Could a Memorable Evening Benefit Your Organisation in Birchanger?

The Birchanger All Girls Dinner at the end of July was a great success. Not just because it was a fun evening, but it raised a substantial sum of money which could benefit voluntary groups and organisations in the village.

After all the bills have been paid there is money left over, which might be of benefit your group or organisation. All you have to do is to call the management team, Michelle May on 814481, Barbara Wilson on 813007 or Angie Driscoll on 817376, tell them what you are doing and give details of the project for which you need funds, and your request will be considered by the team, who may require further details of your request, before it is passed on to the group.

All requests must be for the use of people in Birchanger or those who use the facilities in the village. The requests will be considered by the BAG group at their October meeting. This could be just the funding which your organisation needs. Go for it!

Rural roads treated like race tracks.

Birchanger lane is certainly treated like a race track, as many residents know to their cost. Now it appears that 33% of drivers admit to driving too fast for safety, by speeding, taking bends too fast, and over one third admitted that they had experienced a near miss on our country lanes.

It seems that because they expect to find less traffic on a rural road, they are happy to take greater risks like speeding, overtaking and not slowing down for bends. They simply do not expect anyone to be there. How very wrong they are, as rural roads have been shown to be the most dangerous for all types of road user.

Car occupants are twice as likely to get themselves killed on a rural road as an urban road. For motorcyclists and cyclists, the risks are much higher. It is hard to understand why there are proposals to raise the speed limit to 50. The claim is that it will stop overtaking in unsuitable places, but are the country roads fit for this? I don't think so.

Surely driving badly on our lanes at speed is just simply completely selfish? After all, most of them are effectively single carriageway roads.

The cost of these workshops are just £10 per person and will cover topics such as bookkeeping, selling skills, social media and publicity.

Local plan hearings.

The completion of the Local Plan moved forward a stage when the inspector who has been appointed to examine the proposals, will be holding hearings in the week beginning November 17th and December 1st. The inspector may invite some of those who have indicated that they wanted to speak, may be invited to. Anyone who does simply want to attend and observe proceedings will able to do so in those weeks.

Consultation on new anti-social behaviour policy

We are all sick of ongoing anti-social behaviour, in our neighbourhood, streets, villages and towns. Finally the District Council has drawn up a new policy on anti-social behaviour which is currently out for consultation, and which is expected to be implemented in the New Year.

Everyone has a right to live quietly and peaceably in their homes, without noise, harassment, and unacceptable

behaviour from anyone around them. There are often complaints that incidents are reported but nothing is done.

Once the policy is implemented, the council will have the right tools to deal with incidents. The manner in which these incidents will be managed are detailed in the consultation report. This may be viewed at the Uttlesford District Council Website at www.uttlesford.gov.uk

Salt is added to make the cheese more attractive to our palates. It seems that manufacturers have been adding salt to a great deal of our food for years. It is very bad for our blood pressure and cardiac systems. As the amount has been added slowly, surely it is time to start to reduce the amount so that the product does not eventually cause the demise of the customer?

If you are over 60 and are within easy reach of Stansted village, why not have lunch at the Day Centre? Or perhaps you would simply like a cup of coffee while you wait for that Chemist's prescription or even catch up with a friend? Either way, the Day Centre will welcome you.

You can relax in cheerful bright surroundings, perhaps enjoy the newly established garden or arrange to meet up with friends. A two course lunch will only cost you £5 and it will all be fresh food, with vegetables grown in the centre's garden.

There are also other items going on in the centre on different days. Although the Day Centre operates for lunch on Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Fridays, there are Art Classes for all on Mondays as well as Contemporary History sessions, embroidery groups, music by a local organist and much more arranged for other days during the week.

When the new Stansted Library is completed, there will be a direct link from the Day Centre to the Library undercover, which offers more options and convenience for all the centre users.

More interest in Uttlesford?

Seems that more people than ever before are looking at what the council is up to these days. There was a big surge of interest at the time of the Tour de France, quite

understandably, but it seems that the interest is being maintained. Possibly the controversial new Local Development proposals have accounted for some of this interest, while many others are looking at Planning proposals in their patch and which might affect them. Some recent planning proposals have been in themselves controversial and have raised concerns with residents right across the board.

July figures show that there were some 57,392 visits to the website and that over a quarter of these were made on a mobile device. To access the website for all council related matters the address is given above.

