After a cold, wet and windy winter, there is nothing better than watching forest leaves unfolding and flowers blossoming to a mass of glorious colour in the tepid warmth of the sun. The woods around Birchanger in Spring are no exception as the pre-spring photo above shows. Birchanger wood is around 2000 years old and consists of 69 acres of ancient coppiced woodland including; Hornbeam, Hazel, Ash, Birch, Oak, Sweet Chestnut, Cherry, Holly, and a wide range of flora including English Bluebells, Wood Anemones and Golden Saxifrages. It even has a stream flowing through it. So if you haven't already done so, get your walking shoes on and take a walk around nature's playground. You wont regret it!

The 'Birchanger Hedgehogs'

No, its not a new football team! But you may have heard about the hedgehogs in the Birchanger Wood Compound. Their wooden hut is specially designed and inside it has a separate sleeping area, which has to be regularly cleaned and refilled with suitable bedding material. The hut itself is directly connected to a large natural outside run. Hedgehogs have always lived in Birchanger Wood but as with other swathes of our countryside and in many back-gardens, the population has seen a sharp decline over the last 10 years.

As part of the Birchanger Wood Trust's commitment to improving the biodiversity of Birchanger Wood, our warden contacted the Herts Hogline, the local hedgehog rescue centre, to see if our ancient woodland could be repopulated. So in conjunction with Herts Hogline, a purpose-built 'forever' home was installed into a quiet corner of the Birchanger Wood Compound. Working with Hogline, several underweight hedgehogs which would not make it through the winter hibernation without assistance, were placed into this secure environment and were fed and looked after, every day.

In Spring, when these hedgehogs achieved the necessary weightgain, they were released into Birchanger wood.

In addition to underweight animals received from Hogline, there are now two



disabled hedgehogs, which can never be returned to the wild, owing to the loss of a limb or an eye, as they would be unable to forage properly and in consequence would be vulnerable to predators.

Hut & Run

These hedgehogs will remain in their 'hut and run' in the Birchanger Wood compound. They will hibernate there and never be released. Hedgehogs are wild animals and they hibernate over winter. They are not pets! They are nocturnal and should not be disturbed during the day. Indeed, handling them can cause a great deal of distress and can cause health issues. Hedgehogs that are temporary residents, that is those due for release in Spring, must not become tame, as they need to be afraid of humans so they can survive in the wild. The Trust is indebted to Herts Hogline and to all those local residents who regularly leave tinned dog and cat food for their meals. Super-meat, or meat in jelly are fine but please NO gravy and NO fishy meals. Cat nuts are also great but again, please, NO fish based ones. The food collection point is in the Birchanger Wood compound. The Trust is also indebted to the local shopkeeper at Snowley Parade who regularly donates income he receives from sales of poly-shopping-bags. Letters to the Editor

Dear Ed,

I may be able to shed a little light on the hall discussion. My maternal family has roots back to the mid 18th century in the village and my grandmother and mother were very much at the centre of the community in their time. The hall was built in the early 1930's on land owned then by the church and the church contributed financially to the construction of the building and managed the hall directly through the years appointing a manager to oversee its daily function. My Dad met Mum at the hall on New Year's Eve in 1941; they got married in the Church and had their reception at the hall in June 1942. They also had parties for their 50th and 60th wedding anniversaries in the same hall, so it has a very special place in our family history. My father was the manager for about ten years overseeing new flooring and replacement windows in the 1970's. As far as I remember, the title of the hall always had the word church in it. Of course over time the important fact is that it is a community asset used and enjoyed by the whole community. I hope this helps a little in understanding its roots if not its status in the village.

Dear Ed,

The following extracts were obtained from the Birchanger Village Archive. The authors are; Jenny Gardner (the former village historian), John Gibb (from his 'Birchanger a Village History') and finally from Ruth Clewer's School exercise books dated October 5th 1935 who was 11 years old at the time.

