A letter From the Editor


Hear ye, Hear ye, hear Hear ye!

Before modern media and newspapers, a town crier, or bellman was employed as an officer of the court and made public pronouncements. In Medieval England, town criers were the chief means of news communication with the townspeople, since many were illiterate in a period before the moveable type was invented. We have come a long way since then. However, with the arrival of the supermarket, Internet and online shopping, electronic media and E- mail we have seen the gradual demise of the village infrastructure and in recent years this has caused a steady decline in village schools shops, post offices, pubs, local amenities and services. This has in turn reduced meeting places and communication among villagers.

The Birchanger Magazine is a local newspaper distributed free to almost four hundred homes and the seven hundred & thirty adult residents of Birchanger and since its single page beginning, seventeen years ago, the publication has been produced and distributed entirely by volunteers, whereby the only costs incurred are for printing.





And it does take some getting used to as well! Right now the builders are still around, the new Co-op has opened its doors but the pharmacy at the time of writing is not finished yet and if you are not careful you will end up there or in the Co-op, as all the doors are so close together. For me the first hurdle was the car park. Staff parking places abound but most of them were empty. The bulk of the cars are parked at the far end where there are far less non- reserved spaces available for the public or patients. Looking at the layout, it would appear that staff will outnumber patients by two to one. Surely this cannot be right? I thought there was a general shortage of GPs and nurses?

Having negotiated the car park, and finally opened the right door, I am confronted by a bland "good taste" magnolia interior, a sign which tells me that the surgery is on the first floor and the choice of lift or stairs. Three flights of stairs later I arrive gasping on the so called first floor and a large spacious beige layout. They keep saying we must take more exercise, but what with the walk from the end of the car park and the stairs, I don't think I need that advice right now. The check-in machine is still there, which was just as well as the receptionist was not, and then it was the usual wait in a modern, but still uncomfortable chair

There is no call system; a loud ping sound alerts you to a board where a name appears with an instruction for the name concerned to go to a room number.

The surgery is modern, bland, and just like any government building anywhere. By the time my name finally appeared, I had mentally repainted the walls, changed the magazines and relaxed in an comfortable modern chair! Yes the surgery is long awaited, functional, clean, and very, very dull. It is new, large and will perhaps attract the new young GPs the Practice so badly needs.

We need the doctors and hopefully after the trauma of moving it will all settle down and the long awaited new surgery will become a very much valued part of the community. In the meantime, I shall spend my waiting time there re-designing the decor, selecting pictures, blinds and fabrics. It is probably the best ever way to keep the patients quiet in the long waiting times ahead. The magazines by the way are not to be relied upon!



Parochial Church




How do you think people see you, or how would you like to be seen?

Shame over airport evictions

Shameful behaviour over evictions

Stansted Airport's decision to give two months' notice of eviction to 11 families renting airport-owned houses was described by Stop Stansted Expansion as "shameful behaviour." At the beginning of November, Manchester Airports Group (MAG), Stansted's owners, suddenly announced that it wanted to sell off its entire housing stock of 268 properties within two years. MAG acquired these 268 houses when it bought Stansted Airport from BAA in January 2013.

In response to the airport's attempts to blame SSE and local councillors for the eviction notices, **Brian Ross**, deputy chairman of SSE stated: "It's a desperate attempt by Stansted Airport to avoid taking responsibility for its own shameful behaviour." The houses were mainly bought by the airport in connection with its plans for a second runway, which were abandoned in May 2010 after massive opposition. "For years, any tenant who wanted to buy was met with a refusal. However, there has now been a complete change of policy," said Brian Ross.

No more quit notices before Christmas, says airport

Facing widespread condemnation in the media and from the local community over its eviction policy, Stansted Airport suddenly announced that it would stop issuing eviction notices for the time being. This followed the setting up of an 'Airport Tenants Action Group' when around 70 airport tenants attended a public meeting in Broxted to consider what they might be able to do to persuade Stansted Airport to adopt a more reasonable approach. Councillor Julie Redfern, Uttlesford District Council's housing lead, attended the meeting and said that the council only became aware of the issue when the Essex County Councillor for the area, was knocking on doors on unrelated issues.

The Airports Tenants Action Group issued a statement, saying, "Why is MAG destroying the local communities yet again and in such a rush to do so?" They said that the airport's action might be legal but it was morally wrong and a shortage of properties made it very hard to find alternative accommodation. Some tenants say that they were offered the option to purchase their properties but were given less than two weeks to provide evidence as to how they would finance the purchase.

Increase in planes over towns and villages is 'a disaster'

Residents in parts of Uttlesford have been left angered by changes to Stansted Airport's flight path which has resulted in a vast increase of planes passing over their heads during the day, according to the Saffron Walden Reporter and Dunmow Broadcast. Noise from the re-routing of flights taking off from Stansted, introduced in February, has adversely affected many towns and villages, including Dunmow, Felsted, Stebbing, Hatfield Heath and the Easters. Residents say the increased air traffic is "turning a peaceful part of Essex into a disaster". National Air Traffic Services (NATS) implemented the changes to flight paths after a 12-week consultation in 2014, despite 85% of those who responded to the consultation, including Uttlesford District Council and Stop Stansted Expansion, objecting to the NATS proposals. Unsurprisingly, the number of noise complaints caused by flights in and out of Stansted nearly doubled in the first six months of 2016 compared to last year. There is still a degree of hope that these changes could be reversed when they are reviewed by National Air Traffic Services (NATS) early next year. "The message is, do not give up on complaining when you are annoyed by aircraft noise, or give in to complaints fatigue. Otherwise the aviation industry will think the problem has gone away," says Martin Peachey, SSE's adviser on noise.

New Arrivals Building for Stansted

Stansted Airport has submitted a planning application for a new arrivals building sandwiched between the main terminal and the Radisson Hotel. It was originally intended to extend the main terminal building by a further two double bays to fill that space but Manchester Airports Group (MAG), who now own Stansted Airport, have opted instead for a separate arrivals building. Subject to the relevant planning consents and approvals, it is expected the new £130 million arrivals building will take up to three years to complete.

The new building will enable Stansted to grow from today's throughput of 24 million passengers per annum (mppa) to 35 mppa in line with the planning permission granted in 2008. MAG says that the new arrivals building would also enable Stansted to grow beyond 35 mppa and make full use of its runway which is capable of handling around 43 mppa. However, a further planning application would need to be submitted and approved before Stansted could grow beyond 35mppa.

A Good time for a walk

This is a great time of year to walk off the Christmas excesses and enjoy our unique part of the country. With crisp, bright days, we can all enjoy the countryside in its winter clothes. One essential I would recommend is an Ordnance Survey map, ideally the orange Explorer map which has a scale of 1 to 25,000 and shows many detailed features including footpaths and field boundaries. They can be purchased from good stationers or online from www.ordnancesurvey.co.uk/leisure. Investment in a good pair of walking boots, probably for less than £100, will be paid back over many years and hundreds of miles, especially if you look after them. Our area has an extensive network of generally well-maintained public rights of way – footpaths for walkers and bridleways that may also be used by horse riders and cyclists. Do try out new routes, planning before you set off. Bear in mind that a path that runs beside a field edge is less likely to get muddy than one that crosses a field. Plan your route so that the sun follows you. This is good practice at any time of the year, but especially so in winter with the low sun. For a lengthy, circular walk, try to start near the southeast corner and head clockwise. The sun will follow you, keeping the glare from your eyes and giving you the best views. Most of the walks on the Hundred Parishes website follow this principle. Finally, be sure to wrap up warm with double-thickness woolly hat and gloves, a scarf and layers of clothing . . . and enjoy!
