# LIGHT UP OUR LIVES



# A Time When Emotions Run High

It is that time of year; Christmas time is a time for families and friends to get together, when drink flows freely and over eating seems to be the order of the day. This works well for most people, but there are always those who feel left out, for whatever the reason. The top of the list is usually the elderly, those who live alone, the sick and children with mental health and emotional difficulties. These groups always seem to be on the outside looking in.

It is perhaps easier to recognize the older people and it is hoped that their neighbours will look out for them at this time, but those with children or young people are often having a very difficult time. Their children may behave strangely, react badly to strangers and a shift in their usual routine. Whatever the reason, it is frequently a time when these youngsters kick off and the family is left to cope alone throughout the Christmas period. Living with anyone of any age with any form of condition can be difficult, especially at Christmas time. It may be that the family does have support, but for those with youngsters with emotional or mental health problems, there is a new source of help for parents and carers. You do not need a doctor as you can simply call yourself. All callers are contacted within 24 hours of making a call if nobody is available to take your call at the time.

This service just might provide you with help to deal with your own situation, not just at Christmas but throughout the year. If Christmas might be a problem for you, it might be as well to get advice beforehand. The number to call is 0300 555 1201.

For the rest of us, please help those less fortunate this Christmas if you possibly can.

## Making the Most of Your Doctor's Appointments

Appointments to see the doctor, whether at home or in Outpatients Departments are hard to come by, and often when we do finally get into see the doctor, we forget all the things which we wanted to ask or needed to know. In the days of patient led medical care, we are going to need to be smarter than ever to get the treatment and answers which we know we need. I know, in mid November I was told that there were no appointments until January on a routine matter, and the January schedules were unavailable.

One way of doing it is to write everything down before we even get to the appointment and this can be very useful if we actually know what we want to ask beforehand. Sometimes we are so knocked backwards that everything we wanted to ask is forgotten.

There is a simple way to find out a great deal of what you need to know, in just three main questions.

- 1. What are my options? The treatment offered may not always be the best one for you.
- 2. What are the possible benefits or risks. We are often are taking so many tablets that we do not know what will work with what these days!
- How can we make a decision which is right for me. What has worked for others may not always be the best option. There is usually more than one.

This attitude may surprise your doctor at first, but if he knows you want to be involved in decisions and are far more than just a consumer of services, you will understand more and the doctor will respect your interest. It is a way of taking control of your health for yourself. There is a great deal out there to help you. A helpful website is <u>http://www.selfcareforum.org/fact</u> sheets/ All this may be especially useful in the coming months, when doctors appointments, already difficult to get, may be at a premium.

## Winter Walking

With darkness setting in so early and lasting for so long, many of us find ourselves walking the dog or going for a run in darkness. When we are doing this it is very hard for other people, especially motorists to see us at all. To keep ourselves safe we need to be aware of this. We should all have cycle lights or carry a torch.

Latest advice asks us to wear high vis clothing and reflective bands. These really do show up in a car's headlights. Our dogs should be wearing a reflective vest, or collar and lead. If there are no pavements then pedestrians must take particular care and always walk facing the oncoming traffic.

Uttlesford District has a limited supply of reflective bands available at the Council Offices in Saffron Walden, or at the Library in Dunmow. First come first served so move quickly to obtain your bands. Birchanger. A look bright and lovely this month, but there is still January and February to come.

## We Have a Defibrillator

The potentially life saving defibrillator has been installed on an outside wall at the club.

You cannot miss it! It is bright yellow and sits under a light which is permanently on.

There are clear instructions as to how the device is to be used on the outside. You just follow need to follow these to obtain speedy help in a possible cardiac emergency. You will be talked through the process by the ambulance service.

The key to a successful outcome is speed. In a cardiac emergency is crucial to get the patient's heart up and running as quickly as possible. So having picked up the defibrillator it must reach the patient quickly. The ambulance service will talk you through the procedure and support you until help arrives.

