Once Again Your Views Are Required.

As the Localism Bill is now law, the District Council along with most other councils in the UK are busily updating their local plans to accord with the new planning structure. Uttlesford is embarking on the consultation process this month and if you have not received it already, you will be receiving the first of three consultation Documents which will come your way this year.

Following the previous consultation the option of a new settlement is no longer the council's preferred solution.

Instead development is proposed to be concentrated around the main settlements, with only very small amounts proposed for smaller villages, and these are expected to be community led.

For Birchanger although there were sites identified by landowners and agents in the Strategic Housing Land Allocations, these have been ruled to be unsuitable and unless over 50% of the electorate are in favour of the proposals are not going to happen. In fact if we need affordable housing it is up to us to say where and the site owners have to be willing to sell the land.

We can also change our own development limits, but there is a presumption against this. Some with gardens on the edge whose land is outside development limits may wish to do this as was the case at Churton. The change would need to be supported and justified.

It is important to read the consultation document. It is not all about new housing, there are other issues such as landscape, noise, and amenity which do require your input. There will also be an exhibition and maps of the District on 6th February at the Day Centre Grafton Green. This will run throughout the day and into the evening. Officer will be on hand to answer your questions and to talk through the various issues.

Your opinion does matter. The council listened to the residents of Elsenham. They will listen to you.

New Look Ambulance Service.

We have always looked to the ambulance service to take us to hospital when we are seriously ill or have had an accident. One call to the 999 service and an ambulance whisks you to casualty in no time at all.

That was the old days. These days the approach is quite different. The crew who arrive on your doorstep are likely to be highly trained paramedics or technicians. Their job is to take you to hospital if you really need it, but to see what can be done to treat and to help you first in your own home. If you are visited by the most highly trained team they can administer drugs and pain killers or call for the support of those who can. They will assess your options and proceed accordingly.

Under the new system many who expected to have to wait hours in casualty, will find themselves comfortably treated at home, with appropriate on going care secured through the various agencies. If you do need to go to hospital, your condition will be stabilised for the journey and you will be taken to the hospital unit most appropriate to your needs, It could mean a specialist unit at a London Hospital, Papworth, the Burns Unit at Broomfield as well as the local casualty department for more routine cases.

The target time for a response is 8 minutes across the district; 75% of all calls currently achieve this. This target may not be met at peak times, inclement weather or call overload. Giving the correct address is vital. Most of the failure to arrive inside the target time is due to the original caller giving an incorrect address. In the stress of the moment this can happen very easily. Some people have already experienced the service and have been delighted to have been treated at home where this has been possible.

Training for the ambulance crews is constantly on going. It is no longer about basic first aid and getting there fast. They are assisted by the First Responders who are located in the larger towns and villages in Uttlesford and are ordinary people trained in emergency techniques. They too save lives. A paramedic is also a very worthwhile career for those about to leave school to contemplate as well.

Planning Application at Last for the Stansted Surgery.

The longest awaited surgery plans ever have finally landed on the doorstep of the Council Offices in Saffron Walden. It will be some time before the first bricks are laid, as after three months for the plans to be considered, there will be a further three months of adjustments and tender applications. The project is unlikely to start for at least 6 months from the date the planning application is decided should it be approved. The earliest we could expect the doors to open will be on 2014. Meanwhile the struggle for both patients and surgery staff alike must continue.

The plans for the new PCTs seem to be impossibly complicated to lay eyes. The trusts will also come on line around that time but I am afraid I could not put a time limit on the date we may expect the kind of service from the PCT we can only dream about at present.

Police Station Closures.

Dismay has been expressed right across the board at the closure of police stations in smaller towns and villages across Essex. Our district in particular with easy motorway access is at risk from the criminals who night trip it down from London, and escape before the victims are aware of what has actually happened to them.

The District Council is asking for explanations from the higher ranks of the police force as to the thinking behind this retrograde step and to whether the reasons are just purely financial. There need to be changes to the times the community police bus visits, as a great many of the people who might have issues are at work during the day.

The future of the Police Community Support Officers is also uncertain. They have proved to be invaluable to Birchanger in the past few years and the work they do is very much appreciated by those who have needed their help. A police officer sent out from Harlow could never understand the situation here.

At the moment our nearest Police Stations open on a part time basis are at Great Dunmow and Saffron Walden. They will be open Monday to Saturday between 12 noon and 6pm.

The mobile Police Station will be in the Church Hall Car park between 10 and 11am on January 6th, February 2nd March 2nd and March 30th.

Some Section 106 Money Confirmed.

Birchanger Wood and Birchanger Nursery will receive grants of £33,000 and £7,000 respectively from the Community Section 106 money for Forest Hall park Estate. This will benefit not just those who live in Birchanger, but everyone in the area who use the wood and the Nursery.

