Time to vote in a new Parish Council

On April 1st all the houses on the Stansted side of Forest Hall Road will come under Stansted Parish Council, which is their preferred option after the District Council conducted a survey among all the Forest Park residents at the time of the survey last year. Accordingly the Parish Council elections were postponed for a year.

They will now take place in both Stansted and Birchanger on Thursday May 3rd. The election will be declared on March 22nd, and candidates for the election to the Parish Council have until noon on April 4th to submit their nomination papers. The papers will be available from our Parish Clerk Julia Peachey on 503912, or from the District Council on 01799 510510.

Standing for the parish council is a good way of helping your community, as Parish councillors all have their individual roles and responsibilities. The District Wards are arranged by the Electoral Commission, and a review of these boundaries is expected by 2015.



The day the Village stood still

Birchanger is not a big village. The population stands at around 720 residents, but on one day last month 400 of them turned out to say farewell to a man who had come to mean so much to so many of them over the past 40 years.

Dave Tucker who had run the Three Willows Pub with other members of his family sadly lost a hard fought battle against cancer last month. His death brought huge sadness to not only his family but to the many who had called him a friend for more years than they could remember.

The 400 people who came to Dave's funeral last month packed the church with at least half the congregation having to listen to loud speakers outside in the churchyard. They came to pay tribute to a man who had been born in Birchanger, had served as steward at the club, and who had managed to turn the Three Willows into the attractive and well known pub it is today. He will be remembered as someone you could always rely on, who was always there with a smile and a joke no matter how busy and latterly how ill he was.

You don't meet people like Dave in life very often. Tributes like this are rare in Birchanger and always heart felt. Thank you Dave for all you did. We shall remember you with sincere affection for the rest of our lives.

Camera traffic count in Birchanger Lane

You may not have been aware of it, but you were most probably caught on camera if you used your car at all in Birchanger earlier this year.

Cameras were located at two different locations at either end of the village. Not only did these cameras count the cars, they checked the driver's speed as well, and yes, several of you were caught speeding, the highest speed being 50 mph in a 30 mph speed limit.

The exit onto the B1383 was the preferred route in and out of the village. Some 5108 drivers exited the village

that way, compared to only 3250 using the motorway end. On weekdays, which were during term time, numbers peaked between 8 and 9am at some 95 cars exiting to the motorway and 110 to the Stansted end. Between 3 and 4 pm, 101 vehicles exited towards the motorway, making it the busiest time of day southbound. The equivalent on Saturdays between 8 and 9 am was 30 towards Stansted and 13 to the motorway.

The scary fact is that there are around 16,000 traffic movements through Birchanger. The good news is that there are sometimes periods of two hours in the early hours of the morning when there are no traffic movements at all, but be careful, just a little later the fastest speeds in the lane have been recorded.

Emergency Plan update

The Parish Council is to receive Emergency Planning Training this year. Hopefully the expertise will never be put to the test, but there is always the possibility that living close to an airport and a motorway, something will happen. If it does, apart from the emergency services and depending on the nature of the incident, the people who will be organising the volunteer support will be the members of the Parish Council who expect to receive additional training later this year.

Veolia the water company who supply the water to most of the immediate area cannot rule out some kind of water restrictions for us this summer. There have been two very dry winters, which are bad news, as it is from winter rainfall that the reservoirs and rivers benefit most. The water table is very low, as the rainfall we have experienced has not penetrated to its depth. In the first instance they are asking people to conserve water as far as they can. Showers, not of the power variety, mending dripping taps and cisterns, and turning off the tap while cleaning your teeth are at the top of their list which they would like us all to take seriously now. Meanwhile, perhaps it is a good time to invest in a water butt for when it actually does rain. Remember the much repeated slogan, take a bath with a friend? Could be about to be brought back this summer.

Essex gears up for the Olympics!

What with everyone who is anyone landing at Stansted for the Olympic Games, emergency plans are the name of the game for Essex County Council. The temptation to disrupt or worse among terrorist groups is very high. The games are a huge opportunity for people of all ages to come together in peace in the name of sport, terrorism should have no place in there or anywhere else. In Essex with Stansted at full stretch, cruise liners moored in the Thames extra traffic on roads and rail, the logistics of security are of enormous proportions.

Essex is prepared for the challenge. Emergency services and civilian volunteers have been trained for all eventualities, special vehicles have been commissioned. and a huge intelligence team is already in place. It is hoped that with all this vigilance, the emergency mortuary will be a piece of unnecessary kit. As ever, around the airport is a risk area. Please report anything you see which might be suspicious. You might prevent a tragedy. The torch will travel between Bishops Stortford and Stansted on July 7th, having started the day's journey from Chelmsford and proceeding via Harlow, East Herts, before reaching Bishops Stortford later in the morning. It seems that the bulk of the journey will be completed in a motor cavalcade, with buses, coaches and emergency vehicles escorting the torch and the relay bearers for most of the way. It could be, blink and you will miss it. Further details will be given, when they are known.

Wind's in the East. Kerosene is back.

The stench of kerosene continues to irritate the residents of Birchanger Lane from Duck End to the club on a regular basis when the wind is in the east. As has been discovered, it is highly unlikely that the odour is anything to do with the fuel farm at the airport. It is far more likely to be caused by aircraft on take off and landing. We need once again to do our own research on this. It is proposed to bring back the "odour" cards and distribute them to every house on the vulnerable part of Birchanger Lane, inviting residents to record all the odours of kerosene they notice in a six month period. At the end of this period the cards will be collected, results collated and passed to environmental health teams and to the Airport. To make this work, we are asking as many people as possible to participate in the scheme, in the hope that ultimately a solution may be found to this continuing problem. The cards will be given out at the Annual Parish Meeting on March 28th, following this the cards will be distributed to those most likely to be affected in Birchanger Lane.

