Cannabis Factory Raided in Birchanger



If you wondered why five police cars and vans turned up at Harrisons on the morning of Friday 17th May, you can thank our neighbourhood watch team! The NhW team reported suspicious activity at No. 6 Harrisons several weeks earlier and acting on this report, Essex Police decided to put the house under observation. This resulted in police raiding a suspected cannabis factory at the rented house. Officers searched the property in the heart of the village at around 10.20 am and took away more than 100 cannabis plants and cultivation equipment. A 44-year-old man was arrested on suspicion of cultivating cannabis. He has been taken into custody for questioning. Enquiries are still ongoing.

Inspector Colin Cox of Essex Police said "My thanks go to the Community Policing Team (Both Uttlesford & Braintree) for their response to concerns from local residents regarding the property in Birchanger. CPT Officers attended location, one male was arrested at the scene and cannabis cultivation equipment was dismantled. Some will certainly say that cannabis has medicinal properties and this may well be true but the law still states it is illegal. This was certainly an organised criminal set-up which leads to other criminal activities. Thank you also to local residents".




Birchanger Run

I am not sure if they live in the village but both the driver and passenger were around 17-18 year old and in school uniform. I believe the registration number was WR10 CTX. Let's do what we can to make this road as safe as possible before one of us ends up in a hospital bed or 6 feet under! *Chris Emery*

What to do about speeding in Birchanger Lane

I am writing with regards to the issue of 'speeding' through Birchanger Lane. This is not a new issue; in fact the same problems have persisted for many years. Villagers, cut-through drivers, delivery vans and even buses drive through the village at excessive speeds which are unsuitable for the road conditions. There was another near miss recently and quite a few comments were made on social media about what could be done about reducing speeding through the village.

What is our council doing to address the situation? Are there any plans in the pipeline? I know various solutions have been suggested like speed bumps (problem for buses and ambulances?) traffic calming such as chicanes, digital signs etc. (where would we put them?) and people using speed guns (sporadic). Has the idea of speed cameras (average speed) on the start and end of the main stretch ever been considered? *John McArthur*

Response from Birchanger Parish Council

Firstly I'm sorry to hear there was a near miss recently; it must've been very frightening. The council is well aware of the speeding issues through Birchanger and has been working tirelessly for some time to find a way of controlling and/or reducing the speed of inconsiderate and sometimes reckless drivers using the lane as a rat run.

The problem is, the Parish Council has no control and cannot dictate what speed limits are set in Birchanger. Essex Highways has complete autonomy over speed limits and all other highways issues. However, at a recent parish council meeting, speeding was discussed again and this resulted in Essex Highways agreeing to carry out another speed survey. I have no idea of the date yet but at least they have agreed! When this was last done a few years ago Birchanger didn't meet the criteria for a 20 mph speed limit through the village but maybe we will this time.

We have considered various methods of speed control. Speed humps are not recommended any longer as they are said to cause higher carbon emissions, increase noise, damage vehicle suspension and are detrimental to patients in ambulances. Chicanes also cause high carbon emissions and the lane would not be wide enough for the bus to pass. In fact, chicanes have been known to encourage people to drive like Lewis Hamilton! VAS (vehicle activated signs) are a possibility but it is highly unlikely that we would be given average speed cameras as these are normally installed on roads without any side turnings where drivers could either turn off the main carriageway or enter it. The speed survey must show that we have a speeding issue in the village and to date this has not been the case. If the new speed survey shows that we do then of course we will request the appropriate solution to solve the problem. In the meantime we are hoping to install '20 is plenty' signs up around the school area and Birchanger Lane. These are not legally binding but can be quite effective.

The village is now a member of the Community Speed Watch initiative (CSW) and already has twelve enthusiastic volunteers waiting in the wings. They are due to receive training in May or June, after which they will be using their speed gun to catch offenders, so drivers beware! Peter Sampson is the councillor who has taken on this task.

