Sign Of The Times

How many people walking, biking or driving past the social club actually notice our famous village sign? Most of us probably know it's there but like a ticking clock we don't really notice it anymore! The vast majority of villagers take it for granted and have no idea of the effort that went into making it. Unfortunately, if you look closely at it today, you will realize that it is getting on a bit and is showing signs of deterioration (no pun intended) which is not surprising as it has been standing out in all weathers since 2002. Without doubt something needs to be done very soon before it

deteriorates further. So what is the history behind our village landmark?



The village started putting money aside raised from open garden weekends and village fetes to cover the cost of a millennium project around 1995. Eventually it was decided to use the money to fund a new village sign

and after researching numerous styles and materials and receiving various suggestions from villagers, the present day design was finally chosen.

Sheila Devereux agreed to manage the project and called upon many individuals who gave their support and energy into helping with the planning permission, technical drawings, building work and pure muscle power. Local artist Heather Brown made the first water colour painting of the sign which incorporated elements of the village such as the birch trees, the bluebell woods, St. Mary's Church and of course local wildlife incorporating a fox and pheasant. The finishing touches were the Essex insignia and a facsimile of Birchanger's entry in the Domesday Book. Last but not least, the crown was added and the year 2002, which was the date of the queen's jubilee and the year that the sign was erected.

Suffolk artist Mary Moore, a specialist sign maker of some 40 years, was commissioned to produce the new sign. Using Heather Brown's painting, she first made a life size pencil drawing and from that produced a full size plaster cast model which she carved in relief to show the church, trees and wildlife etc., a very time consuming exercise. Next the model was sent to a Norwich foundry for casting in metal and lastly was painted by the artist with seven coats of protective paint. However, it was not all plain sailing. The foundry contracted to make the casting went in to liquidation and the new company that took over lost the plaster model. Mary Moore then had to make another plaster cast model which put back the project by some three months. Eventually the job was completed and on a cold, damp and drizzly day the sign was finally erected.



On the 22nd December, after the usual carol service, Canon Jackson with his black robes flying in the wind gave the dedication and was joined by Elizabeth Godwin and a crowd of 50 or more villagers. It was a pure case of the Vicar of Dibley meets the Archers.

Currently the sign is undergoing assessment and awaits a quotation for the restoration work which thankfully the parish council has in hand.

Dear Readers,

Are our speed signs becoming invisible?

If the number of cars that continue to speed through Birchanger lane are anything to go by then undoubtedly they are and have become quite useless and ineffectual in slowing down the traffic. Now I know what you are saying, "Oh no, not that old chestnut again". Well yes, the old chestnut is still there and isn't going away soon and for good reason. I have given up counting the amount of scuffs and scratches on the side of my car where I have been forced into hedges by inconsiderate motorists. Of course our overgrown hedgerows don't help. Then there are the numerous emergency stops caused by close encounters of the third kind, by that I mean the buses which take our bends like a bull mastiff chasing a cat. Now the word 'bus', which is shortened from the word 'omnibus', is interesting as it comes via the French from Latin and means literally 'for all'. Clearly this is not the case with some bus drivers as they are certainly not thinking of anyone else but themselves on the road.



We are not even safe around our small cul-de-sac in Harrisons where a few offenders think they are Lewis Hamilton driving for poll position. Our hairy babies look twice now before crossing the road as they have had several near misses with the big metal kennels running on four rubber boots.

The point is, what needs to happen before something is done about it? So far we have been very lucky to have had few major accidents but it is only a matter of time before something

more serious occurs. The parish council have tried signs, gates and road markings but all to no avail. So what is next? One possibility is to install traffic calming measures such as humps or chicanes. Chicanes wouldn't be the best solution as our lane is narrow enough as it is and the disadvantage of humps is that they increase noise and pollution, particularly from buses or lorries and the vehicles that will suffer the most damage are our own rather than those just passing through. Another possibility is to reduce the apparent width of the road by painting lines near the kerbsides or central hatching in the middle of the road. What about fake speed cameras? that could do it but I am not sure they are legal. Something that works for me are fixed "Your speed" signs, the great thing about these radar-controlled active signs is that for most drivers, they just alert you of your indiscretion and you slow down, feeling a little embarrassed. They're simple, they're effective at calming traffic, and they even let you know how inaccurate your speedometer is, assuming that these rat runners even look at their speedometers!

