Ambulance Service Leaps into the 21st Century.

Many of us remember the old ambulances, with bells instead of sirens, and a crew who managed just to hold their patients together while completing their job of transporting a seriously injured or very sick patient to the nearest hospital. Nobody had heard the term paramedic or even thought that the ambulance service was about to have a metamorphosis which would totally change the way the service worked.

Nowadays while ambulance times fall short of expectations, the service actually is more akin to a mobile first aid centre and the training of all ambulance staff has changed radically. True they do still transport patients to casualty and outpatients, but as a member of staff advances in the organisation, so also does their training. A young person entering the service today could find that they have learned advanced medical emergency procedures which will put them into a position where they have learned to treat people at the scene in all major incidents.

Instead of waiting outside the incident scene while the injured are brought out to them, ambulance personnel will be right at the cliff face of the incident, properly equipped with both knowledge and advanced equipment. They have the same equipment as the firemen have in the way of breathing apparatus, an amphibious vehicle which can be transported to the scene, and the capability to set up a tent or series of tents which can act as a mobile hospital or operating theatre. Had this new way of dealing with a major trauma scene been in place at the time of other major incidents, such as the Moorgate tube disaster for instance, it is possible that many more lives would have been saved.

There are highly trained Hazardous Area Response Teams throughout the country. They are mainly known by their acronym HART. We have one based at Braintree to serve South and West Essex. Another team at Melbourne covers the rest of the Eastern Region. They can travel to assist other Hart teams throughout the country. The Hart team have ambulances and support vehicles equipped with just about everything for a major incident. They can treat those exposed to radiation with a special water system and a fully equipped tent. They have four wheel drive vehicles, a minibus to transport additional personnel, supply vehicles as well as the more familiar

ambulances. They were at the scene at the tragic fire in Harlow last year.

They are so well equipped that they can transfer their patients to special units some distance away, which are better suited to the patient's needs.

We may be waiting longer for an ambulance to come, hopefully we will never need the services of HART, but we can be confident that the ambulance service and its paramedics really do know how to treat their patients when they reach them. After six weeks doing their shifts, each Hart ambulance team spends one week training. This keeps them at the cutting edge of major incident and trauma management. The good news for all of this is that some patients may never actually need to go to hospital at all. It has all been done for them expertly at the scene. For a service which has come under a lot of criticism lately, it is good to see the other side of the coin.

Shedding Light on the Long Wait at A and E at Harlow.

We are not the only ones who are concerned with the long wait to be seen at Accident and Emergency Hospitals, followed by the undignified rush to get you out before the magic four hour period is up. Yes the box may have been ticked, but quite often the treatment has been rushed, the patient has been treated inappropriately and has to return or try to seek treatment elsewhere.

There are people out there who are concerned about the huge numbers seeking treatment at A and E hospitals. A survey team at Harlow have started work and their preliminary results have been surprising. Firstly it seems that there are large numbers of mid and far east Europeans coming to work in the UK. They do not have the GP system in their countries, so when they need medical attention they tend to come to A and E, no matter how trivial the complaint. Steps will be taken to rectify this, but it won't be a quick and easy fix. Secondly we are finding it increasingly difficult to access our GPs. A wait of 6 weeks is not tolerable in many cases. The patients were unhappy with the stereotyped responses from NHS Direct and the now removed 111 service, so they took themselves to A and E as a last resort.

It seems there is something radically wrong with our health system. Did the rot set in when GPs no longer worked at weekends? Are the numbers of GPs and their premises adequate? Are the doctors contactable? There have been huge complaints about the expensive telephone numbers used at some practises, and the large bills incurred when the patient is put on hold for unacceptable periods.

There is no saying when the service will improve. It is hard on the committed staff who are at times at breaking point. There is more money needed, but it must be spent wisely and not just on a quick fix. The survey will continue to examine other issues.

Meanwhile, try to stay healthy and accident free if you can.

Survey Results show Some Surprises.

Do you even remember the survey.? It happened in March 2011 and some of the results are available on line. Birchanger can be accessed, but it is by electoral ward, so that includes a large part of Forest park which doubles the households to 610 at the date of the survey. Between us we own 1036 cars and there are 36 no car households. Some 26 households have four cars and upwards. 11 homes are without central heating, but the bulk of us, some 506 use gas. Not everyone in Birchanger can access our gas supply.

There are 931 residents in work, 32 are unemployed, 124 are retired and 826 people rated their health as very good or excellent. A surprisingly high number of people in Birchanger as well as the rest of the district are unpaid carers. There are 145 people who offer some degree of care in Birchanger to the 201 people who did not rate their health as good or who were in some way incapacitated.

There are 997 people who put their religion as Church of England, there were representatives from Jewish, Muslim, Buddhist and Seikh faiths, but 454 people said they had no religion at all.

There is more information on line and more will become available as it is collated in the months to come.

Not Just Mid Summer Madness.

I hate to remind you, but September looms and with it the prospect of Christmas and all that brings. There is an idea which might get you planning ahead and cheer up the village at the same time and this is your very early warning.