I have also spoken to Ray Gooding many times about the anticipated increase in rat running once the work starts to remove the roundabout on the A120 and I have asked him to find out what mitigation measures they intend to make. I hope you will agree that the Parish Council is doing what it can, but dealing with Highways, District and County Councils is a bit like wading through treacle!



Keep your home safe

Burglars are often opportunistic thieves who prey on houses and flats. They seek out any opening that they can take advantage of, specifically doors and windows that are left open or unlocked or are easy to force. Anything of value that they might spot through a window will only spur them on. But it really doesn't take

much to deter these thieves – just smart thinking. Rob them of the opportunity

How burglars operate and how to prevent yourself from becoming a victim

Burglars target homes that they think will contain valuables. A sure giveaway is leaving packaging from expensive items outside your front door.

Burglars often look for homes with windows or doors left open or with vulnerable features that they can exploit.

Burglars are aware of the times when someone is expected to be away from their house such as during the school run or holidays Burglars typically do not want to be seen or heard and if they feel that they would be noticed by a neighbour or passer-by then they are more likely to feel exposed and may move on to find somewhere else to burgle.

Burglars often choose a home because they've spotted a specific vehicle, motorcycle or bicycle they want to steal – and the keys are more than likely to be inside the residence

Sheds and garages are often vulnerable as they are not that secure and contain tools which the burglar can use to assist them to gain entry to a home.

It's a fact that many burglars return to homes that they've previously burgled because the homeowner failed to upgrade security following the first burglary. They sometimes return to an area to try to burgle a nearby home that they spotted while committing a previous break in. Even more reason for you to ensure you keep your home as safe as houses.

Secure your shed or garage

It's strange how most people don't secure their shed or garage in the same way they do their homes. People often end up using a flimsy lock or padlock to protect the contents – whether it's a car, bike or lawnmower. The fact is, a burglar will usually try a shed or garage first because they can find the tools they need to get into the house. First off, check that your insurance covers the contents of your shed or outbuildings from theft.

Think like a thief

Take a look at your shed and consider how you would break in. It's worth having a good padlock on the door with no exposed screws. Pay attention to hinges, as these are sometimes easily removable. If you have windows then these could be vulnerable unless they're secured with wire mesh or grills. And keep it locked at all times.

Alarm it

Consider a battery-operated shed alarm. They look low key but they respond to movement or door contact with an extremely loud siren.

Lock it, hide it or mark it

Don't give them the opportunity or the tools to commit a crime. Lock everything away securely. Tools can be locked inside a locker or box or secured with a chain.

Secure your bike to the ground or a lockable stand within a locked shed or garage. Visit Sold Secure to search for ground anchors and other locks designed to fix to floors and walls.

It's always worth draping an old sheet or blanket over the top of mowers or bikes to keep them covered from view.

Although it might sound like stating the obvious, never leave your garage or shed door unlocked if you're not around.

Property marking your items is advisable and some tools can be painted with your name or postcode.

All Change at UDC

It seems that SSE was not alone in believing that the administration at Uttlesford District Council (UDC) was no longer acting in the best interests of the local community. At the local elections on May 2nd the incumbent UDC Conservative administration, which had been in power for the past 12 years, retained just 4 out of their 24 seats. The Uttlesford result was proportionately the largest loss by any ruling party in any district council in all of England. The independent Residents for Uttlesford (R4U) party swept to power with 26 seats and the Liberal Democrats came second with 7 seats.

Despite being non-party political, SSE had no hesitation in welcoming the change of power at UDC. Our political neutrality had been tested to the limit by the former regime's support for unfettered expansion at Stansted Airport. The five members of the UDC Planning Committee who voted in favour of the Stansted Airport planning application last November are no longer councillors, whereas the five who voted against were all re-elected.