Save £3 with Stansted Airport express set down discount scheme

This scheme will save you some hard earned cash!

Collecting and/or dropping of people at the airport by car currently costs £3.50 at each exit. However, arrangements have been agreed in partnership with the Stansted Airport Consultative Committee to offer locals a discount. The discount scheme is open to all residents living within a ten mile radius of Stansted Airport.

Residents living within a 5 mile radius of Stansted Airport will pay £0.50 for up to 10 minutes and £0.50 per minute thereafter. Residents living within a 5 - 10 mile radius will pay £1 for up to 10 minutes and £1 per minute thereafter.


How to Apply

If you wish to apply for a discount card you need to complete an application form and return it to Stansted Airport who manages the car parks together with proof of ID. Full details, including terms and conditions, are detailed on the application form. To request an application send an E-mail to; dd_carparking@stanstedairport.com

Once you have registered you will be sent a discount card, Express Set Down is a ticketless system using Automated Number Plate Recognition (ANPR) technology to read entry/exit times and to calculate the duration of stay. When you exit the airport, you simply insert the discount card into the machine at the exit barrier and the discount will be applied so that you can make your reduced payment to exit. Note! There have been some problems with the exit pay machines so you may have to call the attendant by pressing the button on the machine. Tell the attendant you have a resident discount card and how much you should pay. If asked, give him/her the card reference number. It has been reported that new exit pay machines will be installed soon to overcome this issue.

Helicopter nuisance over Birchanger

It has been a summer of increasing numbers of helicopters flying any way they please over Birchanger, even after dark. We have all experienced the noise and intrusion as they fly low over our gardens on route to and from Stansted Airport. Now at last the Airport flight manager airside, Duncan Smith, has come up with a proposal for a fixed route for helicopter flights and would like to come and discuss this before the next meeting of the Parish Council. The meeting is on the 5th September at 7.30 pm in the village hall. He will explain his proposals and answer any questions you may have.





Health Matters

Care records are up and running at PAH


How often have we struggled to remember all our relevant illnesses and conditions when we visit the doctor or attend a hospital appointment? For those who are taking a large quantity of different drugs it's almost impossible to remember all the medicinal names and dosages. Now a new scheme means that your care and treatment records are easily accessed on computer by doctors in GP practices, clinics and wards alike. The scheme is now up and running at Princess Alexandra Hospital. At the click of a mouse all recent hospital visits, outcomes, drugs prescribed and anything to do with our medical history can be accessed by the appropriate professionals. The system is in its infancy but for those of us who have trouble remembering which drugs they were on and when, along with the dates of various treatments and other visits should find that all this is now readily available on screen. At least that is the theory! How effective will it be in practice? Or do we still have to go armed with that prescription list!

Possibly the end of the road for liver transplants

Recent work on liver disease has discovered that new liver cells can be grown from bile duct cells. It is now possible that these cells will be able to repair the damage in certain types of the disease which up to now has been mainly irreversible and bring hope of a normal life to many without the need for a rather drastic liver transplant.

Fertility treatment to be axed?

The Primary Care Trust has not been in existence very long but it is already experiencing difficulties in making ends meet. In fact it is at the point when something is going to have to go. In this instance it appears that fertility services are under threat. At present there is a consultation going on to discover the public reaction. Whether public opinion will count for much in the final decision is debatable but that should not deter you from making your comments known.

Is scurvy coming back?

The number of people with scurvy in the UK is small but growing and many more are at risk because of poor diet that lacks the fruit and veg that contain vitamin C. Alcoholics, drug users and the homeless are most vulnerable. Scurvy is caused by a lack of vitamin C, which is needed for collagen. Severe deficiency causes bleeding gums, dry skin, poor healing and muscle pains. You need 40mg a day – that's equivalent to half a large orange, a kiwi fruit, a small red pepper or a 50g portion of sprouts. Frozen and tinned fruit and veg retain their vitamin C. Women who are pregnant and breastfeeding need a bit more (50mg a day in pregnancy, 70mg a day while breastfeeding).

