Birchanger Lane road closure could cause chaos in July

Birchanger Lane could be closed for up to 6 weeks between the 2nd July and 18th August. It may not be closed every day during that period but whatever happens, we will be at the mercy of Essex County Highways.

The good news is that work is at last starting on the long awaited footpath at the Churton bend. New street lights will also be installed along Birchanger Lane and outside the Village Hall. Many years ago when the plans for the new houses at Churton first materialised, we were promised a proper footpath for the Churton bend. Years went by and somehow the plans, not shown to the Parish Council, changed. There was no footpath shown on the final plans. Years of wrangling followed and we were promised the footpath through a section 106 agreement but again nothing happened. Then we were told it would be in the last financial year which passed by and still no footpath. That is until now, when finally something is happening.

The road closure will also very likely cause problems with our bus services unless the bus company can be persuaded to turn the buses around at the club.

For those of you who drive, perhaps you would be able to offer a lift to stranded bus passengers so they can get to work, school, doctors, or the shops.

Armed police and helicopter search Birchanger Woods

Armed police and a police helicopter were deployed to Birchanger Woods on Thursday 4th May after receiving reports of 'gunshots' in the area. Firearms officers from the Hertfordshire Constabulary and NPAS Boreham searched the area around the woods after residents contacted police at around 10pm.



Residents reported concerns about suspicious behaviour after seeing youths entering the forest and later hearing noises which sounded like gunfire.

A helicopter searched the fields around Birchanger Woods while firearms officers searched the grounds in and around the area. However, the officers found no evidence of gunfire but they did find the remains of a campfire and fireworks. Police believe that the sound of the fireworks was mistaken for gunfire. No one was found at the scene and the search was eventually called off.

In June 1974, aged just 23, Ellis Brett Wilkins took his own life at an address in Bishops Stortford. He had previously lived with his parents, Fred and Eileen, at Lavender Cottage, Birchanger. Eileen ran tea rooms there for a time. There were two other siblings, Grahame and Andrea Brown. Grahame was a keen amateur photographer. Andrea sadly passed away in 1973 also in her early twenties. While living there, the thatch of the cottage caught fire and the building underwent substantial repairs.

There must at have been happier times for the Wilkins' family which may be remembered by people still living in the village today. I have found a couple of people from those times who remember my dad Brett, but I am looking for others who can help me to fill the gaps.

Anyone who lived in the village during the late 1960's and early 1970's and who recall my family, please email me with your memories of them. If you know someone who was there at the time but has since moved away, please pass on the message. Thank you.

First of all I would like to offer my sympathy, together with many other villagers I know, to Keith and Jean at Spider Cottage for the mess and intrusion that they and their neighbours have been going through (and continue to put up with), caused by the work on the new cycle path. What make matters worse for them is that the Council intend closing the area near the cycle path for several weeks to lay a new footpath by the side of Churton. (You may remember the houses that were never meant to be built).

Meanwhile at the other end of the village on Birchanger Lane, from Harrisons down to the main Stansted road especially by the Church, we have a large number of huge pot holes in the road. I have rung the council a number of times (as have many others) only to be told that regular checks are made by the council and they don't think the holes are sufficiently deep or wide enough to warrant repairing. When somebody is injured or a vehicle is damaged, (and there have been such cases), the council rush down and fill that specific hole and leave the rest! I am sure that the 'small' amount of £444,000 spent on the cycle path that most residents of Birchanger didn't even want could have been spent on this big problem. As the brunt of the damage is in front of the church, is it not possible that the powers that be on the Church Committee, the Parish Council or any other committee contact Uttlesford Council and get them to sort this problem out before there is a serious accident to a pedestrian and/or driver.

On a positive note, it is great to see how nice the Village Church Hall car park is looking now that it's been refurbished. Well done to whoever organised that. Perhaps they could have a word in the ear of the powers that be at our wonderful council to come down and do a proper job and fill the holes in the road. Don't forget a lot of elderly people walk or drive in this area. *Michael Daw, Birchanger*



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Would you like to continue having a good night's sleep? If you do, you need to send in your response to Stansted Airport's latest planning application by the 3rd of June which attempts to increase flights in and out of Stansted to 42 million passengers per annum.

Tucked away in this application is a plan to increase night flights at Stansted from the current limit of 5,700 to 13,700, a staggering increase of 8000 flights each year. This is totally unreasonable for our quality of life, particularly when you consider that Heathrow have no night flights and that their night time period is from 11pm to 7am while at Stansted, aircraft fly until 11.30 pm and land at 6.30 am. Why should we have to put up with this when Heathrow doesn't?

Another very noisy nuisance, especially at night, is the back thrust of the planes on landing, for some aircraft, the back thrust is necessary; however, surely the loud revving of engines before take-off is not always necessary. This noise can be heard throughout the day and night.

