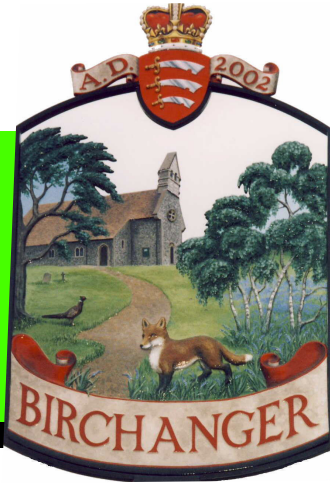

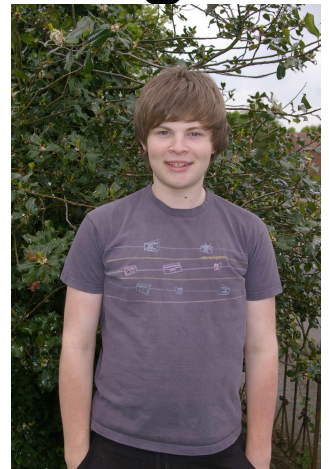

## Footpath maps are available

## There is an experiment on the M11

How often have you found yourself following a pair of lorries, one of whom is attempting to overtake the other? Sometimes the overtaking lorry never achieves its ambition and the traffic is stacked up behind resulting in frustration all round.

The Highways Agency has started an experiment on the M11 to run for an unspecified period, whereby overtaking will be banned for all northbound lorries on the stretch of the motorway between Junction 8 and Junction 9 where there are the steeper hills. A shorter stretch of the southbound section will also be included.

It will be interesting to see if this works, or whether the lorry drivers decide to ignore the whole idea. If you use this section of the M11 while the experiment runs, please tell us about your experiences and what you think.

## The Birchanger Art Exhibition returns with attractions

# School News

## Can you help our children to attain cycling proficiency?

The school is looking for a volunteer to lead a Cycling Proficiency Course later in the Summer Term. This will involve a commitment of 2 hours a week after school for 6 weeks. The volunteer will be trained on the job as they work with the children and will need to take an enhanced CRB Check. There is a small remuneration for the volunteer when trained.

If nobody is found, there will not be a Cycling Proficiency Course this year.

## Celebrating Britain week

The school celebrates many occasions throughout the school year, but has not yet had a week when everyone simply celebrated Britain. The first day of term was busy with preparations for the 21<sup>st</sup> which was also the Queen's birthday. The children all took part in a "Royal Day" when everyone came to school dressed in red, white and blue. They learned about our Royal Family and their role in Britain today.

The focus on the rest of the week was around St George's Day and the celebrations. The children were busy rehearsing for the event which was open to all. The evening was sunny and warm which meant that children, parents and friends could enjoy a picnic of fish and chips, with a licensed bar, before moving into the hall to watch the St George's Day entertainment and an auction of promises. The events have raised around £500 for the school.

## Class 4 Enjoy a Superb Trip.

Every year there is a school trip which lasts 3-4 days and has usually been to an activity centre in the country. The trip at the end of April was very different.

Class 4 boarded a coach on the last Tuesday in April for a trip to the Baden Powell Hostel in London for four days sightseeing and discovering the sights of London for themselves.

In the four days they managed a trip to the Cabinet War Rooms and the Imperial War Museum where they met an octogenarian who told the children just what it was like in world war 2. He showed them his ration book and recounted his wartime experiences. The children then went round a three bedroom house which was kept in the way it would have been in the forties. They visited an underground shelter, and joined in the songs that people sang in the shelters as the bombs were falling.

There was a trip to Tate Modern, a River Cruise which ended in Greenwich with a visit to the National Maritime Museum and a show and the newly refurbished Planetarium.

There was the full London experience, but for some it may well be the visit to the theatre to see War Horse which will be the outstanding memory of the trip.

The children behaved at their best throughout the trip which they will revisit in school in the weeks to come.

## It's Springtime

It is that time of year when the fields and hedgerows are at their most lively and out walking recently a villager pointed out to me that there was a Foxes earth with cubs close to where we were so naturally I went and took a look.

Given that I have lived in the village for most of my life you may be surprised to learn I had never seen fox cubs in the wild before but there they were, three of them, playing in the sunlight, until they spotted me and scampered off into the nearest hole in the ground.

So later I returned, armed with my trusty Pentax and telephoto lens. This time I approached with a good deal more caution and watched the cubs for about an hour. They were not easy to photograph as they spent most of their time obscured by vegetation. Fox cubs have very good hearing and were unsettled by the click of the shutter but their curiosity meant that once disturbed they soon returned to check out the disturbance.

They were happy to ignore me so long as I did not move but once I had some good shots I left them in peace. In the meantime I have also spotted the parents who kept their distance as you would expect. These cubs

were four to six weeks old just turning from dark brown to red and still rely on their mother's milk. If they survive for six months they will become indistinguishable from their parents.

Fox cubs have about a one in five chance of survival to adulthood, while adults rarely live beyond three years. Rural foxes mostly live on rabbit but will take rodents, birds and even invertebrates.

I realise that not everyone shares my ambivalent attitude to foxes so I won't reveal their actual location but I am told that there is at least one other earth in the village with similar occupants.
