Birchanger 10k and Children's Fun Run is back!

In previous years the 10k run has attracted more than 150 race participants and over 50 children for the fun run, plus a similar number of spectators. After being 'away' for a couple of years, the 10k Race is being brought back to Birchanger with the hope that it will be even bigger and better!

This year's event will take place on the morning of Sunday 12th May and will kick off at 10.00 am in the school grounds. All profits from the event will go to the Birchanger Primary School towards enhancing the children's learning experience, educational visits and a new outdoor classroom.

The run will start and finish in the grounds of the school. It is a two looped multi-terrain course, 6 km out, returning through Birchanger Village for a second loop of 4 km. The children's fun run will start after the final adult has finished. The minimum age for runners in the adult race is 17.



Adults booking before the event will cost £12.50 each. Entries on the day will be charged £15 each.

Children can register on the day at a cost of $\pounds 5.00$ per entry. Under 7's must be accompanied by an adult. There will be winners' trophies and prizes plus a goody bag, including a T-Shirt for all the finishers. There will also be medals and winners' trophies for the children's race. Please note there are no changing facilities, therefore, please arrive ready to run. There's plenty of time to get around the course with lots of people to encourage you on the way!

Come along and support the run by either entering the race, or simply coming along to cheer the runners on, in order to raise funds for such a good cause. It promises to be a fantastic community event for both adults and children alike.

Local Government Elections

Local Government Elections will be taking place in Uttlesford on the 2nd May 2019. The elections are for all 39 seats on Uttlesford District Council, as well as the Town and Parish Councils in the District where seats are being contested.

Parish and town council elections

All seats on parish and town councils in Uttlesford are up for election at the same time as the District Council - so none of the existing parish or town councillors will remain councillors unless they stand again as candidates. Not all of the local councils will end up having an election (strictly called a poll), as this depends on whether there are more candidates for the town or parish council than there are seats on it.

If there is a poll for Birchanger Parish Council, this will be indicated on your poll card and you will be given a separate ballot paper in the polling station, or sent the parish ballot paper as well as the district one if you have a postal vote. Where there are fewer, or the same number of candidates as seats, the candidates elected are those whose names are put forward as validly nominated.

Birchanger needs new Parish Councillors!

Could you be one? The Parish Council elections will be held on Thursday 2nd May. Nominations are for the position of parish councillor must be submitted to Uttlesford District Council by 4.00 pm 3rd April. 

Birchanger's Winter From Hell


Don't Let Your Bin Get a Yellow Card

If your re-cycle bin gets one of these nasty yellow tickets on it, it will not be emptied until the next collection, and then only if the offending items have been removed. The items should be listed on the back of the ticket; they include cling film, bubble wrap, items made from polystyrene, all shoes and clothing and unwashed containers to name but a few. A full list can be found on line.

Bins should be placed outside the house on collection days. Larger items can be collected by arrangement by calling 01799 510510 but there is a charge for this service. If you would like to join the garden bin service, call the above number. The bin costs £20 and the annual charge is £45 or £35 if you pay online by direct debit.

Birchanger is a No Drone Zone

After the chaos caused by drones at Gatwick and Heathrow, drones are not allowed to fly within a 5 kilometre exclusion zone around all UK Airports. Birchanger is within this zone. The ban only covers airports for now but could be extended to other areas in the future.

Tenancy Deposit Scheme Alert

Action Fraud have received several reports where fraudsters are claiming to be landlords of properties offered for rent online. Prior to a viewing the suspect requests that the individuals pay a deposit and sometimes a month's rent upfront, claiming that this

money will be put into the Tenancy Deposit Scheme, and is therefore protected under government legislation.

After the individual pays the money, the suspect sends a bogus email purporting to be from the Tenancy Deposit Scheme confirming they have received their deposit. However, this is not the case as the money was sent directly to an account associated with the suspect and the victim is left out of pocket and without the home they had thought to be putting a deposit on.

What You Need To Do

• Always make sure you, or a reliable contact, has viewed the property with an agent or landlord before agreeing to rent a property.

• Don't be rushed or pressured into making a decision. Only transfer funds when you're satisfied a genuine property, safety certificates and valid contract are in place.

• Only pay for goods or service by bank transfer if you know and trust the person. Payments via bank transfer offer you no protection if you become a victim of fraud.

• Once you've paid your deposit, you can check whether it's protected by entering your tenancy deposit certificate code on TDS website (www.tenancydepositscheme.com).

