BRIDLEWAY OR RACETRACK?

It seems the bridleway that runs from Spider cottage towards the motorway foot bridge has become hazardous recently due to cyclists using it at high speeds.

There has been a conflict of use between a cyclist and two horse riders which resulted in two horses being badly spooked by a cyclist who rounded a blind bend at high speed without thought for any other users.

The horses spun round and bolted down hill. Fortunately neither horse stepped into the ditches on either side of the pathway as this would have had serious consequences for the rider and horse. It was also fortunate that neither horse collided with a lady who was walking her dogs further down the hill.

The riders of the horses were experienced riders both in their sixties. One man has some strain injuries but it could easily have been a much more serious incident.

The manager of Essex County Council Footpaths, has given the following advice.

April 2013

"There should be room for everyone to enjoy riding out in the Essex Countryside. Both Equestrians and cyclists are vulnerable road users and share similar risks when riding on the road between off road routes.

Cyclists and horse riders have a statutory right to ride on byways, bridleways and roads. On bridleways, it is important that cyclists give way to horse riders (the Countryside Act 1968 gave cyclists the right to use bridleways, but stated that they must give way to horse riders and walkers).

Though this is seldom noted or known (as well as understood) to both users and it is very hard to police.

"There are many key points that we all need to take into consideration when out riding, whether on horse or cycle and three of these are:

A horse could be unlikely to see or hear a cyclist, especially if they are approaching quietly from behind. Calling out 'hello' for walkers or equestrians is for example, welcome and important in alerting horses and riders that they are there. However most would not be sure how close to get before they call in case of startling horse and rider.

Also, if the cyclist needs to pass, then they should do so on the right, much as they would do on a main road. Also irrespective of the time of day, time of year or prevailing weather conditions, fluorescent and reflective (hi-viz) clothing should if possible be worn, on-road or off by Horse riders.

Equestrians also need to keep their eyes and ears open. Tyre tracks are a good sign that there could be cyclists about. It's not just the cyclists that need to slow down if meeting other path users. Equestrians are used to the size of their horses and ponies, but that doesn't mean everyone else is. The equestrian as well as the cyclist should also be prepared to stop if required or requested."

Please remember

We all have the right to use the footpath appropriately, but our footpaths are not race tracks for anyone, and care and respect must be shown to all the other users at all times, who ever they may be. Combining cyclists, horses and the public in a restricted space is dangerous.



A 20 mph Speed limit for Birchanger Lane?

A great many residents in Birchanger have suffered unfortunate and potentially dangerous encounters with speeding motorists at some time or other in Birchanger Lane, whether they are driving, cycling or on foot. It could be possible to have a 20mph speed limit if the residents are in favour of it.

The message at the Annual parish Meeting last month from those who attended the meeting, showed that by far the greatest number of people wanted the speed limit, but not everyone who would have an opinion was able to be there.

I need to know what you think as soon as possible, as the Section 106 money will eventually be all used up. So far plans are for the improved junction with the B1383 which should have started, new bus shelters on the B1383 and at High View, and gated signs at the entrance to Birchanger on either end of the lane. The signs at the motorway end of the village are to be tidied up, and a clearer sign showing that the lane is unsuitable for HGVs is to be installed. A new way of running Essex Police

Up until last November Essex Police Force was responsible to a committee of the great and the good. Now we have an elected police commissioner and matters are already starting to change.

It is obviously very much more direct to oversee such a large body of people with a single person in place. Committees are naturally unwieldy and take more time to make decisions. In the hands of an elected representative it is hoped that the whole process will be more direct and therefore far more efficient. We shall see.

The new commissioner is making a very proactive start. He plans to hold forums in Uttlesford twice a year. There is an email contact address where concerns can be registered directly. It is hoped that there will be far more community involvement with our policing in future and that the public will be listened to.

Meanwhile at the first Police and Community Forum we learned that crime had actually increased by only one crime in Uttlesford, that staff at Saffron Walden has been increased, emergency response times have improved back to the level last seen two years ago with a target of a real emergency of 15 minutes in urban locations and 20 minutes out in the countryside. There is a lower classification of emergency calls which is a so called "priority call" which gets a target time of a one hour response. How this is decided is down to the discretion of the emergency services and the police. It seems that a routine burglary is not deemed to be a priority call. However if you do perceive that there are risks and the situation is very serious, call again and insist on immediate support.

By far the highest crime is theft from motor vehicles overnight. An amazing number of people leave their cars unlocked overnight with valuables stored inside. The police mounted an operation where they tried the doors of cars parked at various locations throughout the district overnight, and tried to contact all the owners who had left their cars unlocked to warn them of the likelihood that their car or possessions could be stolen. We all make it far too easy for the crooks to take our property. It is very easy to forget to lock the car.