'On May 28th, 1934, at a PCC Meeting, the Rev B J Meeres, Rector (1931-6) proposed the building of a church hall. A subsequent meeting in September decided to accept an estimate of £600 for its erection, which took place the following year. It is situated across the road to the North East of the Old Rectory on land given to the Church by the Harrison family of Birchanger Place. In 1935, the Chester family generously donated a plot of land to the church for a hall for the benefit of the village. Part of the funding for the subsequent building of the Church Hall came from the sale of the old Parish Room which became, and remained a private house until 2004 when it too was finally demolished'. 'There is the new Church hall which has been built just lately and it is very attractive. It has been erected on a piece of ground just a little way from the Church. It was put up by private subscriptions. It has a roof made from cedar shingles which makes it look very nice and the room itself has a firm foundation and the caretaker is Mrs Banks'.

Historically the Birchanger Church Hall is what it says it is, notwithstanding the function of the building as a village social venue makes people think of it as "The Village Hall". It must be clear however that the hall's very existence is a result of a church initiative at a time when the church was the pre-eminent authority in the village.

There is an obvious contradiction in the two adult accounts, so it's important to point out that the Harrison, Chester and Nash Families as well as the Gilbey's and Gold's were much entwined by marriage and all were involved with the Church. So I am not at all sure who wrote the cheque to pay for the construction. The hall has always been administered, maintained and managed by people associated with the church and last year's floods are a good example of this.

It is not really relevant what the residents of surrounding villages call their social spaces. History says Birchanger has a Church Hall. Personally I don't mind what other people call it. Perhaps we should have a local referendum, we could call it "Chexit"! *Eddie Gilbey, Birchanger*

Is the humble shed a man's best friend?

How many of us have men in our lives that spend a great deal of their time in a shed or a garage? They are there for hours in all weathers and most of us have very little idea of what they are actually doing there. Well whatever it is, it is apparently very good for them. So much so in fact, that the health benefits of sheds have been recognised, and the second 'community shed' in the District has just been opened in Barnston. Even if they



shed their own at home. our men seem to think it is better excuse than the pub for going out these

first 'Men's Community Shed' in Little Canfield is very well used. Men have come together there to work on their own, or with others on small community projects. They get to make new friends and they find people they can confide in. Newcomers feel quickly at their ease. The facts are there, men seem to find the ageing process more difficult than women. They are more likely to suffer from social deprivation; they miss friends at work and seem to find it hard to make new ones. One in five men die before reaching 65, while two in five die before reaching 75. Men are far more likely to unload while working alongside other men in an informal and non- pressurised situation. The sheds are places where new friends can be made. Expect to see more Men Sheds around the district as funds allow.

Bringing empty homes back to life

It is some time since we had badly deteriorating empty homes in Birchanger. Nowadays most empty homes are either sold, being renovated, or are available to rent. There is a new scheme whereby the council offers grants to bring up the standard of empty homes so that they can be brought back to life again.

Council's zero tolerance on dog fouling

Uttlesford District Council is getting very tough on dog fouling and a great many people here in Birchanger would agree with this line. There is still far too much of this happening. The fine for failing to

clear up after your dog is now £75 and this could rise to some £1000 if you do not pay up immediately and are taken to court. Birchanger Parish Council is in the process of installing three new dog bins. This will makes things easier for the dog walking population and harder to find an excuse for fouling the



countryside. Good news for dogs and pedestrians alike. Therefore, the options are clear. Take a poo bag or risk £75 when you walk the dog. It's really a no boner!

Our sewage system under stress

It seems that in Birchanger a great many of us are putting the wrong things down our loos throughout the village. They are certainly very good at doing this in the Travelodge, whereby tankers had to visit the sewage pumping station for days on end earlier this year dealing with the waste from the hotel. And that was not the end of the matter, the main sewage pipe in the lane blocked and backed up as well, causing raw sewage to flood into several houses, endangering health and causing a stink.

