Local Soldier Attends D-Day Anniversary

75 years ago on the 6th June 1944, during the Second World War, 150,000 British, American and Canadian troops invaded Nazi occupied France in order to liberate European occupied territories. Known as 'Operation Overlord', this was the biggest seaborne invasion in military history and the turning point of WW II. The troops landed on a 50 mile stretch of beach along the Normandy coast in northern France where allied casualties were reported to be around 10,000.



Corporal Kevin Clerk of the 16 Medical Regiment, part of the 16 Air Assault Brigade and son of John & Julie Clark from Birchanger, was one of the chosen few to attend the 75th anniversary which was held on the 6th June in Normandy and Portsmouth.

During a TV interview Kevin told viewers "It was an honour and a privilege to be a part of the parachute drop into Normandy and to be able to attend the 75th Anniversary". The highlight for Kevin was meeting and chatting to Harry (seen below), one of the Veterans that landed in Normandy on D-Day in 1944 with the Red Devils.



After a tour of Afghanistan, Kevin transferred from 5 Med in Catterick

to 16 Med in Colchester. He is MERT trained (Medical Emergency Response Team) and qualified to undertake procedures in Chinook helicopters whist evacuating casualties. Kevin was also enrolled as one of only one hundred Army Medics to pass the Civilian Paramedic Diploma and he is now currently studying for his Paramedic Science BSc (Hons) degree. As a qualified Paramedic, Kevin often joins NHS Ambulances during his rest days.



Kevin passed the Pegasus P-Coy training course (known as one of the hardest endurance tests in the army), completed his parachute course and is now a Red Beret Para.

Kevin has trained in many parts of the world and his skill and determination earned him the opportunity to attend the D-Day 75th Anniversary celebrations. Needless to say, John and Julie are extremely proud parents.

Cupcake day For Alzheimer's



Drugs And County Lines

Most of us have read press reports of the latest way of tempting young children into drug abuse. Drugs, mainly cannabis at first, are handed out freely to even primary school children for a few occasions. Then the children are expected to pay for their supplies. They are told they can do this by finding other children to first of all give the drugs to, then to sell them to as they too become users. This happened first in Stansted, and there are signs that it is happening here in Birchanger as well. Cars have been seen parked outside the church Lychgate opposite the recreation field late at night and has been reported to the police. It is difficult to try to explain to children just what is happening, and why this is so wrong. This is harder when the child perceives that their own contemporaries are experimenting with drugs and they don't want to feel excluded. Parents have to be vigilant and to be very alert to any behavioural changes in their children. The warning not to accept anything from anyone needs to be enforced, even if the person offering it is a friend of their own age. Being aware is the first step in fighting this menace. Drugs are ruining far too many lives. After the drugs arrive, the gangs form and we all know what that can lead to. We need to show these greedy men that their tactics don't work here!

Japanese Knotweed in Birchanger



Bushes, thought to be Japanese Knotweed have been found growing along footpath 15 which runs between Gower Barn and the farm track in Birchanger. This invasive plant, although not poisonous, grows prolifically and can pierce concrete and tarmae! It has been reported to Uttlesford

District Council for investigation and removal.

Living in a local authority rented home works well for most people, unless you want to move home, that could be very tricky to arrange. Swapping is easy once you have found the right property with a tenant willing to swap, but actually finding another house to swap with has always been difficult. There is an agency which claims to help people find the right swap, sometimes within 24 hours! Realistically, it must take longer than that, but this agency does help people actually find what they want and help with complicated swapping arrangements as well. Until a proper cure is found, we will have to learn to cope with this condition and help manage it, both in ourselves and others the best we can.

