Ever thought of joining the Ramblers?

Many of us do not know that the Ramblers are a registered Charity with around 150,000 members and who have some 36,000 walks to choose from. As a member, walks can be planned using the Ramblers prolific and detailed routes and maps. Other benefits include discounts at outdoor clothing stores, a free quarterly magazine and walks arranged by the Association in our own district or neighbouring counties. The membership costs are £3.25 per month or £34.50 per annum with longer periods also available. Uttlesford does have its own local walks but the benefit of the Ramblers is that you have access to tested, varied and interesting walks nationwide. Close to home, the nearest walk to us leaves from just outside the library In Stansted at 10.30 am every Friday in the summer months.

the district and indeed the whole country which can have a very big effect on everyone in the vicinity. Whether any of these applications actually end up being built is certainly not up to the Parish Council, or any other individual in Birchanger, but they will have an impact on neighbouring properties. Gardens are small, while the houses dominate the site. Parking seems to be inadequate in most cases and the houses disproportionately large. This seems to be a trend which maybe fine for urban areas, but not so appropriate in a village. If one of these planned properties are close to you and there are aspects which you feel will impact adversely on you, tell the District Council Planning Department. You can call them on 01799 510510 and ask to speak to the officer who deals with applications in the Birchanger area. You can also call me (Elizabeth Godwin) or any other member of the Parish Council, to discuss the issues which are concerning you. The final decision rests either with planning officers in Uttlesford, or if the application is large or controversial, with the Planning Committee. Remember, not every application is right for the proposed site and local people know most about local issues.

Starting school for the first time

It may be July and the schools have not yet broken up for the summer holidays but already parents of children about to start school for the very first time are somewhat anxiously eyeing the date and voice their concerns about their child's first few days at school. First of all, schools do understand how the parents feel and try to make it easier with home visits and many opportunities for them and their child to visit the school but there are other places to look for help as well. Essex County Council has special Starting School Bags which can be obtained from their local libraries. These contain stories, aimed at the under-fives and other pieces of information which will help them to understand School and which will hopefully help equip them for this change in their lives. The mobile library calls into Birchanger every other Tuesday, first stopping at Birchwood by the club from 3pm to 3.30pm and then on to High View until 4pm. Why not enquire about your 'Starting School Bag' then?





Look out for the Blackberries

In the shade of Birchanger Wood, simply talk, meander, listen to the birds or really 'go-for-it' and go for a run in this wonderful local and

ancient woodland. Take your family and the dogs with you if you have them. The all-weather paths are there, so simply enjoy being under the cool green tree canopy of the wood and just sit and contemplate, or if you feel like it, work up a sweat. The British summer can throw a lot of undesirable weather about but even if it does rain much of it will be deflected by the wood's thick canopy of deciduous leaves. In the rain, you will be nowhere near as wet as those outside the woodland boundary and in hot sun Birchanger Wood provides a lovely cool respite from the heat.

In July there should be some blackberries in or about the woods. These berries are usually smaller than those out in the open fields, because the sunshine will have lost a lot of its power after filtration through the woodland canopy and therefore they come to fruition. I have found them very tasty and remember, blackbirds love juicy sweet blackberries! Depending on the weather in July, and the amount of insects

and seeds generated, the small bird population will be bringing up yet another set of fledglings. The earlier babies will have grown enough to appear no different from their parents, and in many cases will be assisting their parents to



feed the new set of youngsters. Animals, birds, and plants should all be enjoying life to the full. As I write this article in early June we have experienced the recent combination of

strong winds, and heavy rain which has loosened the soil. With trees in full-leaf this may have caused some of our trees to be brought down. Please always be aware of any such issues in any woodland, especially if you go out in the woods during wet, windy or stormy conditions. Have a lovely July. High View rubbish skips reported to be an eyesore

Residents of High View complain that two rubbish skips parked in the residential area are a real eyesore. The skips are reported to be parked at the rear of two houses which front onto Bradley Common. Both houses have a driveway both at the front and rear of the property and back onto High View. Luckily for the residents of Bradley Common, including the owners of the houses, they don't have to look at the unsightly skips. However, for High View residents they are clearly visible on an almost permanent daily basis. One of the residents stated that "the skips are often full to overflowing and are a continuous eyesore! If it was just one skip standing there once in while it wouldn't be so bad but two skips almost permanently parked there is going too far. The day after this picture was taken the skip on the left was emptied but we know that there will be a skip on site for a number of weeks until yet again it is overflowing". In addition to this, residents of High View are currently experiencing extra



traffic due to a property being constructed in Bradley Common. "Often lorries reverse the whole length of High View without the assistance of a banksman to guide them" said the resident. "It just seems that we are Bradley Common's dumping ground and surely that is not reasonable! We feel that it is incredibly inconsiderate and un-neighbourly to be subjected to these daily eyesores whilst their owners get to live on a pretty lane and not have to see them. If the skips were parked behind a fence or gates at least we wouldn't have to look at them every day" the resident concluded.





