lives, and we at the club consider it a privilege to be their hosts. In fact, of the three Birchanger families involved, the Edgeworth's will accommodate two players while the Robins' and the Crossley's will be lending support in the shape of 'buddying' up the duties involved.

The visit, which will last a week either side of the weekend of rugby, are designed to be a precursor to sustained support from us, their hosts, for their communities back home, and this legacy involvement lies at the heart of the reason for holding the event. The BSRFC U13 Festival aims to create relationships from which both tourists and hosts benefit greatly for years to come.

As mentioned we will be having two players stay in the village and I am sure Birchanger will rise to the occasion and help show them the time of their lives. Remember some of these kids come from desperately poor backgrounds, so let's give them a fantastic outlook on our village.

A venture of this nature costs money, and this is the first time in **tour**aid's history that a British club have taken on the fund raising to pay for the whole trip. The U13 age group are attempting to raise a massive £40,000 to get these clubs over (anyone tempted to donate please contact me – all monies gratefully accepted!!), and there are a myriad of activities being held to keep the coffers growing, including music quizzes, beauty treatment evenings and a gentlemen's evening (tickets available for all but the beauty treatment).

Touraid is a registered charity that is supported by the likes of Phil Vickery, Jason Leonard, Mike Catt and John Inverdale and we will be looking to get as many of these names involved in the project as possible, so watch these pages!

For any school anywhere Ofsted Inspections are greeted with a mixture of apprehension and concern. There is little time to prepare for the Inspector's arrival and everyone wants their school to do well and work hard throughout the inspection to get to know the Inspector and to show him just what their school is about. The Inspector rated the school overall as an outstanding caring school.

The Inspector found that Birchanger School was a school where everyone matters and learning is fun. Pupil's behavior in class and their attitudes to adults and to each other are very good. The children are committed to their lessons, enjoy them and have a very impressive drive to do their best. They work well in groups and relationships are exceptionally good. Pupils told the inspector that bullying was rare, and if it happened was speedily dealt with. Children in Year 6 leave the school exceptionally well prepared for the next stage in their education and beyond. Standards throughout the school are above the average, and in some classes well above this.

The Inspector found that children enjoyed coming to school, they felt safe and secure. They had an excellent understanding of how to keep healthy and a very mature understanding of how to be a part of the school community and to have an important role in it through the School Council and the Play Leaders Scheme. They also enjoyed an outstanding range of additional school clubs, and the many visitors to the school and the school visits enhanced the learning experience.

This is an Ofsted Inspection of which everyone can be proud. There are issues which were suggested for further improvement which involve the use of target information to inform improvement planning and for the most effective teaching elements to be shared across the school and as the Inspector acknowledged, work on this was already in place before his visit. Congratulations everyone.
