The festivities proper began at about three pm with a welcome from Club Captain Colin Ferbrache to acting captain Doug Payne that was followed by a round of "spider" where the bowlers simultaneously bowled his wood at a jack in the centre of the green. Closest to the jack was a lady named Rita who won a bottle of scotch for her effort. Then a match was played on the three rinks.

While the match was being played I interviewed some of the veterans who watched from the shelter of the club. There was a fair amount of banter between the visitors mostly based on inter regimental rivalries and Mac, Charlie and Fred all well into their eighties told us about their life at the Royal Hospital in Chelsea. They all gave the impression of being very privileged to live there. Charlie who joined the Royal Horse Artillery as a boy soldier in 1944 served in Germany, the middle east and far east remaining in the army into the 1970s. His mate Fred was in the Royal Artillery also served for many years reaching the rank of Colour Sergeant.

Mac a very taciturn chap, who likes his beer, served in the Household Division. He played in the final ends of the bowls match, that was won by the visitors.

After the match the pensioners changed into their "scarlets" and there was a photo shoot and time for the hosts and guests to socialise. Afterwards there was a roast chicken dinner followed by fruit crumble or bread and butter pudding. The Guests left the club at about 8.15

having had a very enjoyable time!

Another threat to the green belt

There has been a serious proposal made to the parish Council to build on the paddock behind Digby View. To do so would mean that the paddock would have to be taken out of the Green Belt. The gain would be that it would be for 100% affordable housing.

To gain access two householders would have to agree to move as their homes would have to be demolished to provide an entrance. Apparently two householders are prepared to do this. Others are less than enthusiastic. The Parish Council would like to know what you think. The gain would be more affordable homes for Birchanger. The loss is yet more green belt gone from the village and the loss of some of the houses in Digby View.

Much of Birchanger's green belt has already been lost to Forest Park. The District Council has no plans to take more land out of the green belt. The loss should be offset by green belt land being found elsewhere, but this just may not happen.

The proposal was aired at the Annual Parish Meeting in March when the proposal was overwhelmingly rejected. Your opinion does count. Please let me know on 812793.

Birchanger has Its boundaries returned. Only to be swallowed by Stansted

It seems that the Boundary Commission has decided that we are to become part of Stansted South for Electoral purposes only.

The proposal is that Birchanger is to become part of a two member ward which will include Forest Park to be called Stansted South. The area of the proposed ward is massive, stretching roughly from the motorway service area to the border with Takeley, across to the centre of Stansted, then out towards Hazel End and then down to Birchanger Wood on the other side of the A 120 to the Hertfordshire boundary.

It is somewhat ironic as it closely follows the Birchanger village area of old, before huge chunks of the parish were taken into Stansted down the years. It is very sad now that we have our original size back, due to the warding arrangements, but are all to be labelled, "Stansted South".

There will also be Stansted North which will cover another enormous area which will include Ugley, Farnham, and Hazel End. This will be a three member ward.

This is all part of the plan to downsize the membership of the District Council to 39 members from 44. It may make sense to have less members, but several of the smaller villages may find their independence has been compromised as they are joined with much larger areas. Whatever you may think of the proposals, and many will like to think that they are a part of Stansted now, you will be able to make your feelings known. The whole matter is up for consultation until July 8th. Want to be Fitter?

Wishful thinking maybe, but if you happen to be around on weekday mornings, the District Council's Health Walks might be of interest to you. These walks happen from April to September at all the larger village settlements. While there is none in Birchanger, Stansted and Hatfield Forest are included in the scheme. Walks start at the Library in Stansted at 10 am on Fridays. They start at 9.45 in Hatfield Forest on Thursdays and are done in conjunction with the National Trust and their wardens. All you need to do is to simply turn up. On the first occasion walkers are asked to arrive 15 minutes early to complete a short Health Questionnaire, that is all. All the walks cover items of interest, and these are explained on the way.

