# So Now We Have no Local Police Station

### **Olympic Route**

Uttlesford has been selected to be a pathway for the Olympic Torch on Saturday July 7<sup>th</sup>, as it makes its way across East Anglia. It is expected to use the B1383, which means it is expected to go through a small part of Birchanger, but not the main village en route to Stansted and Saffron Walden.

Contrary to popular expectations, most of the journey will be made in the Olympic Bus, with runners only carrying the torch through the main towns and villages. It could be a case of blink and you will miss it here. In the 1948 games large teams of runners travelled longer distances to carry the torch. They did not travel over so much of the country but there were far better views for the smaller places along the route.

Stansted Airport is expecting an incredibly busy August. You can forget the night period flights will be 24/7 for much of the time, as teams and visitors arrive. Tempted to go away? Avoid August 13<sup>th</sup>. That is expected to be the airport's busiest day ever. You have been warned!

### Decision Time Looms on Section 106 Agreements

The Parish Council has been holding meetings with Essex County Highways to discuss the traffic improvements to the village following the construction of Forest Hall Park. Recent surveys have confirmed that the traffic in the lane has doubled, and that there is also a serious speeding issue.

The possibilities for work include,

 Traffic Island at the junction with the B1383 and Birchanger Lane. A mini roundabout is too costly and Highways believe it would incur more people to cut through Birchanger Lane. An island would benefit those who wish to turn right as well as pedestrians.

- 2. Closure of Tot Lane and the creation of a Bridleway and Cycle Track there. There have been instants of horrendous driving on Tot Lane, as well as a huge weekly bill to clear up fly-tipping.
- 3. Speed display units, possibly on a moveable basis on Birchanger Lane.
- 4. HGV prohibition orders with appropriate signage.
- 5. Entrance gates at both ends of the lane.
- 6. A pedestrian crossing near the Church Hall.

All these possibilities are expensive and we shall not be able to have them all. Highways would like to know what you think about the suggestions now. They will be meeting with members of the Parish Council in January having worked up a scheme. It may be that you would like others to be considered.

The team will be at the Annual Parish Meeting in April, when the proposals will be out for official consultation. Your views prior to this would be appreciated. Please call me on 812793.

### Watch Out, There are Still Travellers About

The people who have caused the problems at Dale Farm in recent months did not belong to the true gypsy community. They were Irish tinkers who come over seasonally, mostly from homes back in Ireland. Some who were actually resident in this country actually left homes to join the travellers at Dale Farm over the past year.

The problem is that the temporary accommodation they are finding is just that, and there are many open spaces around Birchanger which travellers have been "eyeing up" in the past few months. I have reported several large white vans towing large caravans around the Birchanger roundabout to the police in the last few weeks and they have acted on this.

The land opposite the ambulance station is not secure and is owned by the Highways Agency. The fence is broken in places and access would be very easy. There are many other such sites, one on the B 1383 was used last summer.

I cannot be around all the time, but anyone can report a traveller siting to the police. If they are parked anywhere, call 999, or the Duty Officer on 07801 461666 When the landowner co-operates with the police at the time the travellers arrive, they can be removed immediately, as happened in Takeley. If they do not the problem with all, its attendant aggravation, will be around for months at best. You have been warned.

### Christmas Controversy.

Everyone loves a Nativity Play, particularly those who are related to one of the participants. Everyone also wants to take pictures and to film the event as well. The problem is that nobody knows where these pictures end up. Some end up in local newspapers, some are posted on the internet and are freely accessible to all. The difficulty is that children across the country are in situations, where at some point in their young lives, they have been victims at the hands of a parent, relative, so called friend. They are in a situation where their whereabouts have to be protected to ensure their continuing safety or well being. Sadly just about every school in the country has had, or currently has, this situation. The only way of managing this is for the schools to be in control and to see every picture opportunity is taken under close supervision. Photo sessions are arranged, but for those who are currently caring for the child only.

After all nobody wants to see a child's Christmas ruined just because a published picture lead to the exposure of their protected identity.

