THE AIR QUALITY MONITOR IS HERE

So here it is at last, our long awaited Air Quality Monitor, complete in its own compound and finally installed at Duck End. Hopefully it will tell us just what is happening to the air we breathe in Birchanger.

For years we have smelt the odour of kerosene at locations between the hall and the Duck End bend on several occasions each year. There were also concerns about harmful particulates from

the heavy motor way traffic. The Air Quality Monitor should be able to tell us how real our concerns were.

That is of course if we really do have the monitor in the right place. It is shielded from the motorway and aircraft by one of the barns. Should there not be a direct view? It is protected by a row of wooden posts but as it is not one of the most attractive installations and it is unlikely that anyone would want it at home.

It took a long time to get the monitor. We had odour cards which proved that people spread over a good half mile reported the odour of kerosene at the same time, hardly a central heating oil leak, as they tried to tell us. We asked for the particulates to be properly measured as the traffic on the M11 and junction 8 increased but there no convincing answers.

It is here for a year then hopefully we shall get some results which will establish whether or not some of our noses were imagining things..



Birchanger CC secure title after win over Willingale

Birchanger Cricket Club enjoyed one of the most successful seasons in its 118 year history by being crowned champions of the Herts and Essex Cricket League Division Two on Saturday 31 August 2013. The team went into their final match at Willingale knowing that gaining just 6 points and losing the match would be enough to secure the title they so desperately craved having already sewn up promotion two weeks beforehand. But Birchanger were not going to give up on their, hitherto, 100% away record and duly produced a typical display of grit, togetherness and skill to win the game by four wickets, taking the championship in style and leaving South Loughton as runners-up.

The teams that Birchanger have left behind in Division Two will be glad to see the back of a side that became incredibly hard to beat. The batting line up, that was so strong and deep that it could have been reversed in many games and not affected the result, continuously irritated bowling attacks by eking itself out of positions that the team ought to have lost from. Most notably the team were 110-8 chasing 190 to win against a good Takeley side when the number 10, Jamie Davis, joined a settled Paul Parker at the crease. Takeley were rightly confident of a second win against the champions elect having inflicted one of only three defeats upon Birchanger earlier in the campaign. But they had not read the script; Paul Parker batted beautifully for his 75 not out to see the team home with a couple of balls to spare. He was ably supported by Jamie Davis who remained unbeaten on 22 as the celebrations began. The end of season batting averages illustrate that there was always someone who put a high price on his wicket and fought hard for the victories. Jack Squires began the season as a bowler that batted a bit and ended it as a batter that bowled a bit; which summed up the team's season in a nutshell. He ended up with a batting average of 47, aided by some not outs and notable knocks of 60 against South Loughton and 40 versus

Building for a better Birchanger.

This month will see the completion, or near completion of the many Birchanger projects which have been happening through the summer months. A good proportion of these projects have been as a result of the Section 106 awards from the new estates which are themselves nearing completion as well.

The club has a new roof and refurbished toilet facilities, with the long awaited toilet for the disabled. There is still the internal reorganisation to come. The children who returned to school found that there was a brand new class room for the older children as well as a larger than usual intake in the reception class. The recreation ground has a new junior size football pitch, while the church has at last had water and toilet facilities installed, as well as a sink and miniature kitchenette.

The Church Hall has additional car parking space to ease overcrowding in the already busy car park. The extension which includes a kitchen with cooking facilities and additional storage should be in use at the end of November. The new room will mean that two different users will be able to use the hall at the same time. They will be able to use the same entrance and toilet facilities, but will otherwise function separately or as one large unit as required. Anyone interested in using the new facilities should contact the new Hall Manager for details. It is hoped that the many small groups who could not be accommodated in the hall, as there was no spare slots available, will now be able to make their bookings.

We would like to thank everyone who has helped with the projects, as well of those who have been inconvenienced by the construction traffic in the lane, the diversion of the buses, the difficulty of parking at the hall and elsewhere for their understanding and patience. Birchanger is highly unlikely to see this ever happen again. Now enjoy!

Our ancient sewers.

Mains drainage did not come to most parts of the village until some 60 odd years ago. They were buried at a depth of some 15 fifteen feet, which was the practice at the time. While some of the village enjoyed the instant traffic calming in the lane, the rest fumed at the disruption, shaking fists at unfortunate passers by and turning both angrily and inappropriately with no thought for the householders drives, or their vehicles.