Safeguarding for all Children

It is said only too often after a tragedy, where a child has died or has been seriously injured by a close family member, that neighbours had concerns but there was nobody prepared to listen to them and they were hesitant about contacting the police. Or perhaps a child's behaviour has suddenly changed and parents are worried that they may be suffering some kind of abuse. A new dedicated confidential hotline has been set up by Essex Police for those wanting to know how to spot the signs of abuse of all types and to talk in absolute confidentiality about concerns they may have about a child. It is also for parents who have concerns about their own child and how to proceed to clarify the situation. Abuse happens to anyone in any community. If you are an adult there is advice and support for you too. Everything is confidential unless you want it otherwise. Call 01245 452058.

Community Special Constable

The Parish council has started an advertising campaign in order to find a Special Constable (CSC) for Birchanger. This could take some time but if successful, it would mean we would have our own part time local bobby pounding the beat around the village. This is a voluntary position carried out in free time and full training would be given. If you

Community Speed Watch (CSW)

The twelve local volunteers who will monitor speeds throughout the village and report to the police any misdemeanours should get their initial training in July. So watch out you speeders!

HMRC Telephone Scam

Fraudsters are spoofing genuine HMRC telephone numbers to deceive their victims over the phone. The fraudsters state that as a result of the victim's non-payment of tax or other duty, the victim is liable for prosecution or other legal proceedings in order to settle the balance. The fraudsters suggest victims can avoid this, by arranging payment to be made immediately by methods such as bank transfer or by purchasing iTunes gift cards. If the victim is hesitant or refuses to comply, the suspect makes a threat such as immediate arrest, sending bailiffs to the victim's address or, in some cases, deportation. Often, the period for which the tax is allegedly due is distant enough to guarantee the victim will have little, if any, paperwork or ability to verify the claims. Once the money is paid the suspects sever all contact with the victim.

In genuine cases, HMRC will initially make direct contact with you via post/letter and potentially follow up that letter with a phone call at a later date. If HMRC contact you via telephone they will quote the reference number on the initial letter you should have received. HMRC will not discuss something you are not already aware of, like a tax investigation, and will NOT demand immediate payment.

Bank Account Fraud

Individuals have been receiving phone calls from people claiming to be a police officer or banking official.

The fraudster will say something like "There has been fraudulent activity at your bank and some of the staff at the bank are involved." They will then ask you to withdraw money to either keep it safe, or assist the police with their investigation. Another bogus line is "Your card has been compromised and used to purchase goods by a suspect". You are then asked to withdraw your money to keep it safe or hand over your bank card to the 'police' who will arrange collection by courier.

You may be told to dial a non-emergency extension of '161' to receive confirmation of the callers identity (this is also bogus) and that a courier will attend your home address to collect the goods the same day.

What you need to do

You should always question unsolicited requests for your personal or financial information. Just because someone knows your basic details (such as your name and contact details), it doesn't mean they are genuine. Instead, contact the bank or company directly using trusted methods such as a known email address or phone number. Legitimate organisations wouldn't ask you to hand over money, bank cards or to pay taxes, bills or fees over the phone. If you are contacted by anyone that asks you to do this, you're likely the target of a scam. Don't be rushed or pressured into making a decision. Under no circumstances would a genuine bank or some other trusted organisation force you to make a financial transaction on the spot. Report Phishing attempts. If you receive a call, text or email of this nature but have not lost money, you can report this as phishing to 'Action Fraud'. If you have lost money, call 999 immediately.

Ultrafast Broadband is now a Reality in Birchanger

At least for half the village! Ultrafast rural broadband network operator, Gigaclear, has installed its first pure fibre broadband cabinet in Birchanger as part of the Superfast Essex broadband programme. The installation has brought some of the fastest broadband speeds available in the world to people living and working in the district. The cabinet is currently providing 212 properties in Birchanger with a connection to a futureproof pure fibre broadband network with far more properties becoming enabled in the coming months, as even more cabinets are installed, and network connections built. The Gigaclear network is capable of delivering download and upload speeds of up to 900Mbps, meaning it would take less than a minute to download a 2.5-hour HD film – faster than boiling a kettle.