This will not please everyone, but it is the Advent season, Christmas Fairs are in full swing and the great majority in Birchanger appreciated the efforts made last year. However 269 households experience some degree of deprivation and there are 145 unpaid carers looking after someone in our ward, which is a surprisingly degree of disability, again a higher figure than might be anticipated. 997 people put their religion as Church of England, Jewish, Muslim, Buddhist and Sheikh were also represented, but some 454 people said they had no religion at all. More information can be accessed on line and further findings will be available in the coming months.

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A Royal Death, Human Horror and Home

Having no Visa to enter Cambodia, we had to stop at the immigration office on the Mekong river where their territorial border begins. However while waiting in the tropical garden attached to the Border post I noticed a group of Monks and several people crowding around a small Buddhist temple and chanting non-stop. When I enquired what was happening I was told it was out of respect for the "King Father" whose funeral was taking place that very day. It turned out that the present king of Cambodia's father had died 3 months previously and had been lying in state ever since. We were due to land at the boat quay in central Pnomh Penh where our guide would meet us, however due to the funeral, the government had closed many roads and, yes, the boat quay! So the boat actually tied up at a point 5 kilometres outside the city alongside a 15 foot high river bank.

Together with about 50 other tourists we started scrambling up the bank with our suitcases in 40 degrees of heat with no idea how we were going to get to the city! All at once a man came down the bank towards us bearing two things: 1) a huge smile and 2) a piece of paper with the words 'Anthony Wilson' printed on it. I have never been so glad to see my own name. He had somehow made his way out of the city to find us and we were soon in the back of an air conditioned car speeding towards our hote!! Oh the joys of travel.

The historic city of Pnomh Penh boasts a beautiful Palace, a Silver Pagoda, Museums and many other tourist attractions.....all of which were closed due to the King's death! So our first day tour being cancelled Barbara & I had to content ourselves with lying around the pool, eating a relaxed lunch and drinking the odd cocktail; what a disappointment!


No tourist visiting Cambodia can turn a blind eye to the horrors which were inflicted here during the notorious regime of Pol Pot and the Khmer Rouge. It is hard to believe that what happened occurred less than 50 years ago and yet it is to the great credit of the Cambodian people that they have managed to put it all behind them and get on with rebuilding their country whilst keeping their recent history alive as a warning to humanity. So it was that our guide collected us from the hotel and took us on what I can only describe as a most harrowing and emotionally draining tour. We went to the 'killing fields' where thousands of their fellow human beings were murdered in a most brutal way by the Khmer Rouge. Nobody was spared the horror, women and children too were shown no mercy. There were scenes there that are too disturbing to recount here, but nevertheless need remembering, lest a similar thing should ever threaten to happen again.

At the notorious S21 detention centre 20,000 people passed through on their way to the killing fields and only 7 people survived the terror. Five have since died and now only 2 remain to tell their story. We were fortunate that on the day we visited, one of the survivors, now a very old man, was there and agreed to meet Barbara & I. We were extremely impressed by the fact that, not only could he return to that place where he was so cruelly treated, but that he smiled the most wonderful smile despite all that he had gone through. His name was Bou Meng and his story is available to read online. I can understand some people might think this a strange thing to do on a holiday, but, like Auschwitz and the battlefields of the First World war, some things have to be seen to be believed.

As our time in the capital was so restricted due to the Royal funeral it was quite a relief to get to Siam Reap for the

final part of our tour. A guite unremarkable town in many ways it would not feature on any itinerary but for one thing, the magnificent and awe inspiring, Angkor Wat. The guide picked us up at 8 am and I remember thinking they must be very proud of this place, because the image of it forms the centrepiece of their national flag. However nothing prepares you for the sight of these magnificent buildings as they rise up out of the land in the early morning sunshine. Angkor Wat is actually a vast collection of stone temples built over an area of 30 square kilometres. They were built in the 11th and 12th centuries by a succession of kings to honour the Buddha. As a builder myself I cannot imagine the challenge of constructing these marvelous buildings with the tools available at that time. The task was immense. We spent the whole day exploring the sites and even saw the temple that was used in the film "Tomb Raider" Many of these buildings had fallen into disrepair and had to be 'reclaimed' from the jungle which had threatened to engulf them.

The day was a fitting end to our time in Cambodia and as this was our last guided tour a fitting end also to our journey around these remarkable countries. Over the weeks we had some very early starts



(5am in one case!) We have travelled by plane, car, rickshaw, boat, cycle-rickshaw, hydrofoil, traditional junk boat, bicycle and Elephant. We have had some great guides including, Joi, Jun, Hung, Rasamei, Lei and others whose names I cannot even pronounce but they have all added to our knowledge of their countries with great pride and for that we thank them very much.

We have had great experiences and have not even mentioned the broken ankle, the fact that Barbara was tipped off a ferry boat by a freak wave, taking all our electronic equipment and cameras into the sea with her, or the time we got lost at twilight in dense jungle on a Vietnamese Island with no idea how to get back to our beach house by the sea. We had a great time and hope it has been enlightening.

To those who have been kind enough to speak to us about these travels both Barbara & I appreciate the interest you have shown.

We were miles away from home, with a dog and a bag of items we had to remove from the car. I am not sure what happened to the "home recovery" bit.

The next bitter lesson was that no, we could not have a loan car. Yes our policy said we had one but apparently we had not paid the extra for this which nobody had told us about. Our entitlement to this was printed clearly on the policy document, with no supporting information to tell us this was actually an "extra".