'Uttlesford is the best rural place to Live in Britain'

Somehow I find this hard to accept. In the first place, it is hard to believe we are even in a rural area, what with the encroaching development, the constant traffic jams on the M11 and the difficulty of accessing neighbouring East Herts in the mornings.

We have a rat run of strangers through the Lane at peak times, a lot of unnecessary signs for a cycleway few wanted within Birchanger and we have one of the noisiest neighbours in the UK.

Sadly, this could be the last time that Uttlesford wins this title. Too much thoughtless development and shoddy housing have been approved, cheaply built but expensive to buy which are likely to deteriorate at an alarming rate and a transport system that is already inadequate not to mention the parking issue. We are not taking sufficient care of, nor do we appreciate what we have. This leads to failure to maintain our unique asset and to permit open season for all comers to do what they will. This must change before we lose what is left of our rural area forever.

Numbers of affordable new homes insufficient

One thing that is needed to keep our younger residents in the district is a great deal more affordable housing for all sizes of family. This year has seen developers build 98 affordable homes for rent, 53 for Shared Ownership Schemes of all sizes but the total should be higher considering all the other houses which have been built. In some areas, where building on the expensive developments of so called executive homes is slowing down, you might think that developers would get the hint.

They are just not building enough of the homes which Uttlesford residents really need; we need local homes for local people, fewer of the so called executive homes which are cluttering up the countryside.

Back to cleaning recyclable bottles, reusable drink cartons and ditch the straws. **Are Wet Wipes recyclable?**

No. Wet wipes contain plastics that are not recyclable and so should be placed in your general waste. Better yet, don't use them at all and choose reusable alternatives instead. Would you like to spend more time outdoors?

You could do this and help someone not too far away from you as well. Many elderly and disabled people have found their gardens have somewhat run away from them this year and are finding it increasingly hard to cope. A project managed from Dunmow, puts volunteers in touch with people who have a garden they can no longer control. Disabled and elderly people would like to enjoy their own outdoor space, but simply cannot do the work involved in maintaining even a small garden any longer. For this section of our community, volunteers have already provided a lifeline. Not only have they put the garden to right, in many cases they have become firm friends as well, unwittingly providing yet another lifeline.



Being old and long term sick is a very isolating experience for even the most normally gregarious people. It comes as a shock as people simply do not think it will ever happen to them and everyone

is ill prepared to cope. At present there are more people in need than volunteers available for a scheme which brings the elderly and disabled in touch with those who might be able to help and which could be of benefit to both.

The project is run by Mark Ripkins. He will explain to anyone interested in joining the scheme as a volunteer or who is looking for help just clearing up their garden, exactly what is involved. Would £30 tempt you to use cloth nappies?

Maybe you already use cloth nappies or a nappy service, in which case if you have paid over $\pounds 30$ for the nappies or a nappy laundering service in the past year, you are entitled to a $\pounds 30$ refund from Essex County Council. All you have to do is to produce a receipt for your purchase in your name and contact Essex County Council. You can do this on line at www.recycleforessex.comcloth-nappies.



Fed up with junk mail?

You can opt out of a great deal of this by contacting the Mail Preference Service. They can help stop all the unwanted catalogues and other addressed items. Nothing is totally fool proof, but using this service should block 95% of this

type of mail. There are various options. To find out which is best for you, you can Google the Mailing Preference Service where you will find sites and options, or you can visit the main post office in Bishops Stortford.

Guided summer walks are back

Some of you may have tried the Stansted walk, which starts at 10.30 from outside the library on Fridays, lasts up to an hour and takes us through some perhaps unknown routes around the countryside which surrounds Stansted.



If you would like a longer walk, you could try the one in Hatfield Forest from the main entrance at 9.45 on Thursdays. This walk can be about 3-5 miles long and lasts about 2 hours. On both walks well behaved dogs are welcome. There is a short form to complete on site before you do your first walk. It is also advisable to arrive 10 minutes before the scheduled start of the walk. Try it sometime; it is a way to explore perhaps hitherto unknown paths and to meet new people.

An end to daily blood testing for diabetics in sight

Being a diabetic is hard for the millions of sufferers in this country. Not only is the diet restricted but there are the endless blood tests, sometimes needed several times a day, before you take the medication, often through another needle. Now a new patch could put an end to some of that. Just wearing one of these new patches, which read sugar levels through skin secretions, means that blood tests are unnecessary even when they are required at ten minute intervals.

More health myths dispelled

Eating late does not necessarily pile on the pounds, as long as you have not been eating full meals during the day. Most people need only a certain amount of calories each day but it does not matter when they have them unless they come from junk food. However the fatter you are the less likely you are to get pneumonia.

Washing everything down with 8 glasses of water a day does not apply to everyone. The less you weigh the less water you need.