Training is to be offered to those who would like to learn more about using the defibrillator and how members of the public can use simple techniques and procedures to help save lives. It is hoped to perhaps offer a short explanatory session at the Annual Parish Meeting <u>on March 23rd</u>, while additional first aid help and primary support procedures are on offer, if sufficient people are interested and would like to attend a special session given by the ambulance service.

Meanwhile a big thank you to our District Councillor Thom Goddard who provided the funding to purchase the defibrillator and to the club who have allowed their premises to be used.

# Gordon Blue Review: The Flitch of Bacon 4\* - Good for a special occasion

"Not another gastropub, surely!" was the response when I suggested the **Flitch of Bacon** as an option for supper. Yet this recently refurbished and updated eatery is definitely not just another gastropub – managing to maintain restaurant quality (this is Daniel Clifford of Midsummer House fame after all) but with a relaxed feel and jaunty interior.

Pre-dinner drinks were ordered as we stood at the bar beside the fire and initial impressions were positive although the lighting was a little harsh and unflattering on your crooks and crevices. Once seated we had a particularly difficult time choosing from the small but perfectly formed menu, with prices matching the restaurant end of the dining spectrum as another example of a desire to move away from the gastropub theme. In fact it was so difficult to choose that we ordered some nibbles from the bar snack menu and we were very glad we did. The ham and cheese croquettes were sublime but the real star was the crispy quail's eggs. We weren't expecting to bite into something so innocent looking and yet when you do, the explosion of yellow gooeyness that fills your mouth is an experience to savour. So much so, we temporarily forgot about the rest of the menu as we contemplated ordering more of the little protein-filled balls of joy.


Starters included such regular delights as seared scallops and duck liver parfait as well as the more unusual baked beetroot and a smoked duck and crispy hens egg dish that merely added to the protein explosion taking place. Our diners agreed that the mains were on the pricey side but were good value if you consider the quality of ingredients and imagination of the presentation - £14.50 for fish and chips maybe the new norm perhaps.

Now for the highlight of our night: For dessert all four of us chose the pistachio soufflé with dark chocolate sorbet and we all agreed that it was simply sublime. The delight that greets you when you dip the spoon in is immense, the sheer bouncy, air-filled ramekin of joy is worth every one of the 18 minute wait.

On a negative note, they only had two bottles of a particularly delightful Bordeaux in stock although I will give them the benefit of the doubt for this heinous of crimes as it has only just opened. A personal tour of the operation from Daniel himself topped off a wonderful night and we all agreed that the place is a winner. When we can afford to, we shall be back!

### The uncertainty goes on and on and on

More than three years ago, the Government ducked the issue of new runway capacity at one or more of London's airports. Instead, in the summer of 2012, the then Government set up an independent 'Airports Commission', comprising a panel of experts, to examine all the options and to publish a final report with its recommendations in the summer of 2015.

The timing was significant because the Government insisted that the Commission must not publish its final report until after the May 2015 general election.

Stop Stansted Expansion (SSE) engaged fully with the Commission and made 11 separate evidence submissions setting out the case against a second Stansted runway. We were rewarded for this major effort in the Commission's interim report. Much to the relief of the local community, Stansted was not even on the Commission's short list. It was to be a straight choice between Heathrow and Gatwick.


The Commission published its final report in July 2015 and it unanimously recommended another runway at Heathrow. The Government responded by saying that it needed time to study the Commission's recommendations. The Prime Minister at first promised a decision by the autumn and then said there would be a decision by the end of the year.

And so we waited and we waited – knowing that the Commission was only advisory and the Government would ultimately decide whatever it wanted to decide.

Finally, on the 11<sup>th</sup> December, the Government made its decision, which was to say that more studies were required before a final decision could be taken! We're now told that a final decision will be made in the summer of 2016.

The uncertainty will therefore continue for at least another six months.

Meanwhile, we cannot assume that Stansted is off the hook as regards a new runway. It currently seems to be a choice between Heathrow and Gatwick but we know from past experience that Government policy can be as fickle as a snowflake. We can only hope that we'll be better placed to relax and enjoy next Christmas.