We dispose of the Airport's sewage!

When the Americans built the runway at Stansted during the war, they dug a sewer which led to the construction of the sewage farm near to the Ambulance station. Many people would not have even realised that it existed. However in the past months the sewage plant and piping has been renewed, something which meant the temporary closure of bridleways, and strengthening of the foot bridge across the motorway so that a digger could pass. A portacabin was erected beside the Duck End Barns.

The creation of a sewage plant in the village was a great bonus to those living in the village at the time. There was spare capacity which made it possible for houses in Birchanger Lane, who had been without mains drainage, to connect to the sewage farm.

How about a visit to Birchanger Wood.

The bluebells and the aconites will be out soon in Birchanger Wood. There has also been a great deal of work done by a team of volunteers with the aid of grants. There are new paths and bridges, along with seating and tables which have been constructed from materials in the wood. Most of the main paths are now wheel chair friendly. It is hoped that further paths and a storage compound should be completed later this year. The biggest hazard is crossing the A120. Well worth a visit soon.

Birchanger's own Warhorse

With all of the media coverage of War horse, I thought it might be of interest to share with you the story of a Birchanger man who served his country as a cavalry man in the first world war.

That man was Ernest Arthur Harvey. Known as "Tod", He was born in Clavering and then settled in Stansted before marrying Annie Banks.

Tod joined the Essex Yeomanry before the Great War broke out and appears on his Medal Index Card as being "Disemb" which means disembodied. This means he was a pre-war Essex Yeoman who had been embodied for full time service on 5 August 1914.

He was number 1414 and went to France on 8 June 1915 qualifying for the 1914-15 Star. He was also entitled to wear the British War and Allied Victory Medals

This timing would have been dictated by the heavy losses suffered at the Battle of Frezenburg on 13-14 May 1915 where the Yeomanry lost heavily and was in need of reinforcements.

He was renumbered in 1917 as 80268 when all the Yeomanry and Cavalry were absorbed into Corps of Dragoons, Lancers and Hussars and their personnel given new numbers to reflect this change in administration. Tod served for the entire course of the Great War.

After moving to Birchanger he first lived in a cottage near the Three Horse Shoes pub and then number one Digby view followed by 10 Birchwood.

Tod's sister Edie Turner also lived in Birchwood in her later years.

While living in the village Tod was employed by Fred Haggerwood and his last job as a builder was to become his home Hybanks.

Tod was a keen member of Birchanger bowls club and there is a photo that includes him in the Club as part of the 1957 bowls club. He was a small man and is seen pictured between John Bass and Son in Law Bert Kadwill.

School News

A local farmer, Roger Prior has let Birchanger School children use a part of his woodland along with a leader from the National Wildlife Trust.

This means that first of all the younger children have been visiting the wood every Wednesday, to find out about woodland and the fun you can have just playing there.

The younger children have found out how trees can be used as seats, how twigs can make a picture, how to build bridges from timber in the wood, and even how to make "woodland" porridge for the insects. Older children are spotting different trees and plants and watching the signs of spring. It is hoped that if money permits, that the program will be extended to the older children in the summer.

The children enjoy getting themselves very muddy, which does not matter at all, as they are wearing protective weather proof clothing provided by the PTA. However more outgrown or unused gloves would be welcome for the colder weather.

DIGITAL TV SWITCHOVER IS COMING digitaluk

The Birchanger Area can receive TV signals from either Sudbury or Crystal Palace transmitters. In July last year the Sudbury transmitter switched off its analogue signal and April this year is the turn of Crystal Palace. For those that dealt with the change to digital television last year, the switch of Crystal Palace has no effect but those still receiving an analogue signal will now need to take action.

For older and disabled viewers who may find making the switch difficult, the Switchover Help Scheme is at hand to provide practical help and assistance to turn one TV set to digital.

Most people will be asked to pay £40 towards the standard option which includes easy to use equipment, an approved installer, aerial upgrade if needed and a 12 month aftercare service, including a free helpline. However the service is also free for people who are eligible and who also receive pension credit income support, income-based jobseeker's allowance or income-related employment and support allowance.

We can help you convert your TV to digital if you:

- Are aged 75 or over, or
- Have lived in a care home for six months or more, or
- Get (or could get)
 - o Disability Living Allowance (DLA), or
 - o Attendance or Constant Attendance Allowance, or
 - o Mobility Supplement, or
- Are registered blind or partially sighted



Run by the BBC through an agreement with the Government, the Help Scheme has been designed around the needs of older and disabled people. Equipment has been chosen to be easy to use, and contact centre, delivery staff and installers have all been trained to understand and respect older and disabled people. All installers are vetted, carry identification and will never call without having made an appointment.

Eligible people in our local area should have received a letter to explain the switchover programme, and the people must respond to get help. All you need to do is respond to our letter by sending back a completed reply form or call the Help Scheme free. Many of the eligible people will be fortunate to have relatives, friends or neighbours to assist them with their response. However, some are not so fortunate, and the concern is that these people are amongst those least likely to understand the process.

To ensure that they do not get omitted, a community support programme has been established to reach these people. The support team consists of volunteers, each covering a number of villages in their locality, and these volunteers will get the message across to the eligible people by engaging with organisations and services most likely to interface with them - Parish Councils, GP's, Pharmacists, Libraries, Day Centres and Community Transport.