The main culprits in this are ourselves; we are simply putting the wrong things down the loo. Nappy wipes and wet wipes simply do not biodegrade in our sewage system. Neither do some types of kitchen roll and sanitary items. Disposable items are a definite no no and yet all of these items have been found in our sewage system. It doesn't take long for sewage to build up in the system and once a blockage has started it quickly floods first the lower lying houses and gradually works its way upwards. Unfortunately for them, they are exceptionally stupid and their victims extremely brave, and most times they have been disturbed and sent packing just at the sight of the householder. If you do find a stranger in your home, the chances are, they will run as soon as they are rumbled. They will probably only take items they can easily access and carry, so keep



valuable items out of sight or better still hidden away. Make a great deal of noise. They will most likely run before they take

anything and then call the police as soon as possible. Try to remember what they looked like. Write it down. Everything you can remember as well. These shysters are living somewhere. The curse of abandoned vehicles

Uttlesford District Council and ask for the 'Enforcement team'. You will be asked for the vehicle's details and why you suspect that the vehicle might have been abandoned. If it is suspected that this is an abandoned vehicle, the team will try to contact the owner, visit the site, and place a removal notice on the vehicle. If the vehicle is not removed, it will be collected and destroyed by the council. All the costs of this will have to be met by the last registered keeper. So be careful just who you sell your car to. It could be costly!

Parish Records

Did you know that there is a wealth of old Birchanger records, stories and photographs which have been kept over many years in various houses in the village. At the moment Ken and Rosemary Wheatley host the collection.

The records are in good order and span several decades. You can learn a great deal about the history of your house and how it has changed through the decades. You might find pictures of long forgotten former residents and pictures of the village from the last 150 years.

Illegal immigrants tracked

We all are very aware of health tourism, but although we don't seem to be able to stop those who just come and go, we can use it to catch illegal immigrants. Apparently details of names and addresses have been passed on by concerned citizens to the relevant authorities and many have been apprehended in this way.

In future, there will also be new government regulations requiring all hospitals to check up front whether patients are eligible or not for free NHS treatment. Several legal Syrian refugees are already here in Uttlesford who are welcome and settling into their new community very well.

Feeling the cost of winter

This is the month when the dreaded winter fuel bills start to come in. For most of us this is never good news. The cost of heating seems to go up so much every year. If your home is poorly insulated, or if your existing insulation needs updating, now is a good time to be considering this.

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Health Matters

A&E or the local GP Surgery?

Years ago, nobody would have gone to casualty with a simple dose of flu. Nowadays there are just too many people turning up at hospital A&E departments when they have a sore throat or a routine chesty cough. Years ago, we would never have dreamt of attending A&E for a simple illness but then you didn't have to wait two or three weeks or more to see a GP doctor! What is to be done about this? There are a few emergency GP appointments available each day if you sit on the phone long enough first thing in the morning; otherwise it is a simple matter of turning up early at your GP and just waiting, and waiting.... Could it be shorter than the time waiting in casualty? Probably but who knows! We need more GPs but nobody wants to do the job these days and those who do are approaching retirement age. I am not sure where we go from here. The best plan is try to stay in good health and keep away from Doctor! Sadly, easier said than done!

When is a Doctor not a Doctor?

Did you know that some hospitals are training and using



physician associates to relieve the pressure currently experienced by all doctors in the NHS system? These new staff members first complete a year of study at an approved college, before completing their second year on the job. They will take notes and clinical histories and in all departments of a large hospital before taking their final exams. After taking these they will be out and about in all the

Dandelions could be the death of you!

Some people would say that dandelions are definitely not good news in the garden, while a growing number of us appreciate their colour and value them as a flower. However, in some hospitals it is definitely not good news if there is one hanging about your bed. An increasing number of hospitals are using a dandelion symbol on charts on or around a patient's bed to denote that the occupant is receiving end of life care. For the staff it means that the patient may be on a restricted food and fluid diet, for the rest of us the symbol is asking that we are quiet and respectful around this bed, so that the patient is disturbed as little as possible. Most of us have yet to see this symbol in use, but the practice is spreading.

