## THIRTY SEVEN CANDLES IN THE NIGHT

August 4th gave all the participants at the Act of Remembrance in the churchyard an evening they will never forget.

As usual Birchanger bucked the trend. Instead of extinguishing all the lights at 11pm, Birchanger began lighting candles, one for each man as his name was called. The resulting light just seemed to emphasise the fact that , if you died as a soldier and you came from Birchanger, you will truly never be forgotten. There they

all were, their personal light placed carefully in position by a villager as their name was called, the not forgotten, in the centre of our village.

The light burned brightly through the night and those around were reluctant to leave. So many people came to watch and remember, that there was not a candle for everyone, as there are only 37 known soldiers from Birchanger who were killed in the 1914-18 war. One of the nephews of soldier Richard Phillips was also invited to participate and to personally place his light in memory of his uncle. Over 70 villagers attended the ceremony



A very special event, unique to Birchanger, which we hope will be repeated in 2039, although the lights will be dimmer as the numbers lost in World War 2 were far less.

Historical note Private Richard Phillips of the 6<sup>th</sup> Btn Northants regiment was killed in action on 7<sup>th</sup> August 1918 just prior to the battle of Amiens. Which is also known as the third battle of the Somme. He is buried in the Beacon Cemetery Sailly-Laurette, Somme. France. He was 18 years of age.

#### How is Your Health?

If the statistics are to be believed, we are much healthier in Birchanger than most people in England, and although not the healthiest in Uttlesford, we are close. Deaths from all causes in both men and women have decreased. These include cancer, heart disease and stroke as well.

As it was all residents in Harrisons had a chance to get to relax and to get to know each other better. At the same time, they raised money for Help For Heroes, through raffles and competitions, truly important in the year when we remember the outbreak of World War 1 and the heroes of our modern times, whose lives were put on hold as a result of the war.

Congratulations everyone on a really successful day only the thunder spoilt the outdoor fun, which continued indoors for the rest of the evening.

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## **Discovering South Africa**

There must have been something lacking in my education because, as a young boy, I remember learning about exotic and interesting countries all over the world, many of which I have subsequently been lucky enough to visit. But I don't recall hearing anything about South Africa other than the appalling apartheid regime and its vile treatment of the black majority population. I knew something had changed since then but I wasn't sure how much! It was time to find out.

Landing in Cape Town after an overnight flight from London, we couldn't believe we had left the winter rain and floods behind as we made our way with our guide to pick up the hire car for the first part of the journey. Having been given maps, car and itinerary we were on our own and cautiously set off to find our first hotel.

The name of the hotel was " De Tafelberg ", which, if I had known any Afrikaans, I would have realised is so aptly named as it sits neatly at the base of Table Mountain.

The view from our room was awe inspiring. In the early afternoon the mountain is covered in a sheet of cloud which spills over the sides and down the crevasses like some dry ice pumping from the stage at a pop concert. This phenomenon is known by the locals as 'the tablecloth' and as our first sight of the landmark feature sunk in, we began to realise that there might be a few more surprises in store for us in this fascinating place.

Evening saw us dining at the Victoria & Albert waterfront, a buzzing lively area full of restaurants, street entertainers and tourists, lots of tourists. It reminded me somewhat of Covent Garden or the South Bank with the same relaxed atmosphere yet pulsing with life. African music filled the air as we searched for a table among the bustling throng all doing the same. Eventually we ate at a restaurant overlooking the water and Barbara opted for 'Springbok', which, though it sounds an unlikely choice, she said was delicious, whilst I was less adventurous and went for steak. The food was superb and washed down with a bottle of local wine, finished off our first day in fine style.

The next day we decided to drive around the cape peninsular, our first big drive. The morning was beautifully sunny as we set off and we were astounded at the scenery which is stunning. There are beaches so wide and sandy, yet almost deserted. In one place the sand was so white it looked just like snow! Unsurprisingly perhaps, the place was called 'Whitsand' which I'm guessing is Afrikaans for white sand! We then moved on to the boulders, a penguin colony and conservation area near Simonstown. It is an odd thing to see Penguins nesting on the beach and cavorting in the sea in temperatures of 30 degrees and more but this is just another example of this country's ability to surprise. By lunch time we had made it to Cape Point where we watched whales lazily making their way along the coast far out to sea.

In my ignorance I had always believed that The Cape of Good Hope was at the southernmost tip of South

Africa. Not so, it is actually a rocky headland on the Atlantic coast of the cape peninsular, but nonetheless is still a spectacular sight, with another anomaly, Baboons and Ostriches existing right down to the coast itself.

After a leisurely drive around the rest of the Cape we ended up at Camps Bay just in time for sunset and supper. After another satisfying day we drove over the final headland and back into Cape Town for a good night's rest to prepare us for the coming days and no doubt, more surprises!


