### Scott Taylor dies suddenly aged 59

**Scott Taylor** unexpectedly passed away peacefully amongst friends at Harlow's Princes Alexander's Hospital late afternoon on the 2<sup>nd</sup> February after a short illness, pneumonia and subsequent heart attack.

#### My very good friend (by Eddie Gilbey)

Scott was born in Bishops Stortford and attended Leventhorpe School where he met his lifelong friends Bob Warwick and Paul Rumble. Scott's family moved to Duck End in 1973 and in 1976 Scott and his friends took a holiday in Cornwall. Whilst he was there, Scott aged 18, broke his neck diving into the sea. He was airlifted to Stoke Mandeville where he underwent rehabilitation as a quadriplegic casualty. During his time there he actually met Jimmy Saville of whom he said; "He was very polite and sociable but gave me the creeps!" Whilst Scott was recovering in hospital, his parents Gerry and Dot prepared and adapted the family home for a soon to arrive newly disabled resident!

#### Back to work

After his stay in hospital and despite having to get used to using a wheelchair for the rest of his life, Scott went back to work and also developed an interest in Bonsai trees which he cultivated with yet another long term friend, Graham Baker. In all this time, even up to his untimely death, Scott kept his sense of humour and his close cadre of friends. Scott made friends easily so I won't attempt to list them as there are too many to mention. However, everyone that knew him always found him a sociable, generous, funny and cheerful person who often joked about his life in a wheel chair!

In 1994 Sue and I moved into 3 Duck End as neighbours and we struck up an immediate friendship with Scott and his parents.

#### Part of the family

He became practically a part of the family and we shared all manner of social activities together, from barbeques to Christmas lunch, shopping trips, village events, not forgetting the Three Willows pub and the Sports and Social Club! Sadly in early 2002 Scott's father Gerry died suddenly at home, his wife Dot was suffering from dementia and had to move to a care home where she lived until 2009. In the meantime Scott received the services of 24/7 live in carers. He also received visits from a whole plethora of nurses and domiciliary carers all of whom he befriended. Scott enjoyed an active social life. He became a sponsor for Bishops Stortford Football club and attended matches with Rick Hayward and the late Trevor Sage, amongst others.



Scott was a regular in the Three Willows and had a large group of cronies at the club who he met on several days each week. He liked a tipple and certainly Sauvignon Blanc sales in the village will never be quite the same again!

#### **Scott defied the Doctors**

While he was at Stoke Mandeville Scott was told he might, with luck, live into his forties. However, with his love of life and expert help from his doctors, nurses and carers he has surpassed all scientific medical expectations and reached 59 last July. Keeping in good health wasn't always easy for him and in more recent times Scott's health had begun to deteriorate. Even so, his recent admission to hospital was unexpected and his death was a shock. He will be sorely missed by me and by all who knew and loved him.

#### Funeral at Harlow Crematorium

Scott had requested a humanist funeral which will be held at 12.15 on the 3<sup>rd</sup> of March at Harlow Crematorium and afterwards there will be a celebration of his life at Birchanger Sports and Social Club. RIP



#### **Don't Trust the Receptionist**

In July 2015 there was a court case brought against Croydon Health Services NHS Trust which at the time of writing still has to be resolved, whereby a receptionist at a casualty unit told a would be patient that there would be at least a five hour wait before anyone could see him. The patient decided not to wait and left after only 19 minutes, despite the fact that he had a severe head injury. That was a very bad decision on his part. He was returned a short while later to the hospital in an ambulance, unconscious. Brain surgery did not save him from subsequent brain damage. He took the hospital to court, but the court ruled that the receptionist is not a medically trained member of staff, and he should not have taken her word for it. She should have explained that everyone is expected to be seen by a triage nurse on arrival at the hospital, but she failed to do so on this occasion. Despite this, the court ruled in favour of the hospital. The case has been taken to appeal and the result at the time of writing has not been made public. So the moral of the story is; if you do need to go to casualty, wait for the triage nurse. She will assess you and estimate how long you may have to wait before seeing a doctor (if not ask!). The waiting time is not set in stone however as other seriously injured patients may arrive and need more urgent attention. The triage nurse is a highly trained professional, and you will know more after she has assessed you.

