Anxious Year is Over for Birchanger Family

It is worrying to say the least to be told that you will be homeless within a year through no fault of your own. This is what happened to Birchanger family, the Martins, last year when they were told that following the death of their father they had a year to vacate the home in which they had lived since birth.

Apparently current council rules stipulate that a council property lease can only be reassigned to other occupants of a property twice. In this case, the lease had already been reassigned twice to family members and therefore the council refused to let them stay in the house. The family was given a year to find alternative accommodation after which time they would have to vacate the home.



Fortunately, this family has a very large support group both within and outside Birchanger so when Katie Martin submitted a petition on-line, hundreds signed the petition. Even so, there was no certainty that the council would take any notice of this. However, something must have occurred to reverse the

council's decision, because in early June, Katie, Annalise and Jordon received the amazing news that the council had made an exception to the rule allowing them to remain in the family home. It is not hard to imagine the happiness and the overwhelming sense of relief this news brought to the family. Common sense, it seems, prevailed after all.

Katie Martin said, "I am delighted by the news and would like to sincerely thank everyone who supported us and helped us to keep our home, I just cant thank them enough".

Elizabeth Godwin's response:

Heathrow has permission for only 5,800 night flights per annum. In actuality there are only up to 16 flights per night, taking place mainly between 4.30am and 6 pm. Something of a courtesy to the community. Stansted traffic is random and heavy cargo leaves at all hours of the night.

A disruptive summer in the lane

Not something you will want to hear but if you do not already know, there are two long awaited projects that will benefit many people, which after many years of fighting for by the Parish Council are finally going to materialize this summer.

One which is due to start in July will involve the long awaited installation of the footpath at Churton bend. This was in the original plans for the development but it seemed to be forgotten by everyone except the Parish Council who had to work for years to get the work reinstated.

Work will start on the footpath between 9am and 5pm on weekdays from July 2nd and is scheduled to last until August 18th. You can expect the Lane to be closed during this period.

Work will also begin this summer on the installation of a few, much requested, additional lampposts along the Lane, one of which will be outside the village hall. Inevitably it will cause some traffic disruption but hopefully most people will appreciate the benefit from these new lights during the long winter evenings.

Local plan ready for consultation at last

The local plan has just been approved to go out for consultation. The plan will shortly be available on line or at local consultation sites throughout the district. Details of these will be placed on the notice boards as and when they become available.

It is not expected to affect us too much. The main focus areas are Easton Park, Stebbing and Great Chesterford where it is proposed that Garden Villages will provide most of the housing in these locations and which the inspectorate requires. The rest of the required houses will be spread around the towns and villages.

Not much is expected to effect Birchanger, as long as the Green Belt Policy remains in place. Churton is already included in the numbers and there have been several applications for new homes in single developments which will more than make up the rest. As ever, the devil is in the detail and that we have yet to see.

Going to college at the airport?

That is what 250 people are going to be doing in September and there is still room for more students. With exams over and the results some way off it is time to think ahead if you have nothing concrete planned for your next move. The college opens for the first time in September 2018 and offers career opportunities in aviation, engineering, hospitality, business and retail. Being right on our doorstep means it could be worth thinking about.

Access free courses with your library card

Libraries have changed a lot in the past few years and although we still have our mobile library visiting us every third Saturday, there are several other services which might be of interest which you can obtain on line through your library card. A free course on a wide variety of subjects is one of them. They even run taster courses, so you can discover if the full course is for you or not before committing yourself in September. These courses include further learning hobbies, arts, music and all the usual academic courses as well. It can be just for fun or the way to gain another qualification. A lot of the full courses may be free and July is a great month to find out if there is anything there for you. If you have mental health issues there is a lot of material you can access through the library services by simply going on line. The information can be downloaded by logging on to the Essex Libraries Website. For learning and health information Essex Libraries is a good place to start.

Can I recycle it?

With packaging becoming ever more complicated these days and our seas being polluted with micro-plastics and polystyrene to the detriment of sea life all over the world, more people are becoming concerned about recycling than ever before. Remember the dead baby whale choked by polythene wrapping! The problem is that with the advent of more sophisticated packaging right across the board it is harder than ever to know which bin to put it in.

