ART SHOW POSTPONED



Over the years one of the highlight events in the village hall is Birchanger's art show. Each year this event has been put on thanks to the hard work and dedication of a group of villagers to show off some of the best works from around the area. Furthermore, this highly successful and popular event has raised significant funding for a number of local projects including this very magazine as well as other local establishments including the village hall. Sadly, despite being one of the biggest fund raisers and donaters to the hall, this year the uncertainty around the re-opening of the hall has meant the event has had to be cancelled. This is because nobody could be certain that the hall would be finished in time, and it was felt that to be fair to all the artists, who allocate work to shows months ahead, we should let them know that there would be no art show in Birchanger this year.

Luckily for the village hall and other local organisations, the Art Show will return next year with a vengeance. It is planned for either September 22/24, or September 30/October 1st depending on other art shows and the availability of the screens which are hired every year.

Watch this space, as it will happen in the refurbished hall, with all the usual attractions and more.


BUS TIMES CONSULTATION

The Essex County Council consultation on plans to reduce the frequency of route 7/7a through the village has now been published. In the proposed timetable buses pass through the village towards Bishop's Stortford at 0804 (to Birchwood School only), 0954, 1046, 1205, 1301, 1425, 1517, 1750 and 1815. Buses leave the town for Birchanger at 0639, 0900, 1010, 1110, 1230, 1320, 1550 and 1810. The 322 service, a single bus each way through the village en route to and from the Joyce Frankland Academy and the Saffron Walden County High School, is likely to be withdrawn.

Some villagers have already made comments to the Parish Council about the changes; these will be passed on to the County. Information about how you can obtain a copy of the consultation together with the proposed timetable have been posted on village noticeboards. In Safe Hands?

As regards hospitals in an emergency, we seem to live in a kind of no man's land particularly when it comes to Cardiac arrest. It seems we can be shipped to Welwyn, Harlow, Broomfield, or perhaps even in end up in a unit at Basildon, which has one of the best recovery rates from cardiac arrest in the country. It is the centre for cardiac emergency treatment care in Essex. Technically we should go there, but not everyone does. If your heart stops outside an emergency unit, your survival chances can be only 50%. Even if you do survive, your quality of life post cardiac arrest is dependent entirely upon the standard of care received at the time.

At Basildon cardiac patients all benefit from good teamwork, all the latest techniques and equipment, with state of the art imaging as well as a new treatment called therapeutic hypothermia. This involves rapidly cooling the patient, before an artery is opened by the cardiology team. Most patients remember nothing about their treatment, waking up quite literally when it is all over.

A few years ago, Basildon had such a poor rating by the Health Regulator, that is was the place where nobody wanted to go. The hospital is now rated good or outstanding in all eight clinical areas. Cardiology is one of those classified as outstanding.

It seems like common sense to me, but what happens if you arrive unconscious in a hospital, is not clear. You would hardly be able to give your permission then, and it is highly possible that your relatives are nowhere around either. There are flaws in this, but it is a start.

British Weather Spoils the Party



Seasonal Advice



Gordon Blue Review: Hopley's Cafe, Much Hadham – 5 stars

When people come to visit and you want to show them something different, Hopley's in the quaint village of Much Hadham is, in Gordon Bleu's view, the perfect choice - especially if you happen to go on a warm summer afternoon. The landscaped garden is a simple but pleasant stroll even if you still don't quite escape the hum of Ryanair planes, whilst the nearby nursey sells a range of reasonably-priced good quality plants that, combined with the excellent café, makes Hopley's a firm favourite.



On this occasion we find ourselves focusing on our stomachs and the four in this party decide to head straight for the café – a good idea given that it ensured all the freshly cooked food was still available – unlike previous visits when its popularity had got the better of us. As it was a warm day, the range of quiches, salads and sandwiches usually on display inside had been removed to protect them – a shame in some ways because one of the joys of this place is to admire (and drool) at the choice on offer. And what a choice it is. All food is freshly cooked in the morning before the café opens and it shows. The quiches are my particular favourite with typically thin and crispy pastry and good chunks of filling that allow you to properly taste it rather than inferior products which focus on an eggy filling of nothingness. I opted for the smoked haddock and spinach and wasn't disappointed – also because the salad accompaniment contained, as usual, at least 6 different individually prepared

versions that cried out to be eaten. The sandwich options contain some standard fillings as well as some you wouldn't normally see, with a salt-beef offering being crammed full of succulent meat. Other main courses are also available which tends to make choosing all the more difficult.




