Council rules dictate that members of the public cannot participate in the meeting after this, but they can be the first to have their say.

Poppy Appeal Exceeds £4000!

For the first time ever the Poppy Appeal topped the £4000 mark for the Birchanger area. The record breaking amount of £4449.50 was collected through the sales of poppies, other merchandise and donations. This is all down to the hard work put in by the Poppy Collection organisers in Birchanger, Geoff and Angie Driscoll. It is not just a straight forward matter of putting out and collecting the tins and the poppies, it means servicing the poppy trays, regularly replenishing the stock, particularly in the area of the Service Station which requires daily visits, and is one of the prime areas for the theft of the tins. There are also the poppy wreathes to order and to deliver to those who wish to lay them combined with a great deal of organisation and form filling in the weeks around Armistice Day.

A big thank you both for all you have done for the British Legion. The tradition handed down by the Kadwills is still very much alive and succeeding beyond all that was thought possible before.

Sadly this record may never be matched or exceeded. One of the main outlets, The Service Station have decided to make children in Need their main charity for November, with poppies on sale for only three days in the overall two week period of the appeal.

It seems a shame that those who have fought for us and who are left in need themselves should be passed over. Should the buying public not be allowed to make their own choice as has happened this year and in previous years?

The Garden Route, Ostriches and the Swartburg Pass

Driving in the wide open spaces of the Southern African coastal route is an absolute joy. It is no wonder it is called the garden route, to say it is picturesque is a complete understatement, the scenery is awesome!

As we set off in the morning sunshine passing such places as "Somerset West", "Gordons Bay", "Betty's Bay" and many others, I couldn't help but reflect on the legacy of British rule in this part of Africa, I like to think that we left something more than some parochial names and ex-pat communities behind when we left.

We spent the morning marvelling at the sea on our right and the mountains on our left as we drove on in glorious sunshine arriving at about 2 PM at L' Agulhas which is the Southernmost tip of South Africa.

Most people want to have their picture taken at this point where the Atlantic and Indian oceans meet. However as we left the car in the car park to walk to the sea I noticed about 30 Harley Davidson motorcycles tilted lazily on their stands and hoped that we weren't going to be assailed by a group of Hells Angels. Imagine our surprise therefore when, as we got to the rock marking the spot, we were greeted by a group of men, none of whom was under 70, laughing and joking, splashing about in the shallow water. One superannuated leather clad biker even offered to take our photo together.



For the rest of the day we continued on our way until at about 6 pm we arrived at a sign pointing us onto a long farm track just outside of a town called Heidelburg. The track seemed never ending until we finally reached the gates of the Skeiding guest farm where we were to stay for the next 2 days.

This was truly a working farm but not as any farm we would recognise. We were shown to our room, a beautiful bungalow overlooking sprawling meadows where sheep and cattle grazed in the evening sunshine. There was one other resident animal on this farm which we would get up close and personal with in the morning.

Seven am saw us and several other guests clamber onto the back of a four wheel drive truck, together with Neels, the Afrikaaner farmer, three black farm hands and two wild and willing sheepdogs which were a cross between border collies and Australian hunting dogs! For the next hour we bucked and rolled our way over fields and down ditches herding sheep, separating cattle and dropping off the farmhands so they could tend to the Alfalfa plants used to feed the animals. Before arriving back at the farmhouse for a hearty breakfast we were taken to see the other 'herd', Ostriches! Neels explained that his father had always kept Ostriches and his tenure of the farm was continuing the tradition. The birds are huge.

They are kept for their plumage, their eggs and their meat. They can live for up to 50 years and are very fast movers. They have even been ridden and raced in the past though this practice has now thankfully been stopped.

Back at the farm in the evening after a dip in the pool Neels cooked Ostrich steaks over a Braai or South African barbecue. I can tell you the steak was delicious, looked just like a sirloin but contains no cholesterol

whatsoever. Neels explained that he exports the steaks to Europe, mainly to Germany, but he expressed puzzlement that the UK, so far, had not succumbed to the delicacy.

In the morning we made some purchases of souvenirs (I even had my picture taken standing on an Ostrich egg!) perhaps I'm not that heavy after all! We said our goodbyes, packed up the Toyota and off we set again.

A long days journey later saw us arrive at our next home which was a delightful little house in a complex miles from nowhere at the foot of the Swartburg Pass. Looking out from our balcony up at the pass we felt a great sense of inertia come upon us.