Transforming the broadband speeds of Birchanger was a significant civil engineering project. Gigaclear contractor Kier worked to dig up 5.3km of carriageway, footway and verge to lay just over 6.5km of fibre.

Gigaclear is committed to delivering ultrafast fibre broadband to more than 4,600 properties in Uttlesford District, as part of Phase 3 of its work with Superfast Essex, Essex County Council's broadband improvement programme. The £6.8million contract is funded by an investment from Essex County Council, a local funding contribution from Uttlesford District Council, a matching government grant from Broadband Delivery UK (BDUK) in the Department for Digital, Culture, Media and Sport (DCMS) and a significant investment from private sector network operator Gigaclear. 



Biggest Ever Residents' Petition Calls For Review of Airport Decision

The biggest ever residents' petition in the history of Uttlesford District Council has been submitted to the Council by Stop Stansted Expansion (SSE). The petition calls for the 2018 Stansted Airport planning application to be referred back to the UDC Planning Committee. The petition attracted over 1,000 signatures in its first five days. This is over 20 times more than the minimum required by UDC for a petition to be validated and more than four times as many as any previous UDC petition.

The 2018 Stansted Airport planning application, which sought approval for an increase in annual passenger numbers to 43 million, was conditionally approved by the Uttlesford Planning Committee in November 2018. However, final approval has not yet been granted because there are conflicting views as to whether the conditions have been fully met. The petition makes no judgment as to whether the application should be approved or refused. It is purely a request for the correct procedure to be followed by referring the matter to the Planning Committee.

SSE Deputy Chairman Brian Ross said: "There is an overwhelming case for the Planning Committee to have another look at this. It's not only their legal entitlement but also their legal duty to do so. It is imperative that officers do not issue final approval before allowing the Planning Committee an opportunity to take stock of the situation." The petition is still open for signing at http://chng.it/QGYQV46xvr.

Meanwhile, the High Court has agreed to combine SSE's two legal challenges to the airport planning application (one against the Transport Secretary and the other against the Communities Secretary) and has set aside three days for a full hearing – November 12th, 13th and 14th. *Brian Ross*

Coffee with Cops

Wednesday 12th June saw the first of 'Coffee With Cops' meetings at the village hall. Police Community Support Officers (PCSO) Simon Horne and James Graham attended the meeting where around 15 villagers participated, despite the rain.



This recent initiative enables officers to meet with the public and reassure them of a police presence in the area.

PCSO Simon Horne said "This is a nice part of our job, meeting with people over coffee and discussing what we

do and how we can help the community. We get closer to the public and at the same time gather intelligence which can be useful finding criminal activity".

PCSO's work on the frontline of the local police force providing a visible and reassuring presence on the streets and tackling the menace of anti-social behaviour.



The Hundred Parishes Society

The buildings of the Hundred Parishes display a range of traditional construction methods and materials, some dating back many centuries. A notable feature, rarely found outside East Anglia, is pargeting. Pargeting is decorative render applied to the face of a building, either "incised", where a pattern has been cut or pressed into plasterwork, or "raised", where an image has been attached to the wall. Either type may have been crafted by hand in situ or created first using a mould or template. The incised forms were basic and not expensive, unlike the elaborate raised forms. There are several fine and varied examples across the Hundred Parishes.



Perhaps best known are the 17th-century raised images on the former Sun Inn in Saffron Walden pictured above. They depict two giant figures (whose identity is a matter of debate) and also various birds and plants – even a little dog. Also dating from the 1600s is the raised decoration on The Crown House, Newport (seen below) where legend (albeit without evidence) suggests that King Charles II may have visited his mistress, Nell Gwynn.



A fine example of incised patterns can be seen in Braughing, where panels of different patterns cover the face of The Old Forge. In Linton High Street, Chandlers has a mixture of small, ancient raised panels and extensive, more modern incised patterns. The art of creating and conserving pargeting is now pursued by only a few craftsmen. I have mentioned just a few specimens. Other parishes also have examples of pargeting. 