A licence allows all of this to be washed down with a limited and relatively pricey range of ales, cider and wine (hic)and all of us agreed we were too full to entertain dessert on this occasion – a shame given that the range of homemade cakes really does follow the quality of the main courses. Service is attentive, friendly and chatty but then what else would you expect from this place?

If you do overindulge at Hopley's the beautiful gardens are the perfect place to wander round and tell yourself you're burning off that extra slice of cake or the generous portion of quiche. Furthermore sitting outside by the gardens offers the perfect respite for parents who can grab a bite in the cafe whilst their children burn off a little excess energy in the gardens.

I really shouldn't rave about Hopley's too much, lest the popularity become too great that I have to wait for a table in the future (though you can reserve), but you simply must go – especially as the café is not open all year round (it opens from March and will soon close for hibernation). When compared to the standard and seemingly mass-produced food encountered in other local establishments it is a joy to eat at a venue that takes the quality of its food so seriously.

Balearics, Dublin, Edinburgh and Rome top the favorites list as Stansted Airport welcomes over 2.3 million passengers in July

Stansted has released highlights of the traffic figures from last month's which show the upward trajectory continues despite economic uncertainty. Ryanair has since announced that Brexit will see them flying 5 million fewer flights next year, so perhaps this upward trend will be reversed to the benefit of many, but to the economic detriment of others. In the meantime:

- 2.3 million passengers used London Stansted in July 2016, up 6.6% on the same month last year.
- Rolling annual total rose to 23.6 million, an increase of 8.4% over the previous 12 months.
- July 28, 2016, was the runway's busiest day since October 2008 with 583 flights.
- Balearics, Dublin, Edinburgh and Rome top the favourites list for July.
- Long haul destinations to Orlando and Cancun prove a big hit with families.
- Cargo volumes for the last 12 months increased to 248,085 tonnes up 6.4%

Commenting on the latest figures Stansted's MD Andrew Cowan, said: "The beginning of the school holidays helped boost Stansted's traffic to over 2.3million passengers, while load factors averaged 91.8%, another record for the month of July at Stansted. The rolling annual total now stands at 23.6 million passengers as we close in on our all-time high of 24 million. The month also saw the airport record its busiest day for aircraft movements on the runway since October 2008.

""Western Mediterranean destinations, particularly Majorca and Ibiza continue to top the favorites list with holidaymakers while Orlando and Cancun operated by Thomson and Thomas Cook, proved a big hit with families looking to try out the new long haul offer from Stansted. There was also a rising demand in domestic traffic as Brits jetted off for a summer staycation in Ireland and Scotland.

"The volume of cargo handled continued to increase with the rolling annual total up 6.4% to 248,085. 20,820 tonnes was transported through in July alone including 34 of the world's top equestrian horses bound for the Rio 2016 Olympic

Abellio awarded new £1.4 billion East Anglia rail franchise deal

After fierce competition and a long bidding process the decision was made last month to remain with the Dutch firm, who have been running the line since 2012. Worth £1.4 billion the new deal will run until 2025, with the service being renamed 'Abellio East Anglia'

In order to support the bid, Abellio made a number of promises, which if fulfilled should help Birchanger residents who commute into the big smoke every day.

- At least four 90-minute services (2 in each direction) between London and Norwich each weekday and two 60-minute services per day between London and Ipswich
- Free Wi-Fi for all passengers on trains and at stations
- 1,043 new, state of the art carriages between January 2019 and September 2020 to support the faster timetable, with a full programme of refurbishment for the current fleet in the meantime
- Automatic 'delay repay' for season and advance purchase tickets
- Tough new targets for operational performance levels at 93% up from 89.7% currently
- A host of new ticketing initiatives, starting in October 2017, including new offers for part time users and those who don't travel every day

Greater Anglia say the new deal is good news for commuters.

"This is great news not only for Abellio but for the whole of East Anglia," Managing Director of Abellio UK Dominic Booth said.

"We are pleased to become the preferred bidder to deliver a transformation in rail services across the region.

"Our plans will greatly improve our customers' experience with faster and more reliable journeys on new trains with higher frequencies and reduced journey times, to support the socio-economic well-being of one of the country's most successful and fastest growing areas."





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