Birchanger Primary School



The Summer Term in school is always really busy and Birchanger is in full swing with topic work, sports tournaments, curriculum visits and whole school events.

Year 5 and 6 children in Owls Class are working on the history topic of Kings and Queens. Funds transfer request scam

One of the scams in common use at present, are from callers purporting to be from your bank or building society telling you that you are at risk of fraudulent activity. They request that you transfer your funds into a "safe" account, which they will set up for you stressing that you need to act immediately! Whatever you do, don't do this. Put the phone down and call your bank or building society from another phone and check if it is a bona fide request. Always use another phone to call your bank as these people frequently stay on line, play a recorded ring tone and pretend to be your bank. The transfer they request will then be made to their own account!

New Airport Planning Application

Stansted Airport has submitted a 'Scoping Report' to Uttlesford District Council, signalling the start of a process which the Airport says will lead to a planning application later this year seeking permission to expand Stansted Airport to a capacity of around 44.5 million passengers per annum (mppa) and 285,000 annual flights! Stansted handled 24.3 million passengers and 180,400 flights last year. This new application, would lead to an increase of more than 20 million passengers and more than 100,000

flights, 83% more passengers, and 58% more flights. However, Stansted Airport has told Uttlesford that "No significant adverse environmental effects are predicted as a consequence of the proposed development." SSE reacted by saying that the Airport is treating us all like fools.

What's the Rush?

Stansted hasn't even started to make use of its 2008 permission to grow from 25mppa to 35mppa and even by its own projections; it doesn't expect to reach 35mppa until 2023 or 2024. Moreover the Government is in still the midst of preparing an Airports National Policy Statement to be presented to Parliament for approval, next spring. The main feature of this will be a third Heathrow runway but it will also set down the policy for other UK airports, including Stansted. In the meantime, there is no clear Government policy and further uncertainty has been created by the recent election results. SSE says that it would be both premature and opportunistic for Stansted Airport to submit a planning application this year to expand Stansted beyond its present planning limits. SSE Deputy Chairman Brian Ross commented "We may not be able to prevent the Airport from submitting this planning application but we must at least try to ensure that there is a comprehensive, honest and thorough assessment of all the environmental impacts. That will be our immediate focus in responding to the Scoping Report."The Scoping Report can be viewed and commented upon on the Uttlesford website at:

What is the celebration of Pentecost?

On Sunday June the 4th the celebration of Pentecost took place at St Mary's to mark the official end of the Easter season in Christianity. Pentecost is the celebration of the moment that Jesus' apostles received the Holy Spirit. According to the Acts of the Apostles, he promised that he wouldn't abandon his followers — he'd send the Holy Spirit down to them not long after his departure. When that time came the Holy Spirit is said to have arrived in a gust of wind and fire, giving the apostles the ability to speak many languages so they could spread the word of God to as many people as possible. Church attendees wore red to reflect the fire and to celebrate what is the birth of the Christian church. Organ Restoration Fund

On the 19th August at 7pm a concert in aid of the Organ Restoration Fund will take place. The Courtyard Quartet will be providing a summer bouquet of vocal music so watch this space for more details in the August Magazine. The organ was built by August Gern in 1898 and is one of only three still in a playable condition today. Gern was a foreman of the Paris firm of Aristide Cavaille Coll (1815-1899), and while superintending many of the firm's organs in England he undertook work for a number of private patrons, including St Mary's organ. Thought for the Month – July 2017

How are we to respond to the hatred that lies behind the recent terrorist attacks in London and Manchester? Shortly before he became Archbishop of Canterbury, Rowan Williams was about to give a lecture at the Church of the Holy Trinity, Wall Street. The date was September 11th, 2001. Less than half a mile away, in an act of unspeakable evil, two aircraft were deliberately smashed into the twin towers of the World Trade Centre. In a book he wrote shortly after this, Rowan asked how we should respond to evil acts. He used the following analogy. As a Welshman, he could speak both Welsh and English but he explained his English was much better than his Welsh. When someone asked him a question in Welsh he had to decide in what language he should answer that question. Sometimes his Welsh was adequate for the reply but if a very careful reply was required he would have to switch to English. The terrorists, Rowan Williams suggested, had spoken in the language of hatred, fear and violence.

