UFOS OVER BIRCHANGER?



A mysterious flying object has been seen flying over Birchanger recently and caused quite a stir in the village! The UFO was seen flying over the rooftops in Harrisons and the surrounding area and then shooting up high into the sky seemingly disappearing into thin air! Well happily it wasn't a UFO. It was soon discovered to be one of those new fangled remote control flying drones that have been appearing a lot in the national newspapers recently.

Harmless fun?

Now of course most people would think this is just a bit of harmless fun with a rather cool toy but it does have a serious side to it. Is this a toy or is there something more sinister here? **Drones and the law**

At the moment, there is nothing to stop you buying a drone and taking it out flying, as long as the drone weighs less than 20kg and you are not using it for commercial reasons. However, you must avoid flying it within 150 metres of a congested area and 50 metres of a person, vessel, vehicle or structure not under the control of the pilot. That's probably going to be fine if you're flying the drone in your back garden, but if you're in a park, for example, you need to be very careful about making sure you're not flying it within 50 metres of other people who are in the park. You will also need to fly the aircraft "within sight". This means you can't go above 400 feet in altitude or further than 500 metres horizontally. The rules governing use of drones are still evolving as more and more court cases are brought to trial.

What to do when your neighbour has a drone

Drones are not toys, not only can they be loud, but they sometimes are equipped with cameras and telephoto lenses. What do you do if you see that your neighbour is flying a drone over your property? Contact your neighbour by phone or email or knock on the neighbour's door. Ask politely to please refrain from flying the drone over your property. Suggest that the neighbour fly it, perhaps, in a public park or simply hover it over his or her own garden. **Cause of action for private nuisance**

What if your neighbour does not respond to your emails, calls, or reasonable requests to fly the new toy elsewhere? You might have a cause of action in court known as private nuisance. The nuisance in this case, you could argue, is the noise of the drone – the whirring of the engine or blades – disrupting your quiet use and enjoyment of your premises.

Cause of action for trespass

You could also make a legal case for trespass. The drone is flying over your property; you don't necessarily own all of the air rights above your property but generally, you do own the immediate air rights surrounding the top of your home. There is no unified answer to "how high" homeowners own. But any photographs that you take of the flying drone, to show a court how close the machine is getting to your yard or windows, would surely help convince a judge that the flight constitutes a trespass.

Cause of action for invasion of privacy

One of the more frightening aspects of personal drones is the possibility that they might include cameras. These cameras could be powerful, allowing a snooping neighbour to hover over your property and see people and activities that the neighbour shouldn't be seeing. Policymakers are still considering the implications of such snooping. Perhaps you have reason to believe that your neighbour's drone isn't just innocently flying, but is actually equipped with such a camera. Even without drone-specific legislation, you should remember that you have a cause of action against your neighbour for the common law tort of invasion of privacy. In court, you would be able to ask the judge for a temporary restraining order and injunction – essentially, court orders directing your neighbour not to fly the drone.

Toy or Menace?

Whether you think of them as a toy or a menace, there is no doubt that drones are here to stay. There are still many unanswered questions both legally and ethically and these will eventually be answered sooner or later. In the meantime, if you own a drone, be careful where you fly it and have some consideration to those of us who value their privacy and relative peaceful existence. After all, Birchanger is a small, rural village and has enough to deal with considering the noise coming from low flying helicopters and aircraft to and from Stansted Airport! On opening the scam email you will see what appears to be a correct logo and a convincing file number. However, if it asks for your bank details and or card number don't go any further! This is a very nasty scam and will empty your bank account in seconds. A number of Birchanger residents have received such scam emails so if you get one, bin it immediately and report it to the Inland Revenue fraud office at phishing@hmrc.gsi.gov.uk

have retired into his rabbit hole and was fast asleep by sunset.