Will the UK get the artificial pancreas for type 1 diabetes?

The artificial pancreas is a wonderful piece of kit that continuously monitors the blood glucose levels of people with type 1 diabetes and links to their insulin pump to deliver the correct dose of insulin. This is exactly what happens in the body naturally in non-diabetics who have a functioning pancreas. It has FDA approval in the US and, with several trials underway, may be available in the UK soon.

A cure for Alzheimer's disease maybe on the horizon

For years scientists have been trying to discover the cause and then hopefully a cure for Alzheimer's disease which wrecks the lives for so many when it strikes in a family. We all know families who are battling with the care of a sufferer in the knowledge that without a cure the situation is only going to get worse. Now researchers have discovered that there are two different types of abnormal filaments which are found in Alzheimer's sufferers. They have identified one and hope to find the other soon. Knowing and understanding the enemy is part of the route to a cure in future years. It will be too late for many but the end of this disease appears to be in sight.

What can we learn from monkeys?

Quite a lot it seems, particularly about human behaviour and stress. A recent study of monkey behaviour in a monkey sanctuary in this country has shown that the monkeys' reaction to stress is showing patterns very similar to our own. By watching monkeys reactions to stressful



situations and the way they cope with them help researchers in the understanding and eventual treatment of human behaviour and psychiatric conditions. After all monkeys are supposed to be our nearest relatives and it just could make sense. The monkeys were observed over long periods of time in their enclosures with their own groups, not under any artificially engineered situations.

The true cost of a missed hospital appointment

Because they are free to most of us, you may think that hospital appointments have little cost in the scheme of things. After all there are lots of other patients there; you wait for ages, so missing the



appointment altogether could be a bonus to everyone else. You would be wrong. Someone else could have seen the doctor, nurse or consultant, someone whose need was far greater than yours. If you felt so much better that you felt no necessity to attend, why not let somebody else have the appointment that you so casually tossed aside. You might benefit someone in need as well as saved the £150 you cost the hospital in consultant fees, wasted staff time, specialist equipment and medication. Missed hospital appointments cost the NHS and eventually us the taxpayer over one billion pounds last year derived from 6.8 million DNA's (Did Not Attend). So don't be selfish, call and cancel if you are unable to make it!





Thought for the month

"What is truth?" asked the Roman governor Pontius Pilate when Jesus stood on trial before him. We might well ask the same question. We are told that we are living in a 'post-truth world'; a world in which the factual truth of a statement is seen as being of less importance than the way that statement makes people feel. In a post-truth world it doesn't matter as important whether there was any prospect of giving an additional £350 million pounds a week to the NHS once this country leaves the European Union. No one was really expected to believe that the NHS would ever receive that money. The statement was not made to be taken as fact but to arouse in people a feeling that there are better things to do with our money than pay to be part of the EU. Those who put out that statement realised that in order to pursue 'the man in the street';

"Arguments must be ... crude, clear and forcible, and appeal to emotions and instincts, not the intellect. Truth was unimportant and entirely subordinate to tactics and psychology."

These words are those of Joseph Goebbels, propaganda minister of Nazi Germany and this should warn us about the ideology that stands behind the post-truth concept. On the day following the recent election a leading politician was being interviewed on TV. His facial expression gave away the fact that he did not believe what he was saying. He was speaking, not to communicate truth but to evoke a particular response. Those who speak in such a way do so because of their contempt for the rest of us. They see themselves as having a greater worth than others who perhaps have less wealth, power or education.

I guess that in some ways that was how Pilate saw himself when confronted by Jesus. He was the one with the power; he thought he had the power of life and death over this peasant preacher who stood before him. How wrong he was!

This was Pilate's big opportunity and he missed it. History tells us that just a few years later the Emperor Caligula ordered Pilate to take his own life. Those who prefer falsehood above truth are walking a path that leads to disaster, as both Pilate and Goebbels discovered.

