## Electricity goes underground

Last month work started on laying a new electricity supply cable which will ultimately ensure that all over head electric cabling will be buried underground in future years.

Individual homes and junction boxes can be connected to this cable via smaller links in time. Hopefully this will also see the demise of inconveniently sited junction boxes, but that may yet be a step too far.

The cable may be installed but when the connections will be made and the ugly post removed is anyone's guess at the moment.

### 22 Acres future uncertain

Following the defeat of the community consortium in their attempts to purchase the 22 acres adjoining Forest Hall Road, there have been major concerns about the ultimate future of the land. The most recent purchasers appear to be a company who landscape and renovate sites for development in the South East, their current project being a hotel in the Battersea area.

Following a visit from the chief enforcement officer, who pointed out in no uncertain terms that the previous owner had not complied with the condition that the hard standing be removed and the gateway closed, it was pointed out that the onus to do this was now up to him. He also removed any illusion that with the development of Stansted Airport permission might be given for a hotel on this site. It was pointed out that the site was very firmly in the Green Belt and such development was not appropriate. He then suggested that he might run a nursery from the site, this too would not be allowed either.

The most likely use for the site seems to be growing trees and shrubs for use in company projects elsewhere. Whatever he does, he knows that the eyes of both Birchanger, Stansted and the enforcement team will be on him. ## Another accident in the Bradley Common area

Once again the concerns about this area were voiced following an accident there last month. While everyone's sympathies are with those who were caught up in the incident, the focus is back on what can be done at this black spot.

The police would like to see double yellow lines on both sides of the road. This alarms residents, some of whom have no parking of their own. Traffic lights might be possible but very costly, and even then parking would be more limited than it is at present. Tables and humps annoy residents with their noise and the local councils are prohibited by law from supplying car parking places to privately owned homes.

It would be nice to expect everyone to be extra vigilant, but everyone has met the irresponsible driver at the site who is not.

The options are few and impracticable. The situation is always under review, but please be very careful, there can be no miracle.

## Parish boundaries to be reviewed next year

At the time of writing 150 new homes are occupied at the Rochford Nursery Site. An electoral review was scheduled to be held when the 200<sup>th</sup> home was occupied and Stansted Parish Council has requested that this review takes place.

It will not be possible to hold the review prior to the General Election, but it is hoped to start the consultation process next summer, when residents of both the parishes along with the new residents will be invited to give their views. It may well be that the residents of Forest Hall Park will decide to form their own new parish, with its own Parish Council as has happened in Felsted

The complication is that only Parish Boundaries are decided by the District Council. Ward boundaries from which District Councillors are elected and the numbers within those boundaries are decided by the Electoral Commission. They will not act until after the parish boundaries have been decided so that for the next District Council elections the old boundaries will apply. Complicated isn't it?

Unauthorised people are always trying to get into your bank account, or have details of your credit and debit cards. The general advice is never give these away to anyone whatsoever who casually calls on you or phones you up. It is a recipe for disaster. One of the latest involves an outfit who pose as Council Officials who call particularly on the elderly, to offer them the opportunity to pay their council tax by Direct Debit, Credit or Debit Card. They invite you to fill in a form giving these details then leave to help themselves to funds from your account. It is happening.

You may think this does not happen here, but last month an individual called on at least one individual offering to look after the property in the middle of the night for 2 hours for a weekly sum of £20. If you sign up for that you will never see him or the £20 again. It happened in Birchanger to someone who very wisely declined the service.

## **School News**

### Sport continues despite the weather

There was a bright display of attractively wrapped shoe boxes ready for collection to start their journey to some of the most deprived children in the world from Stansted Airport last month. A total of about 25 boxes were collected and they made an attractive feature in the newly decorated and much lighter entrance hall. The children had also made and painted a series of poppies to mark Remembrance Day and the pictures by Class 3 were extraordinarily good.

#### Children create their own special Armistice day

Class 4 have been studying World War 2 this term and Armistice Day proved to be a special focus for their work. They had already created and drawn pictures of poppies which adorned the walls of both their own classroom and the entrance hall. Next they created their own special Armistice Commemoration November 11<sup>th</sup> with a special school assembly, first at the war memorial at 11 am where they kept the silence and where their own special thoughts were expressed and prayers were offered. This was followed by a special service in the church itself.

In the afternoon churchwarden Peter Odrich visited Class 4.He told them how he grew up as a child in war time Germany, together with a very moving account of what it was like when, at age 7, he and his family were taken prisoner by the Russians and he was kept apart from his family alone in a large hall for 6 weeks. It proved to be a day that Class 4 will never forget, and that children of Birchanger do think about and consider the great wars in very great depth.