More money will be made available, but apart from the $\pounds 660,000$ already allocated to Stansted, it is not known at the time of writing as to where the remaining money, estimated to be some $\pounds 6-\pounds 700,000$ will be spent.

CHOCOLATE, TOFFEE AND PEANUT SQUARES

Makes about 24 squares

100 g 3 ½ oz Caster Sugar
200 g 7 oz butter softened and diced
300 g 10 ½ oz self raising flour sifted
400 ml 14 fl oz boiled condensed milk
125 g 4 ½ oz salted peanuts roughly chopped
200 g 7 oz milk chocolate broken into pieces

Pre heat your oven to 180 C/ fan 160 Gas mark 4 Line the base of a Swiss roll tin with baking parchment.

In a food processor whiz together the sugar butter and flour for the short bread base until the mixture resembles coarse breadcrumbs.

Alternatively rub together the butter and flour in a bowl with your finger tips and stir in the sugar.

Tip into the tin and press down with your hands or a pallet knife to level out.



Bake for about 20 minutes or until golden brown, then remove and cool in the tin.

Spread over the boiled condensed milk to cover the shortbread, then press the roughly chopped peanut into it making sure they are evenly distributed.

Melt the chocolate in a heatproof bowl set over a saucepan of simmering water.

Remove the chocolate from the heat and pour over the milk and peanuts.

Allow it to cool then leave in the fridge for 1 to 2 hours to set. Once set, cut the mixture into squares in the tin and serve.

Applying for Membership

Membership is open to any person aged 18 or above. To apply, simply obtain a membership form from behind the bar and find two people who have been members for at least one year to propose and second your application. When all three of you have completed the form hand it in at the bar together with the application fee covering the first year's annual subscription. Once accepted, you can collect your year's membership card within 7-10 days at the club.

Application and Membership Fees

For new members, the first annual subscription is * £22.50 and then £17.50 per calendar year thereafter. Members must renew their membership by the end of January of each year, irrespective of what time of year they joined the Club. Renewal after January deadline will cost an extra £5.00

Temporary Membership

Visitors to Birchanger may obtain temporary membership. This lasts for two weeks and costs £2.50. To obtain temporary membership the visitor needs to be sponsored by a full member, who will apply to the committee on their behalf.

Life Members

Members, who have completed five years of uninterrupted membership, are fully paid up, and who have reached the state retirement age will normally be granted Life Membership upon application. They do not then need to pay any further membership fees but they are required to renew their membership each year.

Pavilion hire:

The club has a small cricket pavilion which is for hire and suitable for; private parties, kids birthdays, meetings, book and cookery clubs, first aid training, chess clubs, martial arts training, computer and photographic clubs, band rehearsal etc. The pavilion can hold around 30-40 people and has tables and chairs, kitchen and toilet facilities. ST. MARY THE VIRGIN, BIRCHANGER Development Proposals 2012

It is now 5 years since the Parochial Church Council (PCC) approached the Diocese to investigate the possibility of installing a toilet and kitchenette in the church. The Archdeacon and some of her colleagues visited St Mary's to discuss the proposals and they then advised that before the proposals could be given further consideration; the dampness problem in church had to be addressed.

The PCC set about a program of repairs to the guttering and floorboards. These works have now been completed and already we can see an improvement in the wall dampness/staining on the main aisle. We thank the Friends of St Mary's and others who have helped to pay for this work at over £10,000.


To finish the job, the old blown plaster now needs to be repaired and then the whole church interior can be painted. This will cost around \pounds 14,000 and we hope to do all of this work in the coming 12 months.

As for the toilet, it has taken some time to locate the whereabouts of the main drains and water (there is none at the church at present), we have had a site meeting with an architect and we have instructed him to prepare detailed plans for our consideration. Once approved and costed, we intend to press on with our application through the Diocese. We are of the view that the provision of a toilet at the church is a necessity. The estimated cost is £80,000.

In a building as old as ours, there will always be something that needs to be repaired or replaced and the PCC has set aside some funds to meet the general cost involved. However, the PCC does not have access to substantial sums and must look for grants and donations to pay for this work.

There is then the organ. With help from the Friends, grants and donations, we have been able to carry out essential repair work but we are about to commence a rigorous program to raise the £100,000 necessary to completely overhaul the organ. The organ is unique and, but for the Franco-Prussian war, it would not have been built here. Daniel Roth, titular organist at Saint-Sulpice, Paris has kindly consented to his name being used to support our fund raising efforts. It is a large sum to spend but in the long term, with the organ in best condition, this will secure the financial future of our church.

So, we need to raise the best part of £200,000. Some will come from church fund raising and some from the Friends. The rest will have to come from grants and donations. Most grant making bodies want to see evidence of matched funding (if we have say £10,000, they will give £10,000) so we are asking for donations to be paid now. Any donation made for this project will be held separately and, unless you agree otherwise, will be used only for the building work and the organ rebuild.