In what language should we reply? If we reply in the same language then hatred, fear and violence increase. If we reject the language of hatred, fear and violence, and choose instead to reach across the barriers of that hatred, fear and violence, then we choose to speak in another language, the language of peace and justice! Those who have carried out the recent attacks are evil men whose one desire is to drag the rest of society down to their level. We are better than that. How should we respond to them? In the words of Saint Francis; "Lord, make me a channel of your peace."

Health Matters



Who pays for your personal care?

Under the current rules, the short answer is - you do! That is assuming you have savings above £23,250. What will happen in the future under the recently re-elected Conservative Government has yet to be clarified. Until you reach that point or whatever point the government decides upon, you are expected to contribute some if not all of the costs. If you have ongoing medical needs you could benefit from an NHS continuing care package. Whether you are paying, or contributing to your care does not prevent you from having a free assessment of your needs from Essex County Council. Care is capped at an eye watering £1085 per week. Other sources of help are not as costly. You can arrange to have your medicines delivered for free at most pharmacies. You may require a health care package for which there will be no charge. However, if you do find yourself in a position where you are going to require ongoing care, it is best to seek advice as to what you are entitled to. Uttlesford CAB can provide this on 01799 618830. Meals can also be delivered, frozen ones are available from Wiltshire Farm Foods on 0800 0773100 and Oakhouse Foods on 0800 3706700. Hot food can be obtained from Herts Meals on 01279 417087. Age U.K. Can be consulted for a home help service on 01245 346106. It is neither easy nor cheap for anyone when a debilitating illness strikes. The most important thing of all is to have support and encour-

agement from neighbours and friends throughout. Do your medicines look a bit different?

Some of you may have noticed from time to time without notice or explanation your routine drugs look a little different, have a different



name or even come in totally different packaging. The reason is that in most surgeries doctors have been looking at the routine prescriptions dispensed each month and have tried to make savings wherever they can. The fact is, where possible, they are replacing premium named drugs with cheaper generic alternatives from other companies. The content of the drug should be the same but in many cases the name

and certainly the packaging may be quite different. Technically there should be little or no difference and patients should not notice the change, although different coatings and ancillary content in some of the alternatives may have an effect on some people. If you do have concerns and new or different side effects you should speak to your Surgery and discover what if anything has been changed.

Is this a record?

We all hear about patients who have spent weeks in hospital unnecessarily because there is no appropriate social care available for them at their home. Some of us may have even experienced this since the demise of the old convalescent units some years ago. It is not a record for any council to be proud of but there is a council in

Wales that have this rather dubiaccolade. One of their patients has been waiting over four years to go home! The situation is so bad countrywide,

that some councils are now looking to the



private sector to take on their role under contract. What will happen if that fails defies imagination.

Are things improving at PAH?

Most of us have at some time or another been a patient at Princess Alexandra Hospital and in recent years found that attending the hospital has not been a very happy experience. Even now it seems that they have yet to get rid of or re-train their stroppy receptionists and booking clerks. However, on a recent admission I found that for the first time the experience was a positive one. I received careful, friendly and good care throughout my visit and so it seems, judging by the smiles and not long faces of the other patients, they all did too. Maybe the hospital will be out of special measures very

Dealing with dementia, whether as a sufferer or a carer can be one of the loneliest experiences in the world. Both carer and patient alike feel cut off and out of their depth a great deal of the time. The message here is that there is no need to battle along alone. The Hundred Parishes Society

The stately homes in the one hundred parishes

Over the centuries wealthy individuals and families have often built grand houses. In our area many remain, albeit that few still serve as family homes. The best-known is Audley End House in the parish of Saffron Walden. Its splendid 17th-century architecture can be seen from the B1383. The house, now only one third of its size when purchased by King Charles II in 1668, is cared for today by English Heritage and should be open to the public again after July 14. Less-known but also visible, are the following four mansions which can be found in the far corners of the Hundred Parishes.

Moyns Park in Steeple Bumpstead was built around 1580. It is privately owned and a mile from a public road but it can be seen clearly and appreciated from an easy public footpath.



Great Waltham is home to the Langleys, a fine three-storey private house that has been in the same family since it was built in 1719. Clearly visible from the road it can be viewed more closely from the Essex Way footpath which passes the end of the drive.

Fanhams Hall in the far southwest of the Hundred Parishes Wareside has an 18th-century home that was extended in the early 1900's when the Japanese gardens were created. It now functions as a conference centre and wedding venue, whilst the grounds can be enjoyed for the price of an afternoon tea or Sunday lunch.

Aspenden Hall was built in the 19th century. Its pristine white exterior, visible from Aspenden churchyard, hides the fact that its interior was gutted 50 years ago and that it is now used for agricultural purposes, mainly the drying of grain.
