




It was well worth the wait so come and see what has been done for yourselves.

## No New Housing Developments For Now!

According to the recent exhibitions that have been made for the new local plan, all housing sites put forward for Birchanger village have been rejected. We will have to find out later in the year as to whether others agree with this. The council will not decide on the final sites which are likely to be in the frame at Dunmow, Easton Park, Stebbing, Newport or Great Chesterford until later in the year. There will be a final round of public consultation in January. We do not miss out on development completely though as there could be some at Parsonage Farm, which is now in Stansted, but which could impact on Birchanger. We will have to wait a bit longer to find out. Meanwhile, if you do have any comments to make on the plan, send them to the district council offices in Saffron Walden, marked local plan. You just have enough time to do this. The plan will be lodged with the Inspectorate in January and the inspector's decision is expected by the end of 2017.

Many of us enjoy a trip to Saffron Walden. There are a great many smaller shops there, which offer a variety of goods which are very unlike the big chain store offerings, and there are also many small cafes and pubs offering a variety of food. The last two occasions have seen me in the recently taken over Cross Keys Hotel, centrally located in the high Street not far from the main traffic lights. This is very much an old world pub, with beams, big fireplaces with much from the 15th century era. There are 6 "boutique" bedrooms aimed at those away for a luxury romantic weekend.

We were just there for lunch, which is exceptionally good. There are also lunch time packages offering two courses between 12 and 4 pm at a bargain price. The food is varied and interesting with a constantly changing menu. Service is swift and friendly and as part of it remains a pub, beers and the wine list are both interesting and very quaffable. ## Ruby's Indian Takeaway - 4 Star\*

The menu is expansive with specials and all manner of exotic dishes for every palette as well as Indian classics that will warm your cockles on any dull evening. The order was placed simply and efficiently over the phone with a very helpful gentleman who ensured he got everything right down to the required number of popadoms, flavours of dipping sauce and request for an updated menu. Being a Sunday night, we were pleasantly surprised to hear that our wait would only be 40-45 minutes. Being the more officious type Madam Blue confirmed to me afterwards that they did in fact knock on the door with our order some 43 minutes and 57 seconds later. Previously, when busy we have found that they can take up to an hour to deliver, but are always up-front when ordering about how long things might take.

The food was delivered by a friendly local face, monies settled and it was now time to get down to our meal. All the items come packed in a fine range of plastic dishes which seal well to avoid that loathsome oily drip so prevalent in some takeaways. I had opted for a chicken tikka jalfrezi which errs on the hotter end of the spectrum. Meanwhile Madam Blue had gone for a more temperate lamb dish. The descriptions on the menu of heat levels are fairly accurate so you are always forewarned if something of the killer variety is on its way. The dishes were well made, the sauces on point and the meat portions reassuringly generous. The popadoms were also crisp and not overly oily with sauces that complemented them well. It is also worth noting that the rice dishes were of a good quality (not drying out) and the naan was beautifully baked retaining it's unique bread substance (without being overly burnt or chewy). This is definitely the best takeaway the Blues have found locally. At £25 for two people to eat generously it is neither cheap nor extortionate, but the quality definitely merits the price. Why, therefore is this not another solid 5stars out of 5 you ask? Well I must admit to using the Indian takeaway as a proxy exercise in proving my manhood. I always therefore, err on the spicier end of the spectrum, something I silently enjoy on the evening, but which always sends me a nasty reminder of its intensity the next day.

## Helicopter Noise

Once again, a number of complaints have been made concerning noise levels from helicopters flying over the village. Helicopters are permitted to land and take-off from London Stansted Airport and on average, they expect around 10 helicopter movements each day. In addition to these, there may be Police, Military, medical emergency or aerial surveying. The only way in which villagers can try to reduce this nuisance is to report each incident on a regular basis.



## So how do I make a complaint?

According to Brian Ross from SSE, the simplest way for anyone to complain about helicopter and aircraft noise, is via the Stop Stansted Expansion website at <a href="http://stopstanstedexpansion.com/noise\_complaint\_form.asp">http://stopstanstedexpansion.com/noise\_complaint\_form.asp</a> It takes less than a minute to complete the on-line complaint form and when a complaint is submitted via the SSE website it automatically goes to the Stansted Airport Flight Evaluation Unit (FEU) for investigation and response. It has the added benefit of enabling SSE to keep track of the number and nature of complaints.

People may sometimes feel that it's a waste of time complaining because the airport pays no attention to complaints but that's not the case. Numbers matter and the number of complaints are carefully looked at by both the CAA and the Department for Transport. It's in Stansted Airport's interests to minimise the number of complaints. Whilst it's important to complain about noisy aircraft and low overflying helicopters, it's in nobody's interests to make frivolous complaints. For details Michelle-814481 Barbara-813007 Rosemary-814678 The company behind Stansted, London's third-busiest airport, is to call on the Government to lift restrictions on passenger numbers as it ramps up its campaign to expand and eventually build a second runway.

Charlie Cornish, chief executive at Stansted's owner, Manchester Airports Group (MAG), said the company was planning to apply officially in the coming months to have its so-called planning cap, which limits it to handling 35m passengers a year, raised. If approved, it would allow the Essex airport to grow by making full use of its single runway, and lead to between £400m and £500m of investment in Stansted to expand its terminal facilities so that it can handle more travellers. The move could also pave the way for a second landing strip.

MAG is Britain's second-biggest airport operator and owns Manchester, the country's third-busiest airport, East Midlands and Bournemouth. Stansted's cap was lifted to 35m from 25m in 2008. However, the airport is growing quickly, with passenger numbers jumping by 10.8% to 23.2m in the 12 months to the end of March.



## The Kids are on the Ball!

As luck would have it Birchanger Primary School together with Elsenham Golf & Leisure recently started an exciting after school golf club for students! The Sharp Shooters Junior Golf Academy was founded by Elsenham Golf & Leisure Head Golf Professional Paul Ring and currently teaches 15 students at the school on a weekly basis.

As the children progress they will be shown how to reflect on each session, set new goals, improve their fitness and even set their own skill challenges! Once they reach the end of their current level children can then upgrade to the next level earning a certificate highlighting their progress and a new polo shirt to wear with pride!

#### The Hundred Parishes Society

Many settlements within the Hundred Parishes evolved alongside highways to serve passing traffic, initially farm carts, drovers with cattle and travellers on horseback, then passenger coaches and bigger farm wagons. The busiest routes radiated out from London. Roads did not have the luxury of a firm surface until the introduction of tarmac at the beginning of the 20th century. Since the Middle Ages, parishes had maintained roads, but increasing traffic meant that some could no longer find the necessary resources. Roads were badly rutted, muddy in winter and dusty in summer, often only passable by encroaching more and more onto adjoining land. Increasing vehicle size and volume of traffic, especially taking farm produce into the expanding capital, caused much damage. Parliament authorised the overseeing of key routes by surveyors, and later by boards of trustees, who were responsible for maintaining a given length of road from the proceeds of tolls. These roads were known as "turnpikes" after an old word meaning toll gate. The first turnpike road in England was established in 1663 on the Old North Road, known more recently as the A10, running from Wadesmill in the parish of Thundridge north to Huntingdonshire. The country's first toll gate was set up in Wadesmill. More turnpike roads and toll gates followed in the 18th century. The arrival of the railways in the mid 1800's took much traffic off the roads and spelt the end of economic viability for turnpikes. Main routes became the responsibility of county or district authorities and they were given road numbers in the 1920s. Much still survives of how things used to be..... if you take time to look!
