### Gen 2 still needs your views

A staggering 70,000 letters regarding proposed expansion at Heathrow has resulted in the government giving itself more time to catalogue and to consider these responses to their proposals.

Letters regarding Stansted Generation 2 are still coming in, but unless more people start writing, Stansted 2 will not even begin to come near the 70,000 total. In the light of the Heathrow response they could be forgiven for thinking that people around Stansted don't really care and the fact that a great many people do care will be never be made known without a large response from the community affected.

What happens with Stansted Generation 1 is a very different matter from what might happen with Generation2. It is a very different airport and the trade at Stansted is very different. Even if it does mean improved transport links, and this is likely to be very inadequate, these links will be prioritised towards the airport. Birchanger will be faced with a massive spaghetti junction overlooking the centre of the village, an influx of low cost houses not readily available to the local community, unimagined noise and light pollution, more fly parking and rat running, in fact all the things which people are complaining about now, but on a much larger scale.

It is even planned to have access to junction construction traffic and a new shack city in Birchanger again. Remember last time? There are plans to site this behind the ambulance station with access via the road to the sewage works. We are experiencing a certain amount of blight on house prices now, just imagine what the impact of Generation2 will do.

Your response does not have to be technical. Just say what you think, whether you are against the proposals or not. Your response can be very simple, but you may have something to say which has not been said before but whether it is original or not, your response is vital. You have up to September 26<sup>th</sup> to make your views known. The Inspectors will be looking at, amongst other matters, the effects of noise and pollution along with sustainability and traffic impacts at the Inquiry. The District Council is still receiving and cataloguing all the responses which will be submitted to the government after this date. A Preliminary Meeting is scheduled to be held on November 10<sup>th</sup> at the Hilton Hotel, but the full inquiry is expected to start on January 13<sup>th</sup>.at Endeavour House. Some of the aspects of the Inquiry will run in parallel to save time. The Inquiry could last a year to 18months. The result is expected in 2011. The address to sent your response to is,

### Birchanger's first arts festival

Artists from miles around are planning to exhibit their work, most of which will be for sale.

There will also be a chance for you to participate in the first ever TURNIP PRIZE. This is open to anyone of any age, artistic or not who would like an opportunity to try to show their work, or to try out their artistic skills. The work can be a painting or sculpture and the stipulation is that all the works must be collected by their owners at 5pm on the 21<sup>st</sup>. There is no objection to an element of fun in the exhibits, in the style of the Turner Prize. The exhibits will be judged by our two resident artists, Brian Gough and Heather Brown.

The paintings will be exhibited at the Church Hall, with additional space for the Turnip Prize entries in a marquee outside. The Scout Hut will also be used as required. Refreshments will be available throughout both days in the Church Hall.

The Archives Exhibition and the Flower Show will take place in the Church. It is another opportunity to see a great floral display organised by Rosemary Saywood, and our editor Eddie Gilbey will be making the archive contents available for exhibition of which will include some hitherto unseen photographs.

It should be a great weekend, and unlike the gardens, the exhibits will be in the dry if it does rain. Enjoy!

### New style at the Club

There is more than just a wind of change about Birchanger Sports and Social Club these days. It is more of sea change to make the club more user friendly, to offer longer opening times and an opportunity to buy good food at incredibly reasonable prices.

The club is now open all day Friday, Saturday and Sunday. Food is available on Friday and Saturday lunch times, with a special fish and chip takeaway on Friday evening, between 6 and 8pm and a full menu on Saturday nights. There is the usual full menu on Tuesday nights with a lunch time menu on Wednesdays and Thursdays. Traditional Sunday Roast is available between noon and 4pm on Sundays.

Vegetarian meals and specials are also on offer along with an "All Day Breakfast". There are also special "meal deals" on many items on the menu featuring two meals for £4 including take away cod and haddock. You can even order in advance by phoning the club on 813441. Large parties are also catered for and special buffets can be arranged. You can hire a room for Christenings, Birthdays etc, or simply book a meeting. Major credit cards are accepted.

### Beer festival at the Club

For many in Birchanger there is another important diary date. The club is to host a Beer Festival from Friday 12<sup>th</sup> September to Sunday 14<sup>th</sup> September. The beers will be from smaller local breweries, and will offer an opportunity to taste a wide range of less well known beers.

