# **BIRCHANGER SCHOOL SET TO GET BIGGER**

For a long time now Birchanger School has wanted to make more space and to improve all the facilities for every child in the school. Up to now this has not been possible. It did seem that the school might not be able to accommodate the additional demand from

Birchanger which has experienced a higher birth rate in recent years. Essex County Council has finally recognised the need for additional teaching space at the school and the result is that the school is to have a new re-locatable classroom from September. There is plenty of space in the grounds to accommodate this, as well as plenty of time to arrange things for the new School Year. There will also be a new equipment store so that there will be more space in the school hall.

These days small schools are viewed as not always being economically viable. This small increase in pupil numbers ensures the future of the school for years to come.

#### THERE ARE NO BADGERS ACROSS SANDY FIELD

I have had a surprising level of reaction to the paragraph in last month's issue relating to earthworks in the farmland north of Birchwood and their possible occupation by Badgers. Initially I received a call from a lady in Harrisons who informed me it was illegal to fill in Badgers Setts.

A few days later I received another call from a gentleman representing the local branch of the Badgers trust who basically told me the same. I responded to both calls by denying knowledge of the source of the report or the location of the earthworks in question. I also pointed out that I have never seen a live Badger in Birchanger or anywhere else.

The next day I took my dog "Millie" for a stroll around Sandy field where there are a series of shallow trench like holes in the footpath towards Stansted I would say they are entirely manmade. On my return two ladies in Birchwood told me they did not believe there were Badgers "across Birchwood".

Then I received the following email from John Napier:-

"Hi the claim in issue 122 that Badgers are causing the holes to appear in the footpath from Birchwood to Stansted is hokum. When the electricity cables were laid the contractors did not backfill the trench properly and left a void at the trench bottom which has caved in causing the holes some soon after the contractors had left and some much later. Badgers setts have much bigger entrance holes and are not usually in open ground nor I have seen any indication of Badgers anywhere in this area at all."

I do hope our readers realise that it is not always possible to verify the copy I receive, it is taken on trust. And if there are Badgers out there, please just leave them alone!

# Birchanger Lane and Birchwood loop resurfaced at last

After at least 10 years of lobbying, many ineffective patched repairs and innumerable complaints, this small piece of Birchanger Lane which was missed out when the rest of the lane was resurfaced some four years ago now, has finally been repaired.

Anxiety levels rose when another crew arrived the following day and started digging all the new asphalt up, but it turned out that they were dealing with the drains, which were sunk into the new surface and were already a cause of concern. Now the new surface on the lane is breaking up.

It took 11 years to get that done. We had better start asking for it now. Might be in the frame for 2020 then! Meanwhile we are asking if anyone would like more footpaths around the village. A request has been made for one around Churton, which is an incredibly dangerous bend. The problem with some of the other areas is that the lane is not wide enough to take a footpath, and it would be creating a dangerous situation to both pedestrians and motorists alike, and Highways would not consider the proposal.

Be careful as you drive. The pothole situation is terrible everywhere. Many cars have been damaged. Councils will get round to fixing them, but it is going to take time.

## Do you want street lights in Birchanger?

If you do, you had better watch out for an individual who is wandering about taking the odd pot shot at them. This wonderful individual must be bored out of his mind and of the type who finds it funny to waste your money as paid by you in the Parish precept.

It costs the Parish Council £50 for every call out, and that is before anything has actually been repaired. We thought it was just a bad run of luck, so many bulbs going at once. We were wrong, it is just another selfish idiot on the scene. The evidence is there in the shattered lights.

There has been a lot of shooting in the village during the past few months, but that is an attempt by the farmers to cull the hundreds of pigeons who are decimating their crops by their sheer numbers. Not even these marksmen could manage to hit lamp posts in Bradley Common, crack shots as they undoubtedly are.

The police have been informed, but we need your eyes most of all. If you do see anything suspicious, please

report it straight away. The lights will not come on for a long time otherwise.

#### Prejudice shows in Birchanger Wood

On the day when the country was shocked at the unprovoked attack on Tottenham Hotspur Fans in Lyons, I was appalled to see swastika signs on trees and fences on the edge of Birchanger Wood where it borders Bishops Stortford. I had thought that such prejudicial behaviour and groups were non- existent in our area. Seems I was wrong.

