My Amazing Experience in Ghana - by Chloe Monk



So I'm back! After two amazing weeks in Africa I'm home safe and sound! I can't quite describe how wonderful my experience in Ghana was. I flew

from London Heathrow to Dubai airport which took 6 and half hours. I then had an hour stopover before another 7 hour flight from Dubai to Accra airport. At Accra airport we were met by one of the workers from 'The Young Shall Grow International'. His name was Noah and worked at the shelter where I stayed. I was welcomed with open arms and felt right at home from the moment I landed. That night, we slept in bunk beds in the guesthouse and I had to sleep inside a big blue mosquito net which surprisingly turned out to be really comforting. On the first night I was so scared and really wanted to speak to my mum but in the morning my anxiety was replaced by sheer excitement at the start of my adventure.

On our first day we were taken to the local church and were able to see how passionate they all are about their religion which is basically Christian. It was so heartwarming to see how important their religion was to each and every one

of them. During my stay, I visited two schools. The first one was called Lolita school

and was in the middle of a very poor village. Upon our arrival, the children and teachers put on a welcome ceremony for us all which included lots of dancing and singing. The children got us all up and taught us a Ghanaian dance called the 'chicken dance'. I certainly didn't look as good as them doing it but the atmosphere in the classroom with all of us dancing together was something I will never forget. The second school, where I spent the most time, was called The Lords Academy. I visited this school every day for a week and made some very strong bonds with everyone in the school. One of the children from the school I grew especially fond of was a girl called Reneta who would literally fight anyone off who came near me because she was so jealous. Another favourite of mine was a little boy from the shelter called Richard (pronounced 'Rishar') who is the same age as my brother aged 4 and he was very cute. We taught them English nursery rhymes, some science, and origami. The children and teachers in this school are amazing and welcomed us so warmly into their school.





My team leader, Jide, was also really amazing and so, so lovely. He went above and beyond to make sure we had a brilliant experience and looked after us better than I could have ever expected. In the evenings, we played football, volleyball, rugby and many other sports and games with the street children and children from all over the village. The food was all very traditional. My favourite meal was 'red-red' with fried plantain. Red-red is a very traditional Ghanaian dish which is tomato based and has

beans in. It was absolutely delicious!

On our last weekend we were taken on a trip to a monkey sanctuary and we visited a waterfall. When I held a monkey in the middle of a jungle I didn't think anything could top it. However, the next day, I swam in a waterfall and that turned out to be the highlight of the whole weekend. On our last day we were taken on a boat trip across the lagoon and walked across an island on the other side of the lagoon. It was so picturesque and beautiful. After that we had a drumming lesson and then a party around the campfire. There is so much more I could talk about but these were the most memorable parts of my trip. I have learnt so much in just two weeks that I will keep with me forever.

One of the most amazing things about the people in Ghana is that they may not have a lot but they are so grateful and so hospitable it really is amazing to see. Someone said to me while I was there that if the Ghanaian currency was in hospitality, it would be the richest country in the world and how very true that is. I am forever grateful to have met such decent human beings whilst out there and Ghana holds a very big place in my heart. I would like to take this opportunity to thank every single person that donated money to help



me experience this wonderful place. No matter how big or small your contribution, I am very grateful for your sponsorship, without which I would not have been able to see the things I have seen. In Ghana they don't say goodbye, they say see you soon and I will be definitely be seeing my Ghanaian friends again soon....

DO YOU WANT TO LOSE YOUR ROUNDABOUT!

As reported by this magazine in May, the Highways Agency have submitted plans to remove our roundabout at the end of Birchanger Lane, nearest the M11, and replace it with traffic lights. If the plan is passed, it will mean that all traffic out of Birchanger Lane will be compelled to turn left and navigate all the way over the M11 at the junction 8 roundabout to access Bishop's Stortford. If you do not want to lose our roundabout you need to register your objections before it is too late. Birchanger Parish Council have already decided to object to the plan but your objections also need to be heard.

