Stand-off at Uttlesford Council



SSE's battle against Uttlesford District Council (UDC) over the Stansted Airport Planning Application has spilled over from the High Court to the world of local politics. Last November, UDC approved the airport's expansion to an annual throughput of 43 million passengers which would make Stansted almost as big as today's Gatwick. However legal challenges from SSE have so far dissuaded the Council from issuing the final planning permission.

At the beginning of April UDC finally signalled its intention to issue the permission but pressure from SSE has again forced the Council to back-track. SSE's position has been supported by opposition councillors who are also pressing the present Conservative administration to delay issuing the planning permission until after the local elections on 2nd May so as to allow the new Council an opportunity to review the situation.

A petition co-sponsored by Liberal Democrats and Residents for Uttlesford councillors has forced UDC to schedule an Extraordinary Meeting for 25th April. Planning permission cannot be issued before that meeting and, since it will then be just one week before the local elections, it is considered unlikely – but not impossible – that the present administration would rush to issue its final approval for Stansted Airport expansion during what could be its final week in office.

SSE Chairman Peter Sanders commented: "It's hard to believe that our own local council wants to rush through final approval of the Stansted Airport Planning Application prior to the local elections on 2nd May. SSE is keen to explore every avenue to avoid the need to take legal proceedings against UDC. The meeting on 25th April provides a glimmer of hope that it may yet be possible to avoid such legal proceedings."

By the time this edition of Birchanger Magazine reaches you the outcome of the meeting on 25th April will be known and the outcome of the 2nd May local elections may also be known. *Brian Ross*

Birchanger May Get Its' Own Community Special Constable

Birchanger Parish Council has been looking at the possibility of sponsoring a Community Special Constable (CSC) for Birchanger whereby uniformed police would patrol Birchanger for a minimum of 16 hours per month, or more depending on the officer's availability. Visibility of a police officer walking the beat is often a major factor in deterring crime.

What is a Community Special Constable and what do they do?

- Special Constables are volunteer police officers, holding the same office and the same powers as regular officers. They wear the same uniform, carry the same equipment and are deployed to the same incidents. They are not paid, but can claim mileage and duty allowances.
- A Special Constable agrees to volunteer at least 16 hours per calendar month, plus time for training.
- Special Constables are bound by the policing Code of Ethics and the Standards of Professional Behaviour. These apply whether the officer is on or off duty.
- CSC's for our area are tasked from Saffron Walden and on average patrol around 26 hours per month.

A Community Special Constable will:

- Be integrated into a Community Policing Team
- Start and end their duty as close to their community as possible, potentially from another agency's premises
- Spend the majority of their time within the village.
- Be visible and accessible in local communities on uniformed, foot or cycle patrol.
- Help address local issues and priorities as informed by the local council and police intelligence-led tasking.
- Patrol hot spots identified through intelligence or which have been deemed to be priority areas.
- Respond to police-related incidents within the council area.
- Engage with local communities and support further recruitment of Specials.
- Attend suitable local council meetings where available to do so.
- Have regard to the Council's aims and objectives in their voluntary service.

Essex Police will equip, train and deploy Community Special Constables into the 'sponsoring' area. The good thing about this service is that it is wheel chair friendly, and can be arranged for a time to suit you. There are also larger vehicles for groups. Membership for individuals costs £10 and thereafter charges depend on which service you are using. Booking a ride for routine trips costs just £3.40 for up to two miles, then £1.02 per mile for up to 15 miles. Costs for Journeys beyond this are arranged with the office.

For hospital journeys £5 is the minimum charge then 45 pence per mile for all miles over 11 miles which must be paid to the driver on the day. You can book your journey in advance, make return arrangements and discuss your individual needs. 
Coping With the Digital Age

Police seize more than 700 cannabis plants in Elsenham

Officers executed a drugs warrant in Elsenham over a weekend in April and seized more than 700 cannabis plants. Acting on concerns from the public, officers from Braintree and Uttlesford executed a warrant at an address on New Road, Elsenham.

The team found sophisticated cannabis cultivation and seized the cannabis plants along with equipment used as part of the cannabis cultivation. The cannabis plants and equipment will be destroyed.



Inspector Colin Cox from the Braintree and Uttlesford Community Policing Team said: "We are listening to and acting on concerns raised from local residents about drug dealing and other crimes in the area".