TV Licence Scam

An ongoing TV Licensing phishing campaign, first identified by the National Fraud Intelligence Bureau (NFIB) in September 2018, continues to be reported to Action Fraud in high numbers. Fraudsters are sending the public fake TV Licensing emails that are designed to steal their personal and financial information. Since April 2018, Action Fraud has received over 900 crime reports with victim losses totalling more than £830,000.

How you can protect yourself:

Don't click on the links or attachments in suspicious emails and never respond to messages that ask for your personal or financial details.



Don't assume a phone call or email is authentic, even if someone knows your basic

details (such as your name or address). Remember, criminals can spoof phone numbers and email addresses to appear as companies you know and trust, such as TV Licensing.

Your bank will never call and ask you for your PIN, full banking password, or ask you to transfer money out of your account.

What to do if you've fallen victim:

Let your bank know as soon as possible and monitor your bank statements regularly for any unusual activity.

If you suspect your identity may have been stolen you can check your credit file quickly and easily online. Use a reputable service provider and follow up on any unexpected or suspicious results. If you have been a victim of fraud or cyber crime, report it to Action Fraud at actionfraud.police.uk, or by calling 0300 123 2040.

Health Matters

Are You Sure of What You'r Eating?

Confused by food labels? Most of us are. Do we know for certain just what we are eating? It is hard to say for most of us, especially anyone trying to keep to a low calorie diet. We happily buy food which claims to be low fat. This should mean 3 grams of fat per 100 grams of product. We confidently buy this product, but did we check the sugar to see how much was in the product. To make up for the low fat and to make a product taste right, sugar is frequently added. Low sugar actually means less than 5 grams of sugar per 100 grams of product; however the no added sugar claim fails to tell you just how much sugar was there in the first place.

Less fat means that there is 25% less fat than in other similar products, but fails to tell you in most cases just how much fat you are actually consuming. Butters, other fats, sausages, fruit juices and yoghurt are all prime examples of food confusion. Butter is always high in fat for a start. 5% less fat makes very little difference.

Is Depression All in the Genes?

Bad genes seem to be responsible for an awful lot of ills these days and now they are adding depression to the list. Depression is apparently caused by neurotic and fearful behaviour. This tends to run in families, so the link is there. Aided by ill health and runs of bad luck it is easy to see how things can escalate. Often things can be helped by simple friendship. If a friend is having a particularly bad time, keep an eye on them. Support during the bad time could prevent a lot of trouble later.

Dementia Friendly Uttlesford

The number of those who have been diagnosed with dementia is on the rise, there is an ever pressing need for those with new diagnoses to seek help and to make plans for their futures while they still can. Meanwhile those who are already struggling with this horrible disease need all the help they can get, whether as a sufferer or a carer. Sporting Activities at Birchanger Primary School

At Birchanger C of E Primary School we love our sport and we hold a gold award for the sport that we provide for our children. This year, from September, we were able to secure Kitteridge Sports as our PE instructors. Ross Kitteridge is the owner and he coaches once or twice a week at our school. He leads the after school clubs and Dan works with him on lessons and clubs. During our end of term review with Ross, he complimented our pupils on their skill level, enthusiasm, desire to learn and their manners. He is now working with us on individual assessments.

We have had a mixed netball club, mixed football squad training, girls football training and boys football training. We also have gym trails each morning. The pupils continue to try and improve their speed, agility and effort in the popular 'Make a Mile' event in school. It is currently being completed on the playground as the field is wet. We have been working on the 30 / 30 campaign. This aims to ensure children get at least 60 minutes of exercise every day. We incorporate this in our PE lessons, playtimes and Make a Mile. We also know that many pupils attend sports clubs outside of school and this increases their activity during the day. We also have a weekly swimming slot at Grange Paddocks so that all children can learn to swim before they leave our school.



We have had a fantastic start for our newly formed football squad with 3 boys remaining from last year and then a massive 19 more boys and girls joining us for training. We have decided to have a rotation system to enable pupils to have a turn at playing matches. This is in preparation for next season as most of the players are in Year 5. Our year and a half unbeaten run came to an end on Thursday as St Mary's Stansted battled out a match that looked set to be 0-0 to score with 4 minutes to go. Well done to all players; it was a very high standard match.