Danger of Rhodes Art Complex losing Council's funding

Following East Herts Council's proposal to build a new Arts Venue on the Old River Lane in Bishop's Stortford an independent group has been formed to support the retention of the Rhodes Arts Complex and Bishop's Stortford Museum in South Road.



The Town Council has agreed in principle to contribute to the on-going costs of East Herts Council's proposed new Arts venue in Old River Lane. If it does so, there is a danger it could withdraw, or substantially reduce its current financial support for the Rhodes Arts Complex in South Road. This would make it very difficult for the Rhodes Trustees to maintain a viable business.

The town would be deprived of its museum and of a thriving facility which currently provides a wide variety of activities - meeting the needs of the local community. The many donors, staff, museum volunteers, ushers and the general public, have, by their combined efforts and support, contributed to Rhodes' success. Their contribution must not be ignored.

Whatever the outcome of the East Herts Council's proposals, the members of the Rhodes Support Group do not wish to see a building which is popular, fit-for-purpose, works well for the local community and has seen significant improvements over the years, go to waste. As part of our campaign we launched a petition at the town's carnival on 16th June to 'Call upon Bishop's Stortford's Town Council to

continue to support the Rhodes Arts Complex and Museum on its current site in South Road by means of an annual grant sufficient to maintain it as a viable venue.' We obtained over 550 signatures on that afternoon. If you wish to sign the petition please please go on line and use the following link

A Plan to Decimate Birchanger?

completely changed Birchanger if Uttlesford District Council had not voted to support all the remaining Green Belt areas in the District. We lost a great deal of it over twenty years ago when the Four Parishes, which included Birchanger and who were worst affected by the loss of a great deal

of Green Belt took the District Council to the High Court over the Forest Hall development and others in the Green Belt. The Parishes lost but the effect of these developments has not yet been forgotten. Despite the loss of a great deal of land to Stansted, Birchanger has remained surrounded by fields and it is every single square inch of this area, all Green Belt, which various developers had their eyes on. In summary they were:

Land behind 266 to 238 Birchanger Lane, garden land behind 328 Birchanger Lane, land at the rear of 285-287 Birchanger Lane, three different Applications from Sion Park, which would cover the land they own. An application covering all around the Stansted boundary to the M11, some 216 hectares, land behind Homebase and Plot 'B' in Birchanger Lane.

A further submission to develop all the fields around Birchanger including a new school, which would be necessary as this would make Birchanger into a town. All the above sites have been rated as unsuitable development in the Green Belt, contributing to the Green Belt, or being of strong value to it.

Nothing about this plan can be certain until the inspector gives his approval. The last proposal was rejected. However, it is really important that you have your say. If this plan is wrong, the inspectorate is likely to make their own decision. Whatever your views are you need to contribute.


Don't Forget the Day Centres

Dining Out in the Village

SSE Fires Starting Gun on High Court Action

SSE has served legal papers on the Secretary of State for Transport providing formal notice of a Judicial Review application to the High Court unless – by no later than 2nd August 2018 – he designates the current Stansted Airport planning application as a Nationally Significant Infrastructure Project (NSIP) thereby requiring it to be dealt with nationally rather than locally by Uttlesford District Council (UDC).

The planning application was submitted by Stansted's owners, the Manchester Airports Group (MAG) on 22nd February. If approved it would mean a 44% increase in flights and a 66% increase in passengers compared to last year's levels. From the outset, SSE has fiercely opposed the attempt to rush through the application and has argued that it needed to be determined nationally rather than by UDC. National determination of a planning application is a lengthier and far more thorough process than local determination, involving detailed scrutiny by an expert team. By contrast, despite having no expertise in the field of major airport infrastructure projects, UDC had reached an agreement with MAG to 'fast track' its planning application in return for staged payments. SSE branded this a 'cash for favours' agreement.

