New Settlement For Birchanger?

Some people might think that we had more than enough new build around us, after all a chunk of Birchanger was lost when Foresthall Park was built. Now it seems they are after us again.

They are suggesting a new settlement for Birchanger as part of the new local plan, currently being debated.

This would appear to encircle most of the village and bring Birchanger closer to being contained in Hertfordshire.

There are a lot of reasons why this cannot be allowed to happen. The identity of Birchanger would be lost forever. We have Junction 8 which was a factor in the Inspector's refusal to grant planning permission for a large number of houses in Elsenham.

With the development already planned for East Herts the situation would be chaotic. No consideration has been taken of flight paths, aircraft noise and the creaky local road system.

As for us, we could lose a lot of the things which make Birchanger a good place to live in. Our fields and footpaths would go, the woods would survive in a sea of housing. Many of the new houses would have to be built close to flight paths and the major trunk routes.

This is not what we want for a village which featured in the Domesday Book.

There has to be a small amount of development in every area to accommodate the perceived housing need, and there is a need for affordable housing for young families, but our Green Belt which is valued, should not be sacrificed for major developments.

There will be consultations on this in the near future and you will be able to have your say.

Will the new Junction 7a on the M11 affect us?

This question is not entirely easy to answer. It is planned to serve The North end of Harlow and the probable new building development there. It might ease the traffic using Junction 8 a little bit, but until the motorway has a direct link from each direction onto it, then the effect would be minimal.

At the moment there is a huge question mark about any development around Bishop's Stortford and our area of Uttlesford, as junction 8 is already at the designated capacity, something which a great many people have said over many years, and it is only just recently that planning inspectors have taken this fact on board in various planning appeals, both in Uttlesford and Bishop's Stortford.

The consultation on this junction is underway, but most people could be forgiven if they wondered just what difference their opinion would make.

Watch out for the "Tuck In" sticker!

There is a great deal of concern about the size of the county. Not the actual landscape, but the people who live in it. We are all getting too fat.

Concerned about this and the effect that this extra weight has on our health, Essex County Council has launched a new initiative to try to help us enjoy the food we like to eat, but this time it will be made of healthier ingredients.

The new initiative, which is to be known as "Tuck In", aims to encourage small businesses to make a few changes in their food, using healthier ingredients, less fat and more grilling to ensure the food we buy is actually better for us, while tasting just as good as before. They are also being encouraged to add healthier options to their menus where they can. It is hoped that more options will expand their business and in return they will receive free nutritional training and promotion through social media and the council's website.

To join the Tuck In scheme is free as is all the support the businesses will be offered .

The support is aimed at all restaurants who have a take away element and a Food Hygiene rating above 3. Nobody is suggesting that customers will be weighed as they use participating restaurants so the success of the scheme will literally be hard to measure!

Off roaders wrecking our woods again

Unfortunately as always it is the less able members in our society who will suffer if the library goes. The library service provides books for the children to read and to take home at school and that will be under threat as well.
