BEWARE FRAUDSTERS




Over the years crime has been evolving from straightforward theft and robbery to today's complex world of cyber crime, fraud and identity theft. Far be it from me to paint a picture of a dangerous new world, figures up and down the country show that crime rates are dropping, our children are safer than they have ever been as are our homes and cars. In this new world, however, criminals are turning to different and ever more canny schemes to make a dishonest buck.

Back in February one of the residents of Birchanger received a letter, claiming to be from a debt collection agency recovering funds from late payment of council tax. This resident had only moved into his property some seven months earlier and as a man of mature years could easily have been profiled as a vulnerable easy target. Luckily, this gentleman saw through this clever scheme and didn't provide any details or send any funds. Instead he contacted 101 and spoke to the police, who advised he should ignore the letter and contact the fraud department. For him came a happy ending, but the police confirmed that many people in the area are being targeted by this scheme and so he contacted the magazine to spread the word. As fraudsters will continue to target people

it is really important that we all follow some simple steps to stay safe:

- 1) Know who you're dealing with always find a seller's physical address not a PO Box or similar. If someone calls you make sure you identify them properly, looking them up online before paying anything or providing any details. If you're not able to do these checks immediately request a call back and find a neighbour /family member to help.
- 2) Never wire/transfer money Once done it is impossible to get back no decent seller will request this.
- 3) Read your monthly statements dull and sometimes depressing yes, but someone could easily be slowly siphoning funds so make sure your recognise transactions.
- 4) After a disaster only give funds to recognised charities this is a peak time for fraudsters so if you want to donate, find the charity yourself, rather than taking unsolicited requests.
- 5) Low risk, high yield if someone promises the earth in an investment they are lying all reputable companies will be up front with risks.
- 6) Don't send money to someone you don't know that online love interest may not be who you think they are.
- 7) Don't respond to messages asking for any personal details even opening the links or attachments on your computer could leave you with some seriously dodgy computer virus.
- 8) Allow yourself to be rude many people end up being bullied into these frauds through a sense of politeness, not wanting to cause a fuss, or not wanting to bother anyone to check their validity.

Would You Throw Away £17,000,000?

Well it seems that throughout Essex the clean up bill for litter is a staggering Seventeen million pounds. It is money we should not be spending on something which should be unnecessary and this money is badly needed elsewhere. Road repairs for a start, social care, schools, the list is endless.

It was very gratifying to discover that in the recent antilitter campaign, litter was reduced in some areas by up to 70%, and that was in Lower Street in Stansted. Most of the county achieved at 40 % reduction in litter. Fast food outlets achieved a 41% litter reduction overall. The trick is to keep up this improvement. However, I cannot see that there was much improvement in Birchanger Lane!

Is Integration the Way to Improved Health Services?

A one stop approach to integrated health care may seem like an unrealistic dream, for those of us struggling to cope with just getting to see a doctor. However trials which have happened in areas other than ours have shown that there are huge benefits when GPs, nurses, social workers, mental health services, pharmacists, and voluntary services all operate as a team from a central point, or one stop shop. Even specialists visit the Centre when required.

The aim is to provide a good well coordinated service, to keep people out of hospital wherever possible and to centralise patient's records so that the details of patients with multi conditions are clearly recorded together.

This is not going to happen overnight, but work towards the integrate care will start this year and it is expected that the program will be fully operational in 2021. Hopefully the new Stansted surgery will have a large part to play in this, but the whole plan assumes that hub surgeries will be very much larger than the ones we are used to today. If all the services work together from a central point, surely it will make the overall care of patients, who often need input from various health professionals, it will be better all round for everyone?

As long as we can actually get to the doctor and survive to 2021. The idea is a no-brainier. The only amazing thing is that it has taken so long to work this out!

Have You Been to Princess Alexandra Hospital Lately?

If you have, you might well have found yourself unable to park and totally confused .the building work there has resulted in some major changes to the roads, car parking layout and access to the departments. As if this was not enough, when you actually have struggled to find a parking space and needed up late for your appointment, you find that actually getting to where you need to be is proving a near impossibility. Instead of clear signs which say pathology, x ray or outpatients there are just zones. What is BB for goodness sake, is it X-ray or clinic. The uninitiated can only find out by actually entering the department. I was lucky to end up in X ray, not the morgue!