Time Banking comes to Uttlesford

You may not have heard of 'time banking' but it is all about volunteering and receiving credits for the time taken by volunteering. It works on the principle that everyone has their own skill, which could be used to benefit others. With your own special skill you register to volunteer to use your skill to benefit someone else. You receive a credit for your own time, which you can then use on another team member with different talents. For example, if you were a decorator and spent time painting someone's house, you could use the time credits on the services of perhaps a plumber or another skill from the Time Bank Team. 
Government pledge to preserve ancient woodland

This is potentially very good news for Birchanger, seeing that we have two ancient woods in the village in the form of Birchanger Wood and Digby Wood. In fact the ancient woodland at one time completely surrounded the small



clearing in the centre of the wood where the first habitations marked the settlement known as 'Billechangra' or a 'clearing in a wood'.

This is how Birchanger got its name and it is mentioned in the Domesday Book. Let us just hope that the government, whoever they may be, will have the same philosophy in future years as well as keeping the promises on the Green Belt.



News from the Gardens of Easton Lodge

We have been busy improving the planting in the gardens this year. In the Italian garden, the inner beds will be colour coordinated, pinks and blues, while the outer beds will be a riot of various colours. Planes Trains & Automobiles

Children in Years 3 and 4, Badgers and Squirrels Class have been working on a transport topic – Planes, Trains and Automobiles. Using maps, Google maps and Google Earth



they looked at local transport links, identifying the main roads, motorways, train lines and the airport serving our area.

In history they found out about key turning points in transport including the invention of the railway and the developments of flight

and the adventures of Amelia Earhart. Science work also

linked with this, exploring forces and magnetism. As part of the topic, the children visited Aerozone at Stansted airport. This was a packed morning with children finding out about lots of different aspects of



the airport including baggage handling, air traffic control, airport fire service and the destinations planes fly to.

Although we are a Church of England school our curriculum ensures children find out about other religions and children



learn to be knowledgeable and respectful of other people's beliefs. As part of Religious Education the Year 3 and 4 children visited the Hindu Mandir in Neasden. This is an amazing building and we were made

very welcome. The children visited an exhibition about the history and values of Hinduism, we found out how the temple was built and then had the opportunity to watch a service and look at the amazing statues and carvings in the marble room.

A Good Report From OFSTED

In February the school was inspected by OFSTED and we are delighted that the school was judged 'Good' in all areas. The inspection took place over two days and was a very thorough process. The inspector visited lessons; spoke to children, staff, governors and parents; reviewed documents and discussed the progress and attainment of pupils in depth.

The last inspection was two years ago and this recent report shows the accelerated progress the school has made since then. The inspectors' comments identify these improvements and emphasise the effectiveness of leadership and management.

Leadership at all levels was graded good with recognition of the work of the governing body "Governance is a strength of the school. The knowledgeable and experienced chair leads a dedicated, insightful and well-trained governing body." The report recognises how "The headteacher has created a culture of high expectation that is embraced by the whole school community" and "a strong team of leaders who share collective responsibility."



The quality of teaching, learning and assessment was recognised in the report as being "good throughout the school". The report also recognises the children's positive attitude to learning and their good behaviour too noting that "Pupils feel safe in this inclusive and welcoming school. The personal development and welfare of pupils has a high priority and pupils' behaviour is good".

Achieving this 'Good' judgement has been a whole school effort and I am very proud of the hard work and commitment shown by the members of staff, school governors and the children. The full report can be viewed on the school website: http://birchanger.essex.sch.u k/inspection-reports/

Health Matters

Our part in cutting back on waste in the NHS

We all know that we may have to face serious cut backs to our NHS funding if the NHS is to survive. Treatments are developing which are almost miraculous in some cases. We want them but resources are limited and we simply cannot have it all. Can we help the NHS? Are we just as guilty as the NHS in wasting resources? When was the last time you looked at your replacement prescription list? Do you really use all the medication on it all the time, every month? Have you got a big stockpile of pills in your cupboard which you are never actually going to use? There could be an awful lot of money going to waste in there. Some people never actually tell their doctor that



they do not get along with certain medicines, yet they keep on turning up on the monthly prescription list. This cannot be right, you could be harming yourself by not taking them, and you are also harming the drug budget. We all tend to do this at some time. We need to come clean and sort it all out to

everyone's advantage.