Green Bag Scheme for Medicines

Some of us are on far more medicines than we would like to be and it may seem that new ones are being added all the time with even more hard to remember names. One solution might be to carry your prescription around with you at all times, on the other hand, the ambulance service is starting to offer a new solution in parts of Essex. When they take a patient to hospital, they will present the patient, or their friends or relatives with a green plastic bag for them to place all the patient's current medicines in. This means, that not only will the patient's medicines be readily available to staff and patients alike It will also mean that the staff will be able to make sure that any additional drugs the patient may require are compatible with the ones they are taking already. When the patient returns home, the bag with the updated medicines will go with them. If the patient attends hospital for a planned procedure, they are always asked to bring their pills with them in any event.

Focus on Fitness on Saturdays

Airport Night Noise



Birchanger Parish Council has called for night-time aircraft noise restrictions to be tightened in its response to the Department for Transport's (DFT's) consultation on how night noise at Heathrow, Gatwick and Stansted should be restricted for the next five years.

They demand that the protected night-time period should be extended to become a full eight hours; that helicopters are included within the restrictions, and that noise caused by aircraft using reverse thrust should be banned at night.

The rules proposed in the consultation are similar to those in place now, which limit disturbance by two means. The first is a noise quota, which governs how many noisy aircraft can use the airport at night. Each type of aircraft has a 'QC' rating ranging from 8 (very noisy) to 0.25 (least noisy), and the airport has a limit on the total QC count that may occur. So, if the airport has a QC count of 8 for a given period, two movements by very noisy QC 4 aircraft are allowed, or eight flights by quieter QC 1 aircraft, 32 by QC 0.25 machines or any other combination so long as the total QC count is no more than 8.

There is also a movement limit, which is the maximum number of take-offs and landings that can take place by those aircraft included in the noise quota scheme. In the consultation the DfT concedes that there is evidence that lower levels of noise than previously thought can disrupt sleep, so they propose adding a QC 0.125 rating, bringing quieter aircraft into the noise quota.

They also propose that all movements, including those that are not noisy enough to warrant any QC rating, count towards the movements limit. The Council welcomes these changes. There was, however, a sting in the tail. The DfT provided figures showing that, unlike Heathrow and Gatwick, Stansted already has many night flights by quieter aircraft that fall outside the current rules.

These are mainly operated by low-cost carriers. The DfT argues that as we already have these extra flights they should be allowed to continue so they want to increase our movement limits accordingly. The Council considers this unreasonable, and has demanded that any uplift in Stansted's movement limit for this reason is temporary, and phased out over the next five years. The DfT said that it expects Manchester Airports Group, the owners of Stansted, to apply during 2017 for planning permission to handle more passengers than the 35 million per year it is allowed at present.

As part of the planning process it is expected that an agreement between the airport and the local community will be reached that includes a new noise quota. Birchanger Parish Council, while supporting in general the idea of local agreements, feels that the DfT should still impose a noise quota that may only be negotiated locally in a downwards direction. *By Ken Wheatley*

New Professional and Technical Skills Centre for Stansted Airport

Thanks to a government grant the first establishment for Further Education is to be built at Stansted Airport and is scheduled to open in September 2018. The centre will teach professional and technical skills and should attract both school leavers and those seeking further professional technological education. The centre is a further development of Harlow College and will offer courses in engineering, business, finance as well as airport related studies. This could be a big advantage for a great many here in Birchanger and not just school leavers.

Day Centres Offer Good Lunches

There are five well established Day Centres in Uttlesford, all offering value for money lunches or just a quick cup of coffee to the over 55's on several days each week. Costs are kept to the minimum and are around £5 at each centre for lunch.



Stansted is our nearest centre at Grafton Green. It is open from 10am to 1.30pm on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Fridays. You can just drop in for a cup of coffee, but if you would like lunch you will need to book by 11am on the day; Telephone 815091.

There is also the Rowena Davy Centre in the centre of Dunmow. This is open for morning coffee and homemade cakes from 10am

every weekday except Wednesdays. They need to know by 10.30am if you would like lunch. The number to call is 01371 872874. Another Day Centre can be found at the Garden Room in Saffron Walden which is open on a daily basis. Other alternatives can be found in Takeley and Thaxted. Day Centres really do have role in the Community today.