The worst happened when the bus drivers collectively decided, for whatever reason, to stop turning round at the club. This left all the regular bus users stranded, with no transport and no information as to when the next bus would come. This cavalier treatment of those who are regular users of the service is totally unethical, inconsiderate and cannot be tolerated. Notice should have been given to passengers, posters displayed, and the service should be returned to normal as soon as the road works are complete. There was no attempt to provide a smaller vehicle, if bus size had been the main issue. The sewers are old and it is just a matter of time before this happens again. The other issue is that while this work was going on, the lane was a much safer and pleasanter place. Traffic has dramatically increased in the village in the last few years, with the near completion of Forest Park, exacerbated by the traffic calming in Church Lane.

Is it time to rethink the situation in Birchanger Lane? Traffic calming is intrusive and noisy, but which is the worse of the two evils? Continue with the increased traffic in the lane, or try to mitigate this. What do you think?

Planning an extension?

Many people are extending their homes as an easier option to moving and facing the vagaries of the property market. The whole process of planning, making sure that your home's structure

is suitable and just what is required for your needs can be daunting.

You might save yourself and others from becoming the thieves next victims.

Gateway to Birchanger.

Highways have proposed to install village gateways at each end of Birchanger. Not only are these signs supposed to create a sense of place, they are also supposed to calm traffic, although I am not quite sure how this is achieved.

While anything to curb the speed of drivers who put people at risk as they barge through the village is to be welcomed, I can't help feeling that traffic controls such as there are in Church Lane in Stansted, might be a more effective option.

Thorley. Seven batsmen averaged over 30 for the season; a feat unlikely to have been achieved previously and has to be noted as a considerable achievement. To prove it's not a young man's game, veteran Justin Bass amassed the highest innings of the season; oddly enough his 106 came in the home defeat against Takeley. Although it was the batting that assisted many of the wins throughout the campaign it was the quality of the bowling attack that put the batters in the position to win the games in the first place. The bowlers were consistent all season and were particularly potent in setting up nine and ten wicket victories over Cloghams and Aspenden Standon & Puckeridge where those sides were dismissed for 84 and 92 respectively. New ball bowlers Griffiths and R Tyler were ably supported by Davis and Ahmed with the four regular seamers taking 72 wickets between them at a cost less than 4 runs per over. It was a reflection of the bowlers working in tandem throughout the season that not one bowler stood out in the end of season statistics but seven bowlers took 10 or more wickets. Opener Alex Griffiths produced the outstanding match figures of the season, taking 7 for 30 from his 9.5 overs in that epic victory over Takeley.

The bandwagon only wobbled off course three times along the journey with home defeats against Takeley, Woodford Wells and, most alarmingly, Thorley – who were ultimately relegated. There were two home games lost to the weather in an otherwise arid summer. The second of which threatened to derail the title charge. It was the penultimate weekend of the season and Birchanger were due to play second placed South Loughton in a title decider. Sadly, the weather Gods denied Birchanger the chance to wrap up the title by beating their nearest rivals on their own patch. In what were perhaps rather more nervy circumstances the sun shone and the champagne moment was delivered a week later.

Captain and all-rounder, Elliott Sellears, who scored the most runs and took the most wickets, has had a lot to do with the excellent camaraderie the team has experienced this season. This was echoed in his summing up of the season, "This has been an historic season for Birchanger CC, claiming its first divisional title. Every member of the side has played their part and the success of the side is underpinned not only by a talented group of players but also by a superb team spirit. It's been a pleasure to skipper not only a talented bunch of cricketers but also a great group of lads."

The club will now look forward to the 2014 season with relish; a chance to try and prove just how good a side they have become. They will be testing themselves against higher class outfits such as Ilford Catholics, Theydon Bois and Epping Foresters and will be rekindling some local rivalry with Hockerill, Matching Green and Stansted. One thing is for sure; the club will not be out of place in the top flight in terms of facilities. Sellears alluded to this, "...none of this would have been possible without the top class facilities we have at the club. The new net facilities and improved all round facilities have no doubt aided our improvement this year. Special thanks to Jim Reed and Justin Bass for providing us with what is now without doubt one of the best wickets in the league. Also thanks to Graham and the club for their hospitality during and after games." The players will be itching to go come 3 May 2014 and will be hoping the winter doesn't drag.

Sadly it was not such a successful season for the Second XI as they finished bottom of Division Six, registering only three wins and losing thirteen in a record that strangely mirrored the First team's record. The club will now be in the unique position of having a First XI in the top division and a Second XI in the bottom division.