#### One way of reducing the waiting lists

Recently I wrote about having to chase overdue follow up appointments at the local hospital. It now seems that the booking staff are doing their best to reduce the waiting lists by taking it upon themselves to discharge long standing patients. This is according to one of the specialists involved. If you are waiting for that overdue appointment make it yourself. You will get one and be seen, eventually.

#### Scammers developing new tricks!

The first one concerns banks. The scammers will send you a letter on what appears to be genuine bank notepaper. It will tell you that there has been unusual activity on your account and gives you a number to call. Whatever you do, do not call this number. If you do, you will be asked very convincingly to provide all your personal details, including your security code, and very soon there will be unwanted unusual activity on your account. Instead, call your bank's telephone number, or visit the bank in person. Never call the number which the potential scammers may give you to call at any time!

Your Internet Provider will rarely call you unless they want to sell you something they only ask for your date of birth and first line of your address. However, scammers will call claiming to be your provider, telling you that your account has been compromised. They will ask you to confirm your personal details, account details or even your account number. Refuse to give any information and contact you provider using the original introduction letter or contract, alternatively go online to their website and use the contact number or email there to check.

There are others who claim to be able to reduce your council tax but want your card details first. Never give it to them. If you think you are paying too much council tax, you can find this out for yourself by calling the Valuation Office Agency on 0300 050 1501, who will advise you on how to make a banding appeal for free.

There are a whole new host of telephone sales scams today. There is the extended warranty scam; the caller take a very easy chance on the fact that you have white goods, computers and televisions in your home. They will offer a cut price but non-existent extended warranty for a reduced sum. They even provide the bogus warranty, which of course is totally useless but then what happens to your bank account? Then there is the telephone preference fraud. The fraudster claims to be from the 'Telephone Preference Service' and offers you a special telephone preference service at a 'reasonable' cost. Wait, this is not necessary! The real "Telephone Preference Service" is free so never respond to someone who claims to be calling from a government backed agency. Also, the government will never phone you regarding a pension review. Other scammers claim that you have speeding tickets and that they are from the intelligence unit or a variety of police and government departments. They will all ask for your personal details and even your bank or card details in order to pay for the fine. Whatever you do, do not give them any information or call any phone number at their request. If you do get such strange calls or are contacted in any other way; by email, post or a by personal visit, politely refuse and immediately contact Action Fraud on 0300 123 2040. These people are being caught but only with your help.

#### Consultation on night flights

Birchanger made representations on night flights but it is a very small voice compared to those of big business. Since Manston Airport in Kent closed in 2016, there have been a great deal more heavy cargo planes flying into Stansted which have disturbed many residents in the southern end of the village. Stansted Airport would like to lose all night time restrictions, which would be a huge disbenefit to all those living close to the runways. Most of us are only too well aware that this cuts little ice with the MAG Group. Stop Stansted Expansion (SSE) are doing their best to reject night flying and we can only hope that the government takes some notice of us. Ryanair and Easy Jet would far rather they did not; they would happily fly all night!

#### Just how good is our policing?

Recent events in Birchanger have shown just how efficient our police can be in dealing with criminal activity in our area. In every case they have been very efficient in their response. However, this may not be the case when a burglary is reported locally and another crime is reported at the same time in another area. Fortunately for the Police (and us) no other requests for their help were received during the same time period. The greatly reduced officer team had to cover most of Uttlesford District on their shift, what would have happened if there had been another call is unclear. The team were fully engaged on each occasion and to break off and attend events elsewhere was not a realistic option. This is a situation which most of us of non-criminal intent find unacceptable. Family support after the event and subsequent information seems to be woefully lacking as well. Effectively this means that someone hoping to pull off a major heist has only to divert police attention elsewhere to have a clear run. Not an acceptable situation, especially as so many have found it difficult to obtain police attention when they have been burgled.

It makes you wonder why the crime figures are down, possibly because so many disillusioned residents simply do not bother to report any event, unless they intend to make an insurance claim and need a crime number. Is this really acceptable? The police station at Saffron Walden has closed but there is a small team based at the District Council Offices in Saffron Walden, so if you need to see a policeman that is where you need to go.