Uttlesford District Council now has a new service on its website, known quite simply as 'Can I Recycle It'? Log onto the councils website and go to 'Refuse Recycling'. All you have to do then is enter in the box provided a brief description of the packaging you are querying e.g. 'tinned peaches', and your answer should speedily appear.

Restaurant review

Fancy a Curry? There are several Indian restaurants within easy reach of Birchanger and we are perhaps spoilt for choice but for a curry with a difference, the Queen Victoria on the edge of Dunmow could be worth a visit.

The Queen Victoria pub is as the name suggests a long standing pub. The difference is that while you can get the usual pints, wines and pub grub, you can also have a very delicious curry, whether you choose to eat in the restaurant, at the bar, or outside. There are curries to try whose names and tastes may be new to you. All are different and delicious. Those who want a mild curry are well catered for and the staff will explain just how hot the various curries are. Service is quick and friendly.



Living with a troublesome neighbour

It is bad enough having noisy neighbours living next door but when you are dealing with a neighbour like Stansted Airport it is positively impossible for many of us these days. The airport wants to expand and the company has ambitions, which even the prospect of a third runway at Heathrow seems unlikely to deter.



They have made it quite clear that they do not care whether they get on with the local community or not. Drop off and collect charges are now £3.50 for 10 minutes which is the highest charge in the country. Local taxi firms which serve the surrounding community cannot return to the drop off point before 30 minutes have elapsed. If they make a short journey with an earlier fare, they have to drive around with their next passengers until the 30 minutes are up, or else face a substantial charge. Some could argue that it was a restraint of trade. Airport related fly-parking in Birchanger and surrounding villages has also reached extraordinary heights due to the high parking costs at the airport. In addition, the airport wants more night flights, including the noisy cargo flights which already plague us in the early hours.

If you have problems with airport related fly-parking you should report them to Stansted Airport Limited 'Fly-Parking Complaints Department, by using their freephone number; 0800 7312385. Alternatively, you can report it to Stop Stansted Expansion (SSE). There's little point in calling the police, as they only seem to act if the vehicle is causing an obstruction or if the road tax is out of date, and since the demise of the tax disc, we have precious little means of discovering this ourselves.

Work at the airport is not suited to the local community as a whole, so workers come in from outside. Our green belt areas have already been lost for so called 'airport related housing', which conversely the average airport worker cannot afford.

There is not much we can do as 'airport neighbours' but thankfully SSE continues to give their tenacious support together with a fount of knowledge regarding all airport matters. We are lucky to have them

Things have definitely gone downhill since BAA was ordered to sell an airport and it was not good news for this local community when they chose to sell Stansted. Our current relationship with Stansted airport, which is now owned by the Manchester Airports Group, is frustrating and very poor to say the least. Still one important victory has been gained, you can read about it on page 9 under the heading 'Stop Stansted Expansion' by Brian Ross.

Always feeling hungry?

Instead of reaching for that sugary snack, you might find some of these alternatives help prevent hunger pangs. Porridge is not just all stodgy. Plain porridge first thing in the morning is a slow energy release food. Eaten with cinnamon or peanut butter, it can stop hunger pangs for hours. If you are hungry between meals, apples, oranges and pears will keep you going until the next meal. In fact eating an apple twenty minutes before a meal reduces the amount you feel you need to eat at that meal. Fibre takes longer to digest so you feel fuller longer, which is also why vegetable soup is good for you. Eggs are higher in calories but maintain your blood sugar levels for longer as well as being good for you. Popping popcorn in the cinema is not so bad after all; it is mostly air but has a high volume which makes you feel full.

If you feel the same as I do then do come to our Sunday services where I am sure you will find something that interests you. You do not have to come every week, perhaps only once a month, but you will always find a warm welcome and probably some debate on a subject that you can get involved in. *Pam Lee*

Better peanut allergy testing

Many children are diagnosed as suffering from a peanut allergy on less than accurate finger prick testing. A lot of these tests have been proved to be wrong over the years and the patient has either stopped eating peanuts unnecessarily or has suffered with ill health. Now a new and more accurate method of testing gives far more reliable results especially when the results of the existing tests prove to be inconclusive.

Do you want to improve your sleep?