Are you finding your way in the New Benefit System?

The changes to the way in which Benefits are paid and Council Tax rules have been redrafted have caused concern among many people. There is no change in most areas for any pensioner, but Universal Credit is worrying a great many beneficiaries. There is confusion and error but there is a way you can seek help.

Uttlesford District Council is aware of the difficulties people are facing and has appointed a special advisor to deal with your queries. She or a member of the team can be reached on 01799 510510 and will be able to check that the benefit for you is correct or otherwise and will be able to explain the system.

For the elderly there is no change in the council tax system for them, and they are not included in the extra bedroom tax either.

Community Project Grant Schemes on offer again

If you have a project which you would like to start now for completion by April next year, but lack the funds, the District Council may be able to help. The Community Project Grant Schemes are on offer again from the District Council this year. The minimum award is £100 and the maximum available is £3,500. If the amount requested is more than £1000, the organisation applying must show that they have raised 50% of the funding required for themselves. For amounts less than £1000 only 25% funding is required.

Many organisations in Birchanger have benefited from these grants. These include grants to the Scouts, Parish Council, Church Hall and many more. The grants can also be awarded for essential equipment. Children now can fix your phone or computer faster than anyone else, but cyber bullying is increasing. It seems we are light years away from getting abreast of the new medium unless we are a computer boffin or under 18.

Are we turning out the best air pilots and computer scientists ever, or are they all going to end up a bunch of overweight couch potatoes who are losing out on an important part of their childhood?

There are no answers now, only time will tell.

Work on Church Hall starts soon

Laid back in Laos

Laos, yes I remember the name, chiefly from associations with the Vietnam War. I thought it was a kingdom but these days it is known as the Lao people's democratic republic.

Our arrival was so exciting, flying over the mountains from Thailand in a tiny Turboprop plane it felt as though we had been transported back to the 1950s. With our driver there to meet us at the airport we were soon installed in our hotel in the picturesque town of Luang Prabang, a fascinating place bounded on both sides by 2 rivers; the Nam Khan and the mighty Mekong!

Our itinerary was given to us and we were particularly looking forward to an upcoming trip to an elephant sanctuary located further into the country. However our immediate needs were met by an evening spent in shorts and light clothing eating a delicious meal and sipping a cool glass of local beer at an open air restaurant on the banks of the Mekong river, Heaven!

After dinner we decided to visit the night market, I cannot believe the range of goods and souvenirs on offer, the market stalls stretched for what seemed like miles and it was all I could do to stop Barbara using up our entire baggage allowance on our first night here! Managing to get her back to the hotel without any purchases was no mean feat, but we retired for the night and resolved to explore this fascinating place in the morning.

The next day after breakfast we set off up the hill known as Phou Si, highest point in the town, home to various buddhist temples and the place to be for the most panoramic views of the area. Luang prabang may be small but it has much to offer and we spent the rest of the day visiting local landmarks and window shopping in the town.

The following day began with our driver and guide picking us up at 9.30 for the journey to the Elephant Village. We were joined by one other couple and were all full of anticipation as we caught our first sight of the Elephants we were to have charge of over the next 2 days.

There followed one of the happiest times of the holiday. We stayed in a lodge on the site, rode the Elephants, fed them on bananas and bamboo, took them home to bed in the jungle before enjoying a meal cooked by the village staff in the company of our fellow travellers. After a good night's sleep it was up at 6 am and off to pick up the "girls" (all of the elephants were female) and take them down to the river to bathe. There is nothing quite like sitting up on the back of a two ton Pachyderm as it takes you into the water sits down and begins to spray you with water from its trunk, a morning shower with a difference, I can highly recommend it! We had a lot of fun but all too soon it was back in the car for the return trip to the hotel. Before leaving Luang we decided to opt for a massage, not in the commercial spa houses but at the Red Cross as the money spent there is recycled back into their funds. Barbara had the full hour massage but after being pummelled for half an hour I went into the Sauna which

was pitch black, hot and full of invisible people who I kept bumping into. One of the most bizarre experiences I have ever had!