#### Petrol Economy Tips.

Fuel prices are still ridiculously high, and even with practising the strictest fuel economy there is still far too large a pay out at the pumps. Here are a few tips from America, where they are finally feeling the petrol crunch and they don't like it! Keep your fuel tank topped up. There is less evaporation that way.

Fill up more slowly. There is a vaporising unit at all the pumps which directs petrol vapour down to the tanks. Faster fill ups increase the rate of vaporisation. Never fill up at a petrol station when fuel is being delivered,( this is not usually possible in this country) or just after a delivery has taken place. The new petrol disturbs the muck at the bottom of the tanks which could end up in your car and cause you problems.

## In the shadow of Vesuvius Or Sally goes to Sorrento part one

I have just returned from a wonderful guiding holiday in Sorrento, Italy. I met my fellow guides and blind and partially sighted companions at Heathrow, unfortunately our airline had changed our flights and arrived very tired at our hotel in Sant Angello, My room mate was a lovely young lady called jenny, we got on famously As always we accompanied our room mate to breakfast and after breakfast changed to a new day partner. This gave everyone the chance to get to know one another. On the first day we had a guided tour of Sorrento, on our way round I spied an orange and lemon grove that invited you in to taste their liquors.

When the tour ended we were given free time, Liz and I wandered the streets had a seafood lunch and a fruit cocktail drink, In the town there was a wedding ceremony taking place and I noticed at one side of the church door there was a container holding paper cones One side the cones filled with rice and the other with paper confetti.

My companion and I decided on route back to the hotel to visit the lemon grove where we tasted lemon orange, mandarin, fennel, walnut and liquorice liquors. Once back at the hotel we were nicknamed the cocktail girls.

Day 2 was a trip to Pompeii. In 79 AD there were 18000 inhabitants of which 500 became victims of the eruption of Vesuvius. After which, the people were unsettled for a long time.

One third of the total area is still uncovered There are plaster reproductions of the victims were covered by a rain of ash mud stones etc, which solidified and the bodies decomposed, leaving a body shaped hole which was filled with liquid plaster and produced perfect plaster reproductions. We visited the gladiator school, and the large amphitheatre where they fought. The gladiators paraded along the main streets on route to the amphitheatres. The large amphitheatre is still in use today, during July and august for concerts. The smaller amphitheatre is a half circle and creates perfect acoustics.

We walked the streets and stood on the stepping stones which were used to cross the street. Cart wheel grooves were between the stones. There were one way traffic streets and two way. Pedestrian malls were blocked at either end by marble pillars.



Water fountains were in each street and were meeting places. The houses were of baked brick covered and painted white red and yellow, no one has successfully recreated the Pompeii red. It came from a red mineral stone which made a powdered mixture.

There was a red light district and erotic pictures were on display, it is said that people who visited these houses would point to the picture that they desired.

On day 3 several people went to a local house for a cookery lesson. They made and cooked traditional Italian food and ate it. Which everyone enjoyed. The national flag of Italy is red white and green and this is reflected in their Cooking. Red chilli, white cheese and green basil. The area is a rich and fertile land and is very good for farming. Olive oil is exported all over the world. Chilli peppers hang outside the houses to ward off evil spirits.

### RECREATIONAL GROUND QUESTIONNAIRE

Guy Robins and Mathew Crossley have conducted a questionnaire about the "Rec" and how it is used amongst the 10 to 19 age group in the village. This is what they found:-

There were 23 questionnaires returned. From those returned 74% said they used the "Rec" regularly, 21% said occasionally and 4% said they never used it.

The most popular reason for using it was Football and to hang out with friends. There were some positive comments about the good quality of the play equipment, the amount of space and the shelter. However most people felt that the equipment was aimed at the younger children and that there is not enough to do for the older children /teenagers to do.

The reason given for never using the "Rec" was because of the amount of broken glass there and also because of the graffiti. There were also comments about the football pitch not being useable due to the slope of the ground.

They asked people what new feature or equipment they would most like to see at the "Rec". The most popular suggestion was a basketball hoop with some tarmac, a skate/ bike ramp and the football pitch being made level. Other suggestion included a multi purpose court, a mini zip wire and a rugby post.

The conclusion they reached was :- "Although the "Rec" is fairly well used at the moment, improvements could be made to the facility and if there were more things for the teenagers to do it would be used more often."