After a long and tiring day we decided *not* to take the guided tour that had been booked for us the following day, we had, however, not reckoned with the force of nature that was Charlie Nunn, who was to enter our world the following day!



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

School News

November fundraising month

This half of the term is the busiest in the school year. Sporting activities are still there and all the children had the chance to try cross country running at Stansted School, with a shorter course for the younger children.

Then it was Children in Need Day, in which the school always participates. There were fund raising events and everyone, including all the staff, came as someone they would really like to be, their own personal super hero. For those who preferred to see someone else depicting their hero, they could come in the clothes they really wanted to wear, with their teddies being the heroes for a change! Everyone donated 50p for the privilege.

The object of the day was to create a Pudsey Bear made from money. This very special Pudsey contributed to the total of £119 which the children raised for Children in Need

Despite the fact that they were all very busy raising money for Children in Need, the British legion Poppy Appeal was certainly not forgotten. The school collection amounted to £126, and a big thank you to everyone who contributed to the total.

Reports also went out last month and two evenings were set aside for parents to come in and view their children's work and to discuss this with their child's class teacher. Bag 2 School where parents brought bags of clothes to the school to be sold by their weight totalled 450kg, or £180 in cash. The next collection will be in May and you do not have to have a child at the school to contribute. The date will be displayed on the noticeboard.

Operation Christmas Child was well supported and the pile of boxes in the hall was a tantalising reminder that Christmas was not far away. A total of 30 boxes went off, nearly one box for every family at the school. So for one reason or another gifts and a total of £425 was raised for good causes in the first two months of the school year.

A Friday assembly to remember

On most Friday afternoons in the school the children hold a special assembly to which all the parents are welcomed. Rewards are given to children who have done something special that week, either in their class or to those who have done something which is particularly special in school that week in other ways. These awards are known as Stars of the Week. Other awards are also given out, such as to the class for the best attendance and the house with the most points, but most of all it is an opportunity for each class to take it in turns to show what they had been doing to their parents.

Last month it was one of the Key Stage 1 classes, known as Badgers, who had been studying the Antarctic and Emperor Penguins in particular. Through their readings and their acting they demonstrated their knowledge of the Emperor Penguins year, from the long trudge inland to the breeding grounds, the finding of their mate again, the egg laying, the careful handover by the female to the male to incubate the chick, the female's return trudge back to the sea and her return to the chick with the food.

Then another departure by the male, the females finally leaving their chick, and at last the departure of the chicks when they realise they have to forage for themselves. The children acted out the different ways the male and female penguins walk, the strange and different grunting cries of adult and young, in fact Emperor penguin behaviour as it really is. The actors were aided by a team of very able narrators who told the story as events unfolded. An assembly not to be forgotten by participants and the audience alike.

Flu drops for Key Stage 1

More inoculations are being administered in a child friendlier way these days. Last month Key Stage 1 children received not a jab, but a gentle squirt of the vaccine in each nostril, to protect them against the current type of flu expected this winter. If this works, it will be a huge benefit to all school children, and there is less likely of an epidemic if there is more take up of the inoculation by all sections of the public.

You may not be lucky enough or young enough to get the nose drops, but an inconvenient jab could be a very small price to pay for a healthier winter?

Parents and staff at Birchanger School turned out in force for a Christmas Fair which was both fun and provided a source for a large number of Christmas goodies for everyone.

There was a cake stall with cup cakes and other goodies galore, the children had made many Christmas items themselves, there were the usual Christmas raffles, Father Christmas with his queue of visitors all afternoon, and a chance to sit down with a welcome cup of tea at the end of it all.

Festive Recipe, Sue's Chicken Liver Paté

This is a delicious starter for Christmas day which I have been making for years. It is really simple to make, and is more tasty than any supermarket paté.

Ingedients

8oz [230g] Chicken Livers.

4oz [120g] Cream cheese.

5oz [150g] Bacon.

1 ½ Tabs Tomato Chutney.

1 Small onion.

Garlic to taste.

Method

- 1 [Cook the Bacon in a non stick pan.
- 2 [Add the livers and cook in bacon fat.

- 3 [Cool and liquidise or mince with onion and garlic.
- 4 [Cream the cheese with the chutney.
- 5 [Mix the cheese with the liver in the blender.
- 6 [Put in one large souffle dish or several small ramekin dishes.
- 7 [Melt some butter, decorate the top of the paté with peppercorns and bay leaves
- 8 [pour the melted butter over to seal.
- 9 [Cool in fridge until ready to serve with some toast.