The Netball Club is back after a winter break and we are very proud of the attitude and determination of the 16 pupils. The matches have again been shared amongst the players and we have won 1 and been close in 3 others. We have played these matches with a range of Year 4, 5 and 6 pupils. Again, this allows us to prepare players for the future and for them to gain vital experience. The Cross Country event was held in Manuden and it was amazing to see 76 pupils taking part with individual successes and one team that gives us representatives in the cross country finals event. This was a new location for us and the length of the field was daunting. However, every pupil completed the race and we saw great determination from everyone. Yet again both events were firm favourites. Thank you for the parents who supported this event. We also attended two tag rugby events at Howe Green with Years 5 and 6 and then Years 3 and 4 gaining vital match experience.

We always enter a group of children into the archery competition and last term we took all of Year 5. We had top scores in the girls sections and 2 good team results. This is a great sport for control. In addition, two of our Year 6 pupils were selected for the Talent Camp in May-WELL DONE. They will now compete alongside other talented children from the area to boost their skills.



Other Activities

Our younger children have also been busy. Year 1/2 Class have prepared a 'Skeleton Dance' for the fabulous dance festival organised by our amazing SCO for the area; Carron Parrish. Good Luck Sparrow Class. Our topic this term is 'Funny Bones' hence the Skeleton theme. We have just had wonderful Science Week with experiments and investigations based around health and exercise which was organised by our Science Lead and our three Year 6 Sports Ambassadors.

During this week our children were investigating what sports equipment they wanted, what foods had more sugar in them, how much fat was in three varieties of sausages, what exercises were needed to increase heart rates and pulse calculations and what effects different types of drinks have on egg shells as these are like the enamel on our teeth. The staff ran a variety of games at lunchtimes including dodgeball, circuit training, and skipping and mindfulness activities.

Overall you can see that although we are a small school we have mighty ambitions for our children to be able to take part in a wide range of sporting activities all year round.

The Waiting Game Continues!

It is now more than four months since Uttlesford District Council (UDC) approved Stansted Airport's Planning Application for expansion to an annual throughput of 43 million passengers. However, UDC is prevented from confirming its decision as a result of SSE's objection to the process followed by UDC. The Secretary of State for Housing, Communities and Local Government ('SSHCLG') has instructed UDC not to grant planning approval until he has decided whether or not to 'call in' the Planning Application. The stakes are high because if he decides to 'call in' the application, this would mean a Public Inquiry and if he decides not to 'call in' the application, this could result in another legal challenge by SSE.

Meanwhile SSE still has an outstanding Judicial Review application (SSE's first legal challenge) against the Secretary of State for Transport ('SST') over his decision to allow the same Stansted Airport Planning Application to be determined locally by UDC. This case was due to be heard in the High Court on February 19th/20th but has been 'stayed' by the Judge pending the decision of the SSHCLG, as referred to above. The High Court has asked for an update on 29th March but the Judge understands that the delay is down to the indecision of the Secretary of State rather than to SSE.

Government indecision, legal complexities and one delay after another. This all has a familiar ring! *Brian Ross*



The Hundred Parishes Society

The Hundred Parishes area includes many airfields and former airfields. Most were constructed in a remarkably short period by the United States Army Air Force when the USA became involved in World War II, while others date back to World War I and the very early days of aviation.

Duxford was built towards the end of WWI, many of its buildings constructed by German prisoners of war. It played a significant role in both World Wars. It is now the location of Imperial War Museum Duxford, a fascinating site that includes many buildings from both World Wars and a huge collection of military and civilian aircraft and other wartime exhibits. RAF Sawbridgeworth (actually in High Wych parish) also originated in WWI and was then used in WWI.



Andrews Field was the first US air base in Europe, constructed in 1942/43 using rubble from the London Blitz. This airfield, partly in Stebbing and partly in Great Saling, is well used today by small private aircraft and has a tea room open to the public.



Other airfields were built in WWII at Castle Camps, Hadstock (known as RAF Little Walden), Hunsdon, Little Easton (also known as RAF Great Dunmow), Matching (mainly in White Roding parish), Nuthampstead, Radwinter (known as RAF Great Sampford although only partially in that parish) and Stansted.

The runways, along with various buildings and more recent memorials survive at most of these airfields, whilst the sites have been developed for a variety of uses. RAF Debden, constructed in 1937 and mainly in Wimbish parish, is now the site of Carver Barracks. Wethersfield airfield (mainly in Finchingfield parish) was built by the Americans and today is still used by the Ministry of Defence. Did you know?

The feast of the Annunciation, (which was celebrated on the 25th March this year) marks the visit of the angel Gabriel to the Virgin Mary, during which he told her that she would be the mother of Jesus Christ, the Son of God.