A society built on lies cannot stand. What can we do about this? The Bible tells us, "Don't believe everything you hear. Carefully weigh and examine what people tell you" (1 John 4.1, The Message). Find out the facts before you believe, act on or repeat what you are told. As George Orwell supposedly said:

"In a time of universal deceit, telling the truth is a revolutionary act"

provides. Ancient woodlands have probably existed since 1600AD. Ancient deciduous woodland covers very little of England and is therefore a valuable and rare resource. Birchanger Wood can be visited all year round as it has wide all-weather paths, but it is spectacular in particular seasons and an absolute delight to visit. In spring the Wood has wonderful displays of spring flowers; carpets of white wood anemones and bursts of English bluebells, and also some golden saxifrage; In autumn there are amazing and abundant varieties of fungi, generated from soil which has lain in place undisturbed for many years, and from dead fallen trees which have been deliberately left to rot to provide habitats for insects and food cover for wildlife. In the past Birchanger Wood was well coppiedd - tree growth cut back to the base stool, and left to re-grow. The new shoots arise from dormant buds on the side of the stool and occur owing to a change in plant hormone levels following removal of the main tree stem. The diameter of the wood achieved by coppicing depends upon the frequency of the coppicing and the type of tree. The strongest trees are ash, hazel, oak, sweet chestnut and lime whilst the weakest include beech, wild cherry and poplar. The size of wood obtained can usually be managed by hand and in the past this made for easier transportation as it could carried off site and used for all manner of uses including; kindling (faggots), building ('wattle and daub' plaster), furniture, weaving, stock fencing, hedging, river-



control, stakes and gardening rods for beans, peas, flowers etc., and for all manner of general repairs. A typical crop from 1 acre (0.4 hectare) of good hazel coppice would have yielded around 10,000 rods which was enough to produce about 300 sheep hurdles of 6 ft. x 3 ft. in size, 5,000 pea sticks, 250 bean rods, thatching wood, stakes and other material. In the 18th and 19th centuries coppiced wood was also used to provide industrial charcoal for the smelting of iron, and the bark was soaked and softened to extract tanning compounds. However, by the mid-twentieth century coppicing was in rapid decline and many coppice woods were replanted with conifers, or simply neglected.

Shortly after it opened, we visited Ruby's Indian restaurant in Bishops Stortford. We didn't book, just arrived in good time on a midweek evening for dinner. The restaurant was around 75% full

so there was still room for our party of four. Situated at the corner of Hockerril traffic lights, we received a warm welcome although the service was perhaps a little slow in the beginning but very friendly throughout. The menu is very different. Items such as lobster appear on the menu as well as other seafood dishes along with the usual Indian restaurant staples of chicken and lamb. Surprisingly there was also a beef dish and interesting vegetable curries with various selections of rice. The

names may seem a little unfamiliar but this is quite definitely a restaurant which is trying hard to serve some authentic and different Indian food.



There are no central warming plates; the food arrives in the dish in which you will eat it, with accompanying rice and vegetables if ordered on the side. The portions were large and satisfying, making most additional dishes seem unnecessary. The wine list is extensive with plenty of good reasonably priced wines, Prices are perhaps a bit more expensive than your average Indian restaurant, at roughly £30 per head including alcohol, but the food was excellent, and the ambience and the friendly staff were very good.

She told us a little about what happens to the Alpacas fleece after their annual shearing. We were able to feel the softness of some samples and we were told about the different qualities of fleece being used for different things. Although Penny gave us a very informative talk, most of us were itching to get up close with the animals that we could see in the nearby field.

We visited the boys, mums and babies and although some of the group were under the impression that the alpacas might spit at us, we were told that it was extremely rare. Normally they only spit at another alpaca if they get annoyed. We certainly didn't witness any spitting, instead as soon as we entered their field they came straight over to us looking for food. We were able to hand feed them with carrots and it was a wonderful experience getting up close to these beautiful animals with them nudging us for more food. They are really quite gentle and inquisitive animals but they are also a little shy with really pretty faces and long eyelashes. July is their peak breeding season so we were lucky enough to meet six cute little babies. The afternoon was topped off by being served a delicious full afternoon cream tea. The general consensus seemed to be that a fantastic afternoon was had by all. We are now putting on our thinking caps to find somewhere to visit for next year's trip. BAGS seem to be thriving at the moment with several new members joining recently.