Reading in a dim light at worst will only give you dry eyes or eye strain for a short time. No permanent damage.

Catching up on sleep at weekends does not work. Scientists found that even after a ten hour sleep, reaction times and general fatigue had not recovered.

Cold weather does not give you a cold. Volunteers were exposed to the common cold virus then half had the good fortune to have a warm bath and time in a warm room while the other half had to stand in the cold after a shower. It made no difference as to who caught the cold. The results for both groups were the same. Vitamin C also does not prevent a cold.

It's not all down to the ladies

For many years now pregnancy and childbirth have been regarded as women's work. It's nothing to do with most men other than the occasional back massage and the odd ante-natal class. That is all changing and it may come as a shock to discover that men have a much greater role to play than they realized. The health of the baby is down to both parents, not just the mother alone. Schools are about to begin educating children about the benefits their future children might have when both parents have good health habits and have avoided excessive alcohol consumption throughout their adolescent years and onwards. Obesity and smoking can also have a detrimental effect to fertility. Going to a gym is expensive for most people and apparently it is not necessarily the best, or the only place where you can lose weight and attain a degree of fitness. You can actually do a lot more than you think in your daily life. For instance three hours gardening burns off more than an hour in the gym, enough for most of us and normally less expensive. That hated word housework, which most of us intensely dislike is good exercise as well. Poll victory for local residents over airport computer

Manchester Airports Group (MAG) has no cause to celebrate over its claim that some 650 emails have been sent to Uttlesford District Council supporting its plans to expand Stansted Airport to an annual passenger throughput of 43 million – 66% above the 25.9 million passengers handled last year.

Unsurprisingly MAG's spin doctors do not bother to point out that 615 of the supportive responses were almost identical computergenerated emails, prompted by a letter from Stansted Chief Executive Ken O'Toole to all his employees and airport-based businesses urging them to "voice their support" for MAG's expansion proposals for Stansted, saying: "It is quick and easy to register your support for the application and will take two minutes. All you need to do is log onto www.ourstansted.com and complete the registration form. This will then send a letter automatically to the Council outlining why you support the plans for the airport."

Even though it was said to take just two minutes to send an automatic, computer-generated email to Uttlesford District Council supporting the airport's expansion plans only five per cent of those employed at the airport took the trouble to do that, which doesn't say much for airport staff morale or loyalty.

Stop Stansted Expansion (SSE) Deputy Chairman Brian Ross said "Despite MAG's attempts to rig the system, local people have outscored the airport's computer 'voting' system with more than 700 objections to MAG's plans – all individually written. Aircraft noise, especially at night, is the biggest concern – followed by road traffic, with many respondents saying that local roads already can't cope." Those objecting to the planning application come from far and wide, although mostly from those parts of Essex and Herts most affected by the impacts of the airport. Some 50 local Parish and Town Councils are amongst those opposing the airport's expansion plans.

To add insult to injury, MAG's attempt to flood Uttlesford District Council with standard emails supporting its expansion plans may have spectacularly backfired because the computerised system which generated the standard emails failed to include the sender's postal address – a requirement which the Council has always insisted upon. As a result, it is understood these automatic emails are to be treated as a petition, which will carry minimal weight.

On Monday 30th April, SSE sent Uttlesford District Council its own response to the MAG planning application. SSE's 175page response setting out the detailed grounds for refusing the application is the result of two months' work by an expert SSE team and is now available on the SSE website. The trees actually sparkled with sun on their new bright pale green leaves, it was absolutely beautiful and there was a sense of calm all around. Several robins were moving about, green finches and blackbirds were singing. I didn't go over to the Birchanger side of the Wood and it was probably for this reason I heard no buzzards. The last of the English bluebells were still well in evidence particularly at both the south end of the Wood and the western end of Birchanger Wood. In the woodland that runs along the A120, sadly there is a lot of ash die-back caused by chalara.



My two Stansted swallows arrived on the 4th April and are probably wondering why they came over so early. It must be a real nightmare for them trying to find sufficient insects to eat. They are definitely not sitting on a nest yet so let's hope that we get a bit more 'full-on' summer shortly. Following my call last month for photographs of Birchanger Wood, this month

I received a number of photographs supplied by Peter Sherlock, our volunteer woodland worker. He supplied the above photo of the bluebells in the wood which I hope you enjoy as much as I do.

Many of you know or have met Derek Honour, a local Stansted Mountfitchet resident, who sadly died recently. It was his business, D. Honour and Son (Landscape) Ltd. which took a leap of faith in believing in The Birchanger Wood Trust's ability to obtain the necessary funding and as a result they constructed all the wonderful winding woodland paths that we have today in Birchanger Wood.

We are so lucky having Birchanger Wood on our doorstep, as not everyone can go and take a short, or long, stroll out in local woodland with the family and friends and come home still looking spick and span.