Next stop Vientiane, Capital of Laos, the influence of the French is everywhere here, the city has wide boulevards and there is even an oriental version of The Arc de Triomphe in the centre. But it is in the food and drink that you are most aware that this was once a French colony. Everywhere you go there is rich dark coffee and you can enjoy baguettes and croissants and rich pastries giving the impression that you are in Paris rather than South East Asia.

On a more serious note we also visited a centre dedicated to helping victims of the bombs left over from the Vietnam war. Quite sobering when you think that there are 780,000 square kilometres of rural land covered with unexploded ordnance, which they are clearing at the rate of 40 square kilometres a week. It's going to be a long Job! As our time in Laos drew to a close we took a leisurely cycle ride through the quiet back streets until we reached a park, where in the early evening we joined in with a crowd doing a crazy fitness workout. It must have been a sight to behold as Barbara & I leapt about to old eighties disco music, being urged on by some faceless trainer yelling instructions and sounding like a zealous dictator at a political rally!

We finally slipped away to the comfort of a French restaurant where we enjoyed a glass of wine, which made a nice change from the Lao beer we usually had to accompany our food.

Laos was a fine experience with its laid back style and the charm of its colonial past. The people are stoical and gentle and I like to think we might return someday. We couldn't help but wonder, on the flight to Vietnam, what excitement might lie ahead.

News from Birchanger Social Club

Renovations update - New roof completed!

The proposed club renovations are split into three phases; phase 1 covers the new roof, phase 2 the new boiler and toilet area and phase 3 is for the modernisation and expansion of the dance and entertainment area. The club is happy to report that despite some delays due to poor weather, the new roof (phase 1) including a 20 year guarantee and budgeted at £18,000 + VAT was completed on the 10th May.

Work starts in June for new boiler and toilet facilities

Phase 2 covering the new boiler and toilet area was discussed on the 24th April at a special EGM meeting where members agreed to go ahead with the new toilets and boiler including a totally new and long awaited purpose built toilet for the disabled. "Another Level Construction" have been appointed contractors who estimate a cost of around £60,000 + VAT. Work on phase 2 is planned to start early June 2013 and is expected to cause minimal disruption to the main body of the club. Consideration for temporary toilets is being investigated in addition to the existing facilities available in the changing rooms. There will be some impact on the availability of the snooker room and the committee will talk with the member players on a regular basis to solve any issues that arise.

Due to a very generous grant received from local government, only around £4,000 is expected to be used from club funds for the first two phases. Phase 3 covering the renovation and expansion of the dance and entertainment area will be discussed at a separate EGM at later date. The planned renovation work has been made possible mainly because of the local government grant received last year of £80,000 but also due to robust financial position of the club and the continuous support of its member's. As a footnote, membership has increased since 2012 and now stands at 475 members, so we must be doing something right!

BSSC Joins CAMRA

BSSC is has recently joined the campaign for real ale. CAMRA is the organisation which has been Campaigning for real ale and pubs & drinkers' rights since 1971. The club has a good selection of real ales and is now recognised by CAMRA. In the 2013 UK Budget the chancellor scrapped the beer duty escalator (which raised beer duty 2% above inflation year on year) following a 12 month long campaign from CAMRA, an e-petition which earned over 108,000 signatures, and overwhelming support from pub goers and the pub industry as a whole. The Chancellor went one step further and actually reduced duty on beer by 1%. Overall, CAMRA estimates that this saved pub goers around 11p on the price of a pint; compared to if the beer duty escalator had stayed in place.

Beer prices kept for the third year!

BSSC is delighted to inform its members that the committee unanimously agreed to keep beer prices the same for the third year running. However, there will be a small increase covering increased costs for soft drinks, wines, spirits and coffee.
