FOREST HALL BOUNDARY CHANGES

There seemed to be little enthusiasm shown by the majority of those currently living in Forest Hall Park, who would be affected by the proposed boundary changes, to remain in Birchanger. All the residents of the houses on the Forest Hall estate were consulted along with some on Forest Hall Rd and the B1383. Some did not realise they were actually in Birchanger. Of those who did only one wanted to remain. Both Parish councils are broadly in favour of the move.

This is entirely understandable. Most of those living there shop in Stansted, attend the schools and Doctor's Surgery there and many go to one of the Stansted Churches. It is quite natural for them to feel more closely linked with Stansted. Birchanger Parish Council does not have a problem with this.

The residents are now to be consulted on where the boundary changes should be. For some time the residents of Forest Hall Farm have voiced their preferences to remain in Birchanger. The line could be drawn along the middle of Forest Hall Rd. However there have been concerns expressed in Birchanger about the huge land grab by Stansted from Birchanger in the past few decades, and there is a move to ask for the boundary to be adjusted to include some farmland up to the Parsonage Farm boundary.

Once again those affected will be given a list of possible options in the next few weeks. The District Council's preferred option is to take the boundary along the centre of Forest Hall Rd, down to Parsonage Lane excluding the lodge, but including Forest Hall Cottages and Farm in Birchanger. If you live in Forest Hall, please respond to this if you can. After all it will affect you most of all. There is still the opportunity to create your own parish later as well. If the boundaries are changed, the parish council elections would be postponed for a year.

However the confusion is set to continue for a while longer. As far as the District Council election boundaries are concerned Forest Park will remain in Birchanger as ward boundaries can only be changed by the Electoral Commission. It is on their "to do" list, but that takes time.

Young people are priced out of the housing market in Uttlesford

This must come as no real surprise to anyone. It has long been a sad fact that young people find it very difficult to set up home in Birchanger, and have often been forced to look elsewhere to set up their first home.

This does not do anybody any good. Family ties are weakened, grand parents do not see their grandchildren so often. This also means that they are unable to help their children as much as they would have liked. Friends become distant and moving to a different town is often a very lonely experience.

In Birchanger we do not really need any more expensive new development. What we really need is homes for younger people and young families. This often means rental accommodation from which the occupants can move on as circumstances improve.

Although Birchanger is surrounded by the Green Belt, exceptions can be made for truly affordable homes only. The question is just where exactly should these new homes go? Land owners are reluctant to part with the Green Belt land in the hope that it might eventually be released, which is highly unlikely in the current climate. What we need is a philanthropic land owner with a place where these houses could be built with agreement that this is a suitable site. A tall order. Any ideas?

A Leader and Cabinet System for Uttlesford

This now seems to be inevitable, although the system is not most people's preferred option. At the moment Uttlesford operates using a system of committees, task groups, and working groups. This system does not lead to quick decision making or overall efficiency although it is generally preferred by members as they feel that they are more involved.

Sadly there are now financial constraints and decisions need to be taken speedily. After several months research

and visits to other councils operating the cabinet system it has, reluctantly by many, been agreed that the move to the cabinet system will take place next May after the council elections.

There will be a leader from the majority party who will appoint members of the cabinet. The regulatory Development Control and Licensing committees will still remain, alongside Scrutiny Committees and Working Groups, but the other committees will go. Rank and file council members main involvement will be with these and many will feel disenfranchised.

So do we have a site for the Surgery at last?

Well not exactly. We have a new preferred option site for certain, but the actual planning consents and construction of the site are a long way off.

On September 23rd the site at the garage in Lower Street in Stansted became the preferred option, replacing the site on Forest Park. Just to confuse things and keep everyone guessing the PCT gave notice of intent to develop the site at Forest Hall Park to the builders at the same time, as a kind of insurance policy. The PCT declares that if agreements are not signed and planning agreed in principle for the Lower Street site by January 1st, then the deal is off.

This is indeed a bold statement. Although the trust is already working with the District council Planners and the developer has commissioned a traffic survey, Essex County Highways has yet to have a say. Certainly the junction at Lower Street is at capacity, and there will at least have to be a new priority traffic routing to accommodate the 400 cars expected to use the site on a daily basis.

In addition to the surgery, the developer has to make things pay. There will be flats on the top floor, retail units at the bottom with the surgery somewhere in the middle. Just what will be offered in addition to the surgery is unclear, although there is a dentist hoping to practise there as well. There will be car parking but this relies on some space taken from the council car park. Just how they will prevent commuter parking has not been worked out yet. Parking is to be free for surgery users they claim, but how will this be differentiated?

There is clearly a long way to go. For Birchanger Village it makes little difference where the surgery is as long as we have one. Too much more procrastination will see us all having to travel to Dunmow, Elsenham, or Saffron Walden if the impasse continues.

Olympics update

Like some of the London boroughs we may be thinking that the Olympic activities are largely passing us by, and that we shall simply be a dormitory or an oversize car park while visitors attempt to struggle on to our already overcrowded train network.

There is however the small possibility that the Olympic Torch may arrive at Stansted Airport sometime in May 2012. If it does there should be a large event to support this. Just what is unknown, but ideas from local residents would be very welcome.

It might not be possible to hold the actual event in the village but surely it could be close by if not actually in Birchanger. Are there any events planned for May 2012? Please tell if you have any ideas on 812793.

Are we failing our under fives?

Last week some very uncomfortable statistics were released which showed that in the last two years our children are lacking the expected language skills when they reach primary schools by some 37% in 2008 and 29% in 2009.

The reasons for this are both several and preventable according to the child care professionals. They are caused by the manufacturers of buggies insistence that buggies should face out wards, not the person pushing the buggy. This prevents eye contact and conversation. From birth babies are exposed to too much background noise from television and radios. Spoken words are rendered meaningless. Adults talk on mobile phones very often simply ignoring their young children. Dummies are used indiscriminately, the child simply sucks on the dummy and does not bother to speak.

We can easily all do something about this. Basically it means a little more human consideration about the growing child's needs. To sit them in front of a TV set is no substitute for a talk or a story. Do they really need that dummy all the time? When your mobile phone calls afford your child the same courtesy as if they were an adult in the room with you. Explain things and above all just talk to them more about anything and everything as often as you can. Include them in.