So you retrace your steps looking for some kind of explanation for all this. There is neither explanation or code that is readily available. By trial and a great deal of error I finally reach my destination.

There the staff were kindness and consideration personified, so the hospital is getting something right! Too much to hope for miracles across the board, or is it just a plot to keep people out of casualty? Perhaps they need to send out de-coders and guides with the appointment letters?

Are You Getting the Help Which May Be Due to You?

If you are over 65 and suffer from a long term illness or infirmity, which may mean that you find it difficult to do household or gardening chores, you may be entitled to additional financial support day and night, depending on the nature of the infirmity.

This could mean that you could claim additional financial support to pay towards the cost of funding a cleaner or someone to help in the garden. There are many older people who are actually entitled to this help, but who have never claimed the allowance.

Gordon Blue Review: DUKE'S HEAD - HATFIELD BROAD OAK - GOOD FOR THE ABSTEMIOUS?

It's a good job we arrived at the **Duke's Head** in in a taxi given the plethora of Range Rovers parked behind this Hatfield Broad Oak favourite. Intimidated we weren't however, even when we all bumbled in and headed to the small bar where a snoozing and unmovable mutt of unidentifiable breed forced us to peer round the pillar in order to get the first round in.

A short wait for the table and it was immediately apparent that an early sitting for lunch was a wise move. Service, whilst generally friendly (more on that later) was rather slow and having to play the "catch-the-eye-of-the-waitress-who-is-definitely-trying-to-ignore-you" game is not something I am happy to play. As the place filled up around us, staff seemed to move quicker but then often disappeared completely for lengthy periods of time and this became increasingly frustrating for all our party given that all we wanted to do was order more drinks – something a pub should be good at?

Food wise, the Duke's Head markets itself as "fine dining" and I suppose to an extent this is true given the mix of pub classics but also genuinely innovative and tasty dishes. Perhaps another definition of fine dining is the ability to nonchalantly but confidently serve food on the most bizarre array of items. Slate, glass and of course the favourite wooden chopping board all featured throughout. A broad array of ales and lagers were on offer although it was disappointing that the only draught cider was off. The wine list is quite varied and includes something for everyone both in terms of grape and origin, whilst the range of wines available by the glass is something that should be commended given the trend in some places to serve just one or two.

Now, I'm all for friendly service and some banter with staff on the odd occasion, but at the Duke's Head, a true first was experienced with one of the waitresses. Admittedly a little worse-for-wear following a "heavy" evening at the Social Club the night before, one of our party ordered a Bloody Mary as a Hair of the Dog and the related banter between us at the table was soon picked up on by the waitress who proceeded to spend the rest of the lunch castigating this guest for ordering alcohol at all. We thought it was a joke so we played along but it turns out, she wasn't joking. As it turns out, nor were we - duly reflected in the tip that we rewarded her sanctimonious attitude with.

So there we have it. I'd go again but not for some time. We are blessed with some really excellent places to eat around our patch of Birchanger and thus the Duke's Head will be kept in reserve for another day.

A much anticipated topic this term was centred around dinosaurs. The children each enjoyed creating their own dinosaur mask by cutting and pasting different textured materials, and reading a selection of fiction & non-fiction books all about dinos. This enticed some reluctant book users to really engage with books spending much time poring over pages and asking staff to read and reread info about their favourite creatures. We had a really exciting dinosaur hunt with our intrepid explorers following footprints outside all through the school grounds to discover a giant standing 6ft dinosaur looking after some dinosaur eggs. Everyone was enthralled to watch them over the subsequent days and speculate what might hatch!

The children were introduced to new words including fossil, carnivore and herbivore. They used little brushes to gently uncover dinosaur 'fossils' set in plaster of paris and hidden in sand, and were amazed to see a vinegar and bicarb soda volcano 'erupt' before making 'volcanic rocks' to eat at our snack cafe.

We continue to play outside in all weathers and have had great fun in the sand, pouring and measuring water and caring for our plants, whilst observing changes as the bulbs emerged and other plants in our beautiful surroundings grow and change.

Finally, we are fortunate to have received a grant recently giving the children access to two new mini PCs plus a comprehensive set of equipment for our future cookery sessions.