Prejudice of any sort is to be deplored. We all may dislike something about the people we rub shoulders with on a daily basis, they find us annoying in many ways as well. Normal people just understand that there are differences in belief and outlook and just accept and get on with them. Why can't the people who seem to think they have to put such signs up. ## Our Primary Care Trust is official now

The documents have been signed, the 119 conditions, with just five to finish, have been met, so from April 1st we shall be part of the West Essex Commissioning Group. This means that all our GP services for those who are registered with doctors in Essex will come through this group of 39 doctors and their partners under the leadership of Rob Gerling and Claire Morris. The West Essex Commissioning Group will be based at St Margaret's Hospital Epping and they will be buying in to the services they believe their patients need.

Hopefully in time our health provision, which should be better suited to our needs, will improve, but this is not necessarily a given. There are bound to be difficulties in any new way of doing things. If you are experiencing problems with your GP wherever you are registered, please tell the trust on 01992 566140 or let me know. This service is vital to the community and it has to work.

## Counting the cost of Winter

It seems that winter has gone on for ever this year. What with rain, floods, snow and extremely cold temperatures all alternating with each other our fuel consumption has been high. Even the best insulation in the world struggles in these extremes, and let's face it, we do not as a rule have very good insulation in this country.

It is the elderly and those who work at home who see the greatest fuel costs. Unless they are to freeze all day, they do need to use some heat, whether it is from gas, oil or electricity, coal or wood.

It is important that everyone is aware of any extras allowances which they might be entitled to. For some there may be the possibility that their employers should have a scheme for office use for those who work from home. For many of the older groups there may well be allowances available to them, about which they know nothing. Last month the CAB visited homes in the Birchanger where they thought older people might live, to make sure that they were coping and that they were receiving everything they were entitled to. They offered all sorts of help and advice to particular individuals. They could not access everyone, but they were keen to reach as many people as possible. # RECIPE OF THE MONTH

#### STICKY TOFFEE PUDDING

#### Serves 6-8 people not on a diet!

175g/6oz unsalted butter, plus extra for greasing

175g/6oz dates, stoned and chopped (medjool, if possible)

1 tsp bicarbonate of soda

175g/6oz golden caster sugar

1 tsp vanilla extract

2 eggs, beaten

175g/6oz self-raising flour, sifted

115g/4oz dark muscovado sugar

4 tbsp runny honey or golden syrup

4 tbsp double cream

vanilla ice cream, to serve



#### Method:

Preheat oven to 180C/350F/Gas 4. Grease and flour 8 x 175ml/6 fl oz dariole moulds and put a circle of parchment paper in the bottom of each one, so that they turn out easily.

Place the dates in a pan with 300ml/½ pint of water and bring to the boil, then simmer for 5 minutes until softened. Remove from the heat and stir in the bicarbonate of soda until the mixture stops foaming. Place 50g/2oz of the butter and the caster sugar in the large bowl of a food processor and cream together until well combined, then beat in the vanilla essence. Gradually add the eggs, beating well after each addition. Fold in the flour with a metal spoon and finally fold in the date mixture. Pour into the greased moulds and place them in a bain-marie (a roasting tin half-filled with boiling water). Bake for 25-30 minutes until well risen and firm to the touch.

To make the toffee sauce, simply place the remaining 115g/4oz of butter, dark muscovado sugar and honey or golden syrup in a pan and heat over a low heat, stirring until the sugar has dissolved. Bring to a simmer and cook for 2-3 minutes until thickened. Stir in the cream and allow to bubble down, then remove from the heat.

When the puddings are cooked, remove from the oven and after 5 minutes turn out on to a wire rack to cool completely. To serve, place the puddings on plates. Pour over some of the toffee sauce, then flash under the grill until bubbling, if liked. Add a scoop of ice cream and serve the remainder of the sauce separately, hot or cold.

#### TIP 1

You can also make this in a single pudding. The mixture will fill a 25cm x 18cm/10in x 7in non-stick baking tin that is at least 2.5cm/1in deep. Don't bother with the bain-marie and bake for 35-40 minutes or until well risen and firm to the touch. Then proceed as above, cutting the pudding into portions once it has cooled. Another alternative would be a greased, loose-bottomed 18cm/7in round cake tin that is 7.5cm/3in deep. If you do not have one deep enough, line the inside with baking parchment to the required depth.

The solution is on the back page.

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