Most of us feel we could do with sleeping better but are resigned to the feeling that we probably never will. Before you give up on a good night's sleep completely, why not try a bit of sleep hygiene first. You might not find much improvement at first as it can take a while to banish years of bad sleeping habits. First of all look at your bed: is the mattress the right type for you? One size never fits all and we are told that anything over 8 years old should be binned anyway. De-cluttering your bedroom is supposed to help as well. Don't fall asleep in front of the television, the blue light it emits fools the body into thinking it is daytime and it can be very hard to get back to sleep again. Put the phone and the iPad away, they are blocking your chances of a good night's sleep as they prevent the release of melatonin which is needed by the brain to reprogram itself through the night hours. Those 2am texts and calls are absolutely out. Other steps to take are to try and work somewhere where there are windows and get out in the sun when you can. Eliminate all caffeine after 5pm. Sweet things are best kept to tea time and that nightcap is not helpful either. Instead, try eating a kiwi, some crisp bread and a drink of camomile tea or an almond snack and read a good book before bedtime. Be patient, it can take years to break a lifetime of bad sleeping habits and to start to enjoy quality sleep again.

Could Alzheimer disease be condemned to history?

Anyone with a relative suffering this horrible disease would say the sooner the better. For years it was feared that any signs of a cure might be a long way away but recent advances in gene research all over the world into relatives and patients with the disease have discovered some thirty genes which are linked to Alzheimer's disease. Finding the cause is a major part of finding a cure. It may not help the present generation, but genetic engineering should help to eliminate the gene for generations to come and also may be in time to be of some use to the younger generation around today.

Resistance to anti-fungal drugs threatens plant and animal life. This little known group of illnesses is prevalent throughout the plant and animal world and that includes us. We are all perhaps familiar with the sight of fields blighted with black rust as well as plants and vegetables affected by mould but all animal life suffers its own specific fungal infections. 



Art Solutions visits Birchanger Primary School

During the last week of half-term, we had some exciting visitors to our school, the Arts Solutions Team (a group of extremely talented artists!) They were here to work with individual classes to create some art masterpieces for our displays.

The day started with an assembly where Liz explained to the children the different resources and techniques they would be using. I think the children (as well as the staff) were in disbelief to find out that we could make art work from only PVA glue, newspaper and tissue paper. But we were soon proven wrong.



The children were presented with cut out cardboard templates which then had to be covered with newspaper, glue and finally tissue paper to bring them to life! During the creative process, children used twists and pebbles to recreate 3D scenes from The Bible. This involved scrunching and twisting newspaper very carefully and specifically to create such shapes.



The children had important decisions to make, such as: how many sheets of newspaper to use, which

direction to twist or scrunch in and finally where to place it on cardboard template.



The children in all classes took part phenomenally well and were able to have the opportunity to take part in art pieces to wow our visitors! They learned a lot throughout the day, including: new art skills, some construction skills, decision making, team work and how to layer newspaper and tissue paper to give the structures more depth to appear more realistic. They thoroughly enjoyed the experience and can feel proud to see their final art work hanging in the school hall. It truly is a delightful sight!

Democracy In Action 'SSE Victory'

Uttlesford District Council (UDC) is in the final stages of agreeing a new Local Plan which has been several years in the making and subject to considerable argument and debate. The new Local Plan is about 400 pages long and it sets down the planning policies which will shape the development of Uttlesford District over the next 15 years. For obvious reasons Stop Stansted Expansion (SSE) has been taking a close interest in the Local Plan policy with regard to the future development of Stansted Airport and SSE was horrified to find that, at the last minute, the Airports Policy (Policy SP11) had been almost completely re-written. The proposed new wording opened the door to almost unlimited airport expansion. SSE then discovered that the new wording had been almost entirely written by Manchester Airports Group, the owners of Stansted Airport. MAG submitted its proposed new wording to UDC and the Council's planning officers had accepted it almost verbatim. Birchanger resident Brian Ross, who is Deputy Chairman of SSE, immediately asked for, and was granted, permission to speak to a crucial Council meeting on 12th June, He was given just three minutes! The main purpose of this Council meeting was to approve the final version of the Local Plan. The text of Brian Ross's three-minute address is shown below. The outcome was that the UDC Cabinet agreed to re-instate all the key wording from the 2017 draft Local Plan, including the safeguards and protections against unfettered airport expansion. An important victory, albeit only a part of a much wider battle. The three minute address:

"My name is Brian Ross. I am the Deputy Chairman of Stop Stansted Expansion (SSE) and it is in that capacity that I am speaking to you this evening. SSE has more than 7,000 members and registered supporters. Our membership includes almost every local parish & town council in Uttlesford, and many others from further afield. For many years SSE has enjoyed a cordial but business-like relationship with Uttlesford District Council. I very much regret the fact that our relationship with the Council has become strained in recent months as a result of our profound concerns about the Council's handling of the current airport planning application. The latest issue to cause a divide was the publication two weeks ago of the radically revised Airports Policy in the most recent draft of the Local Plan. The new policy removes almost all the longstanding safeguards for the local community in relation to unfettered expansion of Stansted Airport. It not only opens the door to the current airport planning application, it lays out the red carpet. And it provides an open invitation for unfettered expansion of Stansted Airport in the future. I believe this may have happened by accident rather than by design.

Policy SP11 – as agreed unanimously by this Council last year in the last draft of the Local Plan - was not controversial. I've reviewed all of the 126 consultation comments. Almost all of these asked for stronger safeguards with regard to airport expansion. Only 2 out of the 126 argued for the relaxation or removal of the existing safeguards. Unsurprisingly one of these was from MAG. Policy SP11 has been revised almost exactly in line with the changes proposed by MAG. If anyone doubts this, I have the list of MAG's proposed changes here and I'm happy to make copies available. Also - whether by accident or design - just this afternoon I received from this Council, following a FOI request, the notes of a meeting between MAG and Officers on 11 December last year. These also show that the key changes to Policy SP11 mirror the changes proposed by MAG. I urge you to reject the proposed re-writing of Policy SP11 and leave the wording as previously unanimously agreed by this Council in the 2017 draft of the Local Plan. I very much hope this will allow us to begin to have, once again, a cordial and business-like relationship."

by trustees who will have the protection of limited liability. The land will remain 'Vested' with the Charity Commission in trust as per the original trust deed. Due to these changes, Birchanger Wood Trust 2018 is looking for local people to become trustees. Are you interested in steering the lovely Birchanger Wood into the future, conserving and maintaining its assets for the benefit of local residents? Let this wonderful green lung be a benefit to all, whatever your age or ability.



Birchanger Wood had a visitor in May. Jono Forgham, (Jono) came and spent some time in Birchanger Wood and many of you will have read his super article in the Stortford Independent on the 16th May. He is brilliant and so knowledgeable in nature and the environment. Did you know we have chiff-chaff nesting and also black-caps and at least one nuthatch in Birchanger Wood? One of our super woodland guys pointed out the fungi, 'King Alfred Cakes' - used by travellers in the past as fuel for their campfires, and 'Herb Robert', which can be used in herbal medicines and not forgetting our Golden Saxifrage. Even Terry, our three legged hedgehog was coaxed out to meet and greet Jono.



I have a message for some dog walkers in the wood. "Please take your dog deposits home with you, it does not belong in a tree or bush and it is not right that our volunteers have to remove your dogs mess. It is unhygienic, inconsiderate and it stinks. Please use the bins provided or take it home with you".

Traffic pollution harming plant life

Insect pollinated plants produce a variety of volatile chemicals which attract passing bees, wasps or flies. Gardeners select scented flowers such as roses, lavender, sweet peas, stocks and honeysuckle so we can enjoy their fragrances too. But have you noticed that in built up areas you need to get really close to smell such perfumes? If we can't smell the flowers, then what is the impact on insects? An article published in the New Scientist in February this year described how recent research had found that the various chemicals present in traffic fumes quickly disrupt the chemical signatures of these plant fragrances, making them unreadable by insects. Thus, if the vital pollinating insects cannot sense the flowers they need for their essential supplies of nectar and pollen, pollination may not occur, and seed production could be compromised.

Much of the area within the Hundred Parishes is largely rural with low levels of traffic pollution, but there are higher levels of traffic fumes close to major roads, motorways or larger towns, especially those with narrow streets. On sunny days the pollutants in these fumes will be interacting destructively with the volatile chemicals from the flowers leaving the insects confused and hungry.

The Essex Air Quality Consortium was formed in 1995 and now oversees the monitoring of air quality across the county as this has implications for human health. It is more important than ever to have an abundance of flowers in every garden, high street, side road, lane and verge to combat this pollution. Many local gardens welcome visitors during the summer.
