Concerned Residents Swamp Village Hall At Meeting Over Travellers Site



On Tuesday 7th August, around 200 villagers attended the meeting concerning the unauthorised development by travellers at the M11 end of Birchanger Lane.

The meeting was introduced by Parish Council Chairman Angie Driscoll and addressed by Dawn French, CE of Uttlesford District Council (UDC). Accompanying her from UDC were Nigel Brown, Head of Planning & Enforcement, and Sarah Marshall, Enforcement Team Leader. The police were represented by PC Paul Brady of the Gypsy & Traveller Rural Engagement Team. Ray Gooding, County Councillor and Cabinet Member for Education, Essex County Council, was also in attendance.

Dawn French, who previously held a senior role at Basildon District Council and was involved in the council's handling of the Dale Farm site, explained that the travellers purchased the greenbelt land site quite legally and applied for planning permission for an equestrian area including stables and an office. Despite 'mislaid' objections from Birchanger Parish Council, planning permission was granted. The travellers then proceeded to move onto the land as residents with 12 caravans and have since built a perimeter fence, over 2 metres high, set down hard core and built an earthen bank.

Using a green belt site in this manner clearly contravenes the current planning permission. However, as the travellers own the land the usual means of eviction cannot be pursued. This would normally require the landowner to obtain a court order for eviction which would be enforced by the council and the police. However, as the travellers have purchased the land themselves, it is only a question of whether planning permission is granted or not for a residential site.

UDC has served a 14 day injunction on the occupants of the site prohibiting them from allowing more caravans onto the land or developing it outside the terms of the existing planning permission, which is for limited equestrian use. Since then, on the 13th August, at the court hearing return date, the court granted the injunction until further notice and a copy of the court order has been served to each of the site occupants.

It is understood that the owner has applied for planning permission for residential use of 12 caravans on the site. The council are still awaiting the additional information required to make the application valid and external parties have been engaged to provide this information. The council will continue to monitor the site and take any necessary enforcement action as advised at the Parish Meeting.

There will be a period of consultation at which time residents and Birchanger Parish Council can make their objections known. Unfortunately, the parish council will only be consulted on the planning application and will have no say in the actual decision making process itself.



The Parish Council has promised to pass on further information to Birchanger residents when it is received from UDC. However, UDC must tread carefully as any wrong move or statement they make could delay the process and subject themselves to a judicial review.

Editor's response

Dear Barry and Jill,

It was recently discovered that this is not an application for planning permission but an application for a Certificate of Lawful Development (CLD). There are certain works that are permitted development, which means that they do not require planning permission. An application for a CLD is to establish if the proposals require planning permission and can only be assessed on planning legislation. If the proposals are permitted developments then the applicant is issued with a CLD. On the other hand, if they require planning permission, the certificate would be refused and a planning permission request would need to be submitted. Consultations would then be carried out in the normal way.

Note! Although the Birchanger Lane / A120 new junction proposal is not a formal planning application, UDC will still need to take account of public objections. Send an email or letter to: planning@uttlesford.gov.uk stating why you object to planning application; UTT/18/1823/CLP ensuring you include your full names and address.

We didn't see that coming!

When a seemingly innocent planning application was made through Uttlesford District Council (UDC) for a small equestrian stable and an office to be sited opposite the ambulance station at the top of Birchanger Lane, nobody suspected for a moment it was the starting gun for a full scale traveller invasion. After all there were already solid stables in place on the field opposite.

The Parish Council was however concerned about the need for an office and objected to the proposal. The land was also believed to be in the Highways Agency ownership and leased to the applicant. However, this was not the case. The applicant is the owner! Despite the Council's reservations, planning permission was passed by the UDC and work began on what was assumed to be the entrance to the site. Bushes were cleared, presumably to enable access for horses, and then shortly after this on a Sunday evening the travellers started rolling in. Two more days of noise and dust followed as space was cleared for an increasingly large number of caravans, all purporting to be members of the same family. This family are quite smart and they know all the tricks of planning application. We know now that they have done this before in Waltham Forest. They knew the district was vulnerable with a deficiency of gypsy sites, the failure of the previous plan and a leader who knew all the ropes having pulled this stunt

So if these travellers are to be moved on, it will be a long haul. This was confirmed at the meeting held in the village hall on the 7th August. Chief Executive of the district council, Dawn French, explained to the village what the situation was and what the next steps would be. A planning application has since been submitted for 12 caravans on the site. The process will be long, as there will be deliberate delays and omissions by the applicant at every stage. However, the land is in the Green Belt, and UDC has voted to uphold this.

New roundabout proposal M11 end of Birchanger Lane

The Highways Agency through Essex County Council is planning to remove the roundabout at the end of Birchanger Lane where it joins the A120 near the M11 at Junction 8. If the plan goes ahead, Birchanger residents will not be allowed to turn right on to the A120 or to go straight over into Bishop's Stortford. Everyone will be compelled to turn left and go all the way round Junction 8 before finally coming back to turn left at the new traffic light controlled junction. What kind of complete idiocy is this? They are supposed to be making Junction 8 easier for all the motorists. The option to get to Bishops Stortford would be to go down the lane to Stansted Road and contribute to the existing congestion there and the road into Bishops Stortford. What kind of madness is this?