## 11.11.11 in France

While Birchanger marked Armistice Sunday in the usual way with a big input from the Scouts and Brownies, in France they were also commemorating the day, but there it is always on November 11<sup>th</sup> as that day is a Bank Holiday there.

Two Birchanger residents, Peter and Brenda Cook, moved to Croisilles in northern France last summer. They are integrating quickly into the small village not far from the Somme in Northern France and have made many new friends. There are five war grave cemeteries in the village where soldiers of all nationalities who fought in the great war are buried, including many British soldiers as well as the crew of a Lancaster bomber which crashed in the vicinity. They told me what happened at Croisilles on 11.11.11.

The local mayor and a large group of residents in Croisilles met at the Mairie before driving to the civic cemetery. Every grave had a large bunch of chrysanthemums which had been placed upon it, as is the French tradition, on All Saints Eve on October 31<sup>st</sup>. They were accompanied by a policeman in his ceremonial white kepi and white gloves, with the traditional standard bearer.

After a minutes silence they went to the nearby British Ceremony where two wreaths were laid on the war memorial there. They then went to the graves where the crew of a Lancaster bomber are buried, before returning to the main square. There the children read letters and poems from the two wars which they had researched themselves. The Mayor made a speech after which the bugler sounded the Last Post and the band played the Marseillaise.

Then the company all retired to the Town Hall for Champagne, or Kir served with dainty biscuits.

The children, like our Scout, Cubs and Brownies were closely involved throughout; something which is very important in the struggle to find world peace.

In Birchanger the Poppy Appeal raised £3200 this year, well done to all those who made it happen.

### Chance to Try the School Dinners

Parents and governors were invited to sample a school dinner at the school last month. The weeks menus were the ones the children deemed to be their favourites. There were the usual choices and a cold lunch or jacket potato on offer as well. The menus included fish and chips and roast chicken in the course of the week. Curry has also become a favourite dish, with wonderful smells coming from the kitchen as it is prepared. Everything is freshly prepared. There are no frozen dinners. The bread is always fresh for the cold lunches. Children know the menus two weeks in advance so that they can make their selections in advance. That way nothing goes to waste. School dinners have come a very long way since I was at school. Maybe I should lunch there more often. It is hardly surprising that the numbers of children taking them continue to rise all the time.

Taste the dinners week proved to be hugely successful with both parents and children. Mrs Quadri, the chef found herself preparing up to 82 dinners a day. Enjoyable, but if the school is to operate a canteen, more staff will definitely be required.

Remembrance Day with the once in a lifetime date of 11.11.11. It was a day when expectant mothers hoped that their babies would arrive, and a special one in the school as the children remembered those who had died in war in their own particular way.

They especially remembered the family of the most recent soldier to die in Afghanistan. They thought about all those children's lifetimes, there really will be peace o'er all the world.

### Non Uniform Days with a Purpose

It is always fun to ditch the school uniform and come to school wearing something completely different for a change. At Birchanger it happens with a purpose. The first day was for Children in Need. The school council decreed that nobody needed to get dressed at all as everyone was to come to school in their pyjamas, and if they just happened to be spotty, so much the better. Throughout the day they thought about children less well off than themselves and set about raising money to help them. A very spotty fun day, which benefited children way beyond Birchanger.

### Christmas Fair Makes a Healthy Profit

### Birchanger School First Ever Strike Closure?

Birchanger School has never been closed for a strike in recent memory, possibly ever. last month while the children enjoyed a day playing in the late Autumn sunshine, three out of four teachers felt so strongly about their current situation that they were prompted to take a day out on stirke.

The decision to take this action was not taken lightly. The decision to close the school was taken only after the governor's had considered the situation carefully and reluctantly concluded that there was no safe way that the 100 children in the school could be supervised appropriately and safely on the day of the strike. Parents had offered to help, but in these health and safety ruled days, the offer could not be accepted.

The children on the whole did not mind at all. It was their parents who bore the brunt of the situation and many had to take the day off.

We live in a democracy and we have been taught to respect each others views; this being the case days like this are to be expected occasionally. Not easy for the adults, although non striking staff all turned up to school and did some vital work in planning,organisation and clearing in preparation for one of the busiest fortnights in the school year.