"Drug dealing is often linked to organised and violent crime and we are working hard to keep the district safe." Action Fraud has received over 100 reports about fake emails that purport to be from Virgin Media. The emails threaten the recipient with "automatic disconnection" due to "invalid billing information". The links in the emails lead to genuine-looking phishing websites that are designed to steal your Virgin Media account login details.

Don't click on the links or attachments in suspicious emails, and never respond to messages that ask for your personal or financial details.



More local, visible & accessible policing for Essex

Today, there are more police officers serving the county than this time last year. Essex Police has grown and further investment in local policing is continuing with the establishment of 23 dedicated Town Centre Teams.

There are now 218 more officers in varying stages of their training journey bringing the number of police officers in the county to 3,046. This time last year there were 2,950 officers in the force. The latest uplift in officer numbers was made possible by an increase in the policing precept part of council tax last year and the focus for the new officers will be to provide visible local policing in all of our communities.

Birchanger **Primary** School



Our school has a church school status which is very important to us and it underpins our ethos and vision statement:

We are committed to the pursuit of excellence in everything we do in our work play and relationships with each other. Everything that we do is built on the Christian values of love, care, courage and truth.'

Last term we were visited by an inspector from SIAMs (School Inspection of Anglican and Methodist Schools) who spent the day with us in order to assess us as a church school. We were one of the first schools in the country to be inspected under the new inspection criteria which judged us against 7 criteria which are:

- Vision and leadership 1.
- Wisdom, Knowledge and skills
 Character development: Hope, aspiration and courageous advocacy.
- Community and living well together.
 Dignity and respect
- 6. Impact of collective worship
- 7. Effectiveness of RE.

During the time that the inspector spent with us she looked at learning in children's books, she watched the teaching of RE and she looked at national and school based data about progress and attainment.

The inspector also talked to the children about their learning and what is important to them. She awarded the school a 'Good Rating' (improving our previous 'Satisfactory Rating') to reflect the way that the children behave towards each other and their attitude to their work. This is the result of the work the school has done to support the children and how we have been supported by our local church, St Mary's.

Despite the rain, fifteen Birchanger residents and helpers turned out on Sunday 7th April to take part in the monthly litter pick around the village. Special thanks need to go to Laura Chapman for organising the group and encouraging people to take part. Two groups set out at midday from the Church Hall, one heading around the church and towards the Three Willows. The other group headed down the hill towards the main Stansted road and along Tot Lane.



"In just over one hour, we managed to collect 16 bags of rubbish s and a discarded tyre" said Gary Davey, one of the helpers. "We also found a pile of tyres dumped on the corner or Forest Hall road and Tot Lane as well as a pile of what looks like garden

waste dumped in the hedge along the Lane. Both have been reported to Uttlesford DC and will be cleared by the Highway Rangers. More frustratingly the following day after the litter pick a lorry tyre was dumped on the path of Birchanger Lane opposite the entrance to Tot Lane. This has also been reported to the council. I have spoken to the leader of the Uttlesford DC and suggested Tot Lane as a good location to get some cameras positioned to catch people fly tipping/littering. Watch this space".

The coppicing season came to an end at Birchanger Wood in March. Volunteers laboured hard over the winter to cut back trees to allow light onto the woodland floor, boosting the flora and helping to support biodiversity. While it may seem counterintuitive to cut down trees for the sake of woodland conservation, coppicing is an age-old practice of harvesting trees for wood products – baskets, beanpoles, walking sticks, arbours, thatching, fences, charcoal and firewood. The practice of coppicing goes back to a time when society was heavily dependent on wood and woodlands were cared for due to their economic importance.



Many bird species rely on insects as a source of food and insects benefit from the flowers that flour-

ish when the woodland floor gets more sunlight, unimpeded by the dense canopy of mature trees. The trees themselves are not harmed and if they are protected from browsing animals such as rabbits and deer, they will grow back healthy – often with a longer lifespan than if they were left to grow as standards. However, the trees and flora can only thrive if walkers, cyclists and dogs keep to the paths.

In line with a management plan devised by conservation experts and overseen by our warden Pat Forrest, Birchanger Wood Trust is pursuing this time-honoured method of woodland management with sales of firewood from coppicing helping to sustain our work.

We have a packed series of events led by local science educator and conservationist Jono Forgham. The first is our moth trapping

night on 31st May when we will be attracting moths to a moth trap to study which species are living in the wood and noting the biodiversity - no moths are harmed and they are freed afterwards! The result of this survey will be forwarded to the County Recorder and will help build up a list of all the moths that may be found within the wood. Please bring a torch and meet at the compound, at the Heath Row entrance in Bishops Stortford from 9pm.

