Birchanger is the First to Renew its Quality Parish Council Status

It means a great deal of work for the clerk, who has to prove to the judges that the Parish Council is a cut above the rest.

She was rewarded for her efforts when she was presented along with Parish Council Chairman Philip Hoy, with a renewed certificate at a meeting of Uttlesford District Council last month.

More Improvements For Birchanger Lane!

Amazingly another long awaited improvement has happened for Birchanger Lane. The improvement of the bend at Churton has been requested more than annually ever since I have been a member of Birchanger Parish Council and long before.

It means that we can at last walk safely at this dangerous bend, with less chance that we will be hit, as I have many times, or having to leap up a bank to avoid the traffic. It is a pity it does not extend further, but maybe that will be another twenty year job!

This was not the only area to receive attention. The gullies at the top end of the lane have been dug out, it remains to be seen what will happen when the first heavy rain falls.

What we really need now is a roundabout or some kind of system which will make the junction at the B1383 easier to use. There was another serious accident there again last month. Improvements there are certainly needed and we are working on it. Hopefully this will not take another 14 years.

A Potentially Disastrous New East of England Plan.

The East of England Regional Assembly is consulting on its regional development plan to run until 2031. It makes horrific reading for all those who feel that there is more than enough development going on in Uttlesford as it is, and residents see a rural way of life disappearing forever.

The plan does not seem to take into account the nature of any area it covers. It simply seems to see space and the totally unproven need for vast

numbers of housing. There is no acknowledgement of the needs of existing residents, or for infrastructure and water supply.

For Uttlesford the plan looks at four different scenarios. Scenario 1 assumes growth at the present rate. For those living in the shadow of enormous developments the prospect cannot be attractive. The second assumes that the airport will continue to develop at the rate seen until last year. It proposes a new town of 21,000 residents in Uttlesford or possibly in Braintree. Scenario 3 envisages economic development which has taken place in the last few years will continue to increase, while scenario 4 shows the number of dwellings which would be required if past trends of migration and population rise in the district continue.

Scenarios 1 and 3 will need an additional 430 houses a year, scenario 4 350, while scenario 2 demands an additional 1080 new homes each year. The region purports to oppose the second runway, so if that permission ever did happen the total of housing said to be required, will be staggering.

It is well known that many people have to leave the area to find affordable homes, and there is a shortage of these, but not to these amounts. New homes are needed, older homes need to be modernised, empty homes must be used, then think about what else is needed, and consideration of the environment should be the starting point, not piecemeal expansion.

Runway 2 Decision Expected

The Competition Commission Appeal Tribunal has been hearing the Appeal by BAA against the decision made earlier this year to make BAA sell off Stansted Airport. It is for this reason that the Inquiry into the Runway 2 planning application was postponed indefinitely.

Should BAA be successful in the appeal, it is almost certain, despite falling numbers at Stansted,(down 11% in September) that BAA will press for the Inquiry to be resumed regardless of the Election and the uncertainty as to who is likely to be in power come next May. It is high time that the shadow hanging over our entire area is lifted, but there is no light on that particular horizon just yet.

Nats Postpone Flight Path Changes Yet Again!

It seems that it will be at least another year before anything is done about the 17 flight paths which currently overfly Birchanger. We may only notice the trails from these routes on a clear day, but the fact that this area is so over flown cannot possibly be right.

Flight paths which bring the planes far closer to the south western end of the village either seem set to remain, as it is claimed that these fall just within the swathe of the departure routes and aircraft are turning earlier. There is a better prospect for the residents of Saffron Walden as it seems that the proposed new stacking area between Saffron Walden and Newmarket is off the agenda for the time being.

The appeal against the competition commission's decision that BAA must sell

Stansted Airport as well as Gatwick could just succeed if BAA argue with sufficient conviction that it is unfair to make them sell both airports. The uncertainty for our area continues. That is unfair on all who live here, but quangos in Whitehall give the likes of us scant concern.

Job Centre Plus Moves Closer to Home

Many people have been very irritated when they are seeking for a new employment by having to travel long distances, in some cases to Braintree to access the services of Job Centre Plus. Trained advisors will now be available in Saffron Walden council offices on Tuesdays between 10am and 4pm.

They will also be available in Thaxted CIC on Monday and Wednesday mornings between 9.30 and 12.30. They may even make it to Stansted given time.

Free Insulation for over 70's and Those on Benefit
