This included posters and Facebook coverage which attracted most of the visitors. The trial of an A&E visit

Dear Ed.

I've watched Casualty and Holby City so I was well prepared for my visit to A&E Well actually no I wasn't! We arrived at 6.45pm, couldn't find the door because of the building works, but no matter, a friendly porter showed us where to go. I presented myself at the reception with my GP referral and the pleasant receptionist booked me in, gave me a sheet of labels with my name and address on it (presumably so I didn't get lost!) and said, "take a seat, you'll be called shortly.

The trouble was her "shortly" and mine didn't exactly match. The board did say that there was a wait of 4 1/2 hours, so we settled down to wait. And we waited and waited and waited and waited some more. Finally I was called in to see a lovely nurse, some 5 hours later, who took all the details and assured me that all this important information would be passed to the medical team and that I would need a blood test and an ECG which he would sort out. It all went downhill from there. A slovenly, unprofessional health care assistant called me for my blood test, barely made eye contact with me, berated her senior colleague for not writing what he should have on her form then proceeded to very clumsily (and roughly) to take blood from me. She didn't explain what she was doing, didn't communicate with me and seemed somewhat impatient during the whole encounter. In fact I was looking at her wondering why on earth she was employed there. Then we were sent back to the freezing cold waiting area to wait for another hour for the blood results.

Finally I got to see the medical registrar who asked questions and said the bloods were fine and the ECG was normal BUT they needed to repeat the blood test. So there was me thinking my ordeal was over and I could go home and eat food and have a hot cup of tea. Wrong!! A repeat blood test took another two hours and FINALLY after a marathon 8 hours we were allowed to go home. Exhausted!! The good news? All the tests were clear. I came to the conclusion that you need to be either half dead, or have one of your limbs hanging by a thread to be gathered in and treated as they treat patients on the TV.

We have a wonderful national health service and by and large I think we generally receive an excellent service from overworked, over stretched, underpaid, demoralised staff. But just because things are difficult doesn't mean we should accept things as they are. I plan to write to the chief executive and tell him of my experience in the hope that things might be better for the next person. Bad service is bad service, whatever the industry! And actually, the thing that impacted most on me was our slovenly health care assistant. Get rid of her!! Everyone else was doing a difficult job with a smile, to the best of their ability and with limited resources. Rant over!

He decided to build her a working studio in his back garden and now she is ready to show and sell her work from the new studio. Asked what gave her the idea for her unusual art, she replied "I lived in Bishops Stortford for 17 years looking

after people's pets and one day realised they all had their own special personalities so I decided to sculpture them in papier mache and paint them in watercolours. 'Mind' in West Essex

It counts as part of a daily exercise routine, but apparently also relieves stress and anxiety, boosts confidence, and can improve sleep patterns.

Can you beat your own cancer?

For those with cancer, trying to beat cancer is a daily and sometimes a very uphill battle. Any help in addition to prescribed treatment can be very welcome, as long as it is not going to make life even more difficult than it already is. It is emerging that an ordinary everyday mineral can help with some types of cancers. Zinc can sometimes slow down the growth of cancer. Zinc tablets can be obtained



over the counter at most chemists, and some health food shops but it is also present in many ordinary foods including beef, oysters, and spinach, pumpkin and watermelon seeds.

which have been shown to be rich in the mineral and although beef and oysters may break the budget, watermelons and spinach should not. Always discuss with your Doctor before supplementing your medication.

Is a cure for Parkinson's on the horizon?

Scientists believe that they are on the brink of discovering a cure for Parkinson's disease which affects so many people as they get older. A group of scientists who are examining the inner workings of a key enzyme which they now know is one of the causes of Parkinson's disease. Having discovered this, the group are now working on a way of effectively and safely stopping this enzyme in its tracks, and thus at

Cold sore nightmare

Most cold sores are caused by HSV-1, also known as Herpes Simplex Virus. There is a large range of remedies that may reduce cold sore symptoms. Not every treatment works for every individual, but below are some of the natural products that may help reduce symptoms and prevent future flare-ups.

Natural Remedies:

Lip balms with at least 1 percent lemon balm Drinking lemon tea and using lemon tea compresses Peppermint, mint, and witch hazel oil

Aloe vera gel can soothe inflamed sores while providing crucial moisture

Liquorice root contains glycyrrhizic acid, considered to be an antiviral

Liquorice powder can be mixed with water or petroleum jelly and applied directly to sores

Echinacea is an immune booster, best consumed in tea or supplement form

Lysine cream or l-lysine supplements - l-lysine may boost the immune system and aid cell repair

Milk contains antibodies and 1-lysine

Corn starch paste, made of equal parts starch and water Rhubarb and sage mixtures






Well it's been a fun and busy start in Badger Class! The children have been throwing themselves into their learning based around the topic of 'Food Glorious Food'. They have been studying poems by Michael Rosen and had fun adapting his poem 'Where Broccoli Comes From'. The Hundred Parishes Society

The society held its annual general meeting in September, kindly hosted by Duxford Parish Council which is one of eighteen parish councils who are members of the society. Before the meeting, we were guided by local historian Jim Longstaff on a short walk around the centre of Duxford, visiting its two interesting grade 1 churches.

If you would like to explore this attractive village, please consider following Hundred Parishes Walk number 14 which can be downloaded from the 'Walks' section of our website,. The 5-mile route starts at Great Chesterford Station and passes through Ickleton, Hinxton and Duxford before finishing at Whittlesford Station. Until last month, I was under the impression that Whittlesford Station was in the parish of Duxford but our guide informed us that the parish boundary was changed in 2010. Whittlesford parish, which lies outside the Hundred

Parishes, also acquired the ancient Duxford Chapel.
Duxford parish has retained most of its treasures including Imperial War Museum Duxford.

A meeting of minds in Birchanger Wood

The Chairman of Uttlesford District Council, Geoffrey Sell, and the Mayor Of Bishop's Stortford Town Council, Colin Woodward, met together recently in the compound of Birchanger Wood in order to understand the development, and progress of this local public asset which comprises 69 acres of ancient woodland, sitting 75% in Essex and 25% in Hertfordshire.



Birchanger Wood is a 'grown-up' local community asset, maintained, and managed by local volunteers under the leadership of our super voluntary warden and is open 365 days of the year. It has almost 6km of 2metre wide, all weather winding woodland paths which are suitable for all ages and abilities, including wheelchairs. The Wood is owned by the Birchanger Wood Trust, which is a charity whereby the cost of upkeep is financed from gifts, donations, grants and sale of fire-wood. The 'compound' is open on most Saturdays for a few hours for the sale of wood and is the work-hub of the trust. We have a small pond, bring on young trees and look after recuperating rescue hedgehogs from Herts Hogline. It is woodland in which to walk, run, contemplate, take the family. Daphne Wallace-Jarvis