The drugs you do not use could benefit someone else, and save the NHS unnecessary expenditure. Nobody wants to see health rationing but if we do not do something, the threat of this is very real.

More hospital specialisation

In an attempt to keep within their budgets, hospitals are tending to specialise in doing what they do best these days leaving some specialities to other better equipped hospitals. This means in Birchanger that heart attacks will be treated in Basildon, strokes at Queens in Oldchurch, burns in Brookfield, and hospitals in Stevenage taking some patients. We will be taken there in fast ambulances with experienced crews. Might sound like a plan on paper but what will the reality be? No hospital in our area has consistently met their targets lately.

Things are looking up for the Stansted Surgery

Six months ago matters could not have been much worse for the Stansted surgery. There were far too few practitioners working in dire conditions and the staff were fighting a battle all the time. There will always be a challenge to see everyone when they want to be seen but things have been improving throughout the winter and regular patients have noticed a difference. More services are planned, but congratulations are in order for their performance through what has been a very difficult time.

Health Walks

Fancy a change from the gym? Why not try one of the regular Friday morning walks which leave from just outside the library in Stansted every Friday morning. You do not need to arrange this in advance necessarily, you simply turn up at 10.30 on a Friday Morning. The walk is planned and arranged in advance by a local volunteer and every walk is different. It often ends at a local coffee shop with an opportunity to make new friends and possibly put back all the calories you just lost!

Asthma alert

There is blossom everywhere, the countryside looks lovely but if you suffer from asthma it can be one of the most difficult times of the year. Everyone is raving about the bluebells but if you are a sufferer you cannot go near them. It makes sense to try to make things easier and you can



sometimes do this for yourself by stocking up on all your inhalers and making sure that you take them with you and that you use them regularly especially when you are out. Check the pollen count; it is available on line and in newspapers. If it is high the weather forecasters will usually mention it. Dusting is infinitely boring but very important at this time of year, as is clearing the car filters where pollen can accumulate and aggravate the sufferer while driving. It may look lovely outside, but keep warm at all times and stay in as much as possible on really bad days. Use the website www.asthma.org.uk for further help and advice.

Good pub grub

Some may remember the Prince of Wales Pub at Broxted from the days when Stop Stansted Expansion used to meet there. It is situated at the crossroads in

The pub can also cater for functions. The atmosphere is lively and friendly. Maybe worth a trip out on a warm summer evening!

Flower time in the Wood

The beautiful white wood anemone was indeed beautiful and flowered profusely in Birchanger Wood towards the end of March and early April. This was a truly gorgeous sight and a tableau of glory in the early warmth and brightness of the sun. In April, the English bluebell should have been blooming in the woods. However, the young green shoots have been quite badly eaten this year so the show may not be as good as previous years. Bluebell plants are in fact poisonous, they contain a chemical used in alchemy and which is being researched by modern day scientists for possible medicinal use. These fresh green shoots are appealing food to some animals and they are apparently eaten by sheep and cattle and the muntjac deer are very partial to the bluebell leaves. This all causes great damage and loss. Interestingly and sadly, it



would seem in Birchanger W o o d squirrels are the prime suspects for eating the bluebell leaves even though poisonous, because owing to their large

numbers in the wood, their normal food is insufficient to adequately feed them all. It takes a bluebell bulb about five years to reach maturity and to flower. With the expanding tree canopy you are unlikely to see the local buzzards, yes they are about again, and maybe you will hear them. When their young start to fly, you will not only be able to see them but hear them calling to each other. 'My' swallows are also very noisy chattering on the telephone wires.
