#### 20 mph Speed Limit for Birchanger?

Many people have expressed a wish to have a 20mph speed limit along Birchanger Lane and other roads in Birchanger. If we do try to arrange one for any part of Birchanger we need a lot of support from residents along with evidence of need from speed surveys. In these days of cut backs whereas at time Essex County Council was keen to see this limit in rural areas, there is less enthusiasm in the current climate.

What do you think? I would like to know your views so that if enough people support this initiative we will have a better chance of actually getting a 20 mph limit.

#### **Boundary Consultation**

The Parish Council has been consulted by the District Council for its views as to changing the boundary between Stansted and Birchanger. They have also been asked as to where they think the boundary should be.

It is quite likely and very understandable that those actually living on the Forest Hall Estate will feel that they are linked more closely geographically to Stansted and will prefer to become part of that parish.

Birchanger Parish Council has to make its views known to the District Council by the end of this month and if you have not already expressed your views, they would invite you to do so either directly to the District Council or in confidence to me on 812793.

Should there be a boundary change the elections for the Parish Council for both Birchanger and Stansted would be postponed until May 2012. The decision will not affect the District Council elections in 2011 as the boundary for these elections is expected to remain as it is at present. No doubt this will cause confusion in years to come.

#### **Energy Saving Update**

It is some 10 months since I first began to improve the insulation of my very old house. It was a long time since I had heard from the Herts and Essex Energy project, currently known as HEEP and it was not until they had received two wake up calls from me that there was any action.

Firstly as my house would be very costly to insulate without cavity walls it was decided to look at loft insulation instead. Last month I had a visit from a very helpful and knowledgeable British Gas Energy expert, despite having had one in February from the HEEP organisation. He told me that because I had partial insulation recently installed which was over 65mm thick in part of the house I would not qualify for free insulation there, but I would in the area where there was some old insulation. They would not accept my offer to pay them for the additional insulation required as the roof space was too low.

Not exactly a result, as I did want the whole house brought up to a higher standard of insulation. However they left me with a lot of advice and a box of goodies. These included an electricity monitor which was duly

fitted and the results are a little bit scary. I never knew the television used that much, or the computer either. There was also a widget for the shower and a device which turns off a TV set switched to standby, another saving.

All in all I think the whole project is worth doing particularly if you are in receipt of any benefits, pensions or tax credits. I received a lot of free helpful advice, if only a small amount of insulation at the end of the day. The downside was the time it all took and the disappointment at what little there is available for older properties at an affordable price. It might be better to approach British Gas directly. I have the number of their energy consultant for anyone who is interested along with an explanatory leaflet. I can be reached on 812793.

#### Basildon Hospital is Getting Better.

After the last few months I could practically write a good hospital guide, but I have to say that after the latest hospital ratings I was awaiting my visit to the Essex Coronary Care Unit at Basildon University Hospital with some trepidation.

As always the clerical services were outshone by the medical staff as promised letters and instructions failed to arrive and this meant that at home preparation was compromised, but that was the worst part of the experience.

I arrived, having been able to park in the middle of the afternoon to a clean and new specialist building where queues were non existent and the appointments were on time. Directions were clear and my driver parked close to the entrance. Chairs were actually comfortable and the staff relaxed and friendly. You did not feel that you were imposing on the staff's precious time. They were actually there for you. It was very clean and the equipment new.

I had some reservations about all the coronary care for this area being delivered at Basildon. The clinical status of the hospital had been a problem. It can be a long journey by car, particularly with the road works on the M11 and an inconvenient journey by bus which will involve at least three bus changes. Ideally you will need private transport and for those who are having procedures where driving is not permitted or who have no transport of their own, or ask for help from Uttlesford Community Transport, a friend or the hospital car

service. That without doubt is the downside. The care I received was very good.

#### The Menace at the End of Your Phone

It is a very good idea to register for the Telephone Preference Service. This is a service which will screen your home phone from the majority of callers who try to sell you something which you certainly did not know you actually needed. The Fax Preference Service also operates in the same way. How they manage to do this remains a mystery to me, but as a user of both services for a number of years, I can confirm that they work in most cases. On the rare occasions when these people have got through, they ring off immediately when I tell them that my line is registered to stop their call.

A particularly nasty caller this summer came from an outfit which claimed to be the Crime Reduction Unit or Crime Research UK. They claim to be working with Essex County Council on a crime awareness week and to be offering a free alarm. All they are trying to do is to gain access to your property and to sell you some particularly expensive but generally inferior alarm equipment. The District Council first issued a warning about this in July but vulnerable people in particular, their preferred prey, are still getting caught.

Another scam involved phoning or calling on vulnerable people to tell them that a gas leak had been reported on their property and that they needed to gain access to their home to sort out the problem. The answer is to always closely examine the caller's credentials and to phone the number on their card to check whether the person on your doorstep is who he claims to be. Many will scarper at this point. A third purported to have information that you had the wrong banding on your property for council tax rating. They needed your details to sort it out. Never ever give your details to anyone who phones you asking for them for any reason or who calls at your home, without checking them out first.

## Farewell to a Very Good Friend

It is easy to imagine that a familiar figure who has been one of the cornerstones of village life will go on forever and will always be here for us. It was a shock and huge sadness for many in Birchanger to learn that Ted Haggerwood who had played an important role in village life for nearly 70 years and who lived at the heart of the village in more ways than one, had died peacefully in his sleep last month.

Ted was one of a rapidly dwindling band who was born, brought up and lived his whole life in the village. He did not just live in the village as from a very young age he lived for the village in every way he could. He attended the village school, played football and cricket for the Birchanger team, becoming Captain and then President of the Cricket Club. He was responsible for most of the extension of Birchanger Club and was an active committee member of the club as well as its Chairman and a Trustee for 42 years.

Ted was born in the cottage adjoining the Three Willows and only moved house within the village. In years to come he had a hand in building many homes in Birchanger. He acquired a huge knowledge of the history of the village and the surrounding area. He was always a source of knowledge and advice, not just on building.

He served a staggering 33 years on Birchanger Parish Council, 22 of those years as its Chairman. He married Dolly, also Birchanger born, who attended Birchanger School with Ted. When she became a member of the District Council he spent a large part of his time taking her to her many meetings finally giving up work after she became ill to do all the driving for her. One of his proudest moments came when she was awarded a well deserved MBE. He was regarded as a kind of "honorary "member of the council by all her colleagues and his experience and local knowledge was always valued there.


There was nobody quite like Ted in Birchanger, He was always to be relied upon, his opinions firm and well thought through. The last ten years after Dolly died were hard for him, but he always had the unfailing support of his daughter Sue and her family who cared for him to the end. He was proud of them all and they never let him down.

At his funeral held in St Mary's on August 23<sup>rd</sup> Grandson Freddie spoke movingly of his "Dannah" remembering his love of gardening and of people and friends and the history of the village. He also reminded us of Ted's softer side when he would buy sweets for Freddie and his sister Lucy on the way home from school.

A recording of Lucy performing the "Ashokan Farewell", a poignant piece well suited to a violin, was played to a full St Mary's.

The service was jointly conducted by Paul Wilkin and Canon Derek Jackson whose comprehensive funeral address touched on every aspect of Ted's life.

Farewell Ted and thank you for all you did for us in Birchanger.

## **School News**
