#### A big turn out for Remembrance Sunday

Whether it was the Afghanistan effect and the close proximity to Carver Barracks, from where a large part of our serving forces are trained before they are shipped out to serve overseas, or just a higher public awareness of everything our soldiers are going through but Birchanger Church was full on Remembrance Sunday. It was a special service taken with thought and compassion by the Rev Giles Tulk. The Scouts carried their Standards as well as the British Legion Standard. Two Scouts read the names of all those who were killed from Birchanger in both world wars and laid the British legion wreath on the memorial. There was a big turnout to the service by the Scouts and Cubs and this was much appreciated by everyone there.

The Poppy Collection was organized again this year by Geoff Driscoll. This does take a great deal of work and organization which Geoff does willingly every year and all the places where people congregate, including the Services at Junction 8 have their own box. A total of over £2000 was raised.

#### Prehistoric mound for Birchanger

Well actually it is a replacement salt store which will be sited where the existing one is at Junction 8. It will be much larger than its predecessor and the shape will resemble a prehistoric mound. The shape will be distinctive to say the least but there are other examples of these mounds about, including one at Chelmsford. The larger store is needed as the original was built to service the original motorway stretch from Junction 8 to Wanstead. Since then it has had to cope with the additional stretch of motorway as well as the new A120, so frankly it is simply not big enough.

It is not exactly the most welcome addition to the Green Belt, but hopefully it will be well screened from Birchanger by the retention of most of the trees as well as new planting. It is supposed to be painted green. Building has to start soon as after 2011 the funding will be lost.

#### Need a lift to important dates?

If you are elderly or disabled or isolated through circumstance and without transport, Utt;esford Community Travel could be exactly what you need. UCT as they are known, receive funding from District and Town Council in Uttlesford and have been providing a taxi service at a reduced rate for the past 13 years. All you need to do is to become a member of UCT, then transport could be yours on weekdays between 8.30 am and 5.30pm when you book it in advance. The charge is £2.50 for the first two miles and 60p per mile thereafter.

UCT is entirely wheelchair friendly. In addition to individuals membership is also open to Church and Youth Groups. Fully trained volunteers help to drive the mini buses, and more recruits are always needed. Volunteer car drivers are also needed to drive their own cars, with a paid mileage allowance, to take people to their appointments who do not need wheelchair transport.

The premises will be checked by Food Hygiene Officers and rated between 1 and 5 according to the way in which food is prepared, the storage of the food and the overall cleanliness of the premises amongst other checks.

The ratings should be clearly displayed for members of the public to see and the premises will still be checked regularly with ratings adjusted as necessary. Hopefully this will eliminate the horrors we have seen in the press in the past when the miscreants have been brought to court.

Reading is a very important part of everyone's life. We all need to read something everyday even if it is the rather dubious prose on our mobile phone. We do not know exactly how we learn to read, but one thing is agreed, the more you do it the faster you learn. Birchanger School took the final steps towards a school website in November. This has been perhaps too long a time coming but great care has to be taken throughout, and everything must be totally secure for the children who use the school.

The website, now completed will be maintained regularly. Children's details cannot be published in full but those visiting the site will be able to catch a flavour of the school and access general information.

Applications for places for children in September 2011 can be made on line now. The Admissions Policy is set by the Local Authority but copies of this may be obtained at the school.

They love their non-uniform days at Birchanger School so it was no surprise when a group of children asked if they could come to school wearing spots for Children in Need Day. They all brought in coins to fill the shapes of three Pudsey Bears outlined on the hall floor in the fashion of the Three Bears. Fund raising activities which included making Pudsey Biscuits also contributed to the total of over £147 which was raised on the day.

#### Please don't axe our sports clubs.

Government cuts have meant that Uttlesford District Council is pulling out of funding the SportsPartnership. This means that the funding for the coaches for such clubs as Tag Rugby and Multi Skills will be withdrawn from next year. No one is taking this lying down. The parents signed a petition along with parents from other schools in the partnership, which was be delivered to the Secretary of State Michael Gove earlier this month. Sir Alan Haselhurst also met the Chairman of the Partnership last month. With all schools facing a reduced budget now it is the so called extras which will be the first to suffer, although it seems all wrong in a country which is about to host the Olympics and is now attempting to bid for the football World Cup.

At the start of December a busy term became even busier. The school stayed open, and the children had a great deal of fun outside in the snow at playtimes. The Infants delighted everyone with their annual nativity play, then it was the turn of the whole school to visit Harlow for the pantomime at the Harlow Playhouse.

Christmas Lunch was enjoyed by children staff and governors alike, prepared at the school by Mrs Qadri and her team of helpers. Later that day children took part in the Cluster School Carol Concert at Stansted Mountfitchet School. Finally the children lit up the Church in more ways than one with their annual Christingle Service before the Class Christmas parties. Throughout the final week of school the children were delighted to welcome Birchanger residents to share in their events and to make it a very special time.

#### Fun in the Snow

Birchanger School stayed open all week despite some staff having severe problems accessing the school.

For the children it was a memorable week. They were able to play in a snow covered field throughout the week. Snow balling was banned as the snow hardened, but giant snow balls and snowmen were plentiful and it was a wonderful opportunity to run about in crisp deep snow in safety. everyone enjoyed the fun, including the Head Teacher Mrs Warbrick.

## Mrs Helen Rose

The Magazine has been saddened to hear of the passing of Mrs Helen Rose (nee Dix) who was the headmistress of Birchanger primary school from 1964 until 1982) She was 84 years old.

Miss Dix came to the school in the depths of the winter of 1963/64 so it is especially poignant that she should pass away during a similar period of cold weather.

I remember her as a quiet but firm teacher who delighted in country dancing and all kinds of music, She taught many of the village children to play the recorder and played the piano at

every morning assembly. Miss Dix became Mrs Rose when she married Terry Rose in 1970 who taught Morris dancing to the children at Birchanger.

During the two years that she was my head mistress Miss Dix organised several outings including the Royal tournament and the National Maritime Museum at Greenwich.

I am sure there are other ex pupils of Mrs Rose/ Miss Dix who have memories they could share with the village. If so, I will be pleased to print them.