#### Local plan update

It seems that Uttlesford District Council have had to revise their first new local plan proposals. According to a lot of people they did not get it right at all but then any local plan by reason of its imposition of an awful lot of houses in certain areas is very unlikely to please anyone living in the area where the houses are to be imposed. Whoever did not like the first proposals may well have got their way as the plan is to re-emerge in amended form. Anyway, sadly this petulant local plan is not dead, and we are all going to have the opportunity to comment on it this summer. That is, of course, if they remember to tell us in advance where these consultations are going to be. Many people missed it last time as they had no information that it was happening, so Uttlesford District Council could well have been under the illusion we liked it and had no comments to make. One way of running a consultation to get the 'right' result I suppose.


#### **Birchanger Art Show returns**




# Birchanger Primary School



#### **Book Week**

#### **Missed Bins**

There have been several reports of missed rubbish bins of all types in recent weeks. Bins are missed for a variety of reasons. Sometimes because the bin has not been put out so that it is clearly visible, or the collection vehicle was simply too full and had to return to the refuse dumping point and could not return through lack of time. Occasionally, you might simply have been forgotten. In all these cases, leave the bin out and call Uttlesford District Council on 01799510510 and report your missed bin. Leave it just where it is. It may take a few days, or a reminder phone call, but it will be collected eventually.

Sometimes it is because the bin contains incorrect material. Usually a note will be left explaining why the rubbish failed to be collected, in which case the keeper of the bin will have to dispose of the contents themselves. The Council will not pick up your bin if a notice has been issued, as some have found to their cost.

#### Fourth year for the BAGS

Birchanger All-Girls Society, BAGS, recently held its AGM as it entered its fourth year. Some new committee members were elected, Michelle May stood down as chair after two years of sterling work, and Liza Clarke stepped up to take the reins.

BAGS members enjoyed a wide range of activities last year. These included quizzes, talks, ceramic painting, a ramble (ending at a pub), a cheese and wine evening, and several socials. The plans for 2017 are not complete, but it already looks as if this year will be even better than the last. 

#### Do you smell gas?

It seems quite a number of people walking their dogs around Birchanger have smelt gas in or close to Birchanger woods, the side nearest the fields opposite the A120 bypass and adjacent to the grain store. This was reported to the National Grid some weeks ago and engineers have recently visited the site with their measuring instruments and after some days searching found three possible leakage sites. There is no major danger to the public and the National Grid is taking the appropriate action to repair leaky pipes.

#### What is Mothering Sunday?

Mothering Sunday (commonly known as Mothers' Day in Britain) has its origins centuries ago in the pre-Reformation Laetare Sunday (the third Sunday of Lent) which was the day to visit the mother church or cathedral. Some customs of the day outlived the Reformation and by the 17<sup>th</sup> century these included making a simnel cake and taking it to mother. In the 19th century children in service, particularly girls, were allowed a day's leave to visit their mothers.

In 1920 the Anglican Constance Smith published a booklet "The Revival of Mothering Sunday" in an attempt to revitalise the day with the idea that Mothering Sunday should not be limited to one Christian denomination. Its popularity rapidly spread through such open organisations as the Boy Scouts and Girls Guides, impelled by feelings consequent on the loss by many mothers of their sons in the First World War. Cordelia Moyse, the modern historian of the Mothers' Union wrote; "by 1938, it was claimed that Mothering Sunday was celebrated in every parish in Britain and in every country of the Empire."

At St Mary's, as in many churches, Mothering Sunday is celebrated by handing out posies of spring flowers to the mothers (and grandmothers) in the congregation by the children at the service. So please come along, bring your children and celebrate this ancient festival with us on 26 March at 11.00 am.