Immediately prior to the local elections the previous administration had intended to issue final approval to Stansted for expansion to 43 million passengers per annum (almost as much as today's Gatwick). However, this was blocked as a result of combined action by R4U, the Lib Dems and two 'rebel' Conservatives – all of whom supported SSE's argument that the planning application needed further consideration. SSE is now hopeful that the new planning committee will be given an opportunity to review the airport planning application.



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The fact that the expansion was approved in principle six months ago means that their room for manoeuvre might be limited. The new council will need to take expert legal advice in this regard.

Meanwhile, SSE's legal challenges continue to trundle along in the High Court. A Directions Hearing has been arranged for 23rd May at which time it is hoped that the Judge will agree to combine SSE's two cases (one against the Transport Secretary and the other against the Communities Secretary) and set a date for a full hearing – which will probably require three days later in the summer. *Brian Ross*



A Case of Too Many Hungry Caterpillars

Some visitors to Birchanger Wood have remarked on the massive number of tiny green caterpillars. Unfortunately, this spring we experienced a massive

invasion of winter moth caterpillars, which are chomping through young leaves on our trees. Hatching is timed to coincide with the budding of oak leaves, their favourite dish. They also feast on maple, birch, hornbeam, hazel and beech – all the tree species that can be found at Birchanger Wood. The large number of caterpillars is leading to the defoliation of many trees.



Hatching is determined by temperature. The moths are adjusting to climate change through selection with the larvae of the most adjusted eggs thriving. As the climate is changing in winter and spring, the winter moth is hatching earlier and earlier to synchronise with their main food sources. Tits predate the winter moth caterpillar and will feed them to their young. However, this will only work well if the peak wood moth caterpillar population coincides with the hatching of the tits' eggs. Tits can adjust the time when chicks hatch with the weather, a capacity that us mammals lack. However, scientists have found that the birds are less able to adjust to the earlier peaking of caterpillar populations, which means they are often unable to take full advantage of the higher caterpillar population. Research has found a mismatch emerging between caterpillar hatching and the hatching of insectivorous woodland birds.

One of the problems with the lack of management of large areas of Birchanger Wood in the past is that not many birds penetrate very far from the edge with the caterpillars remaining unmolested in the dense canopy. Birchanger Wood Trust's coppicing is helping to open up the wood to more bird life, which should help combat the caterpillar problem. The problem isn't going to go away easily. We can only hope that this is a bad year due to specific weather trends this spring and that the trees will continue to bud new leaves after the caterpillars pupate. The Hundred Parishes Society

One of the aims of The Hundred Parishes Society is to raise awareness of our rich and diverse local heritage. It is exceptionally preserved in the rural and town landscapes handed down by past generations and there is also a rich vein of local history, culture, customs and legends. Amongst the legends are a couple concerning dragons.

Henham's dragon is commemorated on the village sign and in the name of its parish magazine, The Henham Dragon. The appearance of this "flying serpent" was reported in a pamphlet published in 1669. The creature was described as eight or nine feet long, having been seen by several men. In recent times, the legend has been dismissed as a 17th-century hoax, while local Saffron Brewery produces a Flying Serpent beer to celebrate the story.



Where there were dragons there were also dragon slayers. We all know St George, whose slaying of the beast has been painted and sculpted many times. I can think of only one such image within the Hundred

Parishes: in Bartlow church where conservation of a 15th century wall painting revealed the dragon but not St George. I would be interested to learn of other images of dragons or St George within the Hundred Parishes.



A local dragon slayer, Piers Shonks, died in 1086 AD and lies at peace in an ancient tomb within the wall of Brent Pelham parish church. There is a brief account of his story, and why he is buried in the wall, in the Hundred Parishes book and on www.hundredparishes.org.uk within the parish page for Brent Pelham and Meesden. There you will also find a link to a Hertfordshire Archives account and audio recording of the legend of Piers Shonks. Do enjoy our local area – and keep an eye open for dragons. *Ken McDonald, Secretary*

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