Other future educational events will include a family bio blitz day, bug hunts, a butterfly identification survey and leaf mining study. Please visit our events page for further details:

The Hundred Parishes Society

Fields across the Hundred Parishes are turning yellow from the oil-seed rape flowers and farmers will be hoping for a bountiful harvest.



Fortunately for them, research by the Centre for Ecology & Hydrology found a positive but unexpected increase in key bee species responsible for pollinating flowering crops

such as these. Between 1980 and 2013, the scientists had measured the presence of 353 wild bee and hoverfly species across the country. Overall, they noted that one-third of species had declined, one tenth increased, while evidence for the status of other species was inconclusive. Pollinating insects are vital for adequate seed production in crop plants as well as other species including rarer native plants which often support more specialist insects.

The UK hosts about 20,000 species of insects, many of which get eaten by other creatures. We enjoy seeing brightly coloured butterflies or dragonflies, but species like skylarks, swifts, blue tits, hedgehogs, shrews, bats and many fish require a cornucopia of moths, flies and beetles in order to survive. Assorted flies, beetles and wasps are also predators or decomposers helping to control pests and recycle dead material.

The statistics in the 2016 State of Nature Report show an alarming decline in the abundance of many insect species. The causes of this decline are complex, but intensification of farming, loss of wildflower meadows, hedgerow removal and changes in climate play a part. Widespread use of herbicides and pesticides is also implicated. Herbicides have reduced the variety of wildflowers: with limited foraging opportunities many insects have become scarce or extinct. The impact of pesticides on all insect populations has far reaching consequences and is now subject to intense scrutiny to find answers.

Planting suitable flowers in our own gardens benefits insects and other forms of wildlife, especially if we garden organically! *Tricia Moxey Trustee*. www.hundredparishes.org.uk

New Domestic Abuse Line

A new helpline has been launched to help people in Southend, Essex and Thurrock who are victims of or who have experienced domestic abuse. COMPASS went live on 1st April 2019 and is the new point of access for victims of domestic abuse across Southend, Essex and Thurrock; providing information, advice and guidance and, where appropriate assessment and access to specialist services. Its function is to increase accessibility to ensure victims of domestic abuse get the right support at the right time. COMPASS is funded by Essex County Council in partnership with the Office of the Police, Fire and Crime Commissioner for Essex to support victims of domestic abuse across Southend, Essex and Thurrock.

It will help women, men and young people aged over 16 to access specialist support including community-based services and specialist accommodation to help them recover and move on from domestic abuse. COMPASS is accessible 24hrs a day. Callers can speak with a trained member of staff and there will also be an online form for both public and professionals wishing to make a referral via the website. Ascension Day each year is held on a Thursday 39 days after Easter Sunday. This day commemorates Jesus Christ's ascension into heaven. This year it is observed on Thursday, May 30th.

Pentecost is a Christian observance commemorating the descent of the Holy Spirit on Jesus Christ's disciples, according to the Christian Bible. Many Christians celebrate Pentecost, which is also known as Pentecost Sunday, Whitsunday, or Whit Sunday, this year it will be on June 10th. The word Pentecost means "the 50th day" because the Pentecost celebration occurs seven weeks, or fifty days, after Easter Sunday. According to the ancient Israel calendar, Pentecost is the Greek name given for the Feast of Weeks, a major feast celebrating the giving of the 10 Commandments from God to Moses on top of Mount Sinai. Some Christians refer to Pentecost as the "Birthday of the Church." We may have tea and cake on this day so come along and celebrate with us!

Did you know?

That The Holy spirit is represented within the church as a white dove? The dove signifies the purity and peace the Holy Spirit brings. Can you find the dove in St Mary's church? Here's a clue its high up on the east wall.

Trinity Sunday, which will be celebrated this year on June 17th, celebrates the Christian doctrine of the Trinity, the three Persons of God: the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit.

Sir Arthur Blomfield was an eminent Architect who designed St Mary's Church along with many other churches and great buildings in the UK. In 1882 Blomfield designed the Royal College of Music in London. He also worked with Henry Woodyer who was the architect for the Rectory and also other church buildings. Thomas Willement called "the Father of Victorian Stained Glass", was active from 1811 to 1865 and designed and made the east window at St Marys.