# Birchanger Wood

Our ancient woodland originates

from the 12th century when it was recorded as "Bircehangra" which means, "Wooded slope growing with Birch trees". Today besides the short-lived, shallow rooted birch trees, Birchanger Wood chiefly comprises the heavier traditional woodland trees. These are slower growing and deep-rooted ash, oak, Spanish chestnut, beech, and of course our recently planted group of Dutch elm disease-resistant, elm trees. There are also the lighter weight trees, the hazel and hornbeam. All trees can be coppiced (cut down leaving a stump and allowing the shoots to re-grow



from that main stump) and traditionally this carried out so that timber could be used locally because the weight and size of cut wood meant that transportation costs expensive difficult. Depending upon the quality and texture of the wood it would be used for furniture, buildings, fencing, provide industrial charcoal for the smelting of iron, and bark,

from which tanning liquors were prepared. Coppicing today is continued to keep mainly the smaller trees down to a reasonable height and to save their branches from growing long and heavy and break off causing possible damage and allowing disease to enter the tree. In Birchanger Wood during March; listen for the cheeping of the first baby nestlings, look for the first bud-burst usually from the blackthorn (the sloe bush), and the hawthorn, check the first rustlings of a hedgehog and remember, we have now released several rehabilitated hedgehogs into the Wood. Of course life in a woodland depends on the weather and the warmth of the temperature - the ash can bud-burst in March,

the oak can also budburst in March but it is usually much later, even waiting until May in some years. Phenology is the study of



the timing of natural events in relation to weather and climate. Best of all, just enjoy a good walk or ramble in our ancient local woodland on our super paths.

#### Bishops Stortford & District Footpath Association is 60 years old in March

BSDFA walks and other historic documentation which have been stored and collected over the last 60 years have been placed on display by kind permission of the Bishop's Stortford Museum at the Rhodes Centre and will be available to view after the AGM on the 18th March for a period of two weeks.

To further celebrate this amazing 60 years of our existence, you are invited to join our Anniversary Walk on Sunday 19<sup>th</sup> March. We will gather in the Nags Head pub car park, Dunmow Road, CM23 5HP and depart at 10.00am. The walk will follow closely to the very first walk included in the 1960 BSDFA booklet of walks. Most of the route is fine but you will need walking boots to negotiate some short muddy

sections and several stiles. The route encompasses the following landmarks:

The Nags Head: This is the beautiful eclectic art deco pub sign. The pub is distinctively individual, and unashamedly art deco circa 1936, by the architect Ernest Brander Musman (1888-1972).





The Hop Poles: Situated on the edge of Hatfield Forest at Bedlars Green this pub has been in existence for some time. In a census of 1840 it was listed as a a beer-sellers and blacksmiths, and held by the Griffin family.

Hops at that time were grown on the nearby Harps Farm and at Hallingbury Hall Farm.

Bedlars Green: The telephone box is a series K6 designed in 1935 to commemorate the silver jubilee of King George V, sometimes referred to as the "Jubilee" kiosk, and it went into production in 1936. The



the post box carries the insignia of King George VI whose reign commenced December 1936.

#### The Rooks are nesting!

At this time of the year, twiggy platforms appear in the leafless canopy of tall trees. These bundles of sticks are the



nests of rooks. Each pair will gather twigs from tree top branches to create a sturdy nest ready to receive the three to five eggs which are laid in

late February or early March. The young hatch about sixteen days later and will fledge in just under five weeks. Rooks forage for earthworms and other invertebrates in fields but those living on the edges of settlements will scavenge in car parks for discarded takeaways. The black feathers of rooks glint a bluish purple in the sunlight and they are distinguished from other members of the crow family by the grey-white skin round the base of their beaks and their baggy feather trousers or plus fours. On the ground their walk is somewhat sedate, but once airborne they enjoy freewheeling in the March winds, often gathering in large flocks alongside crows and jackdaws in an aerobatic display. Ringing records have shown that they can live for at least 20 years and they have a strong affinity for family groups. Collectively called a 'clamour' or a 'parliament', rooks are a gregarious species communicating with a variety of harsh calls.

There may be as many as 1.4 million pairs in the British Isles. The majority of colonies are found in rural areas although within the Hundred Parishes there are some still to be found in the outskirts of smaller towns. They seem to favour ash, beech, oak and sycamore trees or, more rarely, Scot's pine. For more info on the Hundred Parishes contact Tricia Moxey at; www.hundredparishes.org.uk