Bus services

The government is always banging on about connecting out of the way villages to the bus service, but nothing ever seems to happen, The problem is that there is only a limited amount of cash around, the government is making louder noises, so any service to remote locations could well be at the expense of the existing village services. These services are reviewed regularly and if the service is not used enough in one area, it could be moved elsewhere or the buses might become more infrequent. So when you can, use the bus. We should be having the service extended to later in the evening, not cut back.

The very popular Birchanger Art show has once again attracted a very high standard of entrant. It will also have a very high standard of refreshments, all homemade which is expanded this year to provide lunch time snacks as well as the cakes and refreshing tea and coffee. The new room at the hall has made this possible.

It is right on your doorstep, you can buy quality refreshments as well as pick up a picture by a local artist, for a present perhaps, or you might find one which you would really like to have at home. There will be a big selection of unframed prints to tempt you as well.

I do not know if the buzzards nested in Birchanger Wood, BUT at the beginning of September, I was again walking from Forest hall Park across the fields over to Birchanger when suddenly just above me one beautiful buzzard flew up and coursed the fields at a low height and then started to find the thermals. Upon doing so it then circled and spiralled way up into the clouds without any further use of wing power. Gosh it was a wonderful sight.

Tonight, looking out of my window across to Alsa Wood I spied a kestrel, strangely much higher up than I have noticed before, but again coursing the fields for food. I note also that the familiar garden birds will shortly be returning from the fields to our gardens to search for food.



Discovering South Africa

The Mountain and The Prison

There are two sights which any visitor to Cape Town would not want to miss. The first is a visit up to its highest point and most stunning landmark Table Mountain. The second is a journey of reflection to the penal colony that is Robben Island.

Two alternative ways to get up to the top of the mountain are:

- 1) Walk duration about 4 hours. Essential equipment-a good pair of lungs and a fit body.
- 2) Cable Car duration about 10 minutes. Essential equipment a good pair of eyes to enjoy the view.

No prizes for guessing which route Barbara & I took! The cable car rotates as it climbs towards the top so that everyone on board gets an equal view and the panoramic sight which unfolds as you climb is priceless. As far as the eye can see below you, there is uninterrupted sunlit Cape Town. No wonder you can see the mountain for miles, it towers above the city like a loyal sentry watching over the land. Far from being flat on the top as it appears, Table Mountain is a vast rocky area with great chasms and the massive 'Flat Top Gorge' which divides the plateau. The area is a magnet for climbers and even as we descend I am astounded to see someone hanging perilously from one of the cliffs by his fingertips! Thank goodness for cable cars that's what I say!!



Robben Island! Even the name sends a shudder through your body. The apartheid regime kept all of its political opponents locked up there for a very long time and the mental and physical cruelty inflicted on them was immense. But this was not the first time the island had been used in this way. Over 300 years it had been variously, a leper colony, a place to put the mentally ill, a general prison and a place to banish military prisoners and anyone else who was an inconvenience to whoever was in power at the time.

But of course its most famous resident was Nelson Mandela and he is the reason people from all over South Africa and the world come to this place. To add authenticity to your visit, you are told as you board the ferry "you are our prisoner now" and you can only imagine the chill

those words would have sent through the real prisoners bound for the island. Mandela was by no means the only high profile prisoner, another largely forgotten inmate was Robert Sobukwe leader of the Pan African Congress who was held in isolation for many years then banished to Kimberley, a white stronghold, where he eventually died.

From the ferry we were taken by bus around the island, seeing the detention blocks and the Lime Quarry where the prisoners were put to work breaking rocks in the searing heat. Seeing the small cell in which Mandela was held and the exercise yard where he tended a small garden is a moving experience. But along with the despair this was a place of hope where black South Africans never gave up their dreams of independence. Mandela himself would hide messages in his garden and other prisoners used ingenious methods to smuggle them out, even making a small slit in a tennis ball and inserting his message inside. They would then play tennis in the yard of B section, which did not allow visitors, and lob the ball over into the neighbouring yard of a section which did have visitors and thus the messages were secreted out of the prison.

When you visit this prison your guide is always a former inmate and ours served time in the 1980s along with Mandela though he was released later. Finally as you emerge from the prison you realise there are no buses to take you back

to the ferry, it is then that the guide tells you "you are now released Go! Take your long walk to freedom" which is, of course, the title of Nelson Mandela's autobiography.

And the journey back to the ferry is spent for most people thinking about what happened here and certainly thinking about one mans struggle during 18 years of incarceration and how hope triumphed over despair and freedom over cruelty and deprivation. For Barbara and I, our time in Cape Town is now over. Tomorrow we set off for the vineyards of Stellenbosch and Franschhoek, a journey we are looking forward to with some anticipation!