It seems we do not even have the chance to have our say. This horrendous scheme comes under the Permitted Development umbrella. Certain works do not require planning permission, all they need is a Certificate of Lawful Development (CLD). This can only be assessed on planning legislation. If the proposal is accepted, the applicants will be issued with a CLD. If the application for a CLD fails on strict planning law, then the certificate will be refused and a planning application would have to be submitted. Sadly, this is highly unlikely in our case.

The Parish Council is making representations to a great many agencies. From our point of view the scheme is crazy, but it is highly unlikely that the regulatory bodies involved in this will even listen. But that will not stop us from trying.

There are also plans for cyclist and pedestrian access and a sign at the end of the lane pointing out the route to Bishop's Stortford. Residents who object to these plans should email or write to Uttlesford District Council with their full name and address to: planning@uttlesford.gov.uk stating your objections regarding planning application: UTT/18/1823/CLP. Although it is not a formal planning application, UDC will still need to take account of public objections. *Continued on page 4....*



For most of our children the new school year will mean a new year group and possibly a new teacher and classroom. HIGH COURT ACTION

On 8th August Stop Stansted Expansion (SSE) filed an Application for Judicial Review with the High Court to challenge the decision of the Secretary of State for Transport to continue to allow the current Stansted Airport planning application to be determined by Uttlesford District Council (UDC).

From the outset, SSE has fiercely opposed UDC's attempts to rush through the planning application and has argued that the scale of the proposed expansion means that, in accordance with the Planning Act 2008, the application should be determined nationally rather than by the local Council. National determination is a lengthier and far more thorough process. SSE will ask the High Court for an expedited hearing but, even if this is granted, the hearing may still not take place until next year. In the meantime, if UDC proceeds to determine the planning application, the decision would be overturned if the High Court rules in SSE's favour.

Although SSE is contesting the validity of UDC determining the current airport planning application, SSE has submitted extensive evidence to UDC setting out substantial grounds for refusing the application and it will be submitting further evidence to UDC over the coming weeks and months. The planning application was submitted by Stansted Airport last February. If approved it would mean a 44 per cent increase in flights and a 66 per cent increase in passengers compared to 2017 levels. *Brian Ross*

The Hundred Parishes Society

The index to the Society's new book refers to no fewer than eleven castles. All are shadows of their former selves, but many can still be seen and just a few may be visited. Many were built soon after the Norman Conquest of 1066. These Norman castles are described as motte and bailey, consisting of a large mound of earth or rubble (motte) surmounted by a wooden or stone tower. Alongside would be an embanked enclosure with additional buildings (the bailey). A fine example of what a typical Norman castle may have been like exists at Stansted Mountfitchet. Although little survives other than the mound on which the original castle once stood, a wooden stockade and village have been recreated.



The mottes are still visible from Norman castles at Anstey, Great Canfield and Stebbing. The parish of Castle Camps takes its name from the castle which dated back to Saxon times. Clavering castle's buildings were surrounded by a large ditch which can still be seen, adjacent to the churchyard.

Civil war raged in England between Stephen and his cousin Matilda from 1135 to 1153, a time known as The Anarchy, which saw considerable castle building. Geoffrey de Mandeville, the Earl of Essex, swapped sides more than once. He built the castle at Saffron Walden. Some ruined walls still remain and they are Grade I listed, the finest surviving stone castle within the Hundred Parishes. De Mandeville also built the castle at Pleshey during the Anarchy.



The large motte still remains. The present village of Pleshey lies mostly inside the outer bailey earthwork which is clearly visible along much of its length.

Did you know?

The birth of the Blessed Virgin Mary has a traditionally fixed date of September 8, nine months after the December 8 celebration of her Immaculate Conception as the child of Saints Joachim and Anne.

The circumstances of the Virgin Mary's infancy and early life are not directly recorded in the Bible, but other documents and traditions describing the circumstances of her birth are cited by some of the earliest Christian writers from the first centuries of the Church. These accounts, although not considered authoritative in the same manner as the Bible, outline some of the Church's traditional beliefs about the birth of Mary. These accounts describe Mary's father Joachim as a wealthy member of one of the Twelve Tribes of Israel. Joachim was deeply grieved, along with his wife Anne, by their childlessness. "He called to mind Abraham, the early Christian writing says, "that in the last day God gave him a son Isaac." Joachim and Anne began to devote themselves extensively and rigorously to prayer and fasting, initially wondering whether their inability to conceive a child might signify God's displeasure with them. As it turned out, however, the couple were to be blessed even more abundantly than Abraham and Sarah, as an angel revealed to Anne when he appeared to her and prophesied that all generations would honour their future child: "The Lord has heard your prayer, and you shall conceive, and shall bring forth, and your seed shall be spoken of in all the world."

Holy Cross Day is celebrated on the 14th September

Holy Cross Day has been associated with the dedication of a group of buildings that were built by Emperor Constantine in Jerusalem on the sites of Christ's crucifixion and his tomb. This dedication occurred on September 14, 335. During the excavation, a relic that was believed to be the cross was discovered by Constantine's mother, Helena. From the fourth century on, the Church of Jerusalem claimed to have this relic in their possession and had a feast to celebrate its discovery.