For almost four months SSE has been corresponding on this matter with both the Secretary of State for Transport and the Secretary of State for Housing, Communities and Local Government ('HCLG'). Neither of them is at this stage prepared to 'call in' the airport planning application for national determination, although the latter (who has overall responsibility for the planning process) has indicated that he will consider this when the process is further advanced.

Meanwhile the clock is ticking, although thankfully the attempt by MAG and UDC to rush through the planning application and have it decided by July 18th has come spectacularly unstuck. Under pressure from Essex and Herts County Councils, as well as from SSE, Uttlesford has finally now realised that it needs a great deal more information before the planning application can even be sensibly considered. No new target date has yet been set for determining the application but it is unlikely to be before October.

Despite the current delay, SSE has decided that it cannot afford to wait any longer to ask for a legal ruling as to whether the application should be dealt with nationally rather than locally. That is why SSE has now served formal notice of an application to the High Court for Judicial Review proceedings.

At this stage SSE's action is targeted solely at the Secretary of State for Transport but SSE has reserved its position with regard to potential future action against the Secretary of State for HCLG and UDC. All these parties have been served with copies of SSE's legal documents, as has Stansted Airport Limited.

SSE will ask the High Court for an expedited hearing but even so the hearing may not take place until next year. Accordingly, SSE has made representations to the interested parties seeking their agreement that it would be inappropriate for the current airport planning application to be decided until the outcome of the Judicial Review is known, pointing out that there is no urgent need to determine this planning application because Stansted Airport is still nowhere near its present cap of 35 million passengers per annum (mppa).





Health Matters

An Aspirin a Day Keeps Bowel Cancer Away?

Apparently it can help, although it is not advised for long term use. This was discovered by looking at patients who had been advised to take an aspirin a day following a stroke. It was found that most did not have the disease, or if they had experienced it, the symptoms were either reduced or had gone altogether. In its current form, aspirin should not be taken long term but the discovery has led to a spate of new research whereby the active ingredient against bowel cancer is being isolated and engineered into a safer form. Taking aspirin is something many of us have done for years and if you are concerned about the disease, intermittent use of the drug could help in the short term. However, always discuss any changes in medication with your doctor first.

Don't Like the Way You Look in a Swimsuit?

Most of us don't, even if we do have perfect figures compared to everyone else. Last minute diets may seem tempting but are they really worth it long term? Would simply cutting out the crisps and eating in front of the TV be any better? Probably not! And that new fashion fad diet, promising that you will lose a stone in a week simply won't work with holiday food and drink. The pounds will be back quicker than they were lost and by the end of the holiday you could look worse than when you left home, except of course you will be much more relaxed and won't care anyway.

Could We Repair the Spinal Cord?

For anyone whose life has been totally overturned by an injury to the spinal cord and as a result has found themselves trapped in a body which cannot move, a new treatment involving gene therapy could bring hope that their situation might be improved despite the odds.

This seemingly impossible prospect may not be so far away, thanks to gene therapy trials on rats which seem to indicate that using this therapy they have learnt to move and control their limbs again.



It is hoped that the treatment, which involves injections to treat sections of the spinal cord, will soon be used to procure the same results for humans.

More work needs to be done but for the first time in medical history there is hope for these sufferers at last.


How to Lose Weight Without Trying



BAGS visit a vineyard

On July 12th the BAGS ladies went on their annual trip, this time visiting a local vineyard near Great Bardfield.

We had a lovely afternoon and were made most welcome by Rebecca, the owner of the estate, and Claire, the Vineyard's manager. We began with an interesting tour and talk about the history of the beautiful estate visiting their small herd of alpacas and walking by their lovely lake and gardens before arriving at the vineyard itself. Apparently the vineyard was first planted in 1989 and they now grow mainly Bacchus and Pinot Noir vines.



It sounded quite a complicated job to manage these vines and obviously takes a lot of hard work throughout the seasons to produce an excellent wine. After the tour we returned to their stunning Anne of Cleves barn for our wine tasting where we tried several white wines and a rosé. 