Catalytic converter thefts from vans and commercial vehicles are also a priority. Some of us might not know what they are and even that they had one. We soon do when the vehicle will not start. They are expensive to replace but a necessity. Cheeky thieves have even been known to return to take their replacements.

We are in a rural area still, despite the pressures from all sides. There is a very effective Farm Watch system with 112 farms participating. From this there is good information about suspect vehicles, strangers and their movements but the theft of quad bikes, gas canisters, batteries, tack and bird scarers continues to be happen. Dog walkers in Birchanger are also in a very good position to report strange sightings as well. It is also a sad fact that hare coursing is happening in our area, which is not only an offence, but which causes damage to property and crops.

The commissioner plans to update the community every six months at regular community forums. The next one is at the council offices in September at Saffron Walden. The date will be announced later.

Fed up with potholes?

I think that we are all fed up with potholes. There are so many of them and they are getting bigger all the time. The problem is that they are going to cost more than there is money available to repair immediately, and the weather has only made matters worse as well. Potholes cannot be repaired properly in frosty conditions. I suppose it is one way of slowing us all down but damage is being caused to all motor vehicles and the motorists bear the costs in most cases.

Essex County Council has a new pothole repair machine which will be out and about as soon as it can when the weather has improved. There is a large area to cover so nothing will happen immediately unless we are very lucky. Take care.

Do you have problems getting GP appointments?

It is the long term endeavour of the NHS to keep people out of hospital as much as possible. It seems that people can be treated increasingly at home with visits by specialist teams for their condition, and with a GP available for advice and support when needed. Sounds great, but it is when you get to the contacting the GP bit that it all goes wrong for many people.

It seems that in Birchanger people use surgeries in Bishops Stortford, or the one in Stansted. It also appears that the people who are registered with the Bishops Stortford practices may be getting a better deal. That is good news for the patients, but the disparities do need to be addressed, otherwise increasing home care breaks down completely for some.

I would like to know whether the perception that there is a better deal in East Herts is accurate. I am hearing a lot of stories as to how callers to the surgeries can be put on hold to the point where the caller discontinues the call repeatedly, where appointments on the day can only be booked in a ten minute window, which is very bad luck if you can't get through in the allotted time. The result is that many people feel they have to attend hospital to access medical help. Not exactly good news for those who are suffering from a long term condition, are on one of the Home Care treatment plans, are worried about someone close to you, or for the hard pressed emergency departments.

Most GP surgeries do not offer an evening or Saturday morning service. Shift workers have great difficulty phoning for an appointment in the allotted time frame. The whole set up at present would not appear to be in the best interests of the patients.

I would like to hear from you whatever surgery you use as to how you rate your routine GP care. I know that some of you have had an excellent service. I also know that this has not been available for all. I need to know from you how you think matters may be improved and what your experience is. I just want to make sure that we try to get an excellent service for everyone. I know this has not happened in every case. I can be reached on 812793. Discharging people into the community will only work if there is proper access to support and advice at all times. NHS Direct can be reached on 0845 4647, but it is your own doctor who knows your case best.

Incidentally the functions of the old Primary Care Trust were taken over by the new Commissioning Boards on

April 1st. what this will mean to us is unclear, we can only hope for better services but this is not guaranteed. The new groups have undergone rigorous testing to ensure that they are fit for purpose, although our perceptions may turn out to be somewhat different. 

Birchanger Wood – An update April 2013

By the time you are reading this, I trust that the weather will be 'much more Spring-like'. It is perhaps surprising therefore, that during the very cold weather of March, the beautiful white wood anemones have been happy enough to be showing their heads and have commenced flowering in Birchanger Wood.

The wood anemones and the later-showing English bluebells are a Spring feature of Birchanger Wood and it is for this reason that the Birchanger Wood Trust has been seeking to conserve and encourage their growth over the woodland floor. The means we have used to preserve and encourage these colourful flowers has been by refurbishing our winding woodland paths so that feet and boots refrain from venturing onto the soft woodland floor and these lovely bulbs have a chance to regenerate and reinstate.

Birchanger Wood now has 5.3Km of all-weather winding well-surfaced paths including the refurbished public footpath and they are free for use by all the local community. The Wood is maintained by a band of dedicated woodland workers – we have no paid employees but we do use contractors from time to time to carry out specialised tasks like pollarding the tall trees, many of which are ash trees.

The Trust has been busy over the winter months constructing a secure compound for our tree nursery, and equipment store. At the present moment the woodland entrance at the Water Tower, Bishop's Stortford, resembles a muddy building site, but this will mellow during the years. It is important that the Trust has a base from which to operate in order to fulfil the necessary tasks of maintenance and to meet the third of the three objectives which are the reasons for its very existence – to educate the community and visitors in the local history of the Wood and its flora and fauna. The other two objectives? They are the conservation and preservation of this ancient Wood, and to provide a leisure facility for the local community.
